This is the ease more particularly in cold and damp weather, and at this time the mistake is most commonly committed.

Preparing Trees to Endure the Winter.

As animals endure exposure to storm and cold the better when well fed and clothed, so do trees. If their shoots and buds are full and plump, and well supplied with healthful material contributed from clean healthy leaves, the chemical movements which attend growth, assist greatly in the maintaining the tree against cold by heat which

is developed. In a thin, weakly tree, this force is wanting. A great aid to the preservation of the tree is a mulch or covering of the surface during winter, with some vegetable material in a state of decomposition. This shelters the roots, and imparts warmth, evolved by its slow combustion, and the more, if nitrogeneous matter is excluded, as in stable manure, the better for the purpose. 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
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
