Look out for them.—Dangerous counterfeit one dollar Dominion bills (payable in Toronto) are in circulation. The paper is much thinner, but the engraving is singularly well executed, and, apart from the general appearance and texture by which experts can usually detect counterfeits, it is not easy to point out differences by which the bogus bills are to be distinguished from genuine. Perhaps the most noticeable difference is the engraving of the head of Jacques Cartier. In the genuine bill the neck is fairly exposed between the beard and collar, while in the bogus there is a light line immediately below the beard, and the work about the neck is done so imperfectly that it is difficult to say whether the collar reaches close up to the beard or a portion of the neck is exposed. The face of the female figure is also inferior, and much coarser in expression. The next most conspicuous difference is in the cloud work about the central figure. The line engraving in the genuine bill will here be found even, continuous anduite distinct, though souther effect is obtained by coarser and less regular lines, not continuous but dotted. In nearly all the fine work, auch as clouding, shading and scrolls, the counterfeit will be found comparatively blurred and indistinct, though so slightly that only the closest scrutiny will ensure discovery. Clipped sliver coinage is also in circulation, but, as the banks are refusing it, this petty fraud must soon come to an end, It is well, however, that handlers of small coin should be cautioned against accepting sliver the weight of which has been reduced by cutting, clipping or punching. Counterfeit American trade dollars have also found their way to Canada.
