The Anniversary.

CLOSING OF ACADIA UNIVERSITY AND AFFILIATED INSTITUTIONS.

The exercises in connection with the closing of Acadia University this week have been of the most interesting nature. The weather has been pleasant, and Wolfville has presented a pretty and lively appearance.

The exercises began on Sunday morning at 11 o'clock. The Baptist church was filled to overflowing with an expectant audience, and they were disappointed. The baccalaureate sermon was preached by Rev. Mr. Carey, of St. John.

On Monday evening a public meeting of the Senate was held in College Hall, when an able address was delivered by President Sawyer. If we find certain purposes directed to certain ends in any condition of society, there we also find active the forces of the university.

Letter from California.

Ma Emma.—The postman brings to our door once a week, a neatly wrapped newspaper among the other papers and letters, and at once all other occupation is laid aside and the contents of that little newspaper devoured.

It is a paper from home, sweet home. It is the "Wolfville Acadian."

We read with pride of the improvements being made in our native village. Oh! I beg the Mayor's pardon, and all the Councillors! Town I should have said.

We hope, Mr. Editor, that the battle will be "pushed to the gates," and that Wolfville shall have, after her water-works and street lights, electric street cars. How nice and modern it would be to find, after a long and dusty ride on the steam cars, an electric car in waiting at the station to convey passengers to their respective destinations.

Wolfville has her street lights I notice. Hope Mud Bridge is well illuminated and Johnson's Hollow also. But perhaps there are handsome residences now at both places, and so the bright white light of course.

Now, you may wish to know something of our surroundings in this great state. Let me say first that Oakland is to San Francisco as Dartmouth is to Halifax or Carlton is to St. John. Large ferry steamers, quite elaborately fitted up, and with a string band on board, ply back and forth across the bay from San Francisco to Oakland every half hour, and these boats are packed with passengers between the hours of five a. m. and twelve p. m. Business men of San Francisco, a large majority of them, have their homes in Oakland.

This city, with many fine buildings, is principally made up of cottages, lawns and flowers. Flowers everywhere, and the year around, Easter Sunday shows thousands of the beautiful calla lilies, in her church decorations. We gathered one hundred from our own garden, and there were as many more left in bud. Hedges of these pure white flowers are seen at the Presidio, the soldiers headquarters.

The principal attraction now of San Francisco (or "Frisco" for short), is the Midwinter Fair. I shall not attempt a description of that city which sprawls up like a mushroom, on the sand hills of the outskirts of Golden Gate Park, the Park of Frisco. There is an old saying: "Every dog has his day." So every body and every society has a day at the Fair. Each state has a day, each county, each organization, each leading newspaper has a day. Also the leading Universities, Stanford and Berkly, have their days.

Congresses of different societies have been, or are being held in the city of "Frisco." The "Woman's Congress of Missions" was a grand gathering of the "select ladies" such as Paul speaks of, and heart stirring speeches came from lips which had been touched with the "live coal" spoken of in Isaiah. Missionaries from Spain, India, Africa, Japan, inland China, and other distant lands, gave us words of courage and inspiration. We could feel the warmth of the fire of that love which gave Jesus to die, burning from their hearts as they spoke to us. We trust many other similar fires have been kindled.

Just how the "Temperance Congress" is in session, and Mr. Editor, if you could see the fifteen hundred saloons running night and day in San Francisco alone, you would see the incentive to action which this congress has before it.

There is a child's story of a little girl who, when she was good was very very good, but when she was bad she was horrid. So the good people of San Francisco are very very good, but the bad people are horrid. They say that "Dante's Inferno" is represented at the Fair. The comment of a Boston paper is that the whole city of Frisco wailed in would well represent the "Inferno." We object. The wicked city is saved by the Lord's loyal ones, of whom there are not a few.

I presume you are having at Wolfville your closing exercises on "College Hill" about this time. We have been having the same here at "Highland Park Baptist College," of which Dr. S. B. Morse is President. It has seemed quite like home to attend these exercises and listen to the music rich and rare, and the orations, elegant or otherwise, of the students.

Thursday, May 17th, was the graduating day of the Academy, and the class receiving diplomas was the largest this Academy has graduated.
