## Editorial Notes.

The New Brunswick Legislature will open on Thursday, Feb. 13th, and it is expected that all business will be completed and the House prorogued by good Friday, March 21st.

The fact that a Toronto newsboy named Samuel Lichtman has shown that a modest fortune through thrift and wise investments has accumulated there is still as great a chance as ever to become independent in Canada. And it does not matter what calling the ambitious and capable worker follows.

At the meeting of the Municipal Council at Kentville last week Mr. C. A. Patrinquin was re-appointed Scott Act Inspector for the ensuing year. Mr. Patrinquin has been a faithful and efficient official and has done splendid work during the past year in enforcing the law under exceedingly discouraging conditions. His efforts are fully appreciated by law-abiding citizens generally, and regret is freely expressed that he is not better paid for his services. More power to his arm!

In the movement of the markets wheat for delivery in May is again quoted at higher figures in Winnipeg than in Minneapolis, the former being an export and Minneapolis a milling centre. This has happened many times since the politicians of the Liberal party discovered that the commercial salvation of Canada depended upon the acceptance of the Tait Fielding plan of putting the Canadian farmer on the same level as his neighbor in the United States at Minneapolis and other places.

The suggestion made by THE ACADIAN last week with regard to the approaching civic election appears to have met with very general approval, and nomination papers for Mayor Chambers and the three returning councillors, Messrs. Hales, Bishop and Sleep, have been circulated and largely signed. A nomination paper has also been circulated for Mr. F. J. Porter, whose card, along with that of Mayor Chambers, appears in this issue. Next Tuesday will decide whether there are any other aspirants for civic honors.

On account of illness Prof. H. G. Black was obliged to resign his position at Acadia University some weeks ago. Mr. Neilson C. Hannay, who will have charge of the work in English for the next term, arrived in Wolfville this week. He comes from Schenectady, N. Y., and has been assistant professor in English in the Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute at Troy for the past ten years. He is a graduate of Union College and Auburn Theological Seminary and has taken post-graduate work in Glasgow, Scotland, and Halle, Germany. THE ACADIAN gladly welcomes him to Wolfville.

So far as we have been able to learn the Municipal Council at its annual meeting at Kentville last week took no action in the direction of providing for the prisoners serving sentence in the jail being required to earn their board. The Council has never been a very progressive body and in reading over the report of its doings one is not impressed with the feeling that our Municipal rulers are deeply interested in the welfare and prosperity of their constituents. It might be well when the time comes for replacing the men now sitting at the board for the ratepayers of the county to take this into consideration.

Hon. Frank Cochrane assured a deputation representing the Union of Canadian Municipalities that he was in sympathy with their contention that municipalities should, through the railway commission, have control of their streets as against great power companies. He also intimated that an amendment to the railway act to this end might be brought in this session. Control of their streets by municipalities has become a particularly important question in Ontario where the situation was brought to a head not so long ago by an adverse decision of the Privy Council in the dispute between the Niagara Power Company and the municipality of North Toronto.

The provincial bye-election in Antigonish county on Thursday of last week resulted in the return of the Conservative candidate, Mr. J. S. O'Brien, by a majority of 399 votes, over Hon. Christopher Chisholm, the late Commissioner of Works and Mines. The election was held to fill the vacancy caused by the appointment to the Senate of Mr. E. L. Gerrior, who carried the county for the first time in twenty years for the Conservative party by a majority of about thirty at the general election in 1911. These bye-elections have been held in Nova Scotia since the general election and all have gone against the government. Two of these were held in very strong Liberal counties and the result seems to point to the downfall of the present local government when the people shall have another opportunity of passing judgment upon it.

## Municipal Council.

The Municipal Council of Kings County met at the Court House, Kentville, on Tuesday, Jan. 14th, at 10 o'clock.

Minutes of April Term, 1912, and of special term held 12th December were read and approved.

Read petition of Frank E. Fuller and Annie M. Stuart, of Grand Pre, asking that an unused road at that place be closed and the land transferred to the ownership of Miss Stuart. Solicitor Roscoe suggested that such action could not be taken at this session as the procedure required by the statute providing for the closing of roads had not been followed. Action was accordingly deferred to April Term.

Read petition from Mr. William E. Ward, setting forth that his property along Chester Road was subject to injury from water and dirt washed in from that road and asking that Council take steps to remove the cause. Mr. Roscoe said the Council had no jurisdiction in the matter and no action was taken.

A petition for new road from Kingston to Melveva Square was read and H. J. Nelly appointed Commissioner.

A petition for a new road along water front in Canning was read and Arch Foster appointed Commissioner.

Read petition for new road from lands of Lorenzo Roush to warehouse of New Minas Fruit Company. William Bishop, of Sunnyside, appointed Commissioner.

Petition for change of road in Ward 9 to avoid hill. Prof. A. B. Coldwell appointed Commissioner.

Petition of J. F. Kinman and Harry Newcombe for leave to lay water-pipes along highway in Centreville. Prayer granted. Pipes to be laid under supervision of Councillor for Ward.

Read Report of Commissioner H. J. Nelly re road at Kingston Station through lands of estate of Mary Alice Power. No damages. Report received and adopted, proceedings confirmed and road established.

Report of Health Officer, (Dr. P. N. Balcom) read and adopted.

The Committee on Lunatics reported that, in accordance with resolution of Council at April Term, thirteen "harmless lunatics" chargeable to this Municipality, had been removed from the Nova Scotia Hospital, Dr. Sinclair, Inspector of Charitable Institutions, declined to approve their removal to the Annapolis County institution at Bridgetown. Twelve were accordingly removed to Truro; the other, whose parents objected to her removal to Truro, was now at Bridgetown. The saving to the Municipality would amount to \$663. Report adopted.

Reports of Trustees School Lands, Horton and Cornwallis, received and ordered filed.

Read letter from Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities asking that this Council affiliate with that organization and name delegates to attend its next meeting at Bridgewater. No action taken.

Council took recess, reassembling at 2 p.m.

A motion that Councillors Donaldson and Baiser be excused from attendance at this term of Council, on account of illness, passed unanimously.

Mr. H. B. Newcombe, President of the Kings County Temperance Alliance, asked that delegations be heard.

The Rev. J. D. Spidell and Mr. C. I. Wolfe then addressed the Council, asking that Mr. C. A. Patrinquin be appointed Inspector under the Canada Temperance Act.

The Rev. W. J. Rutledge and Mr. S. H. Chute argued that action be taken to provide work for prisoners incarcerated in the County jail.

The Rev. T. C. Mellor and Mr. H. Slais appeared on behalf of the League for the Care and Protection of the Feeble minded and asked the Council to give its approval to the movement to provide for the care of that class at the public expense.

The Report of the Board of Revision and Appeal was read. No alteration had been made in the general valuation of the several wards. A few individual assessments had been varied.

The report of Overseers of Poor were read. Horton asked for assessment of \$1200 for support of poor and purchase of a pair of horses. The report was received and the assessment ordered. Couss, Reid voting against.

Overseers for Cornwallis asked \$2,000. O's motion of Couss. Halsey an assessment of \$1700 was ordered.

Overseers for Aylesford asked \$750 Ordered.

The Report of R. C. Dickey, Municipal Treasurer, was read and adopted.

Coun. S. C. Parker asked in regard to discrepancy between accounts of late treasurer and the bank took. It was explained that, as instructed at April Term, the clerk had rendered account in due form to the administrators of the estate of the late Mr. Dickey for the sum of \$1025, the amount reported by auditors, as balance due the Municipality. The administrators filed the claim on to the Municipal Council. As a result of the inquiry that followed, the estate administrator

## POULTRY METHODS

Below we give the record of a pen of also White Orpingtons belonging to Mr. Frank Smith, a New Brunswick farmer, who conscientiously endeavored to produce the best result possible from his small flock. The records established do not furnish anything really remarkable, but the account is interesting, if for no other reason than that each pullet was named, and the owner has been able to give the time each commenced to lay and the number of eggs laid up to a stated time. Mr. Smith states that at the time these pullets started laying it was from 20 to 25 degrees below zero. In January he received 27 eggs from the five oldest. Following is the interesting record—

## BASIS OF BUSINESS

President Taft Says It is a Protective Tariff

One of the most striking features of the recent United States Presidential campaign is the tenacity with which the above candidates have adhered to the principle of moderate protection as the policy calculated to contribute materially to the national development of the country. In speaking on the tariff question last year President Taft said: "The business of the country rests on a protective tariff. The people are really realizing that a disturbance of business by a change in the tariff and a threat of injury to the industries of the country ought to be avoided, and that nothing could help so much to minimize the fear of destructive changes as the known existence of a reliable source of information for legislative action." The deep interest in the matter of an impartial ascertainment of facts before any new revision was evidenced by an effort to pass a tariff-commission bill in the short session of the Sixty-first Congress, in which many of both parties united.

In his reference to the Wilson tariff of 1894, which gave manufacturers free wool but provided for duties on woolen manufactures the President said: "It is the only experience we have had for a generation of a radical revision of this schedule, and without exaggerating its importance, one pledged to a moderate protection policy may well hesitate before giving approval without full information to legislation which makes a more radical reduction in the protection actually afforded to manufacturers of wool than the Wilson Act."

## "BUY CANADIAN-MADE GOODS"

The above maxim is one that should be prominently considered by each and every Canadian citizen, for it is of great moment and importance to the condition and welfare of any country seeks to attain. The result of purchasing abroad goods and materials which can be supplied at home is strikingly displayed by government statistics, which form sufficient evidence to prove that Canada is not in any position to be considered a resource through the trade and commerce to purchase beyond the country's needs will in time cause results of a noticeable character and this is being done at present at a rate unsatisfactory to Canadian industry. Money expended in this way must mean a corresponding loss of work and the credit of the country must naturally be impaired as in the case of any individual who spends beyond his means. Expenditure must be concentrated and made in the country in which it is earned, before the habit of original purchase will eventually be broken and the credit of Canadian industry will be maintained.
