A KINGLY EXAMPLE

For many months Sweden has been the unfortunate theatre of the most gigantic general strike of modern times. Thousands of workmen left off work, or were locked out, as the result of differences with the Employers' Association. In spite of government interference, the dispute is still far from being settled. The latest move in the matter is that of King Gustavus himself who, not satisfied with the result of his attempt at arbitration last August, has now determined to seek his information from the laborers at first hand. On the fourth instant he inaugurated a new departure for monarchs. In order to obtain the workers' version of the dispute and thus discover the real cause of the trouble, the King disguised as a Stevedore hired as a laborer, freely mixing with the working class on terms of perfect equality. He will join various crafts in like manner, until he has served his purpose. Before his experiment ends, his thoughts will have acquired a new horizon, and he should then be qualified to suggest a permanent remedy for the disastrous industrial war that threaten to ruin more than one country and to even destroy the foundations of modern civilization. If more governors, superintendents and stockholders followed the plan of Gustavus the coming of the Universal Brotherhood would be unmeasurably hastened.

ACQUISITION OF BRANCH LINES

In the House of Commons on Tuesday there was an important session on the bill authorizing the government to lease branch lines connecting with the Intercolonial Railway. The acquisition of branch lines is a policy that has been followed by large company-owned lines in Canada and the government is taking a progressive and business like step in connection with the I. C. R. branch lines. The acquisition of these feeder railroads will contribute to the prosperity of the sections of the country they serve, and will prove beneficial to the Intercolonial. The action of the government in this respect is worthy of much praise; and especial credit is due Hon. H. R. Emmerson, who has repeatedly emphasized the importance of adopting the policy of taking over branch lines.

During the debate in the House on Tuesday it was shown that the Intercolonial has many friends who are emphatically opposed to its sale or lease to any private corporation. Hon. Mr. Graham, Minister of Railways, replying to remarks from the Opposition side, said that the government proposed to adhere to the policy of government ownership and operation. The railway magnates and their friends, who are anxious to hand over the Intercolonial to a private corporation ought to realize that the country generally is opposed to any such retrograde movement as the sale or lease of the government by this time that not only in the Maritime Provinces, but in Central and western portions of the Dominion, the trend of public opinion is towards curtailing rather than enlarging the powers of railway corporations. Still the enemies of the Intercolonial will doubtless persist in their efforts to discredit the road and create public sentiment favorable to its transfer to a company. Those who favor the maintenance of the Intercolonial as the property of the government, under the public control, should neglect no opportunity to combat the agitation in favor of getting rid of the road.—Transcript.



The Chatham curlers are planning a big north shore bonspiel for this winter. There are eight or nine clubs in the north shore counties and all of them are to be invited to send rinks to compete for prizes. It is proposed to flood the exhibition building rink for the occasion. Hotel-keepers and citizens generally will unite in providing suitable prizes, and a grand gathering of jolly curlers may be expected.

SMELT FISHING

Good smelt catches are still reported by fishermen and the indications are that the season will be an extra good one. One night about \$2,500 worth of fish were caught and Tuesday's haul was also a good one. One fisherman with three nets took in over three tons of smelt, and as fish were selling at 5 cents per pound he netted over \$350. Prices have ranged from five to six cents, which is higher than in previous years. An average smelt season is worth \$30,000 to the fishermen of the Miramichi and it is now expected that this season will be better than usual.

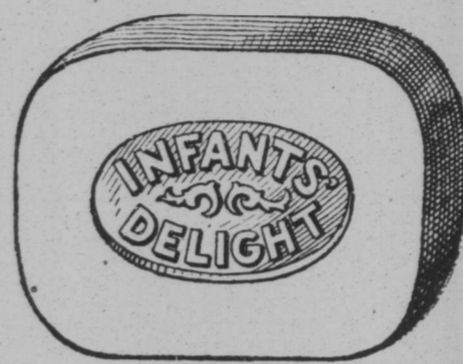
