



Changes in the Admiralty.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-day. Important changes in the Admiralty are announced. Admiral Bridgeman, Commander in Chief of the Home Fleet, is appointed First Sea Lord, replacing Admiral of the Fleet Wilson. Vice Admiral, Prince Louis of Battenburg, becomes Second Sea Lord, replacing Vice-Admiral Egerton. Captain Pakenham, Commander of the battleship Collingwood, becomes Fourth Sea Lord, replacing Rear Admiral Madden. Rear Admiral Briggs, the present Third Sea Lord, retaining his present position. The changes in the Admiralty came as a surprise and is evidently the outcome of Churchill's transference to the Admiralty. In his comments in answer to a question to-night, Churchill denies the changes implied any reflection on the outgoing Sea Lords, who he pointed out were due to retire early in 1912. He explained that important decisions must soon be taken, which would regulate the naval policy of the coming two years. It was therefore considered advisable to make the changes now. These were necessary to unify the Admiralty Board and would lead to more effective work in administration and efficiency. The rumors, continued Churchill, suggesting that absolute security had not always been maintained were completely unfounded. The changes must not be held to imply any radical changes in naval policy, but rather the development of progressive lines of the reform policy instituted when Admiral Wilson was appointed to head the disorders. Battenburg has a great reputation as a scientific and practical officer. Pakenham has a unique experience, as a naval attaché to Admiral Togo's flagship through the Russo-Jap war.

NEWS FROM PRETORIA.—Messrs. Shree & Co. had a wireless from R. M. S. Pretorian at 6 o'clock this morning stating she was then 23 miles east of St. John's and due to arrive here to-morrow morning; all well.



Grey Well Backed Up.

It was hardly to be expected that the German Press would receive the firm though friendly speeches of Sir Edward Grey and Mr. Asquith effusively. Recent events precluded the probability of a welcome of the kind. The Germans had shaken the mail fist, and afterwards had found it necessary to wave the olive branch. The cause of the change was the determination of the Briton to live up to his bargain with the Frenchman in 1904. It was natural enough that a reiteration of the determination to stand by the entente of 1904 should not meet with a warm welcome in Germany, even when submitted in courteous and considerate words, and coupled with a public offer to live on friendly terms with Germany, so far as was consistent with the interests and honour of the Empire and the obligation of older friendships. Instead of finding Grey sacrificed to German pride, Germany finds the Government united and firm and backed strongly by the Unionist leaders in both the House of Commons and the House of Lords.

THE TURKEY.



The turkey is a pampered pet of fortune. He never has to do any work and lives as luxuriously as the conductor of a sleeping car. About Thanksgiving time he is led out into the barn and deprived of his breath, after which he is surrounded by cranberry sauce and family reunions. The turkey is a very intricately constructed bird, and Borroughs tells us that he contains 587 more bones than a carp. These bones are usually in plain view of the man who tries to carve a turkey in the presence of a circle of skeptical and unfeeling relatives. The host who can unhook a turkey's wishbone without taking it by the lap or putting one foot on its neck is deserving of a better fate than having to go to the mat with a lean wing. The surest test of moral heroism is the ability to dissect a Thanksgiving turkey which has lived past the allotted age of man without doing a nimble two-step around the dining room table. Compared with the anatomy of the turkey, the mechanism of a Corliss engine looks as simple as a dress pattern for a kimono. The turkey gobbler is a very cheery and unsocial bird and is subject to melancholia. He runs mostly to dark meat and gizzard and is about as mealy and toothsome as an alligator bag. He also has a highly vindictive beak, which he sharpens on the legs of small boys and dogs of an inquisitive and prying nature. The President of the United States is the only man in this country who has to eat a turkey gobbler for Thanksgiving, and on this account we should be more patient with our presidents.

Stricken Suddenly With Paralysis.

At 4 p.m. yesterday Mr. Caldwell, the Supt. Moulder at the Consolidated Foundry, while at his business there was suddenly stricken with paralysis, and for a while was so ill that it was feared he would die. Mr. S. W. Corrick, his manager, his brother, and the 11-fat-man's fellow-workers were quickly about the prostrate man and vied with each other in their watchful summons and, as he slowly came, did everything that professional skill could suggest for the sufferer and accompanied him to hospital in the ambulance. He died this morning.

Fined for Embazzling.

Horwood and accused of embazzling \$8.20 was again before court when the case was continued and quite a number of witnesses were called and examined both by the Inspector General and Mr. G. B. Ayre for the defence. The outcome was that accused was found guilty and sentenced to pay \$40 and costs or go down for 2 months. He paid the fine.

Mr. A. English Writes

ON OIL SHALE, ALBERTITE, &c.

Dear Sir,—In last Friday's Chronicle appeared an article on the oil shale of Deer Lake. The writer of that article would have it appear that albertite is obtained as a product of the distillation of the shale. I ventured to write the editor of the Chronicle pointing out the error. In my note I also asked two or three questions. My communication has been ignored. I wished to know what period the shales of Deer Lake are referred by our Geological Survey, and thought that the editor of the Chronicle could likely furnish the information, as he gives us a lot of geology, mineralogy, etc., in his new book, "Newfoundland in 1911." Perhaps he has not had time to look it up. It is important to intelligent prospecting that the prospector should know to what formation the rocks of any given region belong. Newspapers should be sure of the reliability of their information before giving it publicity. Albertite, as I pointed out to the Chronicle, is a distinct mineral altogether independent of oil shale. It is a form of coal, intermediate between camel coal and asphalt.

No doubt it is a matter of small moment to the author of "Newfoundland in 1911" to confuse albertite with oil shale and make it a by-product, as the following might show. I have read with much amusement Mr. McGrath's new book, especially those parts of it that treat of geology, mineralogy, etc. It would seem that in attempting such subjects the author got beyond his depth. Here is a sample of technical errors, ambiguous terms. On page 98 he speaks of hematite iron; page 106 it is repeated. On the same page he says "large areas within its confines are occupied by igneous and eruptive materials, evidencing extended volcanic action in the formative periods of its (the island's) history."

There is no evidence of such extended volcanic action. Where are large tracts of igneous rock? I should like to ask. On page 99 large bodies of sulphurates are mentioned, and on the next page we are told that these sulphurates yield, besides copper and sulphur, gold. Now these bodies of sulphurates that did not yield gold, the fact of being sulphurates at all means that they carry gold. On page 102 mention is made of ores of galena or lead. Now galena is ore of lead, and lead is the metal; therefore the ore is ore of lead, and not ore of galena. Out of the following it is very hard to pick McGrath's meaning: "Some of the galena ores show high percentages of silver, and have yielded as much as 400 ounces to the ton of metal." It would seem that ores here again confused with metals. We are also told of many beaches made up of stones, worn smooth by the ceaseless action of the waves.

We are not told of any beaches whose stones have been made rough by the same agency. We are not told to what use these polished stones are being put by the people who are exporting them. The historian should know, if anybody else does. What is the good of telling us what we already know, especially if we are told that badly.

On page 105 we are told of something having been submerged in pre-historic times, but the writer does not make it quite clear what it was submerged. This much is clear, it was the remainder of something. Perhaps he meant the remainder of Bell Island. How does Mr. McGrath know that it was not an elevation of only one part or a tilting up of the strata of the eastern side which really took place, and not a submergence?

On page 115 we are told that the "rocks of the carboniferous formation always underlie good soil." This is a statement that I think Mr. McGrath will have some trouble in sustaining, especially if he believes that we have the carboniferous system at Goose Brook, Howley, etc.

Mr. McGrath has been "studiously moderate" in all he says of the country. He says we have oak, elm, ash, hemlock; but, like a modest fellow, he does not say how many oaks, etc., we have, or whether they are indigenous or exotic. The author is also modest in placing Newfoundland tenth in the scale of size among the islands of the world. Newfoundland is not by any means the tenth largest island, although our school geographies tell us so. Those books should be revised.

I have not enumerated a tithe of the mistakes to be found in Mr. McGrath's book, such as "brumious mist" (p. 181), "On page 180 we are told that Montreal experienced cold so severe as to send the mercury to 33 degrees below zero, centigrade. In the same sentence we are told that this is equal to 59.4 degrees Fahrenheit of frost. What is meant by degrees of frost it is hard to say. How 33 below zero C. is made to equal 59.4 F. is quite an enigma.

Considering that the package fell a distance of 50 feet when it struck, the wonder is that instant death was not his portion.

A pension plan for the benefit of the 15,000 employees of Armour & Company, based on a gift of \$1,000,000 from President J. Ogden Armour, became operative Nov. 1st. Employees who have served twenty years may be pensioned after reaching 57 years of age. Women may retire at 50.

The late census of the United States shows that the percentage of colored people in the whole population is decreasing. Thirty years ago men classified as white constituted 86 1/2 per cent of the whole; in 1910 they constituted about 90 per cent. Moreover, the blacks while they increased in number between 1900 and 1910, did so at a lesser rate than in the previous ten years.

The seedless lemon, to produce which botanical experts had unsuccessfully labored for many years, has been discovered in California. The bulb from which the trees now bearing the seedless lemon have been grown, came from a sample labeled "Citron of Commerce." Fruit growers believe that the fruit was created through budding.

Ever seeking for something new, the leaders of fashion in Paris have decided upon an innovation for this

winter, which is likely to cause considerable sensation if it is ever transplanted to this northern climate. In fashionable soirees women are to have the feet and ankles bare. Although delicate white satin shoes with floral borders may be allowed, in exceptional cases, on condition that the flowers shall be natural and shall leave the bare ankles.

Lansdowne Backs the Government

Special to Evening Telegram.

LONDON, To-day.
The Lords discussed Anglo-German affairs without any fresh revelations. Lord Courtney, Liberal, attacked the Government. Lord Morley and Lord Lansdowne defended it. Courtney desired to know why the British could not come to an arrangement with Germany as they had done with France, Russia and the States. He declared that Lloyd George had been guilty of an outburst of which no Englishman could be proud, and one that naturally promoted ill-feeling in Germany and brought the country into a real peril of war. Morley said the entente of 1904 was an agreement giving Britain a free hand in Egypt and to France a free hand in Morocco. As Britain had enjoyed her share of the benefits of the agreement, it would be intolerable to have refused France hers. The whole nation, continued Morley, was intensely desirous of friendship with Germany. There was no reason why the German naval programme should diminish that desire. But they must consider all the circumstances. Morley declared that Grey had done everything possible to encourage a better feeling. No Cabinet had ever met with a greater intention of not drifting into a single unnecessary antagonism. Lansdowne said that the entente with France was the dominant factor in Britain's foreign policy.

Germans are Pessimistic.

BERLIN, To-day.
Newspapers which published the full text of the speeches delivered on Monday in the House of Commons by Sir Edward Grey and Prime Minister Asquith are rather pessimistic in tone as to the chances that they will improve Anglo-German relations, although they consider it is not necessary they will make them worse.

Threatening a Tie-Up.

LONDON, To-day.
The Seamen's and Firemen's Union threaten to tie up the Atlantic Transport Co. on account of the discharge of several seamen from the steamer Mimicaba for refusing to obey orders. The Union says it will not allow any vessels of the line to sail until the men are reinstated.

Rebels Surrender

Special Evening Telegram.

Pekin, To-day.
The surrender of Wei Chang by the rebels to-day was provisional, with a view of saving the city from destruction. The revolutionaries at Hankow asked for a 7 days armistice, during which an attempt will be made to secure the consent of the other provinces to the acceptance of the Imperial Government's terms, including the preservation of the Manchu dynasty.

A Gallant Effort.

Special to Evening Telegram.

LONDON, To-day.
A despatch from Tien Tsin says a relief party of Englishmen under Captain Soperby started for Sian Fu, Shen Si Province, to make an attempt to rescue any foreigners who may remain in the city. Recent despatches received tell of the killing of many foreigners and the flight of others, but no direct word has come out of Sian Fu for a long time.


