MARY MARCH.

There are no darker chapters in the white man's progress than those that record the fate of the original inhabitants of the conquered territories. As noted in our feature "This Date in History" on Wednesday, Mary March was brought to St. John's in 1819. While not the last of the Beothicks, a short four years after saw the finish of this Indian race found in Newfoundland. The first rude trappers, hunters and fishermen, as they spread into the northern parts of the Island, were outside the control of the law and were but little disposed to try conciliation and kindness on a tribe of savages whose presence interfered with their pursuits. Beothicks were hunted down as vermin and destroyed, and in something over three hundreds years, when an expedition was organized to penetrate to their last retreat at Red Indian Lake, only their graves and the mouldering remains of their wigwams were found. Their tools, their arrowheads were to be seen, but they had gone,



the children went to the poor of this city. I was surprised to see this thing here in Vancouver, while at home it was only what one expected, if anyone did-poor during the summer voyage. When at home you would hear one say if it was a poor voyage, "Let us go out of this country we cannot live here, let us go to Vancouver, where there's lots of money," no doubt, but I tell you, it is not so easy earned when they come here, and I tell you that it's hard to get the chance here now. Ever since the first of January until now, almost everything has been tied up; one can hardly buy a job if he wanted one. And another thing you will hear also, "When you get to Vancouver they will not rob us of what we earn like some do at home," I have heard it said. Well boys of Terra Nova, harken to me-if you come here without a few thousand dollars you will soon find your mistake. If you have the money you can live at home and that is all you will do here, for I can tell you that as soon as you put your foot on this soil all you will hear is money! money! all you will hear is money! money! and it almost seems as if the cry comes from the ground. If you go down town you will hear some one telling you, go inside, everything is going cheap, so you may go in and buy, but I tell you it's no sale, it's a graft in most places. It seems as if graft in most places. It seems as if most things here are done by graft. Now barbers at home do not look at this, you may get wise to this price which I am going to say a word about, so as you may get to learn a little of this rich city. I suppose they saw ne coming. I went in to a barber's hop to get a hair cut and a shampoo. went through the process and when e was finished I asked what he charged and the feeble answer was wo dollars and fifty. What do you think of it? That was the Union price, he told me. Now boys can you get treated any worse at home? I doubt it; no use of kicking, pay and get out. It seems as if they can charge what they wish. I suppose this is about the worst place in the world for graft. Poor people have but very little chance to live here, especially if they have a large family to keep; it would take them all their time to keep the wolf away. What about now, you may say. Well it's bad enough. According to reports people are starving for the want of food and coal. Yes, that is another thing. The total number of German blue-jackets and naval officers killed as the result of the ramming of the torpedo boat destroyer, S 178, by the cruiser Yorck, off Heligoland, is greater than was at first supposed. The official death-list issued by the Admiralty to-day shows 2 officers and 69 men perished, not, however, by drowning, but because most of them were frozen to death, while clinging to loose spars after the vessel sank. A belated account of the disaster stated that the Destroyer, while crossing the bow of the Yorck, became unmanageable, owing to terrific seas, and was cut in two by the bigger vessel, which was going at full speed. The storm made rescue impossible. Many of the communications possible. Many of the corpses were not picked up until this morning.

VIENNA, March 6. According to a Constantinople de spatch, the Turkish cruiser' Hamidieh, to-day sank three Greek transports, loaded with Servian troops on their way to Servia. The attack on the transports occurred near the peninsula of Hagion Oros in the Aegean Sea. This would make it appear that the transports were proceeding to the transports were proceeding Gallipoli, where it was proposed son time ago by the Balkan Allies to make a flank attack on the Turkish troops defending the Dardanelles. The convoy of Greek transports was a large one, consisting of 24 vessels, which carried 34 guns. They were encountered by the cruiser shortly after they had left the coast. With her powerful 4.7 guns she was able to create havon among the practically unprotecte transports loaded with soldiers.

ATHENS, March 6.
The Turkish fortress of Janina was entered at 9 a.m. to-day by three squadrons of Greek Cavalry under General Souzo. The Greek Army took 32,000 Turkish prisoners, comprising and many refugees from Monastin and other places. 




