



#### Canals Huns Hate.

Soldiers Now Guard Great Waterways. Big inter-oceanic canals are the arteries of the world's commerce; and it is, therefore, not surprising that they should be plotted against in time of war, and by enemies like the Germannana.

great lakes with the sea.

They would also, in all probability, have drowned some thousands of American and Canadian citizens. For the Welland Canal, in order to get cound the Niagara Falls, drops some nundreds of feet sheer in the course of a few miles. This it does by a series of gigantic locks, ranged one above the other, like steps of stairs. The idea of the conspirators was to dynamite one of the upper locks, so hat the resultant flood might destroy he others, and eventually sweep away the viriges along the Niagara river, with their inhabitants. Had they succeeded there would have been a flood atastrophe unequalled in the world's

ertain Irish-American dynamitards in 1890, and these nearly succeeded in carrying their design into execution. There is a curious similarity, too, between their methods and those adopted by von Papen's secret service agents. Each meant to blow up the anal at the same spot, each carried the dynamite to Niagara concealed in suit cases, and so on. The Germans, short, copied the methods of the Irish-Americans down to the minutes

Similarly, the Corinth Canal. Greece's great inter-oceanic artificial waterway, has twice since the war began secretly attacked and its destruction attempted by desperadoes in the pay of Austria; and it is now

guarded on both banks and at every few yards by Greek soldiers. The Suez Canal, too, has been at-tacked both openly and covertly; and hould war break out between Germany and the United States, we shall doubtles hear very shortly of plots to destroy the Panama Canal, that su-preme triumph of engineering skill. The Hun stops at nothing to gain his nefarious ends.—Pearson's Weekly.

The London correspondent of the Tribune cables: "David Lloyd George is to succeed Earl Kitchener as Secretary of State for War, according to well authenticated reports curre here to-day. It is understood how here to-day. It is understood how-ever, that in accepting the War Sec-retaryship Lloyd George will not en-tirely sever his relations with the Ministry of Munitions. Various suc-cessors have been suggested for Kit-chener, including Lord Milner and Churchill. The latter is again enjoying Asquith's favor, while his quarrel bility for the Gallipoli disaster has been patched up and they are again fast friends. Both Lord Milner and Churchill, as far as the Cabinet is concerned might be intrusted with the direction of the War Office since the direction of the War Office since the creation of the War Council and the turning over of the responsibility for the operations in the field to General Robertson, Chief of Staff. Lord Kitchener's duties had become almost entirely civil and administrative, but fortunately for Mr. Asquith the British public demands as the successor fortunately for Mr. Asquith the British public demands as the successor to Lord Kitchener a man of equal calibre. The people will not be satisfied with the appointment of the mere civilian or politician to the post they have been accustomed to associate with the greatness of K. of K. Hence Asquith, as he did in the Munition crisis, and in the present situation in Ireland, has had to turn to Lloyd George. He has been reluctant to do this for several reasons. In recent months the relations between the two men have been somewhat strained.
