Objects to Daylight Bill.

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir.—Please allow me space your esteemed paper for a protest against the Daylight Saving Act. It s well known how it was imposed on the country without the people having the privilege of going for it against it. Hence it is like a highhanded piece of Prussianism. Things are coming to a pretty pass in this country when one man can get up a scheme and dictate to the whole population what daylight can be had and what daylight can't be had. All ensible people know that Providence s well capable of judging how much day and how much night is best for the earth's inhabitants. One would think that three hours of daylight, when the work of the day is finished. are sufficient for most people of the city, the majority of whom are only waiting for sunset,—the only part of the summer's day that can be called cool-before taking a walk round our country lakes and roads, after the work and heat of the day is over. It is evident, Mr. Editor, that more daylight is not needed in Newfoundland for the Summer months. We have about eighteen hours of sunshine out of the twenty-four. That is plenty of time for recreation for practical people. As for the outports, last Summer, it caused no little confusion in the majority of the larger settlements. All the mercantile firms gnored the Bill, while the Banks and Railways complied with it. The same applied to the denominational schools. The S. A. and C. E. conformed to what is known as fast or Newfoundland time; while the Methodist and R. C. retained the slow or standard time, and confusion often crose which could not happen were there but one time alone to be kept. Hence it is as much of a wasting rather than of a saving of daylight. Evidently the only practical thing to be done is to abolish the Act altogether and retain standard time lone. Then none would have reason for complaint. Newfoundland went daylight saving, with Canada and America the past few years, but

Canada and America have learned better since and have seen the imracticability of daylight saving, and have discontinued it. It is hoped now while the "House" is in session that Newfoundland will do the same. Yours truly,

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




