



British Expert

SUGGESTS LIMIT ON AIR ARMA-MENTS.

LONDON. August 8-Major-General Sir Frederick Maurice, who was Chief of Military Operations for Great Britain during the war, declares in an article on the increase in the air forces of France and Britain that "it is high time the question of limitation of armaments is taken up seriously." He says that the British Government's recent decision to nearly double England's present air equipment meant a return to competition in armaments and that such competition is not likely to lead to improved relations

between the two countries. General Maurice emphasizes Great Britain's willingness to enter into a conference on the reduction of air armaments similar to the Washingon conference on naval armaments. But for the present, he says, Britain must, out of self-protection, bring her air strength up to that of France. "France," says he; "in the only country which within the next ten years is likely to be able to consider eriously an attack upon England rom the air. To-day we are not in he most romote danger of invasion which comes by sea. Therefore, for the first time for centuries, the navy has ceased to be our first line of home defence, and that role has de-

If we are to have a house-cleaning in our public affairs, it must be thorough. Every facility must be given to the Commission to enable it to arrive at a definite and satisfactory decision. In the interests alike of the public and those against whom charges are made, there must be no verdict of 'not proven.'

Give Us a Leader.

We welcome the endorsation of the Daily News to our suggestion that most of our troubles can be traced to lack of leadership. The assertion of another contemporary that what we need more than a strong leader is a strong people presupposes the fallacy that the people are weak. Diplomats Abroad

MUST PAY HEAVILY TO ENTER-

Washington, Aug. 8. (A.P.)-The comp of European courts has not dereased noticeably since the war, according to reports of American diplomats to the State Department. American Ambassadors are continuing their complaints of inadequate salaries to meet the heavy drain of social entertainment, and are citing post-war troubles of entertaining royalty at functions which equal or surpass the gilded affairs of pre-war days in Europe.

For instance, the state dinner given recently by George Harvey, American Ambassador to the Court of St. James, to the British royal family set back the American envoy something over 8,000-for one dinner and trimmings. In fact, the trimmings constituted a large part of the bill, palms and ferns given standing room In the fireplaces of the American embassy for the occasion.

Tradesmen holding the reval favor have to be reckoned with in the entertainment provided by American diplomats. The caterers are virtually chosen for the American entertainer by the lord chamberlain of the royal palace, no unknown or plebian chefs being permitted to cook for or serve the king or queen. Decorators florists and a train of other tradesen having the royal approval also must be selected by the American host and their word, as well as their bills, go a long way in directing the

Entertainment occasionally of the rulers of the nations to which they are accredited is an inescapable duty of American diplomats, who are provided with no entertainment fund to cover the costs of food and service. A few are wealthy enough to bear extraordinary expenditures for social ntertainment, but the poorer ones, ay that the war has not toned down the "class" of the required social


