The Scramble for Seats

LONDON, Eng.—(Canadian Press)—The scramble for seats by about 600 M.P.'s in the British House of Commons, which comfortably seats only 300, has been notorious for so many years that it has come to be regarded almost as an established system which may go on forever. The system is due to two causes: First, the entire break-up of the moral law by which it was recognized that if a member occupied a particular seat for one session his right by courtesy to retain it was generally accepted during the Parliamentary period. This is still conceded by the older members in many cases, such as the case of T. P. O'Connor. Its survival in a very great measure reached the period of 1912.

Since then, however, the advent of many new members has almost, if not quite, destroyed the practice. Originally the placing of a new hat on the bench was considered a recognized legal claim. After many hats had been irreparably "squashed" this system was replaced by tickets distributed by a messenger from the cross benches on the Government side inside the House, who hands them to members as they come up in a queue. The member, after writing his name on the ticket, places it on the seat he wishes to occupy, or whatever seat is vacant.

This alone, however, does not establish his legal right, except he is there at prayers and places the card in the socket in the back of the bench.

Any member who does not take the precaution to secure his seat by the foregoing method can with impunity ignore the claim of the first-comer should the first comer absent himself from prayers.

This, in some measure, accounts for the scrimmage which on more than one occasion has put to blush a rugby football match. This is particularly evident in every new Parliament within the memory of any present member and in every new Parliament since 1919 has become more intensely wrong than it had ever been before.

All records, however, were broken at the opening of the new Parliament in February last, and most of the M.P.'s agreed that the system is utterly wrong, and that some change is required in the interest of the dignity of the Mother of Parliaments.

"This time," writes James Sexton, Labor Member for St. Helens, in the Daily News, "in spite of my present and early rising and being sixth in the queue, I was rather ruthlessly

swept away and smothered beneath the humus (or shall I say inhuman?) avalanches which literally walked over my prostrate and unoffending body. Three lady members were hustled, one of them losing her hat in the struggle, while I found myself without a place wherein to rest my weary body, and am still a political lemming for all practical purposes.

"Surely the wit of man can devise some more dignified method than this. Either there should be a place where tickets could be delivered in order without having the pitch rushed and with some protection for the officer who distributes the tickets, and each member take his proper place in the queue, or else a free trade in seats—if the old established courtesy is to go by the board—by which the member forfeits his seat when he leaves it and another takes his place. The only other alternative is adequate accommodation for at least 50 per cent. of the members on the floor of the House.

"No doubt the change over from one side of the House to the other, and the sudden influx of two parties to the Government side is somewhat responsible for the scene. It may also be true that these scenes are only aggravated in the beginning of new parliaments. But even this does not provide any excuse, and in the present catch-as-catch-can state of politics, one never knows how often there may be a recurrence."

The Shah's Crown in Danger While He Enjoys Life in Paris

Prince's Accident Due to Spectators on the Race Course--Belgium to Raise no More Loans Except for Public Utilities--Singapore Base Scheme Will Not be Carried Out.

REPUBLICAN MOVEMENT IN PERSIA GROWING.

PARIS, March 18. Official confirmation has been received by the French Foreign Office through diplomatic channels of the reports that the Republican movement in Persia was assuming a serious aspect for the dynasty. Thirty-six former ministers of the crown in the course of a meeting pledged themselves to demand the abolition of the present regime and the creation of a Republic.

SHAH SURPRISED AT INTEREST IN HIS AFFAIRS.

PARIS, March 18. The Shah of Persia, through one of his aides, expressed surprise to-day that the public seemed so keenly interested in the reports that he was in danger of losing his throne. The ruler, whom all the morning papers refer to to-day as quite likely to lose his throne before many days, refused absolutely to see inquirers or discuss the report from Tehran that a committee of fifty prominent persons had decided to proclaim a Republic shortly. Insistent calls finally induced the Shah to send down to the hotel lobby an attendant with a message to the general effect that the ruler failed to sympathize with the public interest in his future. The Shah, who is on a protracted European visit, has been in Paris for several weeks past living with a large household in the most expensive hotel in the city, in the quarters reserved for royalty. He continues to be a familiar figure at the race tracks and many lavish social affairs.

REASON OF PRINCE'S LATEST ACCIDENT.

LONDON, March 18. England discovered the excitement of the nearly disastrous fall of the Prince of Wales in the Arbor Field Cross steeplechase on Saturday, when motion pictures of the accident were shown. The film shows that the Prince swerved his horse to avoid crashing into spectators who were crowding the course. The horse missed his stride and failed to make the fence hurling the Prince to the ground and kicking him a glancing blow in the face.

SINGAPORE BASE SCHEME ABANDONED.

LONDON, March 18. Definite announcement was made in the House of Commons to-day of the Government's decision not to proceed further with the Singapore naval base scheme. Charles G. Ammon, Parliamentary Secretary to the Admiralty, made the announcement. Mr. Ammon declared the Government had reached the decision after full consideration of all relative facts and after consultation with the Overseas Dominions. The announcement evoked loud cheers by the Labor members.

BELGIUM CURTAILING ALSO.

BRUSSELS, Belgium, March 18. France is doing away with special benefits based on the hope of reparations payments from Germany. It was made clear to-day by Premier Thomas in reading the declaration of his reconstructed Ministry before the Chamber of Deputies. The Government, he declared, was determined not to raise further loans except for public works of a productive nature,

and no new expenditure for reparations would be incurred unless the funds were provided beforehand.

ALBERTA APPROVES UNION.

EDMONTON, Alberta, March 18. The Church Union Bill, with the exception of a few clauses, was approved by committee of the whole in the Legislature yesterday, in spite of vigorous opposition offered by three members of the House.

HOUSE PASSED SOLDIERS BONUS BILL.

WASHINGTON, March 18. The House to-day passed the soldier bonus bill 355 to 54, a margin of 82 over the necessary two-thirds. As sent to the Senate the Bill provides for paid up 20 year endowment life insurance policies and cash payments to those veterans not entitled to more than fifty dollars in the adjusted compensation.

FATALITIES IN PHILIPPINES.

MANILA, March 18. Seven Philippines were killed in a clash between landlords and tenants on a sugar plantation near Candaba Pampanga Province, said a despatch reaching here yesterday. A number of others were wounded. The fight developed over deliveries of sugar cane. Five tenants were shot and killed and two landlords were slashed to death.

POPE NEVER FELT BETTER.

ROME, March 18. Reports of the ill-health of Pope Plus were denied to-day by the Pontiff himself in an energetic statement. "I have got to die sooner or later," a well known functionary quotes His Holiness as saying. "What passes my comprehension is why people are so anxious to make it so dreadfully soon. I myself say frankly that I know no reason why it should be in the near future. Why have perhaps never felt better or more energetic than just now."

BOLSHEVIKS IN INDIA.

CANNONPORT, British India, March 18.—The trial opened here yesterday of eight Indians, alleged Bolshevik agents, charged with conspiring to establish Communist International organization throughout India. Four of the accused were absent. The prosecution showed that the defendants "used the workers' and peasants' organization to attempt the complete separation of India from Great Britain, aiming at full control by the Indian National Congress with financial help from a Russian revolutionary organization. Testimony was given purporting to show that Indian revolutionaries met at Moscow in 1921 and decided on a programme of Bolshevik propaganda.




I could not help hitting Brown when he was down, and added, "Of course, but you know, it is the exception that proves the rule."

As the News Comes Back From Abroad

3 SAILORS PERISH BLASTING "SEALER" OUT OF ST. JOHN'S.

ST. JOHN'S, Newfoundland—(Can-Press)—The sealing steamers which have been blockaded in this port by ice, since last Friday, all got away Tuesday, the seven steamers pulling out before noon with the Terra Nova, Captain Kean, in the van.

In the strenuous efforts that were made to get the vessels through the ice, blockading the mouth of the harbor, the Terra Nova resorted to blasting operations.

Blasting powder, hauling ropes with levers were employed. A score of the sealers were on the floes, the majority of them keeping a strain on the ropes and using levers to make a passage for their ship, when a powder container prematurely exploded, shattering the ice, on which the men stood, to fragments.

In an instant the sea was strewn with bobbing heads of the sailors who were in imminent danger from the onward rush of their ship, from the seaward movement of the ice, and from the paralyzing chill of the icy waters on their overheated bodies.

Ropes were thrown to the struggling men, and within five minutes all but three had been rescued. Prolonged search was conducted for the missing men but all in vain.

Captain Kean being reluctantly forced to give up the search and proceeded northward on the voyage so auspiciously begun.—Sydney Record, March 11th.

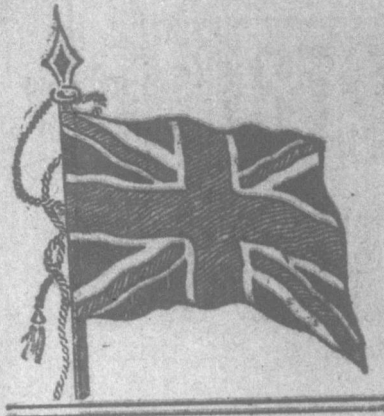

Energy that Might be Turned to Good Account

We are glad to learn that for the past two months not a single case of juvenile larceny has been brought to the attention of the authorities. This constitutes a record in the annals of the police, and while it may be premature and perhaps unwise to jump to conclusions, it is nevertheless gratifying news to those who are interested in boy life, and leads them to hope that their work on behalf of the children may be bearing fruit.

In this work a great responsibility rests upon the shoulders of the Probationary Officer, and in selecting Inspector Noseworthy for the task the authorities showed good judgment. Not only has he proved himself capable, but he seems to possess the right mixture of sound common sense, tact and sentiment, all of which are essential qualifications if the work is to be carried out successfully.

The Brigades and the Scout organizations are influences at work to give the boy an incentive, to absorb his surplus energy, and to mould his character. The Rotarians have given their time to the study of his problems, and have spent their money freely in their desire to make the boy feel that he is a very important member of society, and that it is up to him to prove that he is in all things a very desirable and reliable citizen. Last and most important of all, the churches are striving to instill religious principles which are essential to the checking of vicious tendencies and to the development of a healthy moral tone.

Now the spring is coming and nature is awakening after the winter's sleep. The boy responds to the call and feels a craving to issue forth in search of adventure and indulge in new experiences. The time is opportune for those in charge of the various institutions to turn this gathering energy into a useful channel. Have done with the Don'ts and give him something definite to do.

One of the commonest forms of juvenile delinquency is destructiveness. Why not make the boys themselves responsible for the protection of property in and around the city during the coming summer? Such a movement, the machinery to carry out which is already in existence, could be organized with little difficulty and without incurring any additional expense. Once the idea was fully grasped by them, they would, we feel certain, prove themselves an efficient and enthusiastic body, and the seed thus sown would bear fruit a hundredfold.

Our Representative at Wembley

We have received several communications dealing with the question of our representative at the Empire Exhibition at Wembley. In order to enlighten the public as to what has been done, we interviewed a prominent member of the Committee of Management, who informed us that the Acting High Commissioner in London will be responsible for the Newfoundland exhibit, and that the only person who will go from Newfoundland is the Government Analyst Mr. Davies. He was selected at the special request of Captain Victor Gordon, who with the British Committee felt that it was necessary to have someone who was familiar not only with general affairs in the country, but who also possessed scientific knowledge of our industrial resources.

It may be mentioned that the Committee is a very representative one. It consists of members of the Government and Opposition parties, the Legislative Council and the Board of Trade. The appointment of Mr. Davies has been criticised on the ground that he is not a Newfoundland. The first point to consider in that connection is whether a man who has resided in the country for thirteen years is not justified in being considered entitled to claim that privilege. The next is whether we should allow the question of birth to stand in the way of our sending over the most qualified person for the post. Last of all it is only a case of transferring for a few months the Government Analyst from St. John's to London to continue his duties there, thereby saving the expense which would be entailed by making a new appointment. The appointment of Mr. Davies was made with the practically unanimous approval of the Committee. Rumors have been in circulation that other representatives are being sent to the Exhibition, but we are authorized to state that absolutely no other appointment has been or will be sanctioned by the Committee.

Disqualified!

A lady in the city recently applied for admission to a gymnastic class conducted for the benefit of the fairer sex, and her application was accepted. Promptly she provided herself with the necessary gym equipment, but to her surprise received a communication, to the effect that upon her application being further considered, she had been disqualified as she did not conform to the religious specifications required. Funny, isn't it? It would be 'nny if it were not so tragically absurd. We could understand a certain physical standard being a condition of acceptance, but a religious test for a Gym class—Oh, dear!

Important Meeting

OF GIRL GUIDE ASSOCIATION. It is hoped that the meeting may be able to arrange for a Newfoundland representative to be present at the Girl Guide World Camp, which will be held at Foxlease Park, Lyndhurst, England, in July.

At the request of several members Lady Allardree will show a few of the garments made in the Outposts under the Newfoundland Outpost Nursing and Industrial Association. These will include one or two which are being sent to Wembley Exhibition.

Dissatisfied With New Efficiency Expert

The Company gave notice that a lockout would be declared unless the dissatisfied workmen submitted by 6 p.m. A message received to-day stated that the men returned to work this morning and that the mills are running as usual.

Britain's Army to be Reduced to Nothing More Than a Nucleus

Naval Base at Singapore Abandoned—Address in Reply Passed By Record Majority.

BRITAIN'S FOREIGN POLICY BASED ON GOODWILL OF HER NEIGHBOURS.

LONDON, March 19. The Government's international policy was given in a nutshell and in a new form by the Premier in the course of to-night's House of Commons debate. "We have a short time, and I am afraid it is going to be only a short time, during which this country can rest absolutely secure in the confidence that no war will overtake it within a certain limited number of years. We can use that time by merely trusting to the development of military defences, thereby encouraging and inviting every other country to trust to exactly the same thing. We can use a year or two in pursuing a totally different policy of keeping the military forces right down to a nucleus and keeping them efficient. No rust; don't make any mistake about that; no rust, no disintegration. Brains, energy and decision all that time, but an absolute nucleus, nothing more than a nucleus. During that time, this country ought to show the same energy and the same decision in pursuing other matters as it has shown in achieving security. The Government will be ready to enter into agreements and arrangements for disarmament and take steps towards disarmament, but if these advances fall then this nation will unfortunately have to go back to other considerations."

CONSERVATIVE AMENDMENT TO ADDRESS IN REPLY DEFEATED.

OTTAWA, March 19. By a vote of 167 to 46 a Government majority of 121 the House of Commons this Wednesday morning defeated the Conservative amendment to the Address in Reply to the Speech from the Throne. The Address was subsequently declared adopted. The majority is said to be a record one. The public galleries were crowded. The Conservative amendment expressed disappointment that the Speech from the Throne, while embodying a distinct threat to an important section of industry, contains no promise of legislation which will tend to retain and enlarge the home market for our own Canadian products. Such legislation being manifestly necessary in view of the increased tariff barriers of other countries. The division came after a fortnight's debate in which about fifty speakers participated. To-morrow the estimates will be tabled, and the House will consider private members' motions.

ABANDONMENT OF NAVAL BASE AROUSES A STORM OF CRITICISM.

LONDON, March 19. The simultaneous announcement in the House of Lords and House of Commons to-day of the Labor Government's abandonment of the previous Government's scheme to develop Singapore as a naval base, was sharply criticized in both Houses by those who hold that the scheme is an essential part of Great Britain's complete defensive naval policy in the Pacific. In the Commons Charles P. Ammon, Parliamentary Secretary to the Admiralty, announced the Government's decision not to proceed further with the Singapore scheme. In the Lords a motion was carried by 66 to 19 expressing deep regret at the Government's action. Among the Government's critics Lieut.-Col. Amery, former First Lord of the Admiralty, informed Mr. Ammon that when the Conservatives returned to power they would not lose an instant in resuming the scheme. He said that Singapore was the only point from which British trade in the Indian Ocean and the Pacific could be effectively protected and the only station from which Australia and New Zealand could be assisted in a naval way. Dropping the project was tantamount to telling the Dominions that the Government was no longer prepared to help them. Premier MacDonald explained that the Government had abandoned the scheme, because if proceeded with, it would exercise a most detrimental effect on Great Britain's general foreign policy.

PREMIER OF VICTORIA FORMS A NEW PARTY.

MELBOURNE, Australia, March 19. H. S. W. Lawson, who resigned the Premiership of Victoria a few days ago and was accompanied in his resignation by the Ministers of his Government because of the decision of the Farmers' Party at a recent conference to retain the right to contest any seat in the State, has formed a new Government composed entirely of Liberals.

POINCARÉ'S FISCAL MEASURES APPROVED.

PARIS, March 19. The Senate late this afternoon

adopted the whole of the Government's fiscal measures by a vote of 161 to 23. The members of the left abstained from voting.

PROGRESS OF ROUND THE WORLD FLIGHT.

EUGENE, Ore., March 18. The three round-the-world airplanes landed at the Eugene aviation field this p.m. Number 1 piloted by Major Frederick L. Martin, Fleet Commander, made the field at 3.57 and No. 2 with Lieut. Lowell Smith in command landed at 4 p.m. The plane is in command of Lieut. Leigh was which made a forced landing at Coltonwood, Calif. early this afternoon took the air again and landed at 5.23. The schedule provides that the planes hop off for the north-to-morrow morning at 9.50, stopping at Vancouver barracks for lunch at noon.

BRITISH SHIPOWNERS OBJECT TO DECISION OF U.S. TRADE COMMISSION.

LONDON, March 19. United States Inter-State Commerce Commission's decision to allow a preferential railroad rates to United States goods shipped in United States vessels was greeted with lively interest in British shipping circles. According to the Morning Post correspondent at Liverpool, where the step is declared to be in direct contravention of the convention recently signed at Geneva and introduced by United States delegates.

BRITISH ROUND THE WORLD FLIGHT STARTS TUESDAY.

LONDON, March 19. The latest British attempt at a round the world flight will be started here Tuesday, when three aviators led by Squadron Commander A. Stuart MacLean plan to hop off from Calicut, at the entrance of Southampton, making the first stop at Lyons, France. Thence they will fly by stages to Brindisi, Italy, Athens, Cairo, Bagdad, Basra, Karachi, Rangoon, Hong Kong, Tokio, across the Pacific by way of the Aleutian Islands to Vancouver, Toronto and Newfoundland. According to the present plan the homeward hop over the Atlantic will be by way of the Azores and Lisbon.

NATIONAL ACCOUNTS SHOW \$48,000,000 SURPLUS.

LONDON, Mar. 19. In view of the fact that there is surplus of \$48,000,000 pounds to date, it is anticipated that British national accounts will show a large favorable balance for the financial year ending April 1st.

PREMIER MACDONALD SENDS CONGRATULATORY MESSAGE TO EGYPT.

LONDON, Mar. 19. Premier Scudon of Egypt has sent a message in reply to Premier MacDonald's congratulations on Egypt being represented for the first time by a parliament elected by popular suffrage, and assuring Egypt of the good will and friendship of Great Britain and her readiness always to negotiate with the Egyptian government.

FOREST FIRE TAKES TOLL OF LIVES IN JAPAN.

TOKIO, Mar. 19. Six villages have been wiped out by a forest fire which has raged since Saturday at the foot of Mount Hozai Ji, near Nagoya, 170 miles from here. Twenty persons are missing and are believed to have perished. Troops have been called out to fight the blaze.

JAPANESE SUBMARINE SUNK WITH CREW.

SAZBOO, Japan, Mar. 19. Submarine No. 43 of the Japanese navy collided to-day with the warship Tatsuwa, ten miles outside Sazboo Harbor, and has sunk in 25 fathoms of water. Four officers and forty men were aboard. Rescue work is proceeding. Sazboo is a naval port on the west coast of the island of Kyushu, just south of the island of Hondo, the largest of the Japanese archipelago.

MALCONTENTS ARRESTED.

DUBLIN, Mar. 19. Free State troops this morning took into custody nine men including Colonel Dolan and other army officers accused of joining in the recent protest against the government's demobilization plan. The men were found holding a meeting with thirty or forty others in a house in Farnell Square which was raided by the Free State forces seeking Major General Tobin and Colonel Dalton, leader of army mutiny.

This is a matter of the utmost importance and steps to rectify it should be taken at once.

Upon arrival there he conducted a post mortem examination on the body of Lawrence Barron, the victim, the report of which has been withheld. And when she hands me that tidbit, even though my mind rejects it, my vanity is ready to gobble it up.

Out of Their Own Hearts.

Nay, so strong is this feeling that we extend it even to those counterfeits—in friendship, flatterers may scynophants. Our self-love rather than our self-interest is the master key to our affections.

Produce and Provisions.

(Trade Review.)

Codfish—Owing to the non-arrival of the mails from Europe there was nothing particularly new to be gleaned during the week as to the condition of the foreign fish markets. As far as is known sales at good figures are steady, and with the loading of a steamer due to arrive here soon, and with the forwarding of a few more cargoes per vessel, the local market will be cleared out, and exporters with whom the Trade Review has spoken are unanimous in the belief that the last of the 1923 catch will be marketed to advantage. The report from the Oporto market for the week showed stocks of Newfoundland fish to be 40,348 quintals, consumption 2,845 quintals, while the Norwegian stocks held there totalled 6,238 quintals, and consumption 1,200. The clearances during the week were by S.S. Silvia for New York, 2,097 quintals codfish, 29 tons cod oil, 2 tuns cod liver oil, 22 tcs. salmon and 337 barrels herring; by the schr. David Morris for Alicante, 4,700 quintals, shipped by Geo. M. Barr, and schr. Andreas, for Seville, 3,050 quintals. The schr. Ronald M. Douglas is being loaded at Gonaïves by T. Garland for Oporto.

Common Cod Oil—The comparatively small stock of cod oil held in the country is being gradually worked off, sales being regularly effected of small quantities to United States and European purchasers. Though no fancy prices have been received, the sellers are coming out in the sale of their goods on the right side, and it now looks as if all this particular class of oil will be profitably disposed of in the near future. It is thought that here will be a good market next season for the oil emanating from the 1924 catch of codfish, and more than likely much of this class of goods will be processed during the prosecution of the cod fishery.

Cod Liver Oil—Like common oil there is some business being done in the refined oil market, but no great quantities are being disposed of and the foreign market at present is not very active. There is very little refined oil left in this country as far as can be ascertained, and the balance will be closed off early dealers believe. People who have an eye to the future believe that Newfoundland oil will come to the front this year owing to the first class reports of specialists as to the excellence of the article and all who can do so would be well advised to go into the manufacture of this article. Dealers believe the industry has a very promising future and if the coming fishery is up to the normal or even above the average, there will be a good market for all the refined oil we can produce. This will be especially so if the Norwegian fishery is much below the average as there is every indication there will be. Though the fish, caught to date is well livered, it is thought the shortage in the volume of oil turned out will redound to our advantage, and that the goods we have to offer will find a receptive and paying market.

Flour—There is a steady demand for flour, but no business of any volume was transacted during the week. Stocks are getting low and only average imports are recorded these days. Like all other classes of goods the heavy market at the present time is not very brisk, but with the passing of a few weeks there should be a marked revival in trade. Taken all round,

the market at present is strong and prices for April and May delivery will be high, as far as we can learn from the importers. The wholesale price in the local market quoted during the week was \$8.10 per barrel for the best brands, and \$7.60 for other qualities.

Pork—The pork market during the week was steady, and though no large sales were recorded a fairly good average business was done in this article. The price has been somewhat higher than formerly, the past two weeks or so, and dealers expect no lower figures for some time to come, though they do not anticipate any advance on present quotations. The supply of hogs in the west has, we understand, been increasing of late, and packers are now securing the stocks they require to keep the markets in future up to the standard, so that by the time the supplying for the fishery begins there will be plenty of goods available to meet the demand, which will likely break when the season opens. The wholesale prices quoted here this week were, Loin, \$32; Fat Back, \$30.50; S.C. Clear, \$30.50; Family Mess, \$30; Regular Plate, \$29.50; Bacon Pork, \$27.50; and Spare Ribs, \$24.75.

Beef—The beef market during the week retained its steady normal tone, and though like pork, no large sales were registered, the amount of business done was pretty good, and there are prospects of a more active market in the near future, while of course the late spring and early summer months will show a great improvement in the volume of trade which will be done. Stocks of beef now

here are not heavy, but the imports will likely increase as time passes, and an increasing demand becomes evident. It looks as if there is a good deal of truth in the report that the supply of horned cattle has not been as large as other years, and dealers here say that of late some grades have been growing scarce, this being especially the case with flank beef, of which at present there is only a small quantity available. Dealers declare that there is up to date nothing to indicate that figures for beef will be any lower than those now quoted, though at present (except in the case of the grade which shows a tendency to become scarce), there is nothing to show that there will be any great advance on the market prices ruling at this writing. The figures, wholesale, in the local market this week are, Bos Flank, \$26.50; Extra Family, \$24.50; Family Special, \$23; Boneless, \$21.75; Boneless New York, \$22.75.

Sugar—Like most other classes of goods there was nothing of special importance to be said of the sugar market during the week. Trade in sugar goes along evenly and sales are fairly regular and up to the average for this dull season of the year. Dealers say that the market has become a good deal easier and of late the price has fallen by about 10 cents per 100 pounds. As the summer season approaches the trade in sugar will likely assume much greater activity and prices will, it is thought, be reasonable, as the sugar crop will afford a fairly good supply as we have ample stocks here to meet every demand in ways equal to the supply. May Later in the season the sugar now on hand will be supplemented by considerable imports. The prices quoted wholesale during the week were, Granulated in barrels, \$9.60; in Sacks of 100 pounds, \$9.60; and Brown, in sacks, \$9.15.

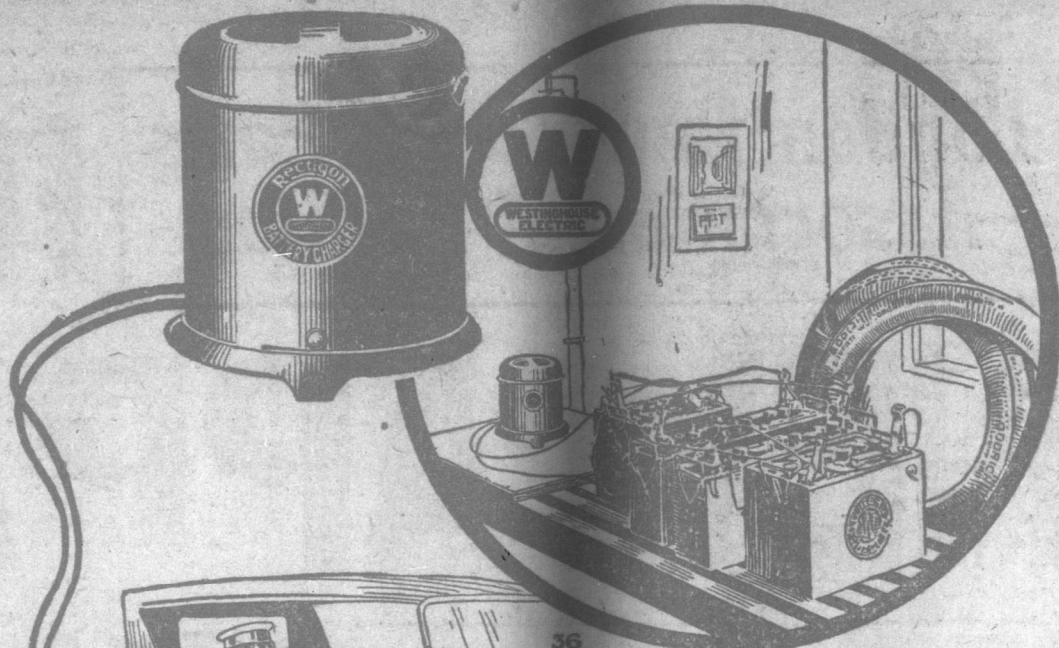
Tea—There has been a fairly active market in tea during the week, though of course, like others, the volume of business done has not been large, nor should be looked forward to for several weeks yet, when the spring trade begins to show up. Tea took a slightly upward trend recently, and this particularly applied to the Ceylon market. The belief expressed by local dealers during the week is that prices will be higher later, though whether the advance will be very marked it is difficult yet to say. More and more tea is being consumed in the world as the years go by, and no matter how prolific the crop the demand is always equal to the supply, so that no great change in prices now quoted may be looked for. The figures at present quoted vary largely according to the grade sought, and wholesale figures in the local market range from 24 to 30 cents, the latter figure applying to the very superior qualities.

Hay & Oats—Both these markets are now showing much improvement and trade in baled hay (Canadian) shows signs of expansion right along. Owing to the adverse weather and other circumstances during the past week there was an particular stir and the demand for the goods is evident, and the future for the market promises well, as the stocks of the local grown goods are being used up. The price remains the same, round about \$36.00 per ton. Activity in oats is general and the future gives promise of good trade in this article. Stocks held are fairly large, and during the past few weeks figures for P.E.I. oats advanced by about 25 cents the bushel wholesale, the prices are about \$3.50 the sack of four bushels to \$3.35 for mixed oats.

The Leviathan and Mr. Ford

Figuratively speaking, a "For Sale" sign is up on the Leviathan. One of the world's two greatest ships may be bought, but must be accepted "as is, where is." This "where is" provision would be a convenience to the Boston purchaser, because the ship is now in the Navy dry dock, handy to Commonwealth Pier. The "as is" provision is not so welcome, inasmuch as the damage done when the vessel tried to dredge a new canal in New York harbor has not yet been repaired. But the prospective purchaser need not be discouraged by the "as is." It is stated that the damage is less than was feared. A hundred thousand dollars or so may cover the bill for fixing it.

These being the days when one of the chief objects of mayors and other public officials, and of chambers of commerce and other commercial bodies, is telling Mr. Henry Ford of business opportunities in which he might invest a few millions, it would seem to be highly proper to call to his attention the fact that the Leviathan may be bought right here in Boston, as it is. Mr. Ford has been extremely successful in the conduct of a railway. He is reported to have made a study of the possibilities of large transportation on the Mississippi. What more logical than that he should now embark upon the shipping business on the North Atlantic? It is said to be sure, that Mr. Ford's success as a railroad owner has been partly due, at least, to the fact that he has supplied the road with much of its traffic. But that should not militate against the proposition that he take over the Leviathan. He is soon to have a great as-

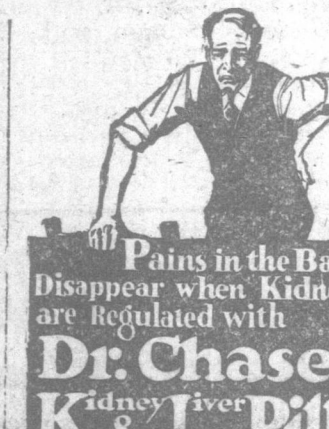

sembling plan in Boston. Why not run the Leviathan on regular schedule to and from this port with stivers filling the hold and the owners of limousines crowding the cabins, it being understood that motor buses to the Wayside Inn would be waiting at the pier when the Leviathan completed a trip west bound? People of prosaic mind may regard this as a fantastic proposition. Even so, and leaving the Leviathan out of the question, it might be that Mr. Ford, should he tackle ocean transportation problems, would contribute in no small degree to keeping the flag upon the seas.

The Leviathan is for sale because the law which contemplates getting the Government out of the shipping business requires that the Shipping Board vessels be offered from time to time. Such offer is now being made. It does not specifically relate to the Leviathan, of course. She is included with the other 1224 vessels, only about one-quarter of which are now in operation. Anybody who wants to buy a ship as is, where is, now has his chance. He may bid for the Leviathan, or he may make an offer for a towboat. Should he care for a pick-refrigerator ship, he may take his pick of fourteen, but, perhaps, if it is his

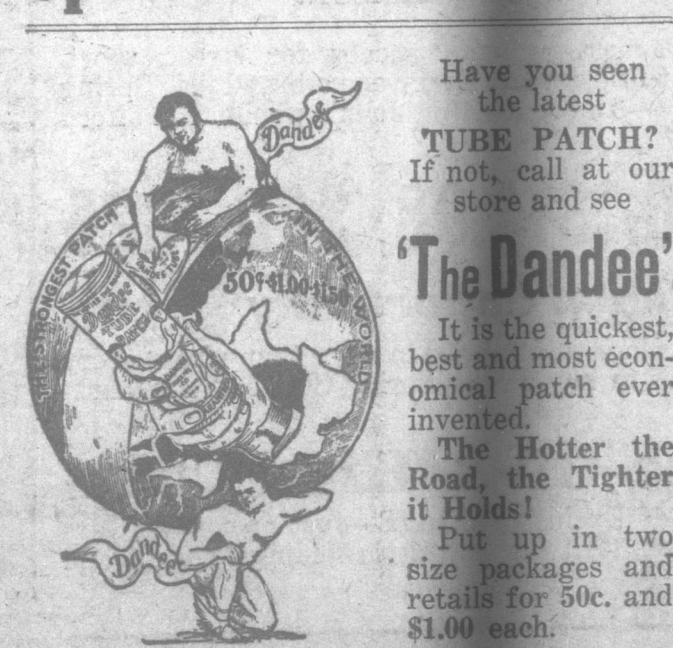

Earth's Crest Weak

IN NUMBER OF SPOTS, SAYS OREGON SAVANT.

Eugene, Ore., Mar. 6.—There are several especially weak places in the crust of the earth, said Dr. Warren D. Smith, professor of the University of Oregon here, in a discussion of earthquakes.

"One of these," he explained, "is the Straits of Messina, between Sicily and Italy, where in 1908, a very destructive earthquake took place. Another is the junction of the Pacific and the Indo-Malayan arcs. This is in the region of Java and the Philippines. Some exceedingly devastating earthquakes have taken place in those regions. Another place is the Chilean coast, and still another is along the San Andreas Rift in California.

"Perhaps the most unstable part of the earth's crust today is in the northwest part of the Pacific, bordering the great Tuscara Deep. A broad belt of folded rocks includes the entire archipelago of Japan, the Philippines and New Guinea in the western Pacific, and this belt runs right around the Pacific ocean. This is the first major feature of the Pacific.

"East of this region is the great trough known as the Tuscara Deep. To the south of this, just east of the Philippines, is a still greater deep, which is a continuation of the one east of Japan. With a depth of slightly over six miles, this is the deepest place known in any ocean. To the east of this trough is a submerged mountain range, in fact several, but one in particular which apparently is rising and some day will form a new festoon of islands paralleling Japan and the Philippines.

"According to the latest investigations in the Pacific, great thrusts, due to accommodations in the outer shell of the earth, are taking place in the direction of the Asiatic continent."

Science and Justice

France has awarded a pension of 12,000 francs to a man who was sentenced to life imprisonment in 1878 for poisoning his wife. The pension is due to scientists who never heard of the alleged criminal. At the time of his trial chemists found one milligram of arsenic in the woman's body. That was enough to secure conviction. Nearly 40 years later scientists reported that a maximum of two milligrams of arsenic may be found normally in the human body. The man, who had always professed his innocence, appealed and won. Science, in more ways than one, is slowly removing the bandage from the eyes of Justice.

London Letter

(By PANTON HOUSE for the Canadian Press)

LONDON, Feb. 22.—The Women's section of the British Empire Exhibition, which is mainly concerned with the provision of hospitality for visitors from overseas coming over for the great show, met this week under the presidency of the Duchess of York. It was then announced that with the help of the Royal Colonial Institute, the Overseas League, and the Victorian League, good progress is being made. Several of the City Companies, of whom we wrote last week, have agreed to set aside certain days for hospitality to Overseas visitors, who will have an opportunity of seeing the companies' ancient and often beautiful "halls" and the treasures kept there—portraits, silver plate, and relics of many kinds. Among hostesses who will give receptions are the Duchess of Norfolk, the Duchess of Atholl, the Duchess of Devonshire, and Lady Weigall, and hospitality is being offered by many London women's clubs. It is hoped that the Government will give a reception at Lancaster House (the home of the London Museum) and that the Colonial Office may arrange for the erection of a special stand for unofficial Overseas visitors to see the ceremony of the Trooping of the Color. This takes place on the wide gravel space at the Whitehall end of St. James' Park on the King's Birthday, June 3.

Although St. Paul's Cathedral is quite a modern building as London reckons—Sir Christopher Wren began it in 1675, and the last stone was placed in position in 1710—it is said to be "showing signs of fatigue." Within the last ten years it has been found necessary to strengthen two of the huge piers which support the dome, by cutting away and renewing defective masonry; and the remaining six may have to be treated in the same way. Excavations for underground railways, and vibration due to our ever-growing motor traffic are blamed for the trouble. The southwest tower is said to be leaning six inches out of the perpendicular. Eventually all the piers and bastions may have to be underpinned.

Six baby crocodiles have just arrived from West Africa at the London Zoological Gardens. In order that the young extiles may not pine for home, a special nursery for them has been made ready, with a rocky playground and a tank. Under the tank is a radiator, which will keep the water at a West African temperature of 85 degrees. Miss Joan Proctor, who is Curator of Reptiles at the Zoo, is causing her new charges to be fed on chopped meat and small fish. Although 18 months old, they still measure their length in inches, but by the time your great-great-grandchildren visit the Zoo they may have attained anything up to 20 feet. The largest crocodile now in the Gardens is about 14 feet long, but he is only 90 years of age, and that is juvenile for a "croc."

The Gardens have just received a specimen of Pere David's Deer, a nearly extinct animal, of which very little is known. No one can say whence it originally came, but its ancestors were preserved, in a half-tame state, in the park of one of the Imperial palaces at Peking. Pere David, a French missionary, sent home in 1868 the first skull and skin ever seen in Europe. Later on a few living specimens followed, and aroused much interest among naturalists, who had not so much as heard of this curious deer with a tail like a monkey's. In 1900 there was a flood in Peking; part of the park walls fell, the royal deer escaped, and the local peasants revelled in venison. Almost the only survivors are at Woburn, Bedfordshire, where the Duke of Bedford, President of the Zoological Society, has a small herd.

On Feb. 26-29 the Shire Horse Society held its annual spring show in London at the Royal Agricultural Hall. The Society, which exists to improve the breed of Shire or old English cart-horses, compiles and publishes a Shire Horse stud-book, and gives prizes, gold and silver medals and premiums, not only at its own London shows, but at country shows

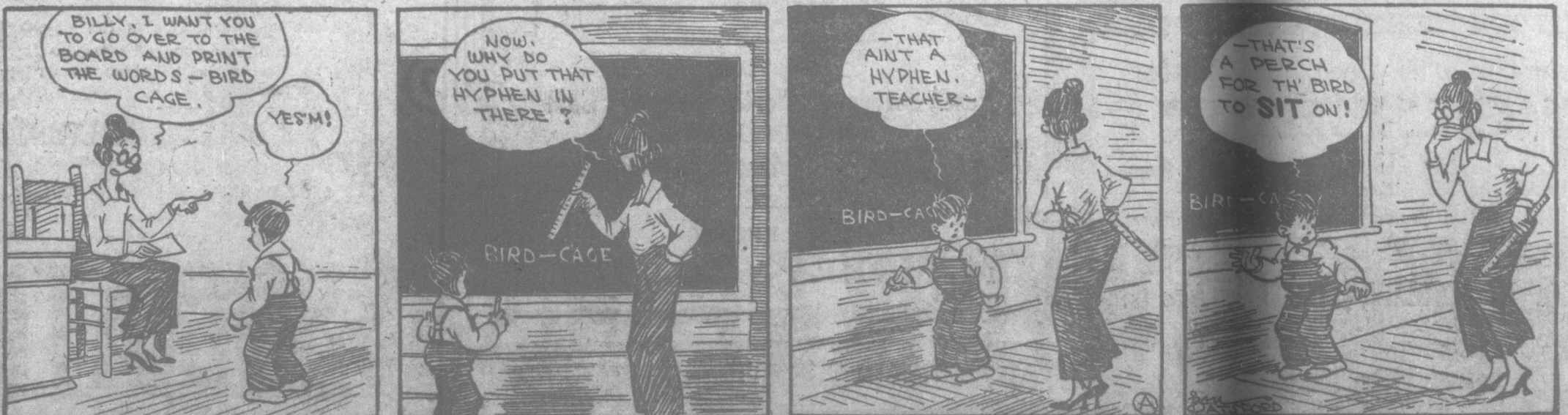

Aumonier, a well-known architectural sculptor, is carrying out the work, assisted by his two sons

and about a dozen expert workers in wood and stone. It will be remembered that the King's throne, couches and chariots were gilded. The gold leaf used in making the reproductions has cost nearly \$1000. Already eight months' work has been expended on the undertaking, and it is by no means completed. The intention is that as fresh discoveries are made at Luxor, models shall be added to the collection at Wembley.
