



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

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### Rotary Luncheon

At yesterday's luncheon of the St John's Rotary Club, Chairman Rotarfan "Tim" Hartnett introduced Hon. A. B. Morine, M.L.C., who gave a very practical and forceful address on "Developing Our Tourist Traffic."

The tourist attractions of this country—our scenery, climate, fish and game, are the best in British North America, but we need to advertise the fact. There are yet many prospective tourists who think that Newfoundland is the next thing to the North Pole. We must convince them that our climate in summer is, as it is-ideal. Travelling from Detroit to Toronto and New York, Mr. Morine had passed through some very pretty stretches country,
th the scenery around no attractions could he nonequal those of the fish and game of
Newfoundland. True, it is, the roads

hundred miles of country, but none could compare But, in this country, with our rivers teeming with salmon and trout from June to August, excellent climate and beautiful scenery, there is something to offer tourists-a variety which they cannot obtain so readily and in such abundance in British North America as in Newfoundland.

Our Caribou-the big attraction to sportsmen, need protection; and it is to be hoped that the matter of having a close season for two or three years will be considered seriously by the Game Board. Our Moose are increasing rapidly, and it is understood that further importations will be made.

It is of very little avail to congratulate ourselves on our possessions if we are not prepared to put them within reach of the outside world, to the benefit of the country. The first the benefit of the country. The first thing we need is hotel accommodation. We cannot expect tourists if we have not hotels. We need a large modern Hotel in St. John's, and a chain of smaller hotels at tourists resorts throughout the country. In planning the hotel scheme, the country should be divided into two sectors should be divided into two sectors. try should be divided into two sections-East and West; Port aux Basques should be one base, and St. John's the other. The "tripper" traffic not so much in evidence because of our lack of hotels. We can fill this country with tourists if we but add modern hotel accommodations and good roads to our present attractions.

The next thing to hotels is steamships, but we can rest assured that adequate steamship facilities will be provided just as soon as we have the hotels. We have the assurance of Sir Edgar Bowring that the Red Cross line are prepared to increase their service when required. A party of Boston capitalists are also prepared to give us sufficient tourist Another essential to tourist traffic

good roads. There is very little us in trying to bring the class of tourist which we desire to this country if we are not prepared to provide him with good motor roads to travel from one vantage point to another. We do not want to cater to the man with the "flivver." We want the monied tourist-men who will bring their families, their parties; bring their own cars along with them; stay in the country for weeks and spend money here; we require men of influence who will advertise our country. But they will require good motor roads; there is no use in our talking to them of fishing, game, and scenic attractions if these are not of easy access. This class of tourist does not want to leave his family at a hotel and then tramp miles through the woods to a stream. Of course, we cannot undertake the expense of paved roads in this country and this class of road is unnecessary; the type built in Nova Scotia is quite good enough: that is, a good foundation with gravel topping, and we have the best materials in this country for making such roads.

The roads of Nova Scotia are about so feet wide, 7 1-2 of which is taken up with ditches; three to four feet for a sort of shoulder, and the travel for a sort of shoulder, and the travel part of the road is slightly convex. These roads are always dry, and the grading such that there is no danger of toppling into a ditch if one was obfiged to swerve to one side. There are also no ruts to make the car a fixture in the middle of the road. A Road Commission with ample scope and authority is necessary in Newfoundland. A Commission closely connected with the Government, but not so closely as to make it political: it thould be free of political pull and waste. The roads should be built with a design as to the system as a whole. They should be built from bertain bases; they should project, connect and improve a definite road ystem. 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

### Phaff Will Seek Redress in Court

New York, Nov. 22.-Max Phaff, New York lawyer, who recently spent some time in jail at Brest, France, and some days in court on trial on charges of rum piracy, returned ome on the steamship President Harding yesterday. He announced he would file an action for damages against the French owners of the pirated liquor, which was aboard the French steamer Mulhouses. It was they, he said, who had caused his detention and trial.

Phaff, now at liberty on 5,000 francs bail pending further action, asserted that his trial had been irregular, that newspaper men had been barred from what he termed the "star chamber sessions." and that garbled reports of the proceedings had been given out by French officials. Finally, he said, he was released on small bail and handed a passport in an obvious effort to put an end to the proceed-

Paris firm of Maur Française, owners of the pirated liquor, had caused his arrest in the hope that those really responsible for the crime would come forward to exonerate him and thus ncriminal e themselves.

The lawyer was accused of having aided the hi-jackers who raided the Mulhouse off the New Jersey coast last July 24, when her cargo of liquor and all money in her safe were stolen. Two employees of Maur Francaise who had travelled with him from London to Paris made affidavit that he had drunkenly boasted to them that he had participated in the raid. Phaff asserted taht he had never drank in his life and denied that he had discussed rum-running with his French companions. He asserted that the Brest authorities refused to let him produce witnesses who would have given him a perfect alibi and that he

### **Expert Counterfeiter** Sent to Jail

FORMER ROYAL ARTIST.

Berlin, Nov. 22 .- One of the most startling cases in the history of counterfeiting had its conclusion here vestetrday when a Berlin court sentenced Ivan Miassoyedoff, Russian artist and former favorite of Russian Royalty and his young sweetheart, Malvinana Bernici, to three years and six nonths in prison for manufacturing and distributing British pound and American dollar notes.

With the aid of a band of other cunterfeiters, composed of former Russian officers. Miassovedoff and his pretty Italian accomplice circulated counterfeit currency throughout Euope, disposing of a total of \$30,000, out according to the evidence, very circulation.

Their counterfeit British notes were o perfect that the Reichsbank experts had to send them to the Bank of England to confirm its suspicion. Miassoyedoff was formerly a member of the Imperial Russian Academy of Fine Arts, and many of his works were bought by the Czar's family



"'Revenues totalling £38,160,000 (\$172,904,000) have been lost to the United States on liquor landed by rum-runners in waters adjacent New York in the two years since the so-called Rum Row came into exist-

"'These figures were given by Mr. Edward Barnes, Assistant Solicitor to the Collector of the Port of New York, who says that a careful check by the Coast Guard shows that 2,400,-000 cases of 14,400,000 gallons of liquor have been landed from Rum Row. The revenue from each gallon would normally be £2 13s. (\$11.66.) Sir Frederick Asks a Question.

"Now will you please tell me," asked Sir Frederick, "how your Coast Guard was able to arrive at those figures? It is a natural presumption to consider the Coast Guard is stationed to stop smugglers from landing goods. But in relation to whisky it appears it not only made a careful check of the number of cases landed in New York City during the period of two years, but that it actually notified the Collector of the Port of this fact. I cannot understand it.

"I am not decrying American public officials nor American public servants; don't misunderstand me. But a shipload of liquor is a rather bulky affair. It must be carted somewhere. It must be carted from the landing place to some warehouse. And it must then be redistributed from that warehouse to its ultimate customers. How it gets there is none of my business. But I don't see how they can check it so accurately.

"Of course," he laughed, "I don't expect you to be able to answer that." -New York Times Magazine.



### U.S. Navy an Asset in Peace and War

Washington, Nov. 22.-Modernization of the six older battleships of the American fleet is essential, Secretary Wilbur declared to-day in his annual report, "if our ratio of naval strength s to be maintained." He indicated his intention to renew the Department's special appropriation for that purpose. 

### Mystery of a Baby

T. HOLLIS WALKER PASSES SEN-

Ghl-Mother Arraigned on Own Confession. Possessing features of a most remarkable character, a pathetic case has been investigated at Lincolnshire Assizes. It involved a charge of mur-der against Maud Elizabeth Norman, 24, servant, and incidentally revealed a series of kindly acts performed by persons who sympathised with her in her distressing position. The girl was charged with the murder of her baby, Margaret Irene Norman, at Sutton Margaret Irene Norman, at Sutton Bridge, between Aug. 31 and Sept. 3, 1923. The infant was born in Hol-beach Workhouse in June, 1923, and the mother left that institution with the child on August 1. In addressing the Grand Jury, the Commissioner, Mr. T. Hollis Walker, K.C., drew attention to the poignant circumstances of the charge. In the first place, his fordship pointed out, the body had hever been produced, which was very nncommon, and another feature was a pleasant one. If one could get pleasure out of such a case, and that was a story of most extraordinary Christian charity on the part of people in the neighbourhood of Sutton. A month after leaving the workhouse accused was found at Sutton Bridge with the baby, and apparently in want. In one house a woman gave her milk, a roadman shared his dinner with her, and a cottager let her stay all night, lighting a fire for her. Afterwards accused was seen without her baby, and exwithout her baby, plained its absence by saying it had been taken by a friend. That was not true. Arrested at Wiswas not true. Arrested at Wisbech a year later prisoner made a statement, and largely upon her remarks the charge was founded. The Grand Jury returned a true bill. Upon the girl being placed on trial the prosecution called witnesses to prove that baby's clothes and a feeding bottle were found in a lake, and were recognized as those of the child. ### Fish That Wear Labels

The study of the eggs of fish and also of the early stages of hatching is carried on mainly by means of fine silk nets, known as "Hansen" nets; and at the later stages by means of the Paterson young-fish trawl.

The spawning grounds of the plaice have been discovered with tolerable certainty, and it has been found that the young larval fish are borne on certain currents towards the shallow waters off the coasts from Holland northward to Denmark.

This concentration of millions of young fish into restricted areas has an inevitable effect on the fish themselves. The food supply is limited and the severe competition for it means that the growth rate in these waters is slow.

Accordingly experiments have been made in transplanting young plaice to the rich food grounds of the Dogger Bank, and these have had remarkable results. It has been found that, while plaice in the nursery grounds grow at a rate of about two inches a year, those transmitted to the Dogger

will grow as much as five inches. When a plaice is to be transplanted, it is first captured and then marked with a small numbered disc in the form of a cuff link, which is inserted under the fin. A record of the number of the disc is kept, together with the time and place at which the fish

was released. Fishermen are rewarded if they return the captured fish to the Laboratory at Lowestoft, where it is possible to trace from the records all the relevant details. Approximately 30 per cent, of the marked fish are returned within a year.





# N. S. Coal Miners Demand Increase

FROM TEN TO FORTY PER CENT.
MORE TO BE ASKED IN NEW
CONTRACTS.

SYDNEY, N.S., Nov. 22 .- (Canadian ress)-The wage policy to be followby the executive officers of District 6. United Mine Workers of America in pursuing negotiations with operators in connection with the drawing up of a new contract, was formaly decided on at yesterday afternoon's session of the miners convention when the report of the committee under this head came up for discussion. With the exception of the recomnendation that a ten per cent. general increase be demanded the clauses the committee's report covering the wage question were adopted as read.

The miners' demands are:

"A twenty-five per cent. increase for datal men, and a ten per cent. increase for contract workers.

"A ten per cent. additional increase

"A ten per cent. additional increase for all miners working on night shift or two shifted places and a fifteen per cent. increase for all three shifted places."

The opinion expressed by the delegates during the discussion on this clause, was that the company should do away with the double and triple shift and the only way for the miners to bring this about, was to force up the operating costs by demanding high wages for the men employed in

those places.

The convention adopted a resolution to the effect that the executive board use its influence with the corporation and the Department of Mines to have all mines now working, continue in operation. Failing this, the resolution states "direct action" will be taken by the district.



INBUSH OF IMMIGRANTS CAUSES AUSTRALIA CONCERN.

MELBOURNE, Aus., Nov. 27. European countries are turning their eyes to Australia for an outlet for their emigrants in view of the restrictions, placed upon immigration by the United States. A stir was created in Australia last year owing to the large number of Italian families who arrived without any provision having been made for their subsequent support. Consternation now has been caused by the receipt of a message from Marseilles which states that a German mail boat is, undergoing alterations for the purpose of engaging in immigration to Australia to carry twelve hundred Jugo Slavs to Australia on its first trip.

EIGHT PERSONS KILLED IN TRAIN AND MOTOR CAR COLLISIONS. CHICAGO, Nov. 28.

Eight persons were reported killed last night in two separate collisions between trains and automobiles at Lombard, Ills., 20 miles west of here, and Aurora, Ills., 30 miles west of Chicago. Three women were reported killed when the Chicago and North Western train struck an automobile at Lombard, and three men and two women died at Aurora where the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy train struck an automobile.

DE VALERA RELEASED.

BELFAST, Nov. 28. Eamon De Valera, the Republican eader, who on Nov 1 was sentenced to one month in Prison, after entering Ulster territory in defiance of a warning from authorities, was released at six o'clock this morning. He was placed on the train for Dublin and escorted to the border.

SUDANESE TROOPS MUTINY. CAIRO, Nov. 28.

Two platoons of the eleventh Sudanese at Khartum to-day mutinied and attacked the military hospital killing one British and two Syrian doctors. British troops fired on the mutineers who suffered severe casual-

MINING ACCIDENT IN WALES. CARDIFF, Wales, Nov. 28. After working waist deep in water Duckworth St. & LeMarchant and battling with deadly black damp all night, rescue crews this morning were still struggling to reach nine miners who were entrapped last night in Penlan pit at Dunvant, when a sudden rush of water caused numerous roof falls. One body has been recovered from the debris and several score miners escaped through the water, reaching their necks. Hundreds of women relatives of the trapped men kept a night long vigil at the pit head.

EGYPTIAN NATIONALISTS

RESOLUTIONS. CAIRO, Nov. 28. A resolution adopted at a meeting of the members of the Nationalist delegation including several who held Cabinet portfolios under Zagloul Pasha declared the nation does not ask for arrangement regarding the waters of the Nile but that it insists on the rights of Egypt in the Sudan. The resolution protests against the Government's consent to the withdrawal of Egyptian troops from the Sudan to which step the Zagloulists Cabinet and parliament categorically refused to agree.

A NETWORK OF PLOTS DISCOVER-ED IN EGYPT.

CAIRO, Nov. 28. Twelve more persons were taken into custody this morning, and the police expect to detain thirty five in all, as precautionary measures. Four prominent members of the Egyptian party with which former Premier Zagloul Pasha is identified were arrested by the British authorNies in Cairo yesterday, and later turned over to the Egyptian Government. Official marters in London last night were nuoted as declaring that men arrested, two of whom were members of Zagloul ministry, were leaders in a conspiracy against the British interests. Following the recent assassination of Sirdar Sir Lee Stack, it was said a network of plots has been discovered menacing the lives of British officials of all ranks in Egypt.


