## THIS MORNING'S DESPATCHES

**Snow Storm in Salt Lake.**

**The Late Massacre in Utah.**

**Preparing for Snow.**

**Lunatic Asylum Burned Down.**

**Fire in Titusville.**

**Heavy Storm in Louisville.**

**Salt Lake City, Sept. 25.**—There was a heavy snow storm in the vicinity of the mountains between Evanston and Wasatch, on Monday night. The drifts were three feet deep, and the telegraph wires were blown down.

**Salt Lake City, September 25.**—Affidavits taken here yesterday regarding the Mountain Meadows Massacre, which fully corroborate the testimony of Bishop Smith, and give further details showing more positively the guilt of the Mormon leaders.

Immense embankments are being constructed along the line of the Union Pacific Railroad, to protect the track from snow.

**Cleveland, Sept. 26.**—The Northern Ohio Lunatic Asylum, at Newburg, O., caught fire to-day. The main or old portion of the building was completely destroyed. There were about six hundred inmates in the building at the time of the fire, all of whom are said to be safe, and a number of them have escaped and are now at large. The loss is unknown, but it will probably amount to \$35,000, on which it is said there is no insurance.

**Titusville, Pa., Sept. 25.**—The Abbot House, one of the principal hotels here, was burned this evening. Loss, seventy five thousand dollars.

**Louisville, Sept. 26.**—A heavy storm swept over this city last night, causing a great deal of damage in the city.

## Stabbing Case in Salem.

**A Man Nearly Killed.**

**SALEM, Sept. 26th, 1872.**

A man named George Stone, a baker here, was stabbed seriously last night, in three places, by the hostler at Mrs. Beltzer's Hotel, at which Stone boarded.

Both were engaged at the time in a frolicsome scuffle, when the hostler got enraged and with his jack-knife stabbed Stone with great force in both arms and in the right thigh. His wounds were of such a dangerous nature that life was almost extinct. He was taken to Dr. Griffith's surgery, and the doctor did all that medical skill could suggest to relieve the sufferer. Stone still lies in a dangerous state. The hostler, immediately after the occurrence, escaped, and has not yet been arrested.

Messrs. G. D. Morse & Co., of Toronto, show a monument in soap. It is 15 feet high, and previous to its last dressing weighed 10,000 pounds. The base and pillars are of common brown soap. The block surrounding the base is of a beautiful mottled soap, said to be an accurate imitation of the columns of the House of Parliament, and the pyramidal shaft is of white soap.

Mr. Ross, of Hamilton, has a fine assortment of ashware of every description. His Terra Cotta goods are of especial excellence, both for finish and design. Ornamental flower pots occupy a prominent place in this class. His Rockingham ware is also excellent, comprising tea-pots, pitchers, spittoons, &c.

Messrs. Brown & Benz, of Hamilton, make a good display of plain and colored lithography.

George Copeland, of Hamilton, shows an assortment of Cordage, which we have seen nothing to surpass at any exhibition in Canada. The samples are graduated from the finest twine up to 3 inch rope, and includes some fine samples of whip cord.

Welding & Belding, Brantford, have an assortment of crooks, jars, jugs and bottles; also flower pots, pitchers, spittoons, images, &c., of Rockingham ware.

B. Lewis, London, exhibits some admirable window plates, stained in the highest style of the art. Lewis' works are rapidly attaining a Provincial reputation.

The Hamilton Glass Works furnish a pyramid of fruit jars, surrounded by an endless array of bottles and ornaments of all sorts.

Miss Evelyn Gourlay, Hamilton, shows a collection of native insects, classified and named.

Richard Ryle, Dundas, also shows many varieties of patterned paper, as to be used for book covers.

Joseph Arnott has a frame of stuffed birds and squirrels from the Canadian forests. He also shows a number of domestic and other animals.

Quinn and Gibbons have a collection of about 150 birds.

Messrs. Biley & May, of Toronto, show a handsome billiard table of light colored wood, with an accompanying assortment of plain and fancy cues.

Mr. McKilvey, of St. Catharines, is very enthusiastic about the merits of a portable cream gatherer which he exhibits a little to the east of the glass work display. It consists virtually of a refriger-

## The Provincial Exhibition.

**The Show on Wednesday.**

**The Crystal Palace.**

**(CONTINUED.)**

Although it was showery in the morning the crowd of visitors to the exhibition was very large. From an early hour—even before daylight—the avenues leading to the city were awakened from their midnight stillness by the rumbling of carts, waggons and carriages. Down John and James street the clatter was so great and continuous that the sleepy residents along these thoroughfares found it impossible to rest after daybreak, and glanced out of the window would reveal the hordes of people who were coming in through wind and rain, in order to find accommodation for their animals and themselves. The result was that when the townspeople began to turn out they found the streets crowded with pedestrians, who, as the morning wore on, began to wend their way to the ground. And such was the crush at the dozen or so of gates, that it is calculated that three or four thousand people had entered the grounds before the early hour of nine a.m.

The turntables were mysterious for many of the country people; some of whom stood outside and gazed at them for a long time before they would entrust their bodies to the revolving machine. As they were managed this year, there was by no means the inconvenience and annoyance that occurred at Toronto two years ago.

## MACHINERY.

The finest display of machinery on the grounds—the first, we believe, ever made at a Provincial Exhibition—is that of Messrs. McKeechie & Bertram of Dundas. These gentlemen have erected a building to the northwest of the Palace, in which they display no less than eighteen pieces of ponderous machinery, weighing an aggregate of thirty tons and costing about \$10,000 to manufacture. Of the wood-working machines there are planing and matching machines of all the most approved kinds. The iron-working machines, though fewer, are even more interesting. First in importance is a large radial drill, weighing four tons and arm of which is hung upon a solid pivot upright, so that it may be lengthened or shortened and moved from side to side. The work, too, may be laid upon the flat bed or bolted to a horizontal bed on either side. A large 12-foot planer weighs 45 tons, and is of fine workmanship, but presents no new features. These machines are all nicely finished.

Messrs. Goldie & McCulloch, the well-known machinists, in Galt, also exhibit several of their machines for the various descriptions of woollen work, &c. These all contain the latest improvements, and are finished in first class style.

The G. W. Railway show some ponderous machinery, being parts of their heavy locomotives. The castings are very large, and the beautiful finish of the work is remarkable on all hands.

## COLLECTION OF FRUIT.

Hamilton Horticultural Society exhibit without doubt, the finest collection ever shown. Of apples they had 150 distinct varieties; 13 varieties of crabs; 7 varieties of quinces; 37 varieties of hardy grapes; 16 varieties of peaches; 29 varieties of hot-house grapes, with a large bunch of Purple Hamburg included; 51 varieties of plums.

The Hamilton Horticultural Club's collection almost equals the Society's—in fact, in excellence of fruit they do equal it, although not in number of varieties. They are: Apples 84; crabs, 14; pears, 44; quinces, 3; plums, 26; peaches, 14; 37 varieties of grapes.

The Gallows Society, of Niagara, have also a good show; their apples are excellent.

## MUSICAL INSTRUMENTS.

The central space in the palace is devoted to musical instruments. Among the exhibitors in pianos are Messrs. Heintzman, of Toronto; Thomas and Herald, of Hamilton; and Weber, of Kingston—each of whom exhibit some very excellent instruments. We noticed a Grand Square Piano, with four round corners, by Heintzman, of Toronto, that is considered to be a very excellent instrument.

In the class of organs and melodeons, there is a splendid display. Messrs. W. Bell & Co., of Guelph, have eight instruments each possessing some peculiar merit, and all finished in excellent style. They have a rosewood organ, in chiffoniere style, also an organ in church style, both beautiful instruments, and possessing very fine rich tones. They also exhibit a combined pipe and reed organ, with the vox humana, tremolo, and all the other improvements; a harmonium, and melodeons in different styles and finish. They took three first prizes.

Messrs. McLeod, Wood & Co., exhibit some of their splendid instruments. These consist of cabinet and church organs, with full rich tones, and some of them in beautiful rosewood and walnut cases, with exquisite carving. Their harmoniums, combined reed and pipe organs, and melodeons are all of an excellent character. In connection with their musical instruments, they also exhibit a set of organ keys in a new style, that are very neat, the fronts being rounded and veneered with ivory.

In musical instruments the Guelph manufacturers are far ahead of all the other exhibitors, and keep up the name of the finest instruments in Canada. As usual, they have nearly monopolised all the prizes.

In the gallery Mr. Koberber, of Lindsay, exhibits a very novel instrument, called "The Reed Orchestra." The intention of which is to imitate the effect of a real orchestra, and also to enable the owner to make use of any portion of it at pleasure, thus having always at hand a portable instrument. There are three distinct organs in line with each other, two of which may be played upon by one person. There are two octaves of bass keys, two octaves of middle or tenor keys, and two and a half of treble. Each of these organs has its own stops and special reeds—thus, according to the nature of the music to be performed, either set of keys may be used *ad libitum* or all three by two performers, thus producing an excellent imitation of the real orchestra. Altogether it is a very ingenious piece of work, and was made to the order of the owner, by the Messrs. Bell, of Guelph.

## SEWING MACHINES.

One whole section of the gallery is almost wholly occupied with sewing machines. Chief among the exhibitors is the Guelph Sewing Machine Company, who show twelve of their machines, comprising the Reverable, the favorite O'Brien and their new machine, which contains many important improvements. The chief of these are in the more perfect adjustment of the feed, improvement in the tension, and a changeable foot board, by which the operator can at pleasure change it either backward or forward, affording thereby great relief in the change of position, after working steadily at the machine for a length of time. These improvements render the machine almost perfect, and they cannot fail to be appreciated by the public. The

machines are all beautifully finished, nicely inlaid, and some of the cases are models of tasteful workmanship. Among the other manufacturers we notice the Canada Company of Hamilton, with their new Webster patent, seven machines; Wilson, Lockman & Co., of Hamilton, are on the east side of the south wing, showing fourteen machines; the Gardner Company of Hamilton, occupy the middle of the same wing; the Appleton Company of Hamilton are at the south end of the wing, and show six samples of their new machine. All the machines possess some peculiar excellence to command them, and from morning till night are eagerly examined by admiring crowds.

**The Provincial Exhibition.**

As far as attendance goes the Provincial Exhibition has been so far quite a success. On Tuesday there were about 3,500 visitors. On Wednesday upwards of \$5,000, representing over 20,000 people was taken at the gate during the day. On the Wednesday last year at Kingston only \$2,938 was taken.

The floor of the palace in the vicinity of the eastern door sank down nearly two feet on Wednesday afternoon, under the combined weight of the machinery on it and of the people thronging into the building at that point.

Pickpockets and chevaliers d'industrie were active on Wednesday afternoon. A gentleman from Dundas, while looking at the articles in the palace, discovered one of the former, with a hand in his pocket, and, after giving him a smart blow on the mouth with his fist, handed him over to a policeman.

A deputation from Nova Scotia, consisting of Joseph J. Northrup, Esq., President of the Central Board of Agriculture, Geo. S. Brown Esq., and Professor Lawson, are making extensive purchases at the Exhibition for the Nova Scotia Government. They have bought a herd of Devons, ten in number, from Mr Wm Aitchison, Guelph; several of the same breed from Mr Geo. Rudd, Puslinch (including his prize animals); also a heard of ten Ayrshires from Mr Guy, Oshawa. Their purchases will likewise include Short-horn, long and short woolled sheep, and horses.

**ACCIDENTS IN MIST BY LIGHTNING.**—On Sunday morning last the house of Mr. Walter Henderson, of Harristown, was struck by lightning. It entered at the stove pipe and made its exit through the roof without doing much damage. Mr. Matthew Hans, of this township, lost a valuable mare killed by lightning on a same morning, and the Wilkinson Brothers, on the 8th instance, lost a fine steer at the same time and by the same cause.

It is not an unusual event to see over two hundred and fifty wagon loads of cheese passing through Ingersoll, in one day, for shipment to the old country. The daily average during the season undoubtedly exceeds fifty wagon loads.

**Pic-Nic and Concert at Hespeler**

The great event of the week has been the annual pic-nic and concert of the Mechanics Institute and Library Association on Friday afternoon and evening. Messrs Randall, Farr & Co., Farr, Long & Blaby, George Hespeler, Schofield & Co., and Mr. Brydon gave their employees a half-holiday for the occasion. The people commenced to gather at the grove soon after 2 p.m., and passed the time until 3:30 in the various amusements available upon such occasions.

**THE ADDRESS.**  
Mr. C. F. Cliff, President of the Institute, called the meeting to order at 3:30 and with a few appropriate remarks introduced the Rev. W. Williams, President of the M. N. C. Conference. The reverend gentleman, on coming forward, congratulated the members of the mechanics institute upon the fine day and the respectable company present, and the president upon the honorable position he filled. Taking for his text the word "Association," which occurs in the title of the organization, he referred to the "Associations" as being very ancient, instead of the family, the tribe and the nations. When Alexander would conquer the world, he used the Macedonian Phalanx, an association of men for warlike purposes. With them he fulfilled his purpose. Caesar, Hannibal and Napoleon conquered by the combined and associated forces of armed men. Churches are associations. "This is an age of Conventions and Associations. Men of money form companies for mercantile and manufacturing purposes. Our railways are built by companies; Men associate together to discuss all manner of questions. The world itself is a vast community, each member of which is dependent upon others—the employe upon the employer, and the employer upon the employe. In conclusion the rev. gentleman said, "You are associated for no warlike or injurious purposes, your progress is not marked with blood and smoke! Your march is not followed by groans and tears! Yours is a peaceful purpose. The member of your community is not dependent upon the few books found upon his own shelves. You unite together to furnish a common stock of mental food of which all may partake. There is hope for a community thus engaged. You take men after they have left the school and their apprenticeship, and help them to greater literary attainments and mental powers. "Go on and prosper."

The people then gathered into the drill shed and partook of the dainties so bountifully supplied by the ladies. The proceedings throughout the afternoon were evinced by several pieces of music from the Hespeler Brass Band.

The concert in the evening was not the least pleasing part of the programme. Miss Kribbs and Mr C. Glick appeared for the first time in the role of singers on a public platform and did themselves great credit. Mrs Wright fully maintained her reputation of "always being ready with a good song and of rendering it in good style." Mr Johnstone sang two pieces with good effect. Many, no doubt, missed their old favorites, Mrs A. Rife, Miss Hollis and Dr Swan from among the local talents, and Miss Gerrie as a professional singer, but the absence of Miss Gerrie was less felt on account of the beautiful rendering of a couple of Scotch songs by Miss Glendinning of Watford, who happened to be in the village at the time, and kindly gave her assistance. Great praise is due to Mr Topham for presiding at the Melodeon and directing the musical part of the entertainment. Several pieces on the Melodeon, Violin, Clarionette and flute by Messrs. Topham, Jardine, Simpert, Bowman and Young were greatly admired. At the close of the entertainment Mr Cliff thanked the inhabitants of Hespeler, and particularly the Ladies' for their generosity in patronizing so well the efforts of the members of the Institute in their endeavors to raise funds for keeping up the library, and during his remarks strongly advised all the young men in the village to become members of the Institute and benefit themselves by its library.

## The Corporation of the County of Wellington.

### BY-LAW No. —

A By-Law to provide for the Erection of a Registry Office for the North Riding of the County of Wellington, the Repair of the Registry Office in Guelph, and to assist in making certain Roads and Bridges in the said County, and for issuing Debentures to the amount of \$20,000 for these purposes.

WHEREAS it is necessary to provide for the erection of a Registry Office for the North Riding of the County of Wellington, which Riding has been set apart for Registration purposes, and it is also necessary to provide for the repair and improvement of the County Registry Office in the Town of Guelph.

And whereas for these purposes the sum of five thousand dollars is required. And whereas it is expedient to grant aid by way of a grant of money, payable hereinafter mentioned, to the several Townships and Villages and the Town of Guelph hereinafter mentioned towards opening and making the new Roads and Bridges hereinafter mentioned in the several Townships and Villages and the Town of Guelph in the said County.

And whereas the said County hereinafter mentioned, and it is also necessary to provide for the repair and improvement of the County Registry Office in the Town of Guelph.

And whereas for these purposes the sum of five thousand dollars is required. And whereas it is expedient to grant aid by way of a grant of money, payable hereinafter mentioned, to the several Townships and Villages and the Town of Guelph hereinafter mentioned towards opening and making the new Roads and Bridges hereinafter mentioned in the several Townships and Villages and the Town of Guelph in the said County.

To the Township of Minto towards making the road known as the road between the eighth and ninth concessions in that township... 800  
To the Township of West Garafraxa towards making the road between the third and fourth concessions in that township... 200  
To the Township of Pillington towards making a bridge across the Grand River at the fifth and sixth concessions... 400  
To the Township of Minto towards making the road known as the Minto and Normanby town line \$900, on condition that the County will grant an equal amount... 800  
To the Township of Luther towards making bridges over rivers and streams crossing the road known as the side road between lots thirty and thirty-one in that township... 600  
To the Township of Arthur towards making the road in that village connecting the County roads... 200  
To the Township of East Garafraxa towards making the road known as the extension of the Fergus and Douglas County Road to Waldermar Railway Station... 500  
To the Township of Peel towards making the road known as the Centre side road in that township... 500  
To the Township of West Garafraxa towards making a bridge over the Grand River on the road between the second and third concessions of that township... 500  
To the Village of Arthur, towards making a road between the village of Arthur, township of Arthur and Luther, to Arthur railway station... 200  
To the Township of Peel towards making the road known as the Centre side road in Peel from Arthur village to Glenallan... 1000  
To the Township of Amaranth towards making the road known as the seventh concession line in that township... 1000  
To the Township of Eramosa towards making the road in that township from Rockwood to the town line of Guelph... 200  
To the Township of Maryborough towards making a bridge over the Spring Creek on the road known as the Kilgour's road in that township... 400  
To the Township of East Garafraxa towards making the road between the fourth and fifthth concessions of that township... 600  
To the Township of East Garafraxa towards making the town line road between the townships of Amaranth and Luther and East Garafraxa... 400  
To the Township of Arthur towards making the town line road between the townships of Peel, Maryborough and Arthur... 800  
To the Township of East Garafraxa towards making the town line road between the townships of East Garafraxa and Erin... 200  
To the Township of Peel towards making the town line road between the townships of Peel and Maryborough from Drayton to Drayton station... 100  
To the Township of Maryborough towards making the townline road between the townships of Peel and Maryborough at the hill at the fourthth concession... 100  
To the Township of Luther towards making the townline road between the townships of Arthur and Luther... 400

And whereas it is necessary to rebuild the bridges at Arthur: at the Four Mile Creek and across the Irvine River on the road assumed by and belonging to the said County, known as the Guelph and Mount Forest Road, and the sum of four thousand, two hundred dollars is required to rebuild the said bridges.

And whereas for the purposes aforesaid it is necessary to create a debt of twenty thousand dollars to be raised in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

And whereas it will require the sum of three thousand and nineteen dollars to be raised annually by special rate for the payment of the said sum of twenty thousand dollars and interest.

And whereas the amount of the whole rateable property of the said County of Wellington, irrespective of any future increase of the same, and irrespective of any interest in or income from the said offices, and the said County Roads and Bridges, and also irrespective of any interest to arise from any temporary investments of the sinking fund hereinafter mentioned, or any part thereof, will according to the last revised and equalized assessment rolls of the said County of Wellington, \$19,806,998.

And whereas for paying the interest and creating an annual sinking fund for the payment of the principal of the said sum of twenty thousand dollars it will require an equal annual special rate of one-fourth of a mill in the dollar to be levied in addition to all other rates.

And whereas the amount of the existing debt of the Corporation of the County of Wellington in the principal the said sum of \$99,649.00, and for interest the sum of \$80,680.82.

And whereas there is no interest in or rear.

And whereas the Corporation of the County of Wellington hath not in the municipal year contracted any debts of loans over and above the sum required for its ordinary expenditure which, including the said sum of twenty thousand dollars, exceed twenty thousand dollars.

And whereas a copy of this by-law hath been duly published according to law. Therefore the Corporation of the County of Wellington do hereby exercise the powers in it in that behalf vested, and by the Council thereof enact as follows: That the Warden be, and he hereby is authorized, empowered, and required for the purposes aforesaid, to issue in due form and to the amount of twenty thousand dollars in debentures of the said Corporation of the said County in sums of not less than one hundred dollars each, payable in twelve years at farthest from the day on which this by-law is appointed to take effect, at the office of the Treasurer of the said County, and that every such debenture shall bear interest at the rate of six per cent. per annum from the date of its issue, payable half yearly at the said office, and shall be signed by the Warden, and countersigned by the Treasurer for the time being of the said County, and shall have attached thereto a certificate of the payment of said interest, which debentures the Warden is hereby authorized to negotiate and dispose of.

AND BE IT ENACTED that, for the purpose of forming a sinking fund for the payment of said debentures and interest, an equal special rate of one-fourth of a mill in the dollar in addition to all other rates be raised, levied, and collected in each year upon all rateable property in the said County during the continuance of the said debentures.

AND BE IT ENACTED that, the proceeds of the said debentures shall be applied and apportioned to the several purposes herebefore mentioned, and in the amounts and proportion aforesaid, the grants of the said local municipalities to be paid to the Treasurers thereof respectively, to be applied by them strictly to the purposes aforesaid, and an account of such application to be returned by the Warden to the Council of the said County, at the next December Session of this Council.

No person lending money upon or purchasing said Debentures shall be bound to see to the application of the proceeds thereof.

AND BE IT ENACTED that, this By-law shall take effect upon, from and after the first day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy-two.

The above is a true copy of a proposed By-law to be taken into consideration by the Municipality of the County of Wellington, at the Court House, in the Town of Guelph, in the said County, on the first day of October, 1872, at the hour of two o'clock in the afternoon, at which time and place the members of the Council are hereby required to attend for the purpose aforesaid.
