ACCIDENT.—On Wednesday last Mrae.

spring pole in a certain direction by the aid of
a tree pole. Despite his efforts the tree
fell the contrary way, bending the pole
nearly double, which, on returning to its
straight position, gave him such a severe
blow on the head and face as to make
him insensible for several minutes. After

THE HIBERNICA.—This company gave
their second and last entertainment in
the Town Hall last night. There was a
fair attendance, but not at all what the
merits of the company demanded. The
different characters in the play were well
presented by the various performers.

The singing was good and elicited well-
merited applause. The paintings, and
miscellaneous were well brought out. The
company exhibit to-night in Belleville,
and intend to return to Guelph again
during next month, when we hope they
will receive a worthy reception.

ACCIDENT.—The Elora *Observer* says,
on Tuesday morning at about 8 o'clock,
as Mr. Wm. Pulkinghorne, of Pilkington,
was putting the wagon box on prepara-
tory to driving to the village, his assist-
ant, a small boy, fell upon the wagon
tongue, frightening the horses, which at
once started off at full gallop through
the barn yard, smashing the wagon box
and everything in their way. The boy
clung to the wagon pole with one hand,
and the lines with the other; until the
horses stopped at the front gate, and
wonderfully escaped with a slight strain
of the ankle and a few minor bruises.—
Mr. Pulkinghorne's injuries were, we are
sorry to state, of a more serious charac-
ter. The wheels of the wagon passed
over the chest and back. It is very likely
that he may be laid up for some time,
but under the care of Dr. Paget no doubt
his recovery will be as speedy as possible.

POTATO BUGS.—"A stitch in time, &c."
These pests are coming in in great num-
bers just now. We would advise garden-
ers and others who have the time to
spare, to go over their "patch" as often
as possible within the next ten days, as,
if unmolested, by that time the
"varmin" will be increased by at
least 3,000 per cent. Don't pass over
the eggs. You will see them on the un-
der-side of the leaf, in little yellow clus-
ters. (We call them yellow, you can call
them what you like.) It would be advi-
sable to remove the leaf altogether, or in
a short time you will lose the vine. We
saw one gardener last night grinning like
a Madoc Indian "in his little lava bed,"
because he had succeeded in capturing a
disfeful, and intended to burn them. He
says that is the only way to exterminate
them, and we thoroughly agree with him.
Paris green is considered by many to be a
good remedy for destroying them. We also
know a gardener who tried boiling them
until they were perfectly shrivelled up,
but afterwards unthinkingly threw them in
the sunshine, and saw them all crawl
away in an hour afterwards. There's
nothing like fire.

PRIMARY SCHOOL.—The Galt Board of
Public School Trustees have purchased
property on which to erect a primary
school. The cost was \$1,100.

Local and Other Items.

A child in Hurl is reported to have
died of yellow fever. After death the
body was covered with large yellow spots.

MAJOR OTTER, of Toronto, has been ap-
pointed to second command in the Wim-
bledon Team for Great Britain.

THE DEGREE of M. A. was conferred
upon Rev. J. B. Clarkson, of Galt, by the
Victoria University at the recent annual
convocation.

CONSIDERABLE DAMAGE has been caused
on the Upper Ottawa and tributaries by
the breaking of the booms. The river is
full of timber and logs.

An up-country farmer recounts the idea
of taking a newspaper or paying for an
advertisement, and posts notice on the
school house that "3 hogs hev strade or
bin stooled" from him.

ON STRIKE.—The London, Ont., hod-
carriers have struck for an increase in
wages. They want 12 1/2 cents per day
added to their present wages. Their em-
ployers have signified their intention of
holding out to the "litter end."

SERIOUS ACCIDENT.—Mrs. Barron, wife
of George Barron, Esq., of Elora, met
with a serious accident on Monday last,
by falling through the trap door into the
cellar. Three ribs were broken and
breathing is painful and difficult.

MR. BONNER challenged the world to
produce a horse that would beat Dexter,
and produced the animal himself. His
mare, Pochantons, made a half mile in
one minute seven and a quarter seconds
on Tuesday—it being the fastest half
mile ever trotted.

HELD FOR PUNISHMENT.—The Govern-
ment of Mexico has arrested a number
of monks and nuns on the charge of
maintaining improper relations with each
other in the private houses where they
have lived as religious communities since
the abolishment of the convents. The
nuns have been released, but the monks
are held for punishment.

QUERY.—A correspondent of the Port
Elgin *Free Press* asks:—"Is our country
going to be turned into an Arabian de-
sert? I see the women turning into
camels. How will they get through the
narrow gate? Burns says of nature
that "her pretence has" she tried on
man, and then she made the asses," but
the asses are evidently not satisfied with
their "make," and are trying to improve
it. It is a lamentable failure thus far,
but not desperate.

ABOLITIONISTS AND AIDERS ASSOCIATION.—
The Council met again on Thursday,
when it was decided that the Province be
divided into four districts for the purpose
of holding ploughing matches—one to be
held in the vicinity of Ottawa, one near
Port Hope, one near Paris, and one near
Chatham—and \$300 was appropriated to-
wards each match. Each match to be
held under the auspices of the Associa-
tion. Some other business was trans-
acted, and the Council adjourned to
meet at London on Monday next.

NOVA SCOTIA ON FIRE.—Heavy fires
have been raging in the woods in differ-
ent parts of Nova Scotia during the last
week. A large tract of land is already
traversed by the flames and much dam-
age has been done in Pictou County. A
very destructive fire swept along a dis-
tance of twelve miles, from the west
branch of the River John to Black River
on the east branch of the River John, on
Sunday last, destroying everything on its
course. A large number of the people
living in the vicinity have had their build-
ings burned. A large fire is prevailing in
the woods between Westville and New
Glasgow.

The *New York Tribune* says: "It is
quite a relief to learn that the office-
holders of other lands got rich in a queer
way, just like some of our own. There
is a Dr. Tupper, who has been a Cabinet
Minister in Nova Scotia, and who is
erecting a magnificent Castle Tupper
at Ottawa. An ill-natured newspaper,
remarking that Tupper has always had a
meagre salary, wants to know where he
got the money wherewith to build this
resplendent edifice. The problem is
puzzling, inasmuch as 'the total honest
earnings of Dr. Tupper would not amount
to a tithe of his possessions.'—Where did
the money come from? Who knows,
save Tupper?"

A NEW IDEA IN BUILDING.—Wire net-
ting for plastering is being rapidly intro-
duced to take the place of laths. It
takes less labor to place on the wall; is
more continuous, and will not burn.
Course netting, with one inch mesh, and
made of strong wire, is found to answer
best. For ornamental cornice work it is
especially valuable, for it can be bent in-
to any desired form. Secured to iron
stanchions, in a brick building, our greatest
danger on account of fire would be re-
moved. A still further application of the
plan is to make round bars of wire, re-
sembling barrels, and to coat them inside
and out with cement. When it hardens
it resembles stone barrels. Filled with
sand and sunk in rows and masses, they
make excellent material for breakwaters.

Another extension of the idea has been
tried with success in England. It con-
sists in making iron framed buildings,
covering them with wire netting, and
spreading concrete on both sides. It is
claimed that a house—walls, floors, roofs,
doors, partitions and all, has been built,
that it is firm, strong and absolutely
incombustible. Various applications of
the use of wire netting and of plaster or
cement readily suggest themselves, and
the matter is worthy of the attention of
merchants and builders.

THIS MORNING'S DESPATCHES

Orange Processions Prohibited
Prince Napoleon in Paris.
Appeal of the ex-Empress.
Increase of Circulation.
Murder—Suicide.
Malignous Attempt.
Arrested for Fraud.

Belfast, June 5.—The magistrates of
this city, with a few to the adoption of
measures for the prevention of distur-
bances on the 1st and 2nd of July, the
anniversaries of the battles of the Boyne
and Aughrim, respectively, have deter-
mined to prohibit all processions on these
days.

Paris, June 5.—Prince Jerome Na-
poleon has arrived in this city. His
presence here causes much agitation in
the lobbies of the National Assembly.

London, June 5.—The *Pull Mall Gazette*
has published an appeal of the ex-Empress
Eugenie to the people of France, in favor
of her son.

New York, June 5th.—A special by
Cable to the *World*, dated London, June
5, says the Government has decided to
authorize the Bank of England to in-
crease its circulation £5,000,000 under
restrictions not yet determined.

The officers of the Spanish army are
preparing to pronounce against the re-
public and to summon the old Cortes to
re-assemble.

San Francisco, June 5.—At Hamilton,
Nova Scotia, on Wednesday, W. Carey shot
and instantly killed P. W. Benefit. There
had been a difficulty between Benefit's
wife and Carey's sister. Benefit was
seen by Carey approaching the latter's
house armed with a pistol when Carey
fired a shot gun through the window and
blew the top of Benefit's head off. Carey
is in jail. Fred. D. Baker committed
suicide yesterday by taking poison.

Norwich, Conn., June 6.—An attempt
was made by persons unknown to throw
the Providence mail train from the track
of the Shore Line Railroad, near Westerly,
R. I., at 11 p. m. on Wednesday, by plac-
ing obstructions on the track. The ob-
structions were discovered and removed
in time to avoid disaster.

New York, June 6.—John Noe, ex-
Superintendent of the Croton Aqueduct
Department, and John Rice, former time
keeper, have been arrested on charge of
fraud upon the City Treasurer to the
extent of one hundred thousand dollars.

POLICE COURT.
Before T. W. Saunders, Esq., P. M.
Friday, June 6.
James Brown was charged by the Chief
Constable with bathing in the river near
Gow's Bridge contrary to the by-law.
Defendant pleaded guilty, but was not
aware he was violating any by-law. Dis-
missed with a caution.

Manitoba Items.
FORT GARRY, June 5.
A large and friendly deputation of
Sioux Indians came from the West, and
waited upon the Governor yesterday.
They asked for a land reserve. A large
quantity of provisions, clothing and
trinkets was presented them, and after a
great deal of friendly pow-wowing they
left.

Ont., has been appointed Reception Im-
migration Agent here.

THE OLD PLEA.—In the despatches re-
counting the surrender of Captain Jack
and his Modoc warriors we have a proof
of the spread of the "New Civilization"
when it found that Captain Jack was su-
re to be taken, the Modocs already in U. S.
hands argued that Captain Jack was in-
sane. That you see, is the favorite plea
by which murder so often goes un-
punished among our Yankee cousins, yet
here we have a Modoc scrapper employ-
ing it as gallantly as a New York lawyer. When
Jack comes into Court that will probably
be his defence, and he has as much right
to it as his pale-complexioned friends.
But we don't think it will answer. It is only
white men who can use such a plea effec-
tually—negroes and Indians are under-
stood to be always sane enough to be
hanged for murder.—*Times.*

OAKVILLE BRIDGE REPAIRED.—The new
bridge at Oakville is completed. The
first train crossed at three p.m. on Thurs-
day. Regular traffic on the Toronto
branch was resumed this morning.

RAILWAY BONUS.—The by-law granting
a bonus of \$10,000 for an extension of
the Wellington, Grey & Bruce Railway
from Palmerston, was voted on Thurs-
day, and carried by a large majority, only
two votes being polled against it.

ACCIDENTAL DROWNING.—On Thursday
evening Peter Clark's youngest son, at
Petworth, while amusing himself on a
log at the edge of the river, was knocked
off the log by the dog with which he
was playing, into the river and drowned. The
body was recovered about twenty minutes
after, but life was extinct.

INTENDED VISIT.—The *Galt Reformer*
learns that the Rev. John Dunbar, after
a twenty years pastorate in Glenmorris,
intended leaving on Tuesday for a three
months' sojourn beyond the Atlantic.

Wellington County Council.

June 5.
The Council resumed at 2 o'clock, the
Warden in the chair.

Moved by Mr. McCarthy, seconded by
Mr. McMillan, that leave be given to in-
troduce a By-law to aid and assist the
Credit Valley Railway Company by giving
\$150,000 to said Company by way of
bonus, from the Municipalities of the
Townships of Erin, East Garafraxa, West
Garafraxa, Pilkington, and Nichol, and
the Villages of Elora, Fergus, and
Orangeville, and that the same be read
a first and second time. Petitions to this
effect were presented from each of the
Municipalities above enumerated.

The motion was carried without any
dissent and the by-law was read a first
and second time. It is fixed that the
voting on the By-law takes place on the
31st day of July.

A petition was read from rate-payers
Maryboro', asking that the Council secure
the admittance of Thos. Henry Gillespie
of that Township to the Deaf and Dumb
Institute.

The Warden read the opinion of the
County Solicitor with respect to the
obligations of the County in keeping up
repair bridges on boundary lines between
Counties. The Solicitor gave it as his
opinion that according to the new Muni-
cipal Act there appears to have been a
change made in the law applicable to the
question, and now it is not only the duty
of County Councils as formerly to erect
and maintain bridges over rivers which
form boundary lines between the Muni-
cipalities, but it is made the duty of the
County Council to erect and maintain
bridges over rivers which cross boundary
lines between the Municipalities within
the County.

On motion of Mr. McCarthy the Clerk
was instructed to advertise the By-law to
aid the Credit Valley Railway according
to law.

Mr. Gibson read the report of the
Special Committee appointed to confer
with the Directors of the Guelph Gen-
eral Hospital. They report that they
have failed to come to any arrangement
with that body, and recommend that a
Committee be appointed by this Council
to look out a proper site and ascertain
the cost thereof, and report at the De-
cember session.

Mr. Gibson, seconded by Mr. Rea,
moved that the report

purchase the necessary roadway and grant a like sum for the purpose of opening up said County line.—Lost.
The Council then adjourned till 2 o'clock.

Presbyterian Church of Canada.
Montreal, June 4.

The Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Canada, in connection with the Church of Scotland, met this morning at eleven o'clock, and was constituted with prayer. Devotional exercises were conducted by the Rev. D. McGillivray, of Brockville.

On motion it was unanimously agreed that the following ministers, strangers, who were present should be allowed to sit in Synod and deliberate:—Rev. Dr. Burns, of Cote-street Church; Rev. B. W. Jones, of Chalmers' Church; Rev. Wm. McMillan, of Nova Scotia; Rev. Malcolm McNeil, of Nova Scotia; and Rev. Mr. McClelland, from the United States.

The Clerk read replies to the address by the last Synod to the Queen, the Governor-General, Lord Dufferin, also to Lord Lisgar. At the instance of the Rev. Gavin Lang, a reply delivered at Toronto by Lord Dufferin was read.

The Clerk also read a number of applications from ministers for leave to retire from active ministerial duty on account of age or infirmity.

On a motion by Rev. A. Currie, a long discussion ensued as to the propriety of making an almost entire change in the constitution of the Examining Committee for 1873-4.

Rev. Dr. Cook said the men best qualified for the examination of students, should be on the committee, and the examination was a delicate matter. He advocated changes being made slowly and by degrees.

Rev. Dr. Jenkins observed that every year new men were introduced into the committee, and he supposed such policy would be continued.

Rev. Dr. Cook thought that the Presidents of Queen's and Morris' Colleges should be on the Committee, as they were able to elect from the students all that the latter knew.

Rev. A. Currie in supporting his motion, acknowledged that the Committee had hitherto done its duties efficiently.

Rev. K. Maclean moved in amendment, seconded by Rev. Dr. Jenkins, that eight members of the Committee be annually dropped to be replaced by eight new names.

After a protracted debate the Rev. Dr. Cook moved in amendment to the amendment, seconded by Mr. Morrison, that the present Committee be reappointed.

The original motion, also the amendments, were at length put, and Dr. Cook's amendment was carried by an overwhelming majority.

The Diet then adjourned.
June 5.

The diet having been constituted, the Moderator called on the Rev. R. McCann, one of the delegates from Nova Scotia, to lead the devotional exercises.

The Clerk afterwards read the minutes of yesterday's diet and the same were sustained.

Mr. Grant, of Halifax, appeared as a delegate, and was asked to sit and deliberate with the Synod.

On motion of Rev. Garvin Lang, Rev. Mr. Elzevoll, of St. James the Apostle Episcopal Church, who was present, was also asked to sit and deliberate.

The Ottawa Presbytery recommended that the Rev. Mr. Cleland be received as a Minister of this Church, without the usual year's probation.

The application was referred to the Examining Committee. The Guelph Presbytery reported, recommending that Rev. Mr. Waite, late of the Primitive Methodist, be received as a minister. Referred.

Mr. J. B. Taylor was also recommended by the Presbytery of London to be received as a probationer. Referred.

The four ruling members of the Temporalities Board were re-elected.

On motion it was resolved that the next meeting of the Synod be held in St. Andrew's Church, at Ottawa, on the first Tuesday of June next, at 7:30 p.m.

Canada Presbyterian Church.
MEETING OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.
Toronto, June 4th.

The General Assembly of the Canada Presbyterian Church met in Cooke's Church, yesterday morning at 11 o'clock. An hour was spent in devotional exercises.

The minutes of last meeting were passed. A large number of petitions were presented during the day, which were received.

The Moderator then read a communication from the Dominion Telegraph Company, stating that they had forwarded a box of franked telegrams for the use of the members of the Assembly.

overtures, and moved the appointment of a Committee to consider the matter and report. The motion was carried. A petition was received and read from the Rev. Walter Wright, for re-admission to the Church.

The case was referred to the Committee on the reception of Ministers, with power to send for persons and papers if required.

The Assembly then adjourned at 5:55 p.m.

June 5th—The General Assembly met again this morning at 10 a.m.

After the usual devotional services, the Rev. Mr. Fraser read the minutes, which were approved.

The report of the Committee on Sabbath observance was presented stating that memorials had been presented to seven railway companies, remonstrating with them against the running of trains on Sunday. Favorable replies were received from the companies.

Rev. Dr. Topp read the report of Knox's College. The Committee appointed by the Board reported: 1st, that it was necessary to have a new building, and 2nd, it was favorably impressed as to the prospect of success in such an undertaking.

A report was also read from the Montreal College.

The Assembly met again in the afternoon at 3 o'clock.

The nominations for the several committees were agreed to without discussion. The case of three students was then taken up. The students had left Knox College after the first term last session, and gone to the College of Montreal, without any consultation with any of the authorities. The Senate of Knox College upon being applied to, refused to certify to their standing. The Assembly sustained the Senate of Knox College, and remitted the case back to them, their decision to be final.

The Assembly then adjourned, and met again at 7:30. The minutes of the previous session were read and confirmed.

The question of union was then taken up. The report of the Joint Committee was read. The reception of the report and the consideration of the deliverances were moved and agreed to.

A long debate ensued on the question of adopting part of the report, but nothing definite was done. The Assembly adjourned at 1:15 p.m.
