Death of George Monger, Esq.

We regret to announce the death of George Monger, Esq., which took plage at his residence, West Garafraxa, (near Fergus,). on Sunday afternoop last, at the age of 58 years. Mr. Monger moved from the Township of Toronto to the farm in which he died over twenty years ago, when Garafraxa was but spassely settled, and underwent the difficulties incident to the pioneer in those times. By dint of hard labor and perseverance, he accumulated sufficient property to place him in comfortable circumstances. He was appointed amagistrate some years since, and also represented the township as Reeve, Deputy-Reeve and Councillor, the duties of which he discharged with considerable ability. The present prosperity of the Church in Fergus is in a great measure due to his unswerving attachment and unfaltering perseverance. He may be said to have been the founder of the church of his choice in that village. The Court of Queen's Bench has ruled that having lights in a bar-room within the prohibited hours is not in itself a criminal offence, but only prima facic evidence of an offence—that is, of the sale of intoricating liquors within the prohibited hours, which evidence may be rebutted by proof that no such sale took place. To charge the presence of the light as being in itself an offence was held as constructing a new crime unknown to the law, rind which the Legislature never intended to have construed into one. Practically, the decision leaves the lighting of bar-rooms within such hours almost as dangerous as ever, except that where it can be shown that it was done with an innocent purpose the law will not arbitrarily convert that which in itself is an innocent and legitimate act into a punishable offence. The onus of proving the act not worogful is thrown on the defendant, but if he can so prove it he is saved from the injustice of being punished for that which is not in itself; a wrong.

ENGLISH POSTAL STATISTICS.—In London there are no less than one thousand six hundred post offices or other receptacles for letters, and from many of these post offices letters are collected and distributed sixteen times a day. The total number of letters posted in the United Kingdom last year was over nine hundred millions; newspapers, book packets, &c., bring up this number to about one-third more. In the Savings' Bank Department, more than a million and a half depositors have in keeping over twenty-one million pounds sterling. The revenue of the Department shows a very large increase, and as the expenses have not increased in the same proportion, the net profit to the Government has advanced to the highly respectable sum of \$8,000,000. On the whole, the British Post Office may be safely said to be still far ahead of any similar institution in other countries.
