

CARDINAL TACSCHEREAU.

QUEBEC, July 25.-Cardinal Taschereau is seriously ill. His Eminence, who belonks to a French family of Quebec, siderable prominence on the bench and at the bar, was born in 1820, in the county of Beauce, his great grandfather having come from La Touraine, France. The Cardinal was ordained a priest in 1842, and in 1847 highly distinguished himself by his pastoral labors among those who had been stricken with the ship's fever. Returning from Rome, where he had been sent to present the decrees of the Second Council of Quebec. and had remained for several years studying canon law, of which he was made a doctor, he was appointed director of the Grand Seminaire of Quebec, of which he became superior in He attended the Ecumenical Council in Rome, 1870, and on the death of the Archbishop of Quebec, in that year, was made administrator jointly with Vicar-General Cazeau. In February, 1871, he was appointed archpishop of Quebec, being made the first Canadian cardinal in 1886.

EXHIBITION CASUALTIES.

WINNIPEG, July 25 .- (Special)-The last day of the Winnipeg show was marked by a series of casualties. A. Hollinger, son of Conductor Hollinger, jumped from a moving passenger train on another track and was cut down by the special exhibition train, losing his arm and leg; J. E. Smith, a well-kown cattle dealer, died suddenly on the grounds: two men were badly bitten by a vicious pig, another was kicked by a horse, and a small boy was shot through the calf of his leg by a stray bullet from one of the shooting galleries.

Steamers of the N. Y. K. to Make Victoria Their First and Final Port.

The Four-Day Liner to Come-Arrival of the Inbound " Tacoma."

A prominent Japanese in the city stated, unauthoritively, yesterday that the new Oriental line of steamships to Ladner's. At Ladner's a line will which is to make Seattle its Western run to somewhere near Point Roberts terminus-the Nippon Yusen Kaishawill have Victoria as a port of call. This will make the fourth steamship connection which Victoria will have with China and Japan, and is expected to add materially to the business of the port. It is the avowed intention of the new Japanese line to compete for Canadian trade as well as American; and to do this it is essential that the vessels of the line should touch some Canadian port. This is what other lines have done, and Victoria being most conveniently situated, possesses the first right, and consequently has already more and better Oriental connections than any other city on the coast-in fact no other city on the coast has more than one line of Oriental steamships. This is probably the best and most convincing indication of Victoria's lead in the rivalry for coast supremacy.

THE "TACOMA" IN PORT.

At noon yesterday the Northern Pacific steamship Tacoma, the second big Oriental liner in port, this week, made fast to the outer wharf after an uneventful passage from Yokohama lasting since the 9th inst. She brought 216 tons of general freight for Victoria; 2,800 tons, composed principally of flour and curios for Tacoma and overland points; 21 saloon passengers; three Chinese intermediates and 42 Chinese steerage for Tacoma; and 39 for Victoria. The saloon passengers were Rev. Mr. Walker, a missionary from Foo Chow, who is returning to his home in Oregon; Sanitary Inspector Jordan, from Shanghai, who is on a pleasure trip; Rev. O. C. Goddard, who belongs to the American mission at Shanghai, and who is accompanied by his wife and child; Rev. Mr. Pole, who with his wife and family is bound for Southampton; Miss Williams, Miss Evington, daughter of Bishop Evington of Tokio, who is seeking an American education, and two Frenchmen named Saby and Revelle. One of the Chinese passengers is said to be a military attache of Li Hung Chang, who is en route to New York to join the great Chinese statesman. The Tacoma commenced discharging immediately after her arrival and will leave for the Sound early this morning.

FOR THE VERY FAR NORTH.

The steamer Lakme will leave San Francisco for Tacoma next Tuesday, where she will take on a full cargo of general merchandise and afterwards steam to St. Michaels, at the mouth of the Yukon river. The goods will be taken from there to the interior on a small river steamer. The North American Transportation Company is sending the goods. Provincial Organization Reported Upon Adversely by the Synod Committee.

The Diocese Divided Into Two Rural Deaneries, Victoria and Nanaimo.

The proposal first put forward some two years ago to complete the organization of the Anglican church in this province by the formation of a British Columbia archbishopric, has for the present at least been laid on the shelf, the recent ession of the synod deciding that the time is not yet ripe for so important a step. A committee had since the 1895 meeting of the synod been looking into the subject, and it was on the recommendations contained in their report that action was taken.

There is now one general synod of the ible, and the other to form the three dioceses west of the mountains, Columbia, Westminster and New Caledoniainto one independent organization. which also was pronounced inexpedient by the committee in view of the few hurches and scattered character of the dioceses.

Acting on the suggestion contained in the annual address of the Bishop, the committee to which this document was referred reported to the synod in favor of the early division of the diocese into two rural deaneries, of Victoria and Nanaimo, with lay representation in the chapters, and this having been approved by the synod will shortly be carried into effect. Other advances in the diocesan work arising out of the suggestions in His Lordship's address include the formation throughout the diocese of branches of the Men's Help the Bishop being requested to name the committee; the formation of a diocesan Sunday school organization; and the establishment as speedily as possible of missions on Gabriola and Denman islands and at Alberni.

The Quebec system of administering the mission funds of the diocese and for the maintenance of the clergy in the various parishes, has been adopted here on the distinct understanding that it is only applicable to such parishes as may voluntarily come into its operation, except in the case of vacancies and new parishes, which will be required to conform to its rule.
