**LONDON'S GREAT STRIKE.**  
ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND MEN AND DESPERATE MEN.

Suffering in strikers' families—Fear of a bloody Calamity which Socialist John Burns May Not Be Able to Avert—The Dock Companies' Offer Retained.

London, Aug. 29.—The great strike reached its last night when the dock companies refused the final compromise offered by the men. It now remains to be seen whether John Burns, the socialist leader, will be able to restrain the fury of 100,000 hungry men goaded to a point of desperation by the misery of their starving families for another week. If this is possible, and it would be impossible under any other leader, it is the general opinion that the dock companies will be obliged to accept his terms and agree to a general strike for another week. The dock companies have issued a manifesto in which they offer the regular dock companies per hour ordinary time and sixpence per hour overtime. The companies are promising to abolish the contract system and to substitute piece work, the rates for which will be sixpence an hour ordinary time and eightpence an hour overtime, the overtime being reckoned from 8 o'clock in the evening. Mr. Burns rejects the offer as being a dodge to abolish piece work and bring all men under the frequency scale. The crews of three American cargo ships have been brought ashore to the docks. The dock laborers at Dover have gone on strike.

Sympathy from Belgium. BRUSSELS, Aug. 29.—The Belgian Workmen's Council has sent a telegram to the British Workmen's Council, expressing sympathy with the London strikers and denying that Belgian workmen have been dispatched to London to take the place of the dockmen on strike.
