Editorial.

An Ecclesiastical Opinion of the S. C. R.

An incident of the greatest interest to members of the Independent Order of Foresters, as illustrating in a most marked manner the high esteem in which the Supreme Chief Ranger is held by the best and most enlightened people in our land, took place at the recent meeting in Montreal of the Provincial Synod of the Church of England for the Ecclesiastical Province of Canada. A motion introduced by the Rev. Dr. Langtry, designed to increase the strength of the Church, was under discussion, when Canon Davidson, of Frelighsburg, moved in addition that the Bishops be requested to inform the house regarding the multiplication of dioceses. The Rev. Wm. Clark, M.A., D.C.L., F.R.C.S., Professor of Mental and Moral Philosophy at Trinity University, Toronto, and a gentleman known and respected wherever the English tongue is spoken for his eminent talents, deep erudition and earnest methods, in seconding the addition expressed the opinion that the rural deans were to blame if the Bishops were not informed as to the state of the Church. "On the other hand," the learned gentleman said, "if the Bishops did know, it was quite time their number was increas-In the Order of Foresters, whenever there was trouble in the courts, Dr. Oronhyatekha descended and restored peace. Surely in the Church of God the Bishops could do what Dr. Oronhyatekha did. The Bishops should be thoroughly familiar with the state of the Church throughout their dioceses, and he believed there was a strong case for an increase of the episcopacy." Professor Clark's remarks were received with signs of the heartiest approval, being subsequently referred to as among the most impressive and practical made upon the subject under discussion.

tion Reservation, near Brantford, in August, 1841. The story of his early career, when his indomitable pluck and energy, operating against obstacles that would have appalled most men, carried him through college life, when the honors began to seek him. He was selected to prepare and present the address of the Six Nation Indians to the Prince of Wales, the son of their "Great Mother," Chief Ranger. The following opinions of some of the impression of his abilities on the Prince was so great that he was invited to continue his studies at Oxford under the personal supervision of Sir Henry Acland, Regius Professor of Medicine. The Doctor started to practiso medicine; but there was a broader field open to him, and the Independent Order of Foresters claimed him. He found the Order a wreck; to-day a membership of nearly 150,000 and a surplus of \$3,000,000 stand mainly as the result of his work. In 1881 there were 369 members in the Order, and a treasury that was strictly non est. A comparison of these two statements affords perhaps as brilliant a comment on the S.C.R.'s work as could be made. - The Foresters' Gazette.

Personality of the Head of the Order.

Dr. Oronhyatekha, the present highest officer, or Supreme Chief Ranger, of the I.O.F., as he is called, is a unique personage. He is a full-blooded Mohawk Indian, and is known as well on the other side of the Atlantic as in Canada and the United States.

His early qualities of self-reliance and perseverance were developed in his work among the Foresters, which has been marked by such remarkable success. On one occasion, when out of funds, he is said to have turned a few pennies by sawing a cord of wood for a Methodist minister.

Oronhyatekha acquired his early training at Kenyon College, Toronto University, and at Ox-ford, England. It was while practising medicine in London, Canada, in 1875, that he was initiated into the Independent Order of Foresters. He rose rapidly to high positions in the Order, and in 1881 he was elected to the office of Supreme Chief Ranger, which he has held ever since.

Oronhyatekha's wife was Miss Ellen Hill, of the Mohawk tribe, a great grand-daughter of the celebrated chief, Joseph Brant. They have a son and daughter. They are proud of their race and language, and in their charming home the Mohawk tongue is generally used.—The Daily Republican,

High Court Meetings

HIGH COURT OF ONTARIO.

The twenty-first annual communication of the High Court of Ontario opened on the 9th of August in the school-room of Christ's Church, Chatham.

The High Chief Ranger, A. H. Backus, presided. The Ven. Archdeacon Davis conferred the High Court Degree.

The High Chief Ranger reported expectations for the year had, in a large measure, been reached. There were 1,456 applicants accepted by Subordin ate Courts in the jurisdiction, 231 of whom were rejected by the Supreme Physician. There were 77 deaths as compared with 71 the previous year; 266 suspensions as compared with 532 last year; making a net gain of 875, as compared with 342 last year, and leaving the membership of the High Court on June 30th, 1898, 13,242. Fourteen new courts were organized during the year, making 279 courts in good standing.

INVESTMENTS.

During the year I had an opportunity given me of examining in detail the business departments of the Executive Offices in Toronto, of examining the investments, and ascertaining the methods of bookkeeping and banking. I can assure you that if even a one cent postage stamp is sent forward years after, the receipt of that stamp can be traced as well as what disposition has been made of it.

THE SUPREME CHIEF.

The health of the Supreme Chief at one time was a matter of most anxious concern to his physicians and friends. He was at last induced to give up work entirely and take perfect rest, and all will rejoice to know that he returned so improved that he was able to fully take charge of his former work and devote his great energies and abilities to the further upbuilding of the Order.

HIGH SECRETARY.

Bro. Frank E. McCormick, St. Thomas, reported not one cent in the books against any court for supplies; the membership shows an increase which more than doubles that of last year, and the suspensions are only one-half of what they were last

HIGH TREASURER.

The Venerable Archdeacon Davis, London, reported that less than two years ago the liabilities of the High Court were \$4,228. The High Court is now out of debt, and had in addition on the 31st July, \$2,667 to credit in the bank.

C. St. Clair Leitch, of Dutton, moved, seconded by W. H. Wardrope, and carried unanimously, "that High Chief Ranger Backus be recommended to the Supreme Executive for the Grand Cross of Merit."

RECEPTION OF DR. ORONHYATEKHA.

The Supreme Chief Ranger was received with the usual honors, made one of his characteristic speeches and exemplified the unwritten work of the Order. In answer to questions from members of the High Court, the Supreme Chief explained that the Supreme Executive intended to ask The Supreme Court for a readjustment of the rates. This would not affect the present members; the change would tend to strengthen the Order and add to its benefits. Legislation whereby every member would be entitled to be declared permanently disabled on reaching his seventieth birthday would be asked for.

WELCOME TO THE CITY.

Mayor Patteson and the local courts welcomed the visiting delegates. A most successful and enjoyable mass neeting was held in Tecumseh Park, where speeches and recitations were given by a number of officers of the Order, and an address of welcome by Mayor Patteson. The Mayor stated that he never before had felt so proud of ad-dressing an audience of a fraternal character. The growth of the Independent Order of Foresters had been the envy of all competing Orders, and their charitable work a Godsend to many a helpless widow. Among the members of the two courts in Chatham are found some of its best citizens. The mayor offered the visitors the freedom of the city, and hoped that when they left they would carry away pleasant recollections of their visit to the Maple City.

The High Chief Ranger thanked the mayor for the hearty welcome extended to the delegates.

Saturday evening, after the meeting of the High Court, the court was presented with a Union Jack, Foresters' flag, the gift of David Corbett. The flag is about sixteen feet by six feet, and is a beauty.

number of applications received during the year in the jurisdiction were 2,598, of which 2 9 were rejected, showing a total membership of 10,404, as against 9,143 last year. The average applications as received monthly last year were 147; this year the average was 216. Twenty-three courts have been instituted during the year. Fifty-three brethren died during the year. The condition of the Order in the jurisdiction is eminently satisfac-

tory.
The High Secretary, Bro. R. J. Niddrie, M.D. reported that the membership had increased 1,261 cations for membership were traceable to the individual members of Subordinate Courts.

The High Treasurer, Bro. Atwell Fleming, submitted a most satisfactory detailed statement of the finances.

Bros. T. R. Preston and Geo. E. Challes, High Auditors, reported the books of the various officers as eminently satisfactory.

A TRIBUTE FROM IRELAND.

Bro. the Rev. W. J. McCaughan introduced Bro. the Rev. James Cregan, H.C.R. of Ireland. He received a warm and fraternal greeting. Bro. Cregan said that the honor conferred upon him by the magnificent reception which they Lad tendered was, in consequence of its great enthusiasm, a surprise. "I belong," he said, "to a country whose people are modest in the highest degree; you all know that Irishmen are proverbially modest, and I am no exception to the rule." He also added that all Irishmen were handsome, and they could see that he was handsome. Speaking of the Order, he added, "I am greatly impressed with this High Court; it is a magnificent body. In the Old Country the Order is making great progress, and nowhere so great as in Ireland."

HIGH COURT OF EASTERN ONTARIO.

The High Court of Eastern Ontario met at Pembroke on the 6th September, Bro. Dr. C. Day Clarke, H.C.R., presiding. The usual Committees were a projuted

The H.C.R. emphasized the wisdom of the action taken at Ottawa in dividing the High Court of Ontario. He referred to the Russell County fire, and to the liberality with which the courts had responded to the assistance of the brethren whose all had been destroyed by the flames. He gave the following statement of the visits made by each member of the H.S.C. during the year:

The H.C.R., 35 visits and public meetings; the H.V.C.R., 9; the H. S., 11; the H.T., 11; the H.C., 8; the H.P., 6.

During the year there had been 47 deaths in the jurisdiction, and there was paid to the beneficiaries of the deceased brethren \$58,374.69. The death rate in the jurisdiction has been only 4.7 in the thousand.

The High Secretary, Bro. G. L. Dickinson, reported that there had been an increase of 20 new courts and 1,065 new members during the past year.

The High Treasurer, Bro. M. B. Mallory, reported that there was a balance of \$2,181.99 in the High Court treasury. That the position of the High Court has improved by over \$9.0 as compared with its financial standing the previous year.

HIGH SECRETARY'S REPORT.

We know what it means to leave one's urgent and remunerative duties to hold meetings, answer correspondence, or make visits, especially when one is liable to criticism for not doing more. Bro. Hall's work has been well seconeded by Bros. Aikin, Henderson, Bomholt and Sullivan.

To all Brethren of the Independent Order of Foresters, of North Dakota, greeting:

BRETHREN,-Your representatives at the last meeting of the High Court called on me to perform the duties of the office of your High Chief Ranger, and to lead you in your forward march campaign to a great Forestric victory. The Value of Life and Health in their Relation to the Home.

Paper Number Four-Insurance.

BY C. H. BRACE, M.D. [From American Journal of Health].

In the previous articles of this series, the importance of health to the head of the household was considered from the several standpoints of diet, clothing and sanitary surroundings; but how-ever careful the wage-earner may be regarding food, apparel and healthful conditions of his home, there may arise exigencies beyond his control which render him incapable of properly fulfilling the duties of caring for and supporting himself and his family.
