# OUR CANADIAN PHILATELISTS.

# JOHN REGINALD HOOPER,

the promoter and organizer of the Canadian Philatelic Association, is an English-Canadian. He is a son of Joseph Hooper, Esq., the well-known marble and granite dealer, of Port Hope, Ont. The subject!

From boyhood he evinced a military spirit which pervaded his ancestors, one of whom was owner and commander of a successful privateer in the service of KingGeorge At the age of 18 he passed a military examination and was appointed a sergeant in a garrison artillery battery. Attending the Royal School of Gunnery he obtained a first-class military certificate, and was a volunteer for the Cape Mounted

Rifles during the Zulu campaign. Altogether he has seen nearly six years of active regular service. He served on Col. William's staff with the Midland Battalion during the North-West Rebellion, and was with General Middleton's column,

action at Batoche, and final charge and capture of the rebel stronghold; afterwards he was on the column in the celebrated Big Bear chase in the wilderness north of Fort Pitt and Frog Lake, where he received a touch of malaria by sleep. of our sketch was born in 1859, and is ing in muskeg swamps. On his arrival

back he was presented with a gold medal by admiring friends, also the Queen's medal and the "Saskatchewan" clasp for being under fire. Hooper now devotes his military ardor to a fancy drill canton of which he is 1st lieutenant.

In conjunction with his military duties he also trained as an athlete, and is the possessor of some fine medals and cups. He is credited with doing 100 vards in 10 seconds in 1883 on the historic Plans

of Abraham, Quebec. He nas been selected four times for competition teams in shifting heavy ordnance and big gun competitions. He has also won the championship half-mile snow race for Quebec.

Mr. Hooper's philatelic experience beparticipating actively in the four days' gan in 1871, but sold his collection in



1877. He commenced collecting again in 1877, and now has nearly 8,000 specimens. He published an amateur stamp paper in 1876-7 and a society journal in 1887, principally for the purpose of booming his C.P.A. scheme. He is now a permanent Government employee in the Post Office Savings Bank at Ottawa.

#### C.P.A. OFFICIAL NEWS.

THE SECRETARY'S REPORT.

The following is the report of the Secretary pro tem, Mr. John R. Hooper: To the Members of the C.P.A.

GENTLEMEN,—I have the honor to herewith present my report of the progress and organization of the C.P.A. While I have labored under some difficulties in organizing the association, I am amply repaid for my efforts from the large number of expressions of good-will which I received during my late severe sickness. I am glad that my efforts were not only successful, but the fact that we have reached a formidable number and the composition of our society ensures us continued success for the future. first conceived the idea of forming a Canadian Stamp Association some ten years ago, but was never able to cope with the difficulties in the way, in fact my schemes were looked on coldly, and I could not secure support in the right! direction. In May of last year I started a paper ostensibly to be a society magazine, The Gossip, but the real design of this paper was to reach the first families in Canada, and to work the C.P.A. enterprise by issuing three numbers, but teachers, 2; watchmaker, 1; weaver, 1.

have the happiness to say that my scheme worked wonderfully, and a large number of older philatelists joined.

I formed a Board of Organization in June, consisting of Messrs. Grenny, Ketcheson, Leighton, McRae and Niesser. To these gentlemen I am particularly indebted to for their material assistance Our membership increased as follows: June, 9; July, 14; Aug. 10; Sept., 11; Oct., 23; Nov., 22; Dec., 5; Jan., 14. —Total, 108. The small number joining in December may be due to the fact that I was unable to attend to any philatelic matters during that month.

The membership roll shows the number to be residents of Ontario, 34; Nova Scotia, 24; New Quebcc, 5; Brunswick, 2; P. E. Island, 1; Manitoba, 4. British Columbia, 1; United States, 33; England, Germany, Guatemala, each one, or

The ages of the members are as follows: Under 20, 35; 20 to 25 years, 25; 25 to 30 years, 22; 30 to 40 years, 15, over 40, 6; age not given, 5.

The occupations are variously given and quite interesting: Accountants, 2; agents (express) 1; broker, 1; booksellers, 2; bookkeepers, 8; civil service (Canada), 7; civil engineer, 1; clerks, 15; contractor, I; cutter, I; commercial travellers, 3; chemist, I; carpenter, 1; cashier, 1; elocutionist, 1; engraver, 1; farmer, 1; gentlemen 3; insurance, 4; jeweller, 1; lawyers, 2; medicos, 2; machinist, 1; minister, 1; merchants, 5; notary, 2; publisher, 2; printers, 2; scheme, through this means reaching stamp dealers, 4; students, 11, salesour best philatelists. The Organizing Board voted me a salary of \$10, but as I left the situation after serving nine months, I suppose I have forfeited my right to any of it, so I

will not claim it.

I hope all members will forward any old books or papers relating to philately to Mr. George Walker, the Librarian, of Peterboro, Ont., and we can thus get the

necleus of a good start.

As Mr. Todd as left Manitoba for British Columbia, and resigned the vicepresidency, I would suggest that he be made vice-president of British Columbia and the North West Territories. Davison, of Brandon, is Mr. Todd's nominee, and I hope that the Executive Committee will appoint him to the vacancy.

The yearly fee, now due, \$1.00, but which can be paid half yearly, should be sent at once to the Secretary, who will issue cards of membership as soon as

printed.

The receipts of the association have been \$27.75, and the expenditure \$33.86, which is very light considering the amount of correspondence done and material I have kept accurate accounts of all receipts and disbursements, and have on hand a good supply of stationery, The expenbooks, etc., for future work. diture includes the purchase of fyles for Association's papers, printing, blank and record books, postage, stationery, telegrams, binders, etc., etc. The material

In classifying the different occupations and itemized accounts, books, with everything belonging to the Association will be sent to Mr. J. A. Leighton, Orangeville, who will in fuiure attend to the correspon-The amount of receipts is from entrance fees, but the discounts on American silver, postage stamps, etc., is charged to expenditure, as I credited over 30 of our American friends with 25 cts. whereas I only could get 20 cts. each for their "quarters." Some United States members sent postal notes which are not receivable here and these had to be sent to the States to be "cashed." As a large proportion of the members remitted in postage stamps they were used on the society's correspondence. My books show the Association in debt \$6.11, but I will personally reduce this to me, and hand over the books balanced. During my illness I had to secure help to desprtch the work promptly, requiring 10 to 30 answers per day.

> In conclusion, I hope every member will do his utmost for the Association, and that harmony will reign supreme.

The following is a short sketch of some of the officers elected to serve the C.P.A. for 1888;
