CAMPBELLFORD, ONT.—By-laws were carried here last week granting bonuses to the Dickson Foundry Co. and the Weston Shoe Co.

NANAIMO, B.C.—The Great Northern Railway Co. is reported to be considering the feasibility of building across Vancouver Island, from Nanaimo to Alberni.

BARING, N. B.—Irving R. Todd and H. F. Dowst purpose building a mill here for preparing wood for pulp. It will be 95x25 feet, exclusive of engine and boiler room.

PRINCE ALBERT, N. W. T.—On behalf of the corporation F. H. Clinch will receive bids up to December 15th next for purchase of \$15,000 20 year 4½ per cent. debentures.

FREDERICTON, N.B.—Plans have been prepared for a steel bridge with masonry piers to be erected at the mouth of the Oromocto river, to be 544 feet long and having two spans.

NEW WESTMINSTER, B.C.—Tenders are invited by the Provincial Government up to October 27th for alterations and additions to the asylum, including a new laundry plant.

PETERBOROUGH, ONT.—It is proposed to submit a by law to the ratepayers to grant a bonus of \$6,000 to the Skelton Mfg. Co. to build a factory here for the manufacture of shovels and other tools.

CALGARY, N. W. T.—Bids for the purchase of corporation debentures will be received up to the 20th inst.—Plans are being prepared for new block for J. Y. Griffin & Co., to be stone, 30x150 feet.

BERLIN, ONT.—The council will submit a by-law to the ratepayers to grant a loan of \$75,000 to H. Mickler and W. S. Hudson to establish a factory for the manufacture of bank and office furniture and hardwood finishings.

PORT ARTHUR, ONT.—It is stated that the C.P.R. will build a large addition to their cleaning elevator next spring—J. L. Meikle & Co. contemplate the erection next spring of a four-storey addition to their wholesale premises.

COLCHESTER SOUTH, ONT.—William Newman, C.E., of Windsor, has submitted to the township council a report on a scheme of drainage involving an expenditure of nearly \$100,000. It is improbable that the work will be undertaken.

HEDLEYVILLE, QUE.—The council has passed a resolution granting exemption from taxation to a company whose object is to build a 1,000-foot wharf fronting on the St. Charles river, warehouses, elevators, lumber and coal landings, etc.

**COLLINGWOOD, ONT.**—It is reported that George Cook contemplates building four stores on his property south of the Toronto House.—John Wilson has prepared plans for addition and alterations to the Queen's Hotel for Capt. J. Ganley.—H. Dixon has decided to build a larger foundry.

**ST. CATHARINES, ONT.**—The council has decided to purchase the Stevenson Gardens as a site for proposed drill hall.—The tenders received for erection of public library are in excess of the appropriation, and if more funds cannot be obtained the plans will probably be modified.

**FORT FRANCES, ONT.**—A deputation, including Senator McMullen, interviewed the Ontario Government last week regarding the proposal to develop the water power of the Rainy River at this place. W. H. Bachus, of Minneapolis, representing an American syndicate, is also interested.

**KAMLOOPS, B. C.**—It is announced here that the Canadian Real Properties, Limited, of London, England, intend bringing under cultivation, by irrigation, some 6,000 acres of arable land within a few miles of this place. The capital of the company is \$215,000, and R.H. Alexander is to be local manager. It is proposed to construct a canal to cost about \$50,000.

**VICTORIA, B.C.**—The British Columbia Government is about to build school houses at Minto and Alberni.—Hugh Grieve has decided to add two storeys to the Imperial Hotel and install an elevator and other modern improvements. Plans for the work are in course of preparation.—Ald. Barnard has submitted to the council a scheme for the extension of the sewerage system of the city.

**LONDON, ONT.**—The London, Aylmer & North Shore Electric Railway Co., of New York city, has been incorporated, to construct an electric railroad from London to Port Burwell, Ont. A.S. Melyon, of Aylmer, Ont., is interested.—The Builders' Supply Co., which comprises a number of city builders, have decided to establish a brick manufactory on Adelaide street north.

**VANCOUVER, B. C.**—Parliament will be asked to incorporate the Vancouver & Coast Kootenay Railway Co., to build a railway from this city to Midway, with branch lines.—Tenders close 24th inst. for purchase of \$182,000 city debentures. Particulars from C. F. McGuigan, city clerk.—J. Rogers has had plans prepared for a four-storey building to be built on the corner of Hastings and Homer streets, to cost \$50,000.

**OWEN SOUND, ONT.**—It is probable that work will be commenced next month on the new machine shops of the Owen Sound Iron Works Co., of which C. A. Fleming is vice-president and secretary. Main building will be 300 feet long, of stone, with steel roof and portland cement floor. There will be a pattern metal storage building 40 feet long and two storeys high, pattern shop 40 feet long, boiler shop 100x40 feet, and perhaps one or two other buildings.

**KINGSTON, ONT.**—E. M. Storey, architect, is preparing plans for new farm residence for Thomas Sherwood, Latimer.—Queen's University has acquired more land near the College and either a new theological building or observatory will be built thereon.—Gillies Bros., of Braeside, have secured an option on property just east of the G. T. R. depot, and it is understood that they propose starting cement works.

**LINDSAY, ONT.**—The town commissioner has submitted a report on the paving of King street, the cost being estimated as follows: Asphalt, \$37,000;

bituminous macadam, \$37,000; bituminous macadam, \$32,000; tar macadam, \$17,500. It has been recommended that tenders for pavements be invited this fall, so that the contractor will be in a position to proceed early in the spring.—Last week the ratepayers in the township of Bexley voted to grant exemption from taxation to the Raven Lake Cement Co.

**HALIFAX, N. S.**—The new issue of \$150,000 of stock by the Nova Scotia Telephone Co. will be used for the extension and improvement of the company's lines to the eastward.—C. A. Flaherty, chief engineer of the Egerton Tramway Co., of Boston, states that his company proposes to build an electric railway between the towns of New Glasgow, Westville, Stellarton and Trenton.—Toronto capitalists interested in the Nova Scotia Eastern Railway Co. are said to have reached an agreement with the Nova Scotia legislature under which the latter agrees to give a subsidy of \$5,000 a mile towards the proposed railway from Halifax to the Strait of Canso, with branches, a total distance of 190 miles. It is stated that the survey will be started at once.

**HAMILTON, ONT.**—C. Mills, architect, is reported to have obtained an option on 5,000,000 bricks to be delivered next April. It is believed that the bricks are required in connection with the proposal of a syndicate to erect a large number of dwellings for working-men in the north-east section of the city.—Building permits have been granted as follows: Chadwick Bros., alterations to factory, King street east, cost \$1,500; Charles Plant, brick dwelling, King William street, for Thomas Anderson, cost \$1,200.—Charles Mills, architect, has prepared plans for large departmental store to be built by Stanley Mills & Co., to be of steel, brick and plate glass.—The Deering Harvester Co. have decided to proceed at once with the erection of their warehouse building instead of waiting until next spring.

**WINNIPEG, MAN.**—The Lake of the Woods Milling Co. have decided to build another large flour mill in this province.—The construction of the following works has been recommended: Sewer on Boyd avenue, Charles to Atkins, cost \$1,060; macadam pavement on lane between Kennedy and Edmonton streets, cost \$2,440; asphalt pavement on Henry avenue, from Maple to Argyle street, cost \$6,920; on Ellen street, Logan avenue to Henry avenue, cost \$3,580.—Rudolph Hering, C. E., of New York, has submitted his report on the improvements to the water supply. The cost is estimated at \$15,150.—At the next meeting of the city council a by-law will be introduced to provide for the erection of suburban fire halls.—Dr. Jamieson, M. F. P., of Durham, Ont., arrived here last week in connection with the proposed establishment of cement works in this province.—J. R. Shrimpton has purchased the Henderson block on Princess street, which will probably be reconstructed for the purposes of an hotel.

**OTTAWA, ONT.**—No decision has as yet been reached as to the successful tenderer for the Royal Mint building and the harbor improvements at Quebec.—A New York architect is preparing plans for the new building to be built by James W. Woods, work on which will commence next spring; estimated cost \$80,000.—Three sets of plans have been prepared for the new Central depot.—R. E. Jamieson, baker and confectioner, is forming a joint stock company and proposes to extend his plant and building.—The following building permits were granted last week: S. J. Davis, brick veneered dwelling, O'Connor street,

cost \$2,500; Mary Ronan, brick veneered dwelling, McLeod street, cost \$2,000; Elizabeth Sharp, two brick dwellings, Daly avenue, cost \$4,000.

**MONTREAL, QUE.**—The Water Committee of the City Council has approved of the plans for new pumping stations to be erected at the high level reservoir.—The city is prepared to receive offers for suitable sites for erection of proposed isolation hospital.—David Ogilvy, architect, has been instructed to prepare plans for rebuilding the Castle des Monts Hotel in Agathe Lake. The building is owned by E. H. Dunham, of this city.—It is proposed to construct sewers on Parthenais street, from end of existing street to Amity street, and on Cuvillier, from end of existing street northward.—Proposals are invited by the city clerk up to October 21st for erection of building for new electric pump at the high level pumping station.

**TORONTO, ONT.**—Within the past two weeks subscriptions amounting to upwards of \$10,000 have been received towards the proposed erection of a building for the Library and Museum of Knox College. Building operations will likely be commenced next spring.—The Alexandra Palace Co., Limited, capital \$100,000, has been incorporated, to erect an apartment house in this city. **SAFE LOAD FOR PILES.**

A test of the safe load for piles was made a few years ago at New Quay, Royal Victoria Dock, London, which has been described in "Engineering." The piles driven in some of the work at that place when 36 to 38 feet in the ground were found to respond to the blows of the hammer more than had been expected. A test was accordingly made of one which had been going at the rate of 2 1/4 inches to four 8-foot blows of an 1,800-pound monkey. The pile was of pitch pine 36 feet in length below the cut-off and 12 1/2 x 11 1/2 inches in cross section. The head of the pile was loaded with steel joists weighing 56.8 pounds per foot. A small indicator was arranged just above the level of the ground to record the deflection, which was as follows:

At 10 tons.	No deflection.	Remained thus	24 hrs
" 20 "	1-16 in.	"	45 "
" 30 "	1-16 in.	"	0 "
" 37.5 "	3-16 in.	"	7 days.
" 56.9 "	1/2 in.	"	4 weeks

At the end of this time there was no further deflection. On the load being removed the pile rose 3-16 inch, showing that a great deal of the deflection was due to the fibers of the timber being put in compression.

## MUNICIPAL DEPARTMENT

### DISPOSAL OF REFUSE.

The Municipal Journal and Engineer tells of a combined refuse destructor and electric generator works in use in London which not only gets rid of the city refuse but turns it to economic account. In the electric station are two steam sets of 100 kilowatts at about 500 volts, a booster, and a storage battery. After the gases produced by the refuse leave the furnaces, they pass through a combustion chamber in which most of the dust settles and then through the boiler flues and regenerator into the chimney. The normal capacity of each furnace is one ton per hour, but this can be doubled if necessary. The maximum load on the station is eighty kilowatts, which can be easily maintained by the consumption of two tons of refuse per hour. Only two stokers and a trimmer are required, and a ton per hour for each stoker is easy firing. The maximum output in kilowatt hours per ton averages 35. The plant is only kept in operation six or seven hours per day, so that the best results are not obtained. In the boiler-room are two 30-foot Lancashire boilers, adapted for coal firing, which are only used when there is an insufficient supply of refuse. There is no smoke or dust from the chimney nor any odor in the vicinity. What a waste of fuel is going on in the refuse burners of our cities. Large institutions, instead of burning up hundreds of tons of coal, might be heated and supplied with power from the refuse which they now find it hard to get rid of.

### WESTERN ONTARIO GOOD ROADS ASSOCIATION.

At the recent Toronto Industrial Exhibition, the Western Ontario Good Roads Association was formed. The constitution and by-laws are as follows:

1. This Association shall be called the Western Ontario Good Roads Association.
2. The objects of the Association are as follows:

(a) To bring the question of good roads up for discussion in every way possible throughout the various municipalities of Western Ontario.

(b) To organize and hold meetings at central points in the counties of Ontario west of Kingston, at which the various county and municipal representatives will be able to meet, discuss and form intelligent decisions on questions pertaining to the improved construction and management of roads.

(c) To assist in every way possible in having the Statute Labor question discussed and considered before the rate-payers, with the object of having it finally commuted or abolished and a more systematic and permanent system of road management adopted.

(d) To hold an annual large central convention at some point in Western Ontario.

(e) To assist in securing and disseminating information pertaining to the construction of permanent roads.

Officers were elected as follows: President, George Gero, warden of the county of Ontario; vice-presidents, the wardens of all the counties in the territory of the Association; secretary-treasurer, J. E. Farwell, Whitby, clerk of the county of Ontario; executive committee, the officers and the chairman of the roads and bridges committees of all county councils. The membership is to consist of the president, ex-presidents, executive officers, members of municipal councils, persons appointed by municipal councils, and such others as may be elected members and subscribe to the constitution, provided that no county shall have more delegates than two for each township.

It having been pointed out by some of those present that the act was in some respects unsatisfactory, a committee was appointed to report to the executive committee such changes in legislation as seem necessary in order that advantages may be taken by the province of the Legislative grant for good roads, the executive committee to take such action as they deem best.

The annual meeting of the Association was fixed for the second Tuesday of the Toronto Industrial Exhibition.

The city council of Houston, Texas, having read of the experiments being made in Paris, France, with glass as a paving material, has decided to give it a trial, provided it proves equal to the claims advanced in its behalf. The French inventor has a method of toughening the glass so that it is not easily broken and the pavement is described as smooth, clean, non-slippery and impervious to water. Houston being conveniently located to large beds of fine glass sand, at the mouth of San Jacinto river, can obtain the requisite materials for a superior article of glass at minimum expense and is anxious to make the experiment. Results will be watched with interest. It should make a durable pavement, with little expense for repairs.
