THE EXHIBITION GROUNDS

Occupy an area of fifty acres and are located on Mount Royal Avenue, on the north-western outskirts of the city, from which point a magnificent view is obtained of the surrounding country. These grounds are universally admitted to be the finest on this Continent, a portion being in Mount Royal Park, connected by means of a substantial bridge with the original limited area. The Park portion includes a splendid Race-course with stands for spectators. Extensive buildings, recently erected for the display of Implements and Machinery of all descriptions, (in motion) as well as those for the accommodation of Horses, Cattle and Live Stock generally, are of modern construction and complete in every particular.

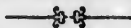
Comfortable seats will be found at convenient intervals all over the grounds, while refreshments of every description may be obtained at the numerous Restaurants or Lunch-rooms. Ice-water Fountains, FREE TO ALL, will be found in various parts of the Grounds. Suitable booths for the deposit of satchels, shawls, &c., will be in charge of responsible parties, who will issue checks for articles left in their care.

The Grounds may be easily reached from any part of the city in a few minutes, either by means of the Street Railway, omnibusses or hacks. A line of busses runs from the Post office to Mount Royal Park every 30 minutes. The Pacific Railway Co. will run special trains to Mile-End every half-hour, from Dalhousie Square and from Hochelaga stations. Pedestrians, preferring a green field route, or short cut, will avail themselves of the splendid new plank road way recently laid from the head of Upper Bleury Street, through Fletcher's Field, to Mount Royal Avenue.

Carriages will be admitted inside the Grounds during the first week only, at the following rates:—

Two-Horse Carriages, \$1.00, and 25c. for each occupant.

One-Horse Carriages, 50c., and 25c. for each occupant.

To avoid confusion at the Turnstiles, visitors are required to provide themselves with the necessary **TWENTY-FIVE CENT PIECE** before entering the Turnstile-house, as it will be impossible for attendants to make change. Offices for this special purpose will be located near the entrances.

A FIRST-CLASS BAND will discourse sweet music daily, on the kiosk, from 2 to 6 o'clock, the **Cornwall Fire Brigade Band** playing on the opening day of the Exhibition.

A VARIETY OF GAMES AND SPORTS, under the auspices of the Citizens' Committee, will take place in the afternoons, particulars of which, with Prizes offered, will be published in hand-bills on the grounds.

A PARADE OF HORSES and other **LIVE STOCK** will take place in the ring daily, at 2 o'clock, from Monday the 18th to the closing day of the Exhibition, and a **Grand Parade of all Prize Animals** will take place on Thursday and Friday, the 21st and 22nd.

THE LIEUTENANT - GOVERNOR of the Province will honor the Exhibition with his presence on Tuesday, the 19th, when an Address will be presented at 1.30 o'clock, at the kiosk. Lunch at 2 p.m.

For the convenience of exhibitors and officials, a post-office, together with telegraph and telephone offices, will be established on the grounds, connecting with the city.

A Lacrosse Match will be played between the Toronto and Shamrock Clubs, on the Shamrock Lacrosse Grounds, on Saturday, the 23rd September.

The Aquatic Sports will take place in the New Canal Basin, at the foot of McGill Street. The North side of the Basin will be reserved for Ladies and their escorts. Entrance to this side only by floating bridge across the Lock at foot of McGill Street. General entrance to the other three sides *via* Black's Bridge only.

The Canadian Pacific Railway will run a special service of Trains to the Exhibition Grounds, from Thursday, 14th, to Saturday, the 23rd September, both inclusive, leaving the New Depot at Dalhousie Square at 9 and 11 a.m., and 1, 3 and 5 p.m. Return Trains will leave the Grounds at 10 a.m., 12 noon, and 2, 4 and 6 p.m. Fare, 10 cents, or 15 cents for the round trip.

The Troy Citizens' Corps are expected to arrive by special train over the Central Vermont Railway, on Monday evening, September 18th, at 8 o'clock, and will take part in the parade of the whole force on the following [Tuesday] morning, at 10 o'clock. The Barlow Greys. of St. Albans, and the Ransom Guards will also be present. The Regimental Band of the First National Guard will accompany the visitors.

MISCELLANEOUS.

The Art Gallery, Phillips' Square, is open daily from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m., during the term of the Exhibition. Splendid collection of Paintings and Statuary. Entrance fee, 10 cents.

The Natural History Society Museum, University Street, will be open to visitors free of charge during the Exhibition term.

The Mechanics' Institute, St. James Street, and the Reading rooms of the Young Men's Christian Association, Victoria Square, and of the Merchants' Exchange, St. Sacrament Street, are all freely open to visitors.

The Electric Light will be used in different parts of the city and on the summit of Mount Royal.

Vessels in the Harbor of the various Lines running between Europe and this port, some of which are especially worth seeing, will be open to visitors during the forenoons of Monday, Wednesday and Friday, 21st, 23rd and 25th, from 10 to 12 o'clock.

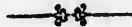
Railway and Steamboat Companies will convey passengers to and from this city during the Exhibition at reduced fares. (See posters and other public announcements.)

CAB TARIFF.

One-Horse Vehicle—From any place to any other, providing the time occupied does not exceed twenty minutes: for one or two persons, 25 cents; three or four persons, 50 cts.

From any place to any other, provided the time occupied does not exceed half an hour: for one or two persons, 40 cents; three or four persons, 60 cents. When the drive exceeds the time limited as aforesaid, hour rates charged.

By the Hour for One-Horse Vehicle.—For the first hour, one or two persons, 75 cents; three or four persons, \$1. Every subsequent hour: for one or two persons, 60 cents; three or four persons, 75 cents.

Two-Horse Vehicle.—From any place to any other, provided the time occupied does not exceed half an hour: one or two persons, 65 cents; three or four persons, 75 cents. When the drive exceeds the time limited as aforesaid, hour rates charged.

By the Hour for Two-Horse Vehicle.—One or two persons, \$1; three or four persons, \$1 25.

Fractions of hours to be charged at *pro rata* hour rates, but no less than one quarter of an hour shall be charged when the time exceeds the hour.

Fifty per cent. to be added to the tariff rates for rides from 12 midnight to 4 a.m.

The tariff by the hour shall apply to all rides extending beyond the city limits, when the engagement is made within the city.

Baggage.—For each trunk or box carried in any valise, boxes or parcels which passengers carry by hand, 10 cents; but no charge shall be made for travelling valises, boxes or parcels which passengers carry by hand.

CHIEF HOTELS AND RESTAURANTS.

The Windsor Hotel, on Dominion Square, is the largest in Canada, and, in point of commodiousness and comfort, will compare favorably with the best managed Hotels in America.

The St. Lawrence Hall, on St. James Street, though not quite so extensive as the Windsor, is the oldest in the city, and more centrally situated, being adjacent to the Post-office and Banks. It is now being enlarged and improved to meet every want of the travelling public. Under the management of its popular proprietor, Mr. Hogan, the Hall justly retains its reputation as a first-class Hotel in every respect.

The Richelieu Hotel, J. B. Durocher, proprietor, is a large and well managed establishment on St. Vincent Street, extending through to Jacques Cartier Square. It is frequented chiefly by the French portion of the population.

The Albion, on McGill Street, is also a large and exceedingly comfortable commercial Hotel. Its proprietors, Messrs. Murray & Stearnes, are especially popular with country merchants.

The American House, on St. Joseph Street, affords good accommodation to the general public, and is much patronized by dealers in horses from the United States.

The Canada Hotel, on St. Gabriel Street, is another comfortable house, chiefly frequented by the French portion of our population.

Omnibusses attached to the chief Hotels, await the arrival of all Trains and Steamers at the different Stations and Docks.

RESTAURANTS.

Freeman's Restaurant, on St. James Street, is probably the handsomest and best managed Restaurant in the Dominion. The *menu* is always of the very best, while the urbane proprietor anticipates the needs of his guests. He justly enjoys a popularity extending from "Ocean to Ocean."

The Terrapin, 287 Notre Dame Street, has for many years enjoyed the reputation of a first-class Restaurant, under the able management of its gentlemanly proprietor, Henry Dunne.

Alexander's, on Notre Dame Street, is the oldest and best known Lunch-room and Confectionery establishment in Canada. It is especially well managed by lady attendants.

Victor's Restaurant, on St. James Street, has only been opened within the past year, and is gaining fast in popularity with the general public. It is conducted in the Parisian style.

Compain's, on St. Francois Xavier Street, is another well-conducted Restaurant, deserving all the patronage it enjoys. The present proprietor is the worthy son and successor of a highly respected citizen, who has been a resident of Montreal for over a quarter of a century.

There are a number of other very respectable Restaurants in the city, all deserving notice, if space permitted.
