As the morning advanced, the bodies of dead men slowly were brought up. The first dead to appear were mostly old men who had been employed as shifters and stonemen. The work of rescue was continued thruout the day.

The lengthy examination to which James White, contractor of Ottawa, and prominent in party organization there as president of the Liberal Association, was subjected by Mr. Du-Vernet in the London bribery case vesterday, was an apparent effort to get an answer to the pertinent query of "Where did the money come from?" What was more, he handed the bulk sum to one of the quartet, and had no personal knowledge as to whether or not the money was actually applied to the defraying of the bills referred to. LABOR TROUBLES.

would indicate that the workers should co-operate and produce without the aid of employers, and so end the recurrence of strikes and lock-outs.

Legislation which is supposed to enact laws for the greatest good of the greatest number is at fault in that it does not safeguard the rights of the workers. Under present conditions we are told that labor and capital (also land) are the factors in the production of wealth, yet labor, which is the creation of God, is ignored, and capital the production of man, alone is considered. Labor is degraded to the condition of a commodity, and capital exaited above God's creation, which is idolatry.

exalted above God's creation, which is idolatry.

Parliament, which grants charters to corporations (or permits individuals) to engage in manufacturing or transportation, is quite right in granting such privilege to the shareholders of such corporations, but when they emerge substitutes to do such manufacturing, then the legislative body which granted the charters should determine as to whether the substitutes should not be considered as partners in the industry, and as such should have a voice in the apportionment of the product. At present the employer claims the business as his very own, and the substitute (labor) has only to be obedient and accept the share which the employer chooses to give. Is it any wonder that the workers should be dissatisfied? Parliament authorizes the issuing of a substitute for money to move crops, and permits interest to

be charged as if it were money. Why then, should not the substitute of the shareholder be on an equality in the apportionment of the product of the industry? It could as well issue the substitute for money to aid in production, and so aid in relieving labor from the thraidom of employers whose arrogance is a menace to the welfare of the country.

Mantime, licenses should be required to be taken out by corporations or others employer, and in the event of any trouble with their employes, the license of the corporation or employer refusing the offices of the department of labor in settlement of any dispute, should be revoked and the cancellation of their charfers should result.





Government Inspection of Banks.

The question of government inspection of Canadian chartered banks is now being discussed.

The Ontario Bank weathered the sea of finance for many years, and only came to grief thru the incompetency of its pilot. Could government inspection have done what a board of directors did not do? When asked if he believed that government inspection of all chartered banks was necessary for the furtherance of the interests of the depositors, he replied:

"The question of government inspection of banks is one that has been brought up on many occasions, and under many conditions. I do not believe that it would materially add to the safety or efficiency of the present banking system.

If any member of parliament seriously proposed that the B.N.A. Act. should be amended and this country be governed, not by a parliament or by ministers, but by a commission, it would startle the people. They would be more startled if his amendment provided that the members of this commission should be appointed, one by the C.P.R., one by the G. T. R.; one by Mackenzie & Mann, one by the Cox-Nicholls electric syndicate, one by the Bell Telephone Co. and the remaining members by other aggregations of corporal wealth.

Such a proposition would receive no support. The corporations themselves would oppose it. Like Julius Caesar and Oliver Cromwell, they would prefer to keep the substance without changing the form of government. Should such a proposition be submitted to the people it would be overwhelmingly defeated, even were it to be supported by every corporation. If the corporations rule Canada, it is not thru their popularity, but is it because the people are betrayed by those who should protect them.

(1.7) Naturally the first avenue of escape for a free people from oppression is thru the ballot-box. Theoretically, the people are free to choose their own members of parliament. As a matter of fact, their members are very largely chosen for them. Thru the device of a party system, the elector is compelled to choose between one of two men, both of whom may be corrupt or inefficient. Not only this, but after the members are elected to parliament, they are systematically betrayed and debauched. elected to parliament, they are systematically betrayed and debauched, until, within a short time, many of them become the servants of corporate wealth instead of the tribunes of the people.

Electoral corruption is not new in Canada. We have always had it, and

Electoral corruption is not new in Canada. We have always had it, and our ancestors were accustomed to it in England centuries ago But electoral corruption to-day has a new, deep, sinister significance. In former times it was not so seriously regarded, nor did it work such very serious injury. In England, for example, two young squires, both popular in their county, might contest for parliament. Both would be good, honest young fellows of large estates, free from any sordid ambition. It would largely narrow down to a matter of personal popularity. Naturally they would spend more or less money. No man, with the best of intentions, can go into a campaign without being importuned, directly or indirectly, for money. But, in the case supposed, whichever young squire was chosen, the country was not hurt; the constituency had a fit, decent, patriotic representative. Even when, as in Canada years ago, the corruption came from party machines, the harm was not so great. Both parties contained men who desired office to carry out their honest Both parties contained men who desired office to carry out their honest desires, to promote the proper administration of public affairs. But at present, this electoral corruption is a far different matter. It is a deliberate, cold-blooded debauchery of the ballot-box by syndicates of selfish and unscrupulous men who have no other end in view but to feather their and unscrupulous men who have no other end in view but to feather their

own nests at the expense of the people. Hence enormous sums are expended to keep in place whichever party happens to be in power.

Where does this money come from? It can only come from one source, and undoubtedly the source is the corporation interests of this country, who pay large sums of money to politicians, for legislation that is favorable to them, for not passing legislation that would be in the public interest and against them, and for concessions and privileges given to them by governments or by parliaments

lic interest and against them, and for concessions and privileges given to them by governments or by parliaments

That corruption prevails is witnessed by the way in which elections are carried on. Infamous men are put into all by elections now, to do dishonest things in the way of carrying elections. There was the trick ballot-box in Hastings. There has been the switching of ballots. There have been dishonest returning officers who have taken oaths, and conducted booths under false names. There has been widespread bribery, as in London. There have been professional election stealers moved from district to district where elections have to be held, and these same men appear in provincial elections and then in federal elections. Schools for the training of men in dishonest election work have actually been opened the training of men in dishonest election work have actually been opened

(2.) Another serious consideration is this: Not only is this money corruptly furnished by men who expect in return for it some unfair concession at the expense of the people, but it must be received and distributed by those who should be the very pillars of the state. There is no man in Canada to-day who seriously doubts but that guilty knowledge, at least, of this dirty business, is possessed by many ministers of the crown. The scoundrels who paid out money also promised—and so far as can be learned, caused to be distributed—positions of trust and emolument under the crown, as a reward to persons who committed peremolument under the crown, as a reward to persons who committed perjury, electoral frauds and other felonies. Guilty knowledge and actual participation in flagrant crime have been brought home to candidates for parliament, and the conclusion is irresistible that either these rascalities. were known to, acquiesced in and condoned by members of parliament and ministers of the crown, or else certain men holding these positions, by their ignorance of facts, so perceptible and notorious, are shown to be utterly incompetent for the official positions which they occupy. Men who run for office require some practical knowledge of politics, and it is a remarkably stupid candidate who does not know about how much money is being spent in his behalf. If common rumor be true, that ministers of the crown and members of parliament conspire with felons to overthrow the very foundations of representative government, an alarming state of affairs is disclosed which becomes still more startling when it is known that their object is not to carry out some line of public it is known that their object is not to carry out some line of public policy to which they are devotedly attached, but that it is merely to enrich themselves by indirect acquisitions from the public treasury.

Many great statesmen have resorted to dubious political acts, feel-

ing that the end justified the means. No doubt Abraham Lincoln, during the American civil war, resorted to many devices of the most ordinary politician, in order to keep a congress behind him pledged to carry on the war to a successful termination. People have often condoned electoral corruption, feeling that some great man, bent on some high purpose, is compelled to seize or retain power by any means at hand. But there is no dignity, or pretense of purpose, or affectation of patrictism, in our public men. They go after the jobs like a tramp after a free lunch counter, and with no higher motives or no truer conception of the dignity of the crown or the grandeur of free institutions.

(3.) Every nation has had more or less electoral corruption, and every legislative body has, among its members, some fellows who are for sale. Many countries, at various time, have had legislatures which were corrupt, or kings who were tyrannical. Between the people and oppression, there was formerly the bench and the bar. Until recent times a lawyer was not allowed to charge a fee. It was supposed that he gave his services to the cause of justice A client might, if he saw fit, present him with an honorarium. Until very recently, the best lawyers died poor. From their ranks were chosen judges, who, with unshaken firmness, defied the power of kings and the tumult of the mob. With the growth of corporations, however, there has been evolved the "business lawyer." The present-day lawyer has little to do with judges or courts. He is found in the lobbies of legislatures and parliaments, in hotels and "houses of mirth." Instead of upholding the law, his principal duty is to evade it. He is paid to teach men how to violate the law and yet keep out of the penitentiary. There is no chivalry about it. He is after the money for the money's sake. The corporations have taken over all the leading lawyers. If anyone tried to bring a lawsuit against a big corporation to-morrow, he could hardly find a firm in Toronto to take his case. Many of them are paid, by the year, by clients they never meet, simply to keep them in cold storage. This is not peculiar to Toronto or to Canada. In New Hampshire every lawyer in the state has an annual pass on the Boston and Maine Railway, and considers himself retained by that corporation. The lawyers, therefore, have abandoned the pursuit of chivalry. There is no more poetry in the profession, to-day. than there is in the business of keeping a cheap restaurant. From these men our judges are made; and any corporation lawyer can tell you, in a moment, how this or that lawyer or judge "leans" towards corporations. A man defending corporations all his life, repeating over and over again their specious arguments, will find himself acting upon these arguments, when he sits on the bench. The present government made chief justice of Canada a man who prided himself upon his detestation of pubownership. He was always professing his regard for vested rights, but never during his whole service in the house was he heard to say a word that would help to right public wrongs. His successor as minister of justice was A. B. Aylesworth, the attorney of the Bell Telephone Co. A place was first made for him in the cabinet by displacing Sir William Mulock, who committed the unpardonable crime of professing some friendship for public rights. He was thought to favor public ownership of telephones. Not only was he put out of office, but the feelings of the Bell Company were assuaged by taking one of their employes to be his successor. No one will seriously say that if there is any crisis in Canada, people can rely upon the bar as an organization to save them. There are doubtless many good lawyers; so are there also many good butchers; but the point is that the bar, as a bar, has ceased to be a defence against the practical overturning of constitutional government.

(4.) But even more than parliaments, judges or lawyers, the people in modern times have looked for protection to the press. It has been truly called the fourth estate. Constantly speaking to the people, in constant touch with them, its influence has been far-reaching and powerful. It would be utterly impossible to effect any complete betrayal of the people, with the newspapers of the country aligned for patriotism. But, after all, what is a newspaper? These men who write must work for the men who own presses, and the rich men and great corporations of Canada are acquiring these presses. They own newspapers which say to the people what their owners and masters tell them to say. It is a fact that the men who own and control the electric ring in this country own and control The Globe newspaper and The Star newspaper in this city, and that the policies of these newspapers are dictated by Senator Cox, Mr. Nichols and their associates. Furthermore that in the City of Hamilton all three newspapers are in the service of the electric ring of that town The same is true of most of the other cities of this country—the corporations have got control of the newspapers. In Winnipeg it

is largely the case there also, and the public will simply be dumbfounded by the knowledge that the Bell Telephone Co. has nearly every newspaper in Manitoba tied up to it by a contract for free telephones with some advertising thrown in, that the newspaper is to be friendly to the Bell Company in its fight to oppose public telephones in that province. The same thing prevails in the Province of Ontario. Nearly every newspaper is sewed up by one of these contracts to the Bell Telephone Co., and so it goes from one end of the country to the other, that this great bulk of the daily newspapers have passed into the hands of the corporations.

Only the other day the fact leaked out that a paper supposed to be published in the interests of the farmers was tied up to the electric light ring and was helped in the publication of its paper by a newspaper controlled by the ring, and that, as a consequence, this paper has nothing to say in favor of the distribution of cheap power to the farmers of this

(5. But many may say: "After all, members of parliament will no doubt do about what is right notwithstanding the way in which they are often elected." It is too shocking for the ordinary man's belief, that any member of parliament would really sell his vote. There is an old saying that "a wink is as good as a nod to a blind horse," and, perhaps, many men who are looked upon as chattels of this or that corporation hardly realize that they are in slavery; but it is impossible for anyone to be long in the City of Ottawa without seeing that the corporations are entirely too active. During the pendency of the Sunday bill in the senate, the Conservative leader in that body was frequently called from his seat by representatives of the great corporations. Members of the house are fairly jostled in the lobbies by representatives of corporations, appropriately enough called "lobbyists." Indeed, one well-known lobbyist for a great corporation usually wears his hat, the same as a member, in the lobby; others hang up their hats and overcoats in the wardrobes reserved for members. There are said to be "houses of mirth" controlled by the three great railways where members are entertained. At meetings of the railway committee, some curious things are seen. When the Yonge-street bridge bill was before the railway committee, thirty or forty members, who seldom attended a meeting, made it a point to be there that day and fairly howled down the Toronto deputation, and finally voted down the bill. Why? Twothrids of these men did not know where Toronto was. They had never seen Yonge-street. They knew nothing about the bridge. They were simply serving the railways. Among the gentlemen very conspicuous that day was Mr. Lefurgey.

The defence is made that men must live. The old idea of public service being a public sacrifice is exploded. During the discussion upon the salary grab, member after member rose and declared that he thought he was worth \$2500 a year—that he earned that much. They disputed about their pay, like Italian laborers on a Saturday night. All dignity seems to have fled from a seat in parliament. It has gotten to be a "job." A man goes to Ottawa and sits in parliament because he is paid \$2500. If somebody would offer him \$2600 to be a clerk in an hotel he would at once resign from parliament. Or he might not for there seems to be in this

body would offer him \$2600 to be a clerk in an hotel he would at once resign from parliament. Or he might not; for there seems to be in this matter what might be called "silent assets."

Another serious matter. The members come to the house bound hand and foot. Their election expenses have been paid by the party and they are reminded of that fact. They owe a debt. They must pay it by supporting the party. The party got this money out of the corporations. It owes a debt. It pays that debt by voting its members. In the house on May 9, 1906, while discussing the bill of W. F. Maclean (South York-to repeal the salary and pension grab, Mr. Henri Bcurassa said:

"How is it that there is so little independence of conduct in the par-liament of Canada? The root of that question lies in the fact that most of the members of the house, except the wealthiest ones—and some-times even the wealthiest ones, acting in this respect, as they do in respect to the indemnity, are not the last to go to the committee to get their funds—are under a kind of moral pledge, as our code of political morality would put it, of supporting their party, tooth and nail, under any kind of circumstances, because their past elections have depended, and their future elections will depend, on the funds which are given to them by their party." them by their party."

"We know very well that the money which is spent in elections by both parties does not fall from the heavens. It is subscribed by people who expect to be repaid, and it is aepaid by the country in the end. If they subscribe to the opposition it is because they expect that their friends will be in power, at some time in the future, and that they will compensate them for the money that they have subscribed to the election fund. If they subscribe to the government, it is because they know

tion fund. If they subscribe to the government, it is because they know that they are going to get back from the government probably twice or threefold the amount that they have subscribed to the electoral fund."

These statements were made on the floor of the house in the presence of the first minister and the leader of the opposition. The debate which followed lasted for many hours. It was participated in by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, R. L. Borden and other prominent men, yet no one challegend the statement made by Mr. Bourassa, because everyone knew

that they were true. (6.) In speaking of "silent assets," what of another ancient bul-wark of popular rights? How about the patriotic business men? Every now and then when the affairs of a city get in a bad way, somebody cries for a business administration, and there is a general feeling that the business men are more honest than the lawyers or the politicians. Is this another hallucination, as applied to the present country and the present time? It would seem so, from the disclosures before the insurance commission. There is no method of evading the law which the big men in these corporations have overlooked. They have accepted evry chance in this direction. They have invested, contrary to the statute. They have been dishonest in their distribution of profits, to policyholders. They have freely used trust funds for personal aggrandizement. They have overcapitalized. They have committed every offende which made the American insurance companies smell rank to Heaven. And the politicians have not been idle. They have endeavored to protect

their friends who were exposed in the insurance business. (7) And with all this, there exists a constant "sawing off" of one scandal against another and one fraudulent election against another The people seem to have no rights in the matter. Party feeling is so absurd, that if Sir Wilfred Laurier went to Halifax and R. L. Borden to Van-couver, and each of them simultaneously committed a murder, the suggestion would at once arise to not arrest either, but to saw one crime off against the other.

So long as the people can be marched like sheep in one party or the other, there is little hope for them. Politics have become so dirty that it is hard to get a decent man to run for office. Corruption is so prevalent that it requires a fortune, in many ridings, to be elected. If the people ignore imaginary party lines that now divide them, if each constituency selects some decent man with the understanding that he will resign whenever called upon, and then see what he does when he goes to Ottawa, there will be some hope for the country. But these things require organization. They require some co-operation between the different parts of the country. Object to the party system as much as we may, it is still difficult to accomplish anything except thru the mechanism of a party. Taking the present membership of the house, neither of the historical parties would pose very gracefully in the attitude of a reformer. They are too busy sawing off with one another. It is time for the people of this country, who are not owned by corporations, to cease relying on the press or the politicians, and to work for such a radical change as will sweep out of power the bulk of the men who are now holding official positions. It is time for a new deal.





Toms River, N.J., Oct. 15.—The trial of Dr. Frank Brouwer for the alleged murder of his wife by poison was re-

Stand in Own Behalf-Other

Defence Witnesses.

After two neighbors of Dr. Brouwer had testified that the doctor and his terms, Dr. Brouwer took the stand in his own defence. He told the story of his early struggle with poverty, then he worked as a carpenter to earn noney to pay his way thru college and nedical schools, and then of the time when he began to practice medicine at alrehyers.

make a living at that place that I first met the woman who became my wife." said Dr. Brouwer. "We were married not long afterwards, and when the foundation for our home was completed I transferred the property to my wife. Much has been said about the financial relation between my wife and myself, and I wish to say that all the money that went into that house was furnished by me. Subsequently I sold the house, and with the money received from the sale purchased some property at Toms River. Then I started to build the house where I now live. Dr. Brouwer said that on the last night of his wife's illness he gave her brandy and one-twentieth of a grain

"No. I never gave arsenic to Mrs. wife's illness, give her strychnine?"
"As God is my judge, I never gave my
wife any strychnine, except in the one
instance, the night before she died." "Did you ever put in your wife's medicine or food powdered glass?"

"No, I did not."

"Did you ever do anything to cause your wife's death?"

"I did not."

Dr. Brouwer denied that his wife was ever jealous, altho she sometimes spoke about women who visited his office, and after they had gone would ask who they were and what they wanted. He said that he had never walked on the street with Miss Kearns, but on one occasion took her for a carriage ride.

He denied that he ever told anyone he would get a divorce or that he ever heard his wife say she would apply

Result of Over Eating. Result of Over Eating.

The witness said his wife's sickness, in his opinion, was the result of overeating and was not caused by impure food. He thought that a too hearty meal had produced cholera morbus.

Dr. Brouwer said the insurance on his wife's life had not been collected. In filling out the proof of death he gave Bright's disease as the cause of death, because he believed that that was the cause.

The witness was asked whether he had spoken to Undertaker Anderson previous to Mrs. Brouwer's death in regard to the kinds of fluid used in em-balming, and whether they contained arsenic. He replied that it was several months after Mrs. Brouwer's death that he asked Anderson about the embalm-

ley, the nurse, that he would rather see his wife die from something given to relieve her sufferings than to see her die without anything having been done to lessen the pain.

He said that he had not only consented to the exhumation of his wife's body, but had even urged that it be taken up and an autopsy performed.

This closed the testimony of the defendant, who was followed on the stand by Mr. Carmichael, one of his lawyers.

Mr. Carmichael corroborated the defendant, relative to their talks about exhuming the body of Mrs. Brouwer.
