

LONDON A CATASTROPHE Pall of Sorrow Hung Heavy Over the Forest City Yesterday.

Flags Hung at Half Mast and the People Spoke in Whispers When They Met on the Street and Discussed the Awful Magnitude of the Disaster—Messages of Sympathy From Cities All Over Canada and Across the Line—The Countess of Aberdeen's Message to the Council of Women—Toronto's Symphathy Wired by Mayor Shaw.

The Dead Number 23 and the List of Injured Runs Away Past the Century Mark—Excited Citizens Discuss the Calamity—City Council Called in Special Session—It is Decided That the City Will Take Care of Its Own Afflicted and Destitute and Seek No Aid From Outside.

London, Ont., Jan. 4.—(Special.)—London's pall of sorrow darkened and hung heavy over the city to-day. From the masts of the city flags waved at half-mast in dolorous silence, and citizens spoke in whispers as they realized the magnitude of the disaster which had in a moment blotted out the lives of 23 people who the evening before were jubilant with life.

From all sections of the country came messages of sympathy, showing how deeply the calamity had touched the hearts of the people of Canada. From Lady Aberdeen the following telegram was received by the President of the Local Council of Women: "His Excellency and I are deeply distressed to hear of the terrible disaster. We know the Local Council of Women will be prompt to render all help possible. Our most heartfelt sympathy is with you. Isabel Aberdeen."

Submitted by the Royal Commission on Re-Forestation, Etc.
How Fast Pine Grows—The Report Recommends the Extension of the Present System of Fire Ranging, the Co-operation of the Hudson Bay Company, the Protection of Small Trees and the Establishment of Forest Reserves.

In the Legislature yesterday the Commissioner of Crown Lands laid on the table the report of the Royal Commission appointed in June last to investigate the subject of "restoring and preserving the growth of white pine upon lands in the province which have been cleared or partially cleared by lumbering operations."

During the fall and summer the members of the commission visited the townships of New Harvey, Galway and Barleige, in the county of Peterborough; the territory of the township of North Bay, in the county of Ontario; and the township of Verulam, in the county of York.

Though the commission has not yet had time to examine minutely enough into local conditions to be able to submit detailed plans for the care and management of the forest, its investigations have been of a sufficiently technical nature to warrant their being made public.

As a rule, after the fire the seeds of the varieties of trees desired, such as spruce, poplar, birch and cotton wood, are scattered by the wind, and speedily occupy the ground.

PROTECTION FROM FIRE.

This statement as to the condition in the Township of Barleige may be taken as fairly typical of the course of natural forest regeneration in nearly all the fire-affected lands which came under the observation of the commission.

How Fast Pine Grows.

The commission gives the following data as to the rate of growth of white pine: A young tree which would give only one inch in diameter and 16 feet long, measuring 16 feet, board measure, would, if allowed to stand for 30 years, grow to 12 inches in diameter and 100 feet long.
