The handle-bar being set forward of the head of the machine, the grips are brought loser to and more in line with the head, giving a greater everage and enabling the rider to have more perfect control of the mount. A bolt running down through the head of the machine serves a double purpose, for it not only tightens the lug on the handle-bar, making it secure, but it expands the handle-bar stem, forming a friction that cannot be relieved without the unscrewing of the bolt. This is done by the handlebar stem being split, so that a V slot is formed on each side. Fitted in the ends of the stem that has the V slot is a wedge-shaped nut. This nut is connected with the bolt runing down through the head, so that the tightning of the bolt brings the nut up into the handle-bar stem, causing it to exd and forming the friction with the interior of fork stem, which it in turn is fitted. The bolt can be slackened without disturbing the nut, and as the handle-bar is adjust-

Another new feature that is valuable on account of its plicity and the perfect manner in which it does its work, is the seat-post fastener, which is composed of three piecesa blind nut, a cotter key and a sleeve. The key, which is milled away on one side so as to partly encircle sleeve, is in-serted through a hole drilled horizontally through top tube, pisecting seat-post tube. The sleeve, which is split and fits the tube snugly, having been put in position and the seatpost inserted, the nut on end of cotter key is tightened. The ightening of nut compresses the sleeve against the seat-post, forming a friction that holds the seat-post securely without any perceptible strain. To adjust the seat-post it is merely ry to loosen nut and tap back bolt, when the sleeve ands and all friction is off. This fastener is light, has but few parts, is neat in appearance, simplifies the matter of adjustment and works perfectly. THE FRAME OF MODEL 51. The frame of the Red Bird Special, Model 51, is of the internal flush joint pattern, with the tubes reinforced at ends and swaged so as to fit internally to lugs. The joint thus formed is brazed from the outside, the work being so carefully done that it is impossible to have any defect in any detail of the process. This joint is clean and smooth, and is exceptionally strong. The tubing used in these frames is of the finest steel we can buy. and is tempered by a special process, adding greatly to its strength. This, with the careful way in which the joints are made, gives a frame that it is almost impossible to twist or break, and that will withstand any amount of hardship. Frames are made 20, 22 and 24 inches high, measured from the centre of bracket to the top of frame. Hanger centres drop 21 inches below wheel centres. A very pleasing effect is produced in the bottom rear fork tube by making them so that they gradually taper from seven-eighths of an inch at one end to nine-sixteenths at the other. Taken altogether, the frames to be used in the different models of the Red Bird Special, Model 51, are decidedly handsome, and are just as strong as they are good-looking, for happily they combine in a marked degree both beauty and strength. In the frames for Style B, or the Ladies' Red Bird Spe-cial, Model 51, the fittings and wheel base are exactly the same as those of the gentlemen's mouuts; in both cases the wheel base being 44 5-8 inches.
