ONTARIO WEST ORANGEMEN

The Forty-Second Annual Session of the Grand Lodge Opened at Stratford.

ALL THE OFFICERS ARE PRESENT.

Grand Officers' Reports Show a Prosperous Year and a Good Outlook.

Stratford, Ont., March 13.—The forty-second annual session of the Provincial Grand Lodge of Ontario West opened here to-day.

Among those present are Bro. E. P. Clarke, M.P., John McMillan, W. Lee, E. Flood, H. Lovelock, W. B. Stricker, W. Foster, W. J. Sanderson, J. T. Edworthy, W. Fitzgerald, Rev. C. E. Perry of Toronto; Aid. Nicholson, Hamilton; ex-Mayor Essey, London; M. Thompson, Windsor; W. Cook, Meaford; Major Clegg, Wingham; J. Wilford, Brant; W. White, Mitchell; J. Alden, St. Catharines; Lieut.-Col. White, St. Mary's; Lieut.-Col. Scott, Kinross; W. Collins, Walkerton; J. Scarlett, Seaforth; James Wilson, Peterborough; and many other well-known and esteemed brethren.

The Grand Lodge was called to order at 2:30 p.m. by L.W. Bro. Jerry, who delivered his address. R.W. Bro. Lee, Grand Secretary, submitted his report and the report notes the organization of six new primary lodges and the reconstitution of four old ones as follows:

- No. 1709, at Fingal, County of Elgin. No. 1742, at Stony Creek, County of Wentworth. No. 1748, at Sutton, County of North York. No. 1745, at Kingsport, County of East York. No. 1748, at Kent's Hall, St. Joseph, County of Algoma. No. 182, reconstituted in the County of East Middlesex. No. 611, reconstituted in the County of West Lambton. No. 788, reconstituted in the County of Algoma. No. 1106, reconstituted in the County of Essex.

The Grand Officers, in their report, express the view that there is great cause for hopefulness in the outlook.

The reports of the Grand Master, Grand Secretary and Grand Treasurer were sent to the proper committees, and the Auditors' report was adopted.

The Grand High Chapter, which met yesterday, concluded business this morning, W. J. Robinson of Stratford being elected Grand Master.

AT OSGOODS HALL.

Judgment was handed out yesterday morning by the Court of Appeal in the following actions: Mann v. G.T. R. This action was brought by an Essex county farmer for damages for the conversion of a quantity of gravel and for the cost of the trial and the trial judge, Sir William Meredith, gave him judgment for \$250 and costs. Kennedy v. Gaudreau—Appeal of judgment of order of Divisional Court varying judgment of the County Court of Essex at Rat Portage. This action grew out of partnership dealings between the plaintiff and the defendant, Joseph G. Gaudreau, the owner, in an hotel business which they carried on at Rat Portage.

NEEDS OF TORONTO FAIR

Parks and Exhibition Committee in Favor of the Expenditure of \$137,500.

IMPROVEMENTS IN HIGH PARK

Urged By Deputation of West End Citizens—Fire Brigade Matters Discussed.

The needs of the industrial Exhibition furnished food for discussion at yesterday afternoon's meeting of the Parks and Exhibition Committee. The directors have asked for \$210,000 for new buildings, alterations, repairs, etc., but the Special Inquiries Committee reduced this amount to \$137,500. It is expected that the new Manufacturers' Building, \$106,000; new Art Gallery, \$10,000; new Dairy Building, \$14,000; remodeling of present Main Building, \$10,000; providing for vehicle exhibit, \$5,000.

The committee approved at this expenditure, in addition to \$2000 for fittings for new buildings, removal of old buildings, etc.

Exhibition Grounds Improvement. The report of the City Engineer and the Commissioner on the cost of controlling the bank in front of the Exhibition grounds stated that there was a space 200 feet long and 500 feet wide, and the estimated cost was \$200,000, requiring about 10 years to fill. It would make a valuable addition to the grounds.

The committee, on motion of Ald. Graham, recommended that \$3000 be provided for the merrily-ground privilege on the Island was awarded to O. Lavigne on the 15th of March for three years.

The Needs of High Park. A large deputation of residents from Parkdale and the West End petitioned the committee to use the claims of High Park to more assistance from the city to beautify the place, and that in future years a sum of between \$3000 and \$5000 be placed in the estimates for this purpose.

The committee were heartily in accord with the proposal.

The City Solicitor was instructed to refer to the city's power to regulate the ferry service.

Fire and Light Committee. Council was recommended by the Fire and Light Committee yesterday afternoon to urge the Gas Company to extend their mains to the Island so as to supply the householders there with gas this summer.

A deputation composed of Mrs. J. T. Small, J. K. McNaught, L. Goldman and H. J. Wade, representing the Islanders' Association, was present and agreed to the Gas Company's terms, which as a condition would be reduced to \$125 when the consumption shall have reached 2,500,000 cubic feet annually, and to \$1 when the

The proposal to place the freon on the same footing as the coal in respect to good conduct badges, merit marks, carrying increased pay, and medals for bravery, was hotly discussed.

On motion of Ald. Lynd a sub-committee composed of Ald. McMurrich, Hubbard and Foster was appointed to bring in a report.

The chief, at the request of Ald. Lynd, will bring in a report as to the necessity of installing a two-story wagon in the St. Clarence-avenue fire hall.

Remove Temptation. In the chairman, Ald. Foster's, message the recommendation is made that all licensed distillers' calendars and pictures be excluded from the fire halls was laughed at. He tried to explain that it was not a good thing for the young men in the halls to see these calendars and read about the output of the breweries, but he only got the laugh for his pains, and the recommendation was knocked out.

Another item in the message recommended that the chief and deputy chief be provided with a distinctive uniform. The chief took of his overcoat to show the clothes that were at present worn. Ald. Foster said to be expected as the fireman's suit had on, but a gentleman's.

The chairman I hope the firemen are gentlemen. The chief became rattled, and after floundering around said he did not mean to say they were not gentlemen. His recommendation about the uniforms was thrown out.

Architect Lemson's report on the new City Hall has been received by the Mayor, and will be made public at the Board of Control. It is thought that the total cost of the building is in the neighborhood of \$2,100,000, which includes the \$800,000 for unfinished work. The extra will amount to about \$20,000.

Re Works Investigation. The Mayor, in the following letter to the aldermen, invites them to come along with their complaints against the Works Department: "If of your own personal knowledge or from communications from constituents you are aware of any specific complaints during the past year relating to the planning or execution of works of any kind under the Works Department which you think should be inquired into, will you kindly write me on the subject, giving such details of date, locality and circumstances as you conveniently can."

"I will then be in a position to ask a report from the department in these matters. "If the report in any case is not satisfactory or is dissatisfied in regard to the work done, I will be glad to refer it to a committee of experts, if it may then be decided what course of expert referee it may be desirable to call in such case."

After Building Site. Messrs.
