ANNUAL MEETING,

February 20th, 1884.

ANNUAL REPORT

Grande Ligne Mission,

OF THE

FOR 1883.

Slowly, but surely, the work of this Mission is drawing near the fiftieth anniversary of its foundation. We do not wish to anticipate the review of the fifty years' work, though often tempted to ascend those forty-seven steps to survey the wide field of our operations. A field where but little money has been spent, a great deal of labor bestowed, numerous trials met, a little discouragement at times, many tears by the way, as in all true labor for the Master and after Him. During all this time, kind, loving, generous friends have helped us and cheered us, from near and from far. It will be a glorious moment for those of us who have seen the beginning of this work, if we are spared to contemplate from that high position, what has been accomplished during half a century, and perhaps they will be ready and happy then to say : "Lord, now Thou lettest Thy servant depart in peace, for mine eyes have seen Thy salvation." In the meantime it is only of one year's work that we are now called upon to say a few words.

We may say that on the whole it has been a successful period of hard work, enough to encourage any modest laborer, and more than enough to inspire a far seeing one. While we are toiling in our different stations to impart evangelical knowledge, to scatter around us the light and savor of a truly christian life, to educate our young people in our Institution at Grande Ligne and sending

a few others to other institutions of learning, we find ourselves in the midst of a population which has ever been boasting of the unity and compactness of its church and religious institutions, now disturbed and wrangling, fairly distracted by the quarrels of one portion of the clergy against the other ; bishop against bishop, altramontane newspapers against other catholic organs of the press. All this about a branch of the Laval University of Quebec being established in Montreal. The much vaunted unity of the church has never been so glaringly shown to be only a pretence. The present quiet divisions of Protestantism, appear almost as an edifying union compared to the clerical quarrellings, the coarse invectives of the partisans, especially on one side where they do not even refrain from affirming the infallible authority of the See of Rome, has been deceived and duped; that the verdict has been extorted by misrepresentations, fraud and lies; it is even intimated that the larger purse has been the weight in the balance of the holy tribunal.

There never was a time more propitious to fish in troubled waters. Why, then, do you not draw a shoal at a time, and not only a few scatt red ones? This is not so simple a question to answer as one might think. The French Canadian is French in the first place, the liberal one is more or less a rationalist, a sadducee. To become a Protest nt is to become more or less English, and he loes not want to loose his nationality; our history is French, our best, greatest writers, poets, historians, literary men are French. In their eyes to become Protestant is severing one's self from all that. Then the mother, the sister, the wife and daughter are devoted Catholics. Only a deep work of the spirit of God can give the strength to sever those ties. We must trust more and more in the mighty spiritual agency for suc cess among a few at least, as it was the determination of the great apostle: "If by any means I may provoke emulation, and may save some of them."

Well, some of them have been saved during the past year through the instrumentality of the Mission, and, indeed, not a few old and young, but especially young, and have made a profession of saving grace in them, in several of our stations. The Grande Ligne station has been the most favored, especially as the young of other places gather there more or less for the winter months.

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Since a year now, nineteen persons were baptized, twelve of whom were pupils in the institution. With the other baptisms in other stations, Montreal, Roxton, Sherbrooke, it forms an aggregate of *thirty-nine baptisms*.

In the Institute at Grande Ligne the work has been pursued very much as usual, only commencing with a larger number of pupils than in almost any other year in the history of the Mission, namely, seventy-two pupils in the house and eight from outside. We are very sorry to have to say that Mrs. Roux's health continues feeble, and though well enough, as she thought, in the fall to resume her duties in the charge of the school with Mr. Roux as usual, much of the time this winter she has had to be confined to her room. The Principal has the help of two English teachers, one for the English language and the other branches, the other for music lessons; and Mr. A. Massé for teacher in French, of mathematics and other things. It is a very heavy burden for Mr. Roux to bear, and we trust that health and strength will be given to all to carry through a successful scholastic year. We also trust that before it closes a work of grace, to which we are now accustomed yearly to look for, may take place among the pupils, so that they will bear with them wherever they go, at home or elsewhere, the precious treasure of a renewed soul.

In our last Annual Report we said that the year had seen the completion of a parsonage at Roxton Pond and a church in Montreal. We are happy to say that another church will soon be completed, at a place where it has been needed for many years past, namely, at Grande Ligne. It will be a glorious day for that station, and a joyous occasion for the missionaries, the converts, and especially for brother Therrien, when next summer we dedicate the building erected on the hill by the generosity of the converts, and the exertions of their pastor, helped of course by a few generous friends.

The work of evangelization has been pursued during the summer months, especially by some of the pupils, but not so extensively as in the previous year, because some of the students were preparing themselves in their studies, in view of pursuing them in other institutions, like Messrs. Lebeau and St. James, at Woodstock, and others were prevented by ill health. One of our students, Mr. J. C. Bracq, after having passed several years at Grande Ligne, went to McGill College where he graduated, and then to Newton Theological Institute, Massachusetts, where he also graduated in June last. While pursuing his theological studies at Newton, every year he spent several months in the work of collecting for the Mission, especially in the New England States. On the 15th of June last he was set apart for the work of the ministry in the Baptist church at Burlington, Vermont, where Mr. Bracq had been brought from popery to the saving knowledge of Christ through the Gospel, by the instrumentality of Rev. Mr. Therrien. It was for brother Therrien and his convert, and now co-worker, a delightful as well as solemn occasion, in which several of Mr. Bracq's ministerial friends joined.

Shortly after Mr. Bracq was married, and soon after his marriage left for Great Britain, where according to previous understanding, he was to devote the fall and winter in the work of collecting, and after that of spending some time on the Continent for the purpose of pursuing further studies. He has now canvassed about two-thirds of that collecting field, and we are happy to say that he has met everywhere a great deal of kindness at the hands of British christians, and has been so far very successful.

The collections in the New England States were also made in the spring and early summer by Mr. Bracq. The Ladies' Associations in New York and Brooklyn, and especially the latter, have been active and generous in their work of getting funds for their beloved Mission. We are deeply indebted to Mrs. Brown in New York, to Mrs. Cutting the President, and Mrs. Burke the Secretary-Treasurer, for their loving devotion to this work, and also to a dear lady friend from Montreal who is helping there now.

In this city (Montreal) the Ladies' Association have done their usual amount of collecting, supplemented by subscriptions gathered by Mr. Lafleur. The collections in Ontario were begun in the fall by Rev. Mr. Therrien very successfully, and are now continued by the Rev. Mr. Botterill, whose agency has been secured for an indefinite period of time.

There is one subject towards which we must ever revert in order to understand the magnitude of this work in its varied channels of action and influence, namely, the great number of our converts who emigrate to the States, either to form Frenchspeaking churches there, or join English-speaking churches. One aspect of this subject became very prominent and striking in the eves of the writer, when on a trip of pastoral labor in Massachusetts and Connecticut last fall In Lowell, Lawrence, Worcester, Springfield he met several parties who had only heard of the Gospel before leaving Canada, or being convinced that the true christian religion was there, had not had in the midst of their relatives, the courage to make known their inmost convictions. There they were, free and untramelled ; the weak ones need that, only the strong ones break through obstacles, and these once weaker ones are to be found by scores on the other side of the lines.

Of the many cases that have come under my observation, I shall quote only two, showing their reflex influence. In the city of Worcester live three brothers, the grandsons of a convert from the parish of St. Phillipe, and a member of the church at Grande Ligne, a very old and stalwart man who died three years ago. While in Canada they were brought up strict Roman Catholics by their father and mother, who forbade any intercourse with their Protestant relations, but in the States, being surrounded by most respectable and devout Protestants, they began to do more for themselves, and soon sent word to their grandparents that they would henceforth follow their example. Intelligent and well to do, we should like to have them among us.

After one of my services, a handsome Canadian came to me and said : " I cannot tell you how happy I am to see you. Let me tell you that my old parents live in Canada, in the parish of St. Paul, of Abbottsford, where Mr. Therrien and yourself had a public discussion with the priest last fall. Since that time their opinions, are entirely changed; I have visited them since and they have more than pardoned me my Protestantism, they have embraced the truth, and the reading of the Gospel is their constant delight."

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GRAND LIGNE STATION.

About the time our Annual Report was in the hands of the printer last year, a gracious awakening, which resulted in the conversion of a score of precious souls, was in progress here; and although mention was made in that Report of this interesting movement, no details having been given, I will now rehearse, as briefly as possible, the gracious dealings of the Spirit with us in that particular instance.

About the middle of the winter it became apparent that several young people in the school were taking a lively interest in the salvation of their souls. Both in private and in the public meetings they expressed their desire to enter the new life. They were glad to embrace the opportunity given them to talk with the pastor privately, concerning their soul's salvation, and to bow down with him to implore divine mercy upon themselves. Many of these private interviews were of the most touching character, as tears of repentance in some instances, and tears of joy in others, flowed freely. Never, in all my experience in dealing with anxious souls, had I seen so much earnestness and such clear evidences of the strivings of the Spirit. Fourteen pupils gave good evidence of their sincere conversion to Christ, and a number of others went away under conviction.

The good work was not confined to the school. Five members of the congregation, outside of the school, were also brought to the saving knowledge of the Lord Jesus Christ. One of them is a man highly esteemed in the community as an honest and upright citizen, as well as a skilful master-builder. He came to the Grande Ligne school years ago a Catholic, and was then made the subject of many prayers. He afterwards severed his connection with the Church of Rome, but never received saving grace until lately. His two young and interesting daughters followed him in the baptismal waters, to the great joy of their christian wife and mother. On the 9th of April a most solemn and, the same time, joyful service was held in the chapel, when nineteen confessed their faith in the Lord Jesus Christ in baptism, and afterwards sat at the Lord's table with a large number of the church members who had preceeded them in the new life.

One of our pupils who had been blessed in this gracious awakening, and in whose heart burned the fire of love to Christ and for precious souls, went to spend her summer vacation with a married sister of hers, living in the vicinity of Sherbrooke city. Her main reason for going there was to labor for the salvation of that beloved sister, her husband and their children. Their home is in a new settlement, four miles from the city, and where they had no public religious privileges. Our young sister started a Sunday-school in her brother-in-law's small log-house, gathering with this brother's family as many of the neighbors' children as she could. It soon became manifest that a larger place must be had for the auspicious school. The school-house was resorted to, but this being at considerable distance, it made it rather inconvenient for teacher and scholars to meet there. "Where there is a will there is a way," and never is this more true than when the will is under the influence and guidance of the Holy Spirit. The skirts of the virgin forest lay quite near the house of her brother, and with his aid our young friend prepared, under the tall and shady trees, a romantic and novel Sunday-school room. A rough board table and seats were put up that could serve also for a pic-nic. Boards were white-washed, and upon them were wrought, with tacks and evergreens, texts of Scripture, such as "God is love," and after which these boards were nailed to the trees. Sunday after Sunday the school met and increased in number and in interest. Adults (the parents of these children) began to attend. A prayer meeting was inaugurated, which followed the Sundayschool exercises. At first the teacher's voice only was heard, but soon the sister, and afterwads the brother and others ventured to call upon the Lord to bless them. The Lord heard these prayers, the spirit of conviction and conversion fell upon them, and the voice of pardoned sinners and the praises of converted souls were soon mingled with the songs of devotion. Brother, sister and three other heads of families were sincerely converted to Christ. and in the month of September it was my sweet privilege to consecrate the waters of the beautiful St. Francis river, by burying these happy converts into them, and "into Christ" by baptism.

During the last year we have been much encouraged by the frequent attendance of Roman Catholics at our meetings. On funeral occasions we always have a large number of them. This

was especially the case at the funeral of our much lamented and excellent brother, Philippe Lore, whose christian character had won him the office of deacon of the church, and the high esteem of all who knew him, both Catholics and Protestants. Many of the first were heard to bear testimony to his virtues, one of them saying, "If I could die as that man did, having borne the same character, and have the same testimony borne to my life on my grave, that was borne to his life on his grave, I should be willing to die now." Another one said, "After hearing what I heard today, I'll never believe the evil reports that are made against Protestants." And another still said, "The beauty of the service is that I understood every word that was said from beginning to end." This departed brother whose death, we are sure, was "precious in the sight of the Lord," was the grandson of Mr. -Rou sy's first convert, Mrs. Lore, whose conversion and death are related in Mdme Feller's memoir.

It was my privilege during the year to bear testimony to the truth before many Roman Catholics. In one instance I had a two hours' conversation with a number of intelligent business men in one of the largest business places in the city of St. Johns. The conversation was friendly and quiet, and listened to by many who came to trade and stayed to hear. When I parted with them one said, "I am very glad we had this talk, I have learned many things this afternoon." From all appearances the effect was excellent—may the Lord water the good seed sown.

In another instance I spent an evening with two aged and respectable Roman Catholics who had been present at the public discussion held last year with the priest of St. Paul of Abbottsford. The impressions they received there, and their subsequent study of the Bible, have led them to seek the truth earnestly, and will doubtless cause them to sever their connection with the Church of Rome. The conversation I had with them seemed to dispel many clouds which hovered over their mind and heart, and they very warmly thanked me for my visit.

There was present at the above-mentioned discussion a man and his wife who had had the Bible in their house for twenty years, but without reading it. Since the discussion the Bible has been made a subject of study, and they are at the present time on

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a fair way of accepting the truth. A devoted brother and sister who, while doing their farm work, always find time and opportunity to bear testimony to the truth, and who live not far from this enquiring family, wrote to me last week, and among other things they say, "Mr. and Mrs. P., who are now studying the Bible, said lately that they would like to see you. For the last two years the priest has refused absolution to Mrs. P., because she reads the Bible. Lately she was very sick, and when the priest heard of her illness he came of his own accord to see her, and offered to confess her. But she said to him that it would be useless to confess. as he had already twice refused her absolution because she kept the Bible and read it, and she was not vet willing to part with it nor to discontinue the reading of it. She asked him to point out to her the evil the Bible taught, and she would then relinquish it. He answered that the wrong was not in the reading of the Bible. but in disobeving the authority of the church. She quoted several texts, such as " Come unto me all ye that labor and are heavy laden and I will give you rest," and " All that the Father giveth me shall come to me; and him that cometh unto me I will in no wise cast out." She said she thought those texts were clear, and that they were a great consolation to her. But the priest said she understood nothing, and that reading the Bible was a mere caprice on her part. He went away without confessing her. We think very highly of this woman ; she has always been very pious, and since she reads the Bible she does not let a day pass without reading several chapters. Her conduct and her conversation indicate that she truly loves God. We have also our aged friends the D's, who have made very good progress in the truth. Mrs. D. is educated. and now she fearlessly speaks to those she meets of the blessed truths of the Gospel."

Perhaps I ought not to close this report without saying a word about our church building here at Grande Ligne. The contract was given last winter for \$5,100. The building is now all enclosed, and if we can secure the remainder of the required funds, it will be completed in the summer. But we need \$1,000 above what we have subscribed to complete the amount. Our congregation having already subscribed \$3,000, we cannot expect much more from them. We need the help of our friends for this. Who will help us ? Let our friends remember that this is the central station of our Mission, that about eighty young people will, for years and perhaps generations to come, be gathered here to receive their intellectual, moral and religious education, that it is the first French Protestant church which is in a great measure built by the congregation itself, and that the church proper will e're long have become self-supporting. A little help now, and by and by, we will walk alone.

REPORT OF MR. ROUX, PRINCIPAL OF THE FELLER INSTITUTE, GRANDE LIGNE.

This year has been a peculiar one in several respects. First by the much larger number of applicants for admission than in former years, especially of Roman Catholics, of which thirty-nine asked for admission. The income from the pupils' fees is also much in advance of former years, as the financial report will show. There were so many applications for younger, untrained uneducated pupils that, if we were able to provide it, a new department for such would meet a great want. Whilst we note the desirability of such department for younger pupils who have everything to learn, we often desire a higher one than we have, and situated in Montreal, as a means of preparing the future laborers. But the foundation for such is the much needed *Endowment* Fund we have often suggested.

A smaller matter here at Grande Ligne, but very desirable item, is a Gymnasium, to have our boys and girls out of the house for a few hours in bad weather, when they cannot go to play out doors.

Now, as to the general aspect of the work, others will speak about it. It seems to me, however, that the country is ripening for a Reformation on a large scale, and in which we shall have our share.

As to the results of this year's work, we are convinced that in spite of all the drawbacks caused by the unusually large number of young ones admitted, encouraging progress have been made in the general deportment and in the studies of the pupils. With the help of the teachers and some of the more advanced scholars, I have organized a Primary department, separate from the others, for little boys, and we have found it to be a great improvement. Among the older ones I may mention the case of a young man who, after only a few weeks stay in our midst, having to go back to his home in the United States, appeared to his friends so much changed in his manner and conduct, that their happy surprise made him regret the folly of having left us, and he is now anxious to return for another year. He came here an infidel, he left us taking with him a French and English Bible and several other religious books, which he bought and began to read earnestly ; and he has since declared himself perfectly cured of any tendency to Romanism. Of another, one of the most troublesome I have, in my large experience of a teacher, ever met with, the father was writing to me some time ago : " I am sure you have done him good. It seems as if nothing touches the Mission without receiving virtue from it." And later on he writes : " I am happy to say his stay with you was of great advantage. He is greatly improved, and studies with more energy than he has done for years before."

But apart from those "hard cases," we have some young men of good ability and excellent disposition. One is a very fine young man, a native of France, brought up in the Church of Rome, well educated, and who is making wonderful progress in the knowledge of the Holy Scriptures, leaving far behind him, in that respect, many who for years have been familiar with the Bible. We have no doubt that the Lord sent him here to be enlightened, and ere long he will know Him, whom to know is life eternal.

Two other members of the church are studying in the higher department; they help us in various ways, and may, at least one of them, eventually become one of our fellow-laborers in Christ; and last, not least, we have gathered under the roof of the Feller Institute, one of the prettiest bevy of young women it has ever been our privilege to teach, giving us, as a whole, much satisfaction. To meet the wants and secure the progress of such a varied assemblage of pupils, we have had to give an enormous amount of lessons, a weekly average of 300 in the divers branches of the Primary, Model and Academy course; and although the Institution is not so strong in the higher branches than it has been in some years past, yet it will be encouraging to know that four pupils study Greek, twenty Latin, five Geometry, and nineteen Algebra. There is besides an elementary course in Physical Geography and Astronomy given to the whole school, while the superior class read with the Principal, Guisot's History of Civilisation in Europe.

The same special attention is given as usual by the Pastor, the Principal and his wife to the study of Holy Writ. The pupils encourage us with their progress in this supreme knowledge.

We here acknowledge with thanks the faithful and able assistance given us by the Misses Gee, Cadier, McFie, Riendeau and Mr. Massé, and we deeply regret that the Pastor should have again been so much absent from the Institution on account of sickness in his family, and of necessary collecting trips, especially at a time when Mrs. Roux was in poor health. We greatly needed to be helped in our infirmity by the Almighty Spirit of our God. We have also been sustained by the sympathy of numerous friends, many of whom have written us encouraging letters. A French Canadian convert, the founder of the *Aurore* newspaper, has generously offered to give our pupils a course of Vocal Music, and comes twice a week from Montreal to help us in this way, having secured a ticket at reduced fare by the kindness of Mr. Stevenson, of the Grand Trunk Railway Company.

Our Institution with its large number of pupils, eighty-three in all, has for its next neighbor the primary school, with an average of thirty-four children, making a total of 117 Protestant children taught daily under the influence of the Gospel

May the Lord make this youth a mighty power in this land.

MONTREAL STATION.

On the 22nd of February, a year ago, the French Baptist Church was dedicated to the service of God. A number of English friends came to join us and to speak words of encouragement to us all. The meeting was a most cordial one. It was presided over by our generous friend and member of the Board. A. A. Ayer. After a few words from the chairman, the meeting was addressed by Rev. Dr. MacVicar, Rev. Dr. Clarke, Rev. Dr. Stevenson, Rev. Mr. Wells and the Pastor. It was hoped that what was wanting to dedicate the building entirely free of debt. would be made up on that evening. In this, however, we were disappointed, and it remained for the pastor to find another \$1,000. which he did. But having been again disappointed in part of a subscription, there still remains \$400 to be found to make it entirely free of debt. On the following Sunday three services were held. The afternoon meeting was a united meeting of all the French Protestant congregations. The church was filled to its utmost capacity; the large French assemblage was addressed by all the French pastors of the city. It was a most delightful exercise, and we have no doubt very beneficial in its results.

The services were henceforth held morning and evening, as in other churches, instead of the afternoon as formerly held before. A Sunday-school was organized, and the Wednesday-evening services have been kept up as usual. Except on special occasions we cannot say that the meetings have been increasing. Our morning service is the most largely attended, at times by a good number of strangers. In the beginning of July the association of our French Baptist Churches met with us, and though not numerous, on account of some misunderstanding, we had delightful and profitable meetings. In the autumn the fourth centenary of Luther was celebrated in our church, and to which we gave the name of *Fête de la Réformation*, a more general topic and less offensive to our Roman Catholic neighbors. The church was full in every corner, and more than a hundred people had to leave at the door for want of room. That we regretted very much, as most of them, if not all, were Roman Catholics. The discourses then were of a high order, and were since published in French in the Aurore newspaper.

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Our French congregations are always very large on any special occasion, and not necessarily as regular in their general attendance as their English brethren, and that is remarkably the case in the French churches in France, and particularly in Paris. Very few will be seen twice at church on Sundays, though they may be for all that very devout and very devoted. This is not in justification but in explanation.

Last autumn there were three persons admitted to the church vy baptism. Mrs. Roux, the wife of the Principal at Grande Ligne, who for years has been convinced that immersion was the proper mode of baptism, made up her mind to follow her conviction. She wished to be baptized by an old missionary whom she considered as her pastor more than twenty years ago, while an assistant teacher to Mrs. Lafleur at Longueuil. Another is the wife, and a delightfully sweet christian, whose husband joined the church eight years ago. She did not feel ready to follow him then, having only left the Church of Rome a few months before. Many were the evenings spent with them to win them entirely over from Rome to Christ. Though, long ago convinced of her duty in this matter, she hesitated on account of her relatives, and particularly of her old mother, who, however, on the evening of her baptism took care of the children at home.

The third is a man who waited a good while hoping to induce his wife to be baptized at the same time; as she used to come with him to church, and receive with pleasure at home the pastor's visits But when he showed that he was determined to wait no longer, she manifested a decided opposition. After his baptism she has never returned to church again. As far as we can see, it is fear of the opinion of the world. As one of her sisters is a faithful member of our church, she may again be brought by the Grace of God to find more strength to follow what she knows to be the truth. She is otherwise an amiable person, and is apparently pleased to receive the minister's visits, when on an evening he never leaves before reading and praying in the family. The head of the family is a most exemplary christian.

As in former years, the twelve months have not elapsed without our loosing a few families by emigration to the great neighboring Republic. If we had not there many friends and supporters of our cause, we should feel rather sore on this point. But we are working together for the continent. The family we most miss were brought to the Gospel here in Montreal, the father and mother having been baptized in Beaver Hall Baptist Church. Mr. L was for several years a deacon in the church. A promising young man has also left for Dakota.

We have no doubt that a persevering, faithful work will in due time fill these churches of ours, and gladden the hearts of younger and stronger men, who will take up after us the labor made perhaps a little easier by our efforts, and friends of this cause will rejoice in seeing that cause a growing success.

STE. MARIE DE MONNOIR.

This important station continues to be an encouraging field in spite of its being just now but partially cared for, Mr. Riendeau, the pastor, having removed to St. John with the view of establishing a station there, where we have a few of our French Protestant converts residing. Since Bro. Riendeau's removal to St. Johns. Ste. Marie has been under the conjoined care of its former pastor and of Mr. Manassé Parent, one of our students in McGill College. They alternate during the winter months, and in the summer Mr. Parent has given his whole vacation to it, preaching with much acceptance. The church and congregation are in a healthy and growing state, owing chiefly to the natural increase of well-established families. Recently a newly-converted family have come to reside there for the purpose of being near a place of evangelical worship. The church now numbers sixty members out of twenty families, and has a congregation of 110. There have been interesting cases of answers to prayer, especially among sick persons A short time after Mr. Riendeau's removal to St. Johns, he was sent for to visit one of his former charge, a sister who was dangerously ill. She wished to be prayed for, and manifested a great desire to partake of the Lord's supper with a few friends, anticipating that it would be for the last time. A short time after she was recovering, and is now quite well to the great joy of her family. Three members of the congregation being awakened in

their souls, desired to obey the Lord's command, "Believe and be baptized." On the following Sunday they met with the other members of the church to partake of the Communion. It was a solemn and blessed moment. Other visits among the parishoners were of a delightful character.

ST. JOHNS.

ABSTRACT OF MR. RIENDEAU'S REPORT.

About a year ago I was invited by the Rev. Ed. Judson, D.D., to go and spend a few weeks in New York to examine the field, in view of establishing a French Baptist Mission Work, in connection with his English Missionary enterprise in the lower part of that great city. Having the permission of our Committee to do so, I went and spent a few weeks there. I found that there is room and opportunity for such a work, but that it would require a younger man than I am, and one well adapted to undertake what would be for some years an arduous task. Having experienced great kindness at the hands of Dr. Judson and other brethren in New York, I returned to my old field of St. Mary. But while there, the friends of St. Johns sent a petition to the Board to have me settled there. The request being granted, I removed with my family to St. Johns. My work in this place has not been without interest. One recently converted family has left for the United States, and others have also removed elsewhere in Canada, that diminishes the numbers at our meetings, where a few Roman Catholics used to attend. But now through the strenous efforts of the priest who has so much influence on these people, surrounded as they are, they no longer come, though many of them receive me kindly in their homes to speak to them on religion, to read the Gospel to them and even to pray with them. A woman who had been present at one of my visits said : "I did not know that Protestants thus fervently prayed to God." You may infer that she did not know much of anything, but it must be borne in mind that Protest ints are studionsly misrepresented by their priests. Another woman who had received a New Testament from a Protestant friend, wishing to see me came to my house with a friend to converse on the subject of salvation. I prayed with

them and the prayer was answered to the good, both of body and soul. The next day she met her neighbor and related to her what had happened in the evening, and how happy she had been through the night. Her neighbor asked her to be kind enough to ask the minister to pray for her also. The priest hearing of this, did all he could to prevent them reading the Bible and seeing Protestants, saying they would do them harm. The woman hearing the priest speaking against the Missionaries said : "Sir, if Protestant ministers are bad men, why did the Lord answer his prayer for me?"

With much pleasure do I bear my testimony to the kindness, generosity and sympathy of the English Protestants of this place. They have welcomed us and have helped us in many ways, and particularly in lending us a fine room in their Acadamy to hold our meetings on the Lord's day.

While laboring here I have also visited old Protestant families in the town of Farnham and in St. Athanase.

ROXTON POND.

This station may boast of having one of the members of its congregation, a member of the Federal Parliament at Ottawa; of having a most active, judicious and economical man for pastor, besides being devoted and devout. The members of the church and congregation are enterprising and successful men. Altogether this station is constantly rising, becoming more and more a centre of French Protestant influence, animated with a missionary spirit. To some of us who remember the small beginnings here among poor people in the woods, the results are marvellous. But they have not been attained without passing through years of trouble, of discouragement, as well as unfruitful hard labor. At one time, some twenty years ago, more than a score of families left for Lake Huron : a short time after it was sorely disturbed by denominational strife, happily quite ended now.

During the past year the church has lost three members by death, and has received nine members by baptism. The conversion of two of those newly received members is remarkable. One is of a young man recently converted from Romanism. Feeble in health, but strong in soul, he resisted in a loving spirit, but with firmness, to the solicitations and even persecutions of his friends, of his relatives, and even of the priest, until his death, which he calmly faced with immortal hopes through the Gospel. The other is the conversion of an interesting young woman, the sister of a member of the church, who a few years ago was employed as colporteur. The brother some years ago gave her a New Testament, and sometimes would say a few words to her about religion. She always remained silent on the subject, and would continue to perform zealously her religious practices. At times, after mass, she would secrete herself in some secluded spot on the banks of the beautiful Yamaska river, and then compare what the priest had said with what she read in the Gospel, and there shed many tears in her soul's perplexity. Some months ago she came from St. H. to Roxton Pond to live and establish a fancy goods store. On Sunday mornings she would habitually start for church at the same time with her brother, he to go to the Protestant church and she to the Catholic church. One Sunday morning her brother said to her as they came to the parting spot : "So we must part again ; you will pray for me and I will pray for you." "I am going with you this morning," she said, "we will pray together." In the evening she again went to church with him, and on the following Wednesday evening meeting, she spoke feelingly on her change of convictions. The Roman Catholics of the place told her: "You may as well close your shop now, for you will do nothing." "Let it be so, then," she said. But their prophecy is not fulfilled, and she remains a delightful

The contributions of the church are a good deal in advance of previous years. The Sunday-school, under the direction of Mr. O. Therrien, is increasing and interesting, he is helped in this work by Miss Eva Brouillet and other young ladies.

ST. PIE.

Once a flourishing station, and for years in a depressed state on account of the emigration of many of its members, is beginning to revive again, and while the Protestants are taking courage for themselves, they see a number of Roman Catholics come in to their assemblies. Lately two families, who a few years ago had sent to their priest the notice of their leaving their church and then reentered it; after a sojourn in the United States for a few years have returned very decided Protestants, and are regular attendants at the church. The pastor of Roxton Pond, Mr. Brouillet, has the charge of St. Pie station, but as it is a great distance from Roxton Pond, it is very desirable that a missionary should once more be settled there, inasmuch as the converts themselves are willing and ready to help.

SOUTH ELY.

In the midst of some difficulties the work has been continued in this station by the labors of our young brother, F. Millar, for some time a student at Grande Ligne. The congregation have made laudable efforts, considering their means in repairing the chapel, besides contributing sixty five dollars to the funds of the Mission. In the course of the year five persons were added to the church by baptism. An aged brother has died in the faith, and at his funeral service there were some forty Roman Catholics present in spite of the priests forbidding them to attend such services The clerical leaders know that Protestant religious services are the means of imparting a great deal of evangelical knowledge to their parishioners, and especially of convincing them that the Protestants die as peacefully and hopefully in their faith as Roman Catholics themselves, and would like to prevent that conviction being formed. This station very much needs a permanent and experienced missionary.

SHERRINGTON.

This interesting field is under the immediate care of the pastor of the church at Grande Ligne, and some of the items of interest connected with it are related in Mr. Therrien's Report. Still there is much more to say than is said there, but we are obliged to say it in very few words. There are in that place several respectable families of converts, who form the nucleus of missionary action, they are exemplary, intelligent and generous, and are always ready to help the christian worker in this good cause.

LAPIGEONNIERE AND ST. CONSTANT.

Have been, we are sorry to acknowledge, very much neglected during the past year, and especially this hard winter, with almost impassable roads, and a great deal of rough weather. However, some of the missionaries, pastors and students have occasionally visited those places, where doubtless some good missionary work might be accomplished by a devoted laborer, who would meet with encouragement and help among the goodly number of Protestant families who still remain there. They themselves show their attachment to the Gospel by sometimes going all the way to Grande Ligne to attend religious services there.

CONCLUSION.

It seems to us that the review of such a year's labor and success is enough to warm our hearts to renewed efforts in this cause, where the hand of the Lord is so visibly seen at times if not always. There are great things constantly occurring in the Kingdom of God without observation. The bustle and noise and show of a Canadian Carnival is a very small feature of the great throbbing, deep, moral and suffering progressing life of humanity, and will soon pass away as her ice palace before the rays of March's sun; while we shall be left to continue spring, summer and winter to fight the battle of right against wrong, of right against might, of honesty, purity and holy christian life against a sinful world. In our particular sphere we are moreover called upon to constantly wrestle with religious and evangelical truths,

so as to make it appear that a religion of forms, of superstitious teaching, often without a particle of spirituality, is the only true religion. The educated, liberal-minded, sceptical members of that great eclesiastical organization, are clever enough, clear sighted enough to discriminate between a religion of mere forms, as to the mass of her adherents, and a religion which is exacting in the sphere of morality from its members. They often boast that their natural religion is better than the professed, revealed religion of the priest. Still they seldom abandon it, because their friends and relatives are there, and also our different Protestant forms of worship seem strange to them. They are happy of our success. though remaining outside, and may never join our churches in their present state and forms. Still we have labored so long among them, that through our labors, preaching and lecturing, articles in newspapers, pamphlets and conversations, they have learned so much of the truth that there may be some day a large movement of secession from the Church of Rome. Several times men in the higher circles of society have told us : "If we could go out some twenty-five or thirty families together, so as to form a social circle of our own, we would be ready and glad to come out and free ourselves from the interference of the priesthood."

We must be prepared to see such movement outside of our existing forms of churches some day. It is in view of such a result that a united French Protestant church, especially in Montreal, with larger congregations, better singing, more pulpit preparation, has been advocated. There is no doubt but what such a religious body would be more attractive to cultivated persons who have no particular creed, and no very deep conscious need of a religious life.

In the meantime, not knowing what we may be helping to prepare for future reformation in society here below, we know that in laboring faithfully for the Master, and in His spirit, we are preparing souls for the immortal society of the blessed. Your labors, dear brethren, your prayers and your gifts, brothers and sisters, will not be in vain in the Lord. THE EVANGELICAL SOCIETY OF LA GRANDE LIGNE.
