

REPORT OF THE KIRK SESSION.

In accordance with the practice of previous years, the Kirk Session avail themselves of the opportunity, which the Annual Meeting of the Congregation affords, of submitting the following statement concerning those matters which are entrusted to their oversight :

In their last Report, the Session expressed the confident hope, that, within a few months our then vacant Pastorate would be provided with a minister ; and now they are enabled to say that the hope then expressed, and the high expectations then entertained by many of the Congregation, have since been more than fully realized by the induction of the Rev. W. T. HERRIDGE, B A., B.D., into the Pastorate of this Church. This important event in the history of the Congregation was consummated on the Second day of August last, after a vacancy of one year. This settlement is one which has given the utmost satisfaction, and appears full of promise for the future prosperity of the Congregation.

In looking back on the events of our past year, especially on the trouble and anxiety which were experienced in connection with the calling and ultimate induction of our Pastor, the Session recognize much that calls for gratitude to the Divine Head of the Church, especially for the guidance which He vouchsafed to us in the hour of our temporary disappointment—enabling us then quickly to decide on our future course of action and opening up so plainly the way which led to the unanimous choice of our Minister. They also find it a great cause of thankfulness that the disturbing influences so often incident to the tedious process which a congregation is required to go through in calling a minister have, in our case, passed away without causing any permanent injury to the good feeling and harmony which have hitherto prevailed in the Congregation.

The Session deem it unnecessary in this Report to refer to the various steps which were taken in prosecuting our successful call, or, to specify all the stipulations which it was considered necessary for the Congregation to propose in order to render the acceptance of the call

clearly probable—these matters having been already very fully reported to the Congregation by its commissioners and committees. There is, however, one of the conditions attached to the call which now requires to be referred to, namely: that which stipulates that Mr. Herridge should enter upon his duties immediately after his induction and remain with the Congregation until the middle of October, after which short term of service he is to be permitted to leave his charge for a period of seven months or thereabout. And the Kirk Session are to be responsible for providing regular pulpit supply during such absence. The fulfilment of this agreement will incur considerable additional expense, but as the amount required to meet this has already been provided, there will be no necessity to increase the burden already placed upon our ordinary revenue. This lengthy absence of Mr. Herridge from his charge became necessary in consequence of his holding a College Fellowship which required that he should visit the principal seats of learning in Britain and the Continent, and which he had arranged to carry into effect previous to his receiving any intimation of our Call. The Session feel that under these circumstances the vacation given was unavoidable, and while they now feel his absence as a loss, yet, they are confident, that when he returns to his Charge he will come to his new sphere of labor with such increased powers of ministration as shall amply repay the Congregation for their generous liberality in this matter.

In providing Pulpit Supply during our Pastor's absence, the Session were fortunate in securing the consent of the Rev. Dr. Jenkins to undertake the Moderatorship of the Kirk Session, and also to hold himself responsible for our pulpit supply, during the greater part of the time that our Pastor may be absent. Of the value and character of these services the Session will avail themselves of a future opportunity of expressing their appreciation.

In arranging supply for the months of November, December and January, the Session were enabled to secure the services of the Rev. F. W. Archibald, of Truro, who discharged the duties of the Pastorate with great acceptance to the Congregation, and on closing his engagement the Session expressed their estimation of his services by adopting the following minute, viz:

F. W. Archibald attended to the ministerial duties in the pastorate of this Church during the past three months, the Kirk Session record their appreciation of his faithful presentation of the Gospel in the course of his recent pulpit ministrations and of his diligent pastoral visitation of the sick belonging to the Congregation, and they express the hope, that, with increasing bodily strength, there may also be given unto him an abundant measure of Spiritual gifts, to fit him for still greater usefulness in the work of the Christian ministry, in such sphere of future labor as the Divine Head of the Church may call him to occupy."

The Session take this opportunity of thanking those ministers from a distance who kindly gave us their ministerial services during the closing months of our recent vacancy, and also to thank the ministers of our sister Churches in the city for their kindly offices to members of the Congregation in seasons of sickness and times of family bereavement during the same period; and they would, especially, recognize the many and valuable services which were rendered to the Session by the Rev. Joseph White, of Rochesterville, who, by appointment of the Presbytery, acted as *interim* Moderator of Session, and faithfully attended all meetings of the Congregation that required his presence as Moderator during the year which our Pastorate remained vacant, and also conducted our Weekly Prayer Meetings for three months of the past summer. The Session recorded their appreciation of his various services by recording the following minute, viz:

"The Rev. Joseph White, of Rochesterville, having performed the duties of Moderator of this Court during the recent vacancy in the pastorate of this Church, the Session, in recognition of the excellent services which he had thus rendered, do hereby authorize their Treasurer to forward to Mr. White a cheque for the sum of fifty dollars additional to the amount which he has already received for Pulpit Supply."

The Session have much pleasure in reporting that the Christian work of the Congregation has been continued during the past year with energy and apparent success. The public Sabbath-day services have, generally, been largely attended, both morning and evening. The Wednesday Evening Prayer Meeting has been maintained during the greater part of the year, and whilst the attendance has not always been as large as might be expected, yet, during the last seven months, many of the Congregation have availed themselves of this hour of social worship and instruction.

The work in the three Sabbath Schools, connected with the Congregation, has been carried on with energy, and good results should follow the devotion which has been manifested by many of our teachers. The School, which meets in the Lecture Room of the Church, under the continued superintendence of Mr. Gibson, in numbers and efficiency is in advance of former years. That which meets in the Central School East, under the superintendence of Mr. Larmonth, continues to render good service to the families of the Congregation who reside in that locality. The Stewarton School was, for a time, interrupted in its work in consequence of being deprived of the use of the building which it formerly occupied. The Session have now pleasure in stating that within the past few months a new School House has been erected, at a cost of seven hundred dollars. Of this sum, however, there yet remains an unpaid balance, which, it is hoped, will not be allowed to rest upon it for any great length of time. The site upon which the building is erected was the free gift of Mrs. Stewart, of Stewarton, who presented it to our Church, for the convenience and benefit of the families of our Congregation residing in that suburb. The Session in acknowledging this gift, recorded the following minute addressed to Mrs. Stewart, viz :

“The Session of St. Andrew’s Church desire to offer you sincere thanks for your generous gift of a property for the erection of a School House. Your kindness has supplied a felt want in our work in Stewarton, and we earnestly pray that God’s blessing may rest upon the endeavors that we are thus enabled to make in the instruction of the young and the upbuilding of the Church of Christ.”

Further details concerning these Schools may be found in their Reports to be presented at this meeting.

The District Visitors have, as heretofore, rendered valuable service in their sphere of congregational work—in visiting their districts monthly, in reporting cases of sickness—in distributing tracts, and receiving the contributions promised to the Schemes of the Church.

The work of relieving the wants of the poor in the Congregation is entrusted to the Ladies’ Aid Society. From their Report it will be seen that \$105.36 have been expended for this purpose during the year. Some persons to whom weekly allowances had heretofore been given, having in the course of the year removed from the city, the drafts on the funds have consequently been less in amount than usual, and new calls

for relief have not been numerous. The balance in the hands of the Treasurer of the Fund is reported as \$125.63.

The numerical strength of the Congregation is greater than reported last year. Then, the number of families connected with the Congregation were returned as 262, but in making up that estimate single persons in the Congregation who held parts of pews were included by computing three persons as equal to one family. This year the Session have followed the different and more usual practice by giving the actual number of families and of single persons separately, thus reporting our present number of families as 255, and of single persons 71, which, if compared with last year's return will show an increase of sixteen families.

The number of communicants reported last year was 361. The present number on the Communion Roll of the Congregation is 360, there having been added during the past year the names of (31) thirty-one persons, (18) eighteen of whom were received by certificate from other congregations; (11) eleven were admitted to the Fellowship of the Church on profession of faith, and (2) two were re-admitted after absence; whilst, within the same time (32) thirty-two names were removed from the Roll—(3) three by death, (5) five by certificate, and (24) twenty-four in adjusting the Roll before prosecuting our call to a minister.

The Session have always found it difficult to give an absolutely correct return of the actual membership of the Congregation in consequence of the fluctuating character of our city population, and the increasing frequency of our members removing to other cities without thinking of withdrawing their Certificates of Church Membership, and these names are thus allowed to remain on our roll until the lapse of two years, and sometimes it happens that while their names appear on our Roll some of them become members of other congregations, whose Sessions receive them without certificate, contrary to the Rules of our Church, and in this way their names appear on the roll of two congregations in different places at the same time. The Session refer to this matter with the view of preventing the recurrence of such instances of neglect and of impressing upon any of our members who may find it necessary, at any time, to leave us permanently, that the Rules of our Church require that, on leaving, they should withdraw their certificates, and also to offer the further consideration—that a

strict compliance with this rule would render the statistics furnished by our Church Records far more accurate and reliable.

On Sabbath morning, the second of December last, the Rev. D. J. Macdonell, of Toronto, conducted Divine Service in our Church. The purport of his discourse was mainly to place before the Congregation the claims of the scheme, authorized by the General Assembly of our Church at its last meeting for the Augmentation of Ministers' Stipends. During the following week personal appeals on behalf of this Scheme were made to several members of the Congregation, and on Sabbaths the 9th and 16th of December last an opportunity was given to such others of the Congregation as desired to do so, to contribute thereto. The result of these efforts on behalf of this Scheme was, that the very liberal sum of \$1,033.50 was contributed by the Congregation in aid of its funds, the items of which are herewith submitted.

The lengthened absence of our pastor in Scotland has entailed an additional liability on the Session in the matter of payment for pulpit supply. To meet this liability, a guarantee fund amounting to the sum of \$1,100 was kindly raised by a few of the members of the Congregation, the details of which are also herewith submitted. Of this fund, \$725 have been already paid in, and the remainder will be available whenever required.

The Session desire to record their gratification that the contribution by the Congregation of these two additional amounts, aggregating the very considerable sum of \$2,133.50 for the augmentation scheme and for pulpit supply, have not appreciably interfered with their revenue for other purposes, both the contributions to the ordinary schemes of the Church and the usual Sabbath collections being somewhat in excess of the total amounts realized from those sources last year.

In God's good providence we still have our church edifice in which to worship Him; and have now a Pastor who shall soon be present with us, to "go out and in before us," to break unto us the "bread of life:" to guide our steps in the way of truth and holiness: to impart words of comfort and of hope to the feeble, the sick and the dying, and to administer consolation to the bereaved. And, to help him in the arduous duties of his office, we have a band of earnest and willing workers to engage in the various branches of our Congregational work, and the support and co-operation of a people, among whom are found many, who are animated by a spirit of generous liberality towards every Congregational object, and to the various schemes of our Church. The Session, while rejoicing in this completeness of our external organization for carrying on our Congregational work, would also remember that we cannot expect to achieve any real success in our Christian life and work without the blessing of the Holy Spirit. They would therefore ask the Congregation to unite with them in earnest prayer unto God that He may bless us during the ensuing year with an abundant outpouring of His Spirit, so that the zealous labours of minister and people may be crowned with a large measure of true success.

REPORT OF THE TEMPORAL COMMITTEE

To the Congregation of St. Andrew's Church in General Meeting Assembled:

The Temporal Committee beg respectfully to report that the financial affairs of the Congregation are, in their opinion, in a satisfactory condition. The claims on the Congregation have been met without difficulty, and the Treasurer left with a balance on hand. The pew rents, Glebe rents and the rent of the Manse have brought to the Committee a sum of \$887, \$59 in excess of the revenue from the same sources during the preceding year, and the Kirk Session have seen their way to increasing the amount yearly placed by them at the disposal of the Committee.

The Committee have endeavored to administer the funds at their disposal economically and faithfully, and have given careful consideration to all matters affecting the interest of the Congregation.

The Audited Accounts submitted will show the total of moneys received and disbursed during the financial year, from 15th February, 1883, to 15th February, 1884. A Special Account will also be submitted, dealing with the period between the General Meeting last year and the present date.

The Total Receipts, according to this Account, plus the balance on hand, amount to \$7,378.37. The Total Disbursements have been \$6,290.38, leaving a balance on hand at date of \$1,087.99, from which the unsettled accounts, estimated at \$200, should be deducted, shewing a balance at present at disposal of the Treasurer for the next year's liabilities of \$887.99.

It will be found that the total of Glebe rents collected has been \$697.15, as against \$402.83 collected last year; and the total of pew rents collected has been \$4,182.

This total comes within a few dollars of the total of collectable rents from pews, but \$830.35 of the amount were paid on account of arrears of preceding years; and although the whole sum paid shows an increase of \$413.27 over last year, this increase has not been sufficient

to prevent the total of arrears from being slightly increased instead of diminished.

Perhaps the time may come—may the immediate successors of your present Committee see it—when there will be no arrears of pew rent, and one invariable topic of the writer of the Committee reports will be no more.

There are but few special points of interest in the Accounts. They will be left to speak for themselves.

On the whole, the Committee consider the result of this past year's labors satisfactory, and lay it before the Congregation for their consideration, and hoped for approval.

In submitting their Annual Report, the Society are happy to be able to state that the year has, on the whole, been a prosperous one. The average attendance at the weekly meetings has increased; it has been twenty-one as against eighteen last season; the smallest number present at any one meeting has been twelve, and the largest twenty-seven. They are glad to report this improvement, and they hope for a still larger attendance in future. The calls upon the funds are numerous, and it should be borne in mind that many hands make light work.

The Society have within the year lost one of their most zealous fellow-workers, Mrs. David Matheson, whose sudden death has deprived the Poor Relief Committee of one of its most active and efficient members.

In April last four hundred dollars (\$400) were paid over by the Society to the Temporal Committee of the Church, to wipe off the mortgage on the Slater lot. During the year five entertainments have been given, of which two were complimentary—the first a welcome to the Reverend Mr. Herridge, the second a Reception to the Young Men's Christian Association. From the proceeds of the other three entertainments and from other sources, one hundred dollars (\$100) have been handed to the Trustees of the Stewarton Sunday School Building Fund, and two hundred dollars (\$200) to the County of Carleton Protestant Hospital. One dozen nightgowns of a kind specially adapted to the comfort of patients are being made with the view of being presented to that institution.

The Society desire again to express their gratitude to their many friends in this and other congregations for their kind assistance and patronage, which have done so much to render their entertainments successful.

UPPER TOWN SCHOOL.

We have again the satisfaction of reporting a large increase in the number of scholars : 273 as against 213 last year, an increase of 60 ; and 24 teachers as against 20 last year, an increase of 4. We have great reason to thank God for the prosperous condition of the School. In last year's report the hope was expressed with regard to the number of teachers that some would come forward to take hold of this department of Christian work. In this we have not been disappointed, for during the year we have welcomed to our ranks as teachers, four ladies and two gentlemen.

The weekly contributions are considerably larger than those of last year, and amount to \$175.48, which sum has been divided as per financial statement annexed, between the Church's Missions in Formosa, India, Erromanga, and the North West Territories, after giving a donation of \$25 towards the building of a Sabbath School at Ripon, Que., for the use of the French Protestants there.

The Library is at present being renovated by the introduction of about 225 new volumes and the withdrawal of a like number of books worn out or deemed unsuitable. We shall require a liberal collection from the congregation this year to defray this expense in addition to the ordinary expenses of the School.

We would again earnestly urge the parents to use in the home study of the lessons along with their children the "Lesson Leaves" supplied to the scholars. The importance of home study by parents and children together of the lesson for the following Sabbath cannot be over-estimated.

The teachers, as heretofore, meet weekly with the teachers of the other Presbyterian Schools in the city for preparatory study. Our own monthly meeting for prayer after the close of the school, is well sustained.

The Annual Festival of the three schools was held on 1st February and was, as always, largely attended and much enjoyed.
