# **British Press On Towards** Cambrai; Gain Quarter Mile

Also Capture Heights and Two Villages LIFUT MCCORD -Progress Satisfactory All Alon Line

London, April 11—The British captured the village and heights of Monchy Le Preux early this morning, according to a British official Sackville Officer Who Won statement. The village of La Bergere was also captured and satisfactory progress is reported being made on other parts of the battle-

London, April 11-British troops yesterday advanced north of the village of Louveral, in the direction of Cambrai, to the extent fo a quarter of a mile along a front of 2,000 yards and consolidated this gain during the night.

So telegraphs Reuter's correspondent from the British military No Need to Worry About the headquarters in France.

London, April 11.—The message of Reuter's correspondent reads: "North of the village of Louveral we pushed forward towards Cambrai to the extent of a quarter of a mile along a front of 2,000 yards and consolidated this gain during the night.

"Northwards our patrols are advancing to the belt of forest which runs along the whole of the steep eastern slope of Vimy Ridge.

"The splendid success of our offen sive has created a most interesting situation and one which is fraught with tremendous possibilities. The enemy has been forced back upon the pivot of his previous retreat in a manner which creates a dangerously sharp salient at this spot.

"Indeed, a glance at the map suggests that there is a distinct outflanking of the German northern pivot as it existed before the present fighting."





DEATH OF SUPERVISOR McKAY

(Halifax Recorder) There passed away on Sunday morning at his home on Victoria Road, Dartmouth, N.S., Alexander McKay, for many years supervisor of the Hali-fax public schools. It was only in Janu-ary last that he formally retired from

supervisor McKay was born at Earltown, Colchester county, on July 16, 1841. He commenced teaching at the carly age of fifteen years; he graduated from the Normal school at Truro in 1859. He then taught in the counties of Digby, Colchester and Kings for eleven years. In 1872 Mr. McKay took charge of the Dartmouth public schools and was principal of these institutions for nine

In 1881 he was appointed to the department of mathematics and science in the Halifax High school and was associated with others in the Institute of Technology, since defunct.

In 1884 he was appointed supervisor of the Halifax public schools. This position he filled for thirty-five years.

Mr. McKay was a director of the Victoria School of Art and Design and victoria school of he institution for a long. secretary of the institution for a long time; he was for many years secretary of the Nova Scotia Institute of the Provincial Educational Association of Nova Scotia. Mr. McKay was also a direc-for of the Halifax Ladies' College, and was an important member of the Summer School of Science.

Mr. McKay leaves five children, Mary, wife of P. J. Shaw of the staff of the Agricultural College, Truro; Katie, wife of Dr. Nelson Gunning of Rosland, B.C.; Miss Carrie, at home; Dr. T. C. Mackay of Soccarro, New Mexico of the staff of the State School of Mines; and Alexander, at Berwick, Nova Scotia. His wife predeceased him in 1894.



Other officers were deeply depressed. Hundreds of prisoners taken were found lying in the assembly tunnels, from which they had attempted to reach the front line, but could not emerge on account of the shell




