# **Canadians Fill a German Trench With** Dead Bodies of Enemy

Fierce Fighting on Last Sunday Fills New Also Official Report on Some Page in History of Dominion; Attack Under Withering Fire, Reach Objective but Compelled to Retire

Ottawa, Oct. 12.—Fierce fighting by the Canadians at the front, an advance which demonstrated personal superiority and filled a trench with dead Germans but failed to maintain the position aimed at, are told today in a cable to the militia department from the Canadian war records office. The battle, which occurred on last Sunday, followed an attack by the Canadians on the

German positions. It extended over a frontage of 3,500 yards. Ontario, Manitoba, British Columbia and Alberta battalions distinguished themselves in the fray. Though hampered by wire entanglements and meanwhile subjected to a withering hail of builets from enemy machine guns t'ae troops, especially on the left, made fheir way to the German lines and took their toll of dead. Afterwards, how-

ever, they had to retire. The record office describes the battle as a demonstration of the dash and courage of the troops and a great event in the military history of Canada.

London, Oct. 12.—An uneventful night along the British lines in the Sommer region is reported in today's official statement. It follows:

"South of the Robinst five raids were undertaken by us in the Messines, Bois Grenier and Haisnes areas, in the course of which we took prisoners and course of which we took prisoners and inflicted casualties on the enemy."

Montreal, Oct. 12—It is officially unnounced that the Royal Bank of Canada will purchase the Quebec bank. The directors of the banks have reached an agreement whereby for every three shares of Quebec Bank stock, shareholders to amalgamate with a larger and stronger bank.

The Royal Bank of Canada is one of the shareholders of the Quebec Bank will receive one share of Royal Bank stock and \$75 in cash.

### THE SOLDIER AND THE SHEEP

Crops of Wool and Lambs Can be Raised by Men Who Cannot Till the Soil

"The Soldier and the Hen" was the title of a paragraph published recently describing the way in which soldiers had taken up poultry-raising at some of the Military Hospitals Commission's convalescent homes. J. H. Grisdale, director of the dominion government's experimental farm system, has sent the Military Hospital Commission the following article on "Sheep farming for returned soldiers."

Agriculturally, Canada is and has been a land of big things. Sheep, however, though great money-makers in many other countries, have received anything

Yet every province in Canada has been proven to include extensive areas highly suitable to the successful pursuit of the sheep-breeding industry, and climatic conditions seem favorable in practically all parts of the dominion.

One peculiarity of this industry is its suitability to either fertile or inferior lands. Much money has been made with sheep on farms where no other line of farming could possibly have been followed.

Another peculiarity is that it may be conducted either on a small scale, earning a satisfactory income, or on a very large scale, building a fortune. The single-handed farmer with his tidy little flock of high grade ewes is sure of a comfortable income, while the rancher with his wide scattered flocks and his hired shepherds may be easily on a financial par with the railway president.





'NO ONE DESIRES TO PROLONG, FOR A SINGLE MOMENT LONGER THAN IS NECES-SARY, THE TRAGIC SPECTACLE OF BLOODSHED AND DESTRUCTION, BUT WE OWE IT TO HAVE BEEN UNAVAILING. "THE ENDS OF THE ALLIES ARE WELL KNOWN. THEY HAVE BEEN FREQUENTLY

STATED. THEY ARE NOT SELFISH, THEY ARE NOT VINDICTIVE, BUT THEY REQUIRE ADE-QUATE REPARATION FOR THE PAST, AND ADEQUATE SECURITY FOR THE FUTURE." The house cheered the premier loudly as he made these remarks, in concluding his address, after






