BOARD OF HEALTH GIVES \$300 FOR CLEAN-UP WORK

M. W. Doherty Offers Use of Four Scows For Carrying

Refuse Out to Sea

Many matters of public interest pertaining to health and sanitation were dealt with at a special meeting of the board of health yesterday afternoon, Manning W. Doherty presiding. A vote of \$300 was made to aid in the Clean-Up Day activities, and the board decided to co-operate with the Safety Department in lending whatever assistance is possible in the movement. Mr. Doherty volunteered the services of four scows for the day or days, to carry to sea the refuse taken from about the city.

Seven inspectors were appointed to inspect the various premises about the city and Fairville: John G. Cliffe, James McKinney, James Morrell, H. T. Walsh, J. H. Baizley, H. J. McElroy, and J. E. Raines. They will begin their duties next week, making a thorough round of the city.







MOMENTOUS BATTLES IN BOTH EAST AND WEST

French Forge Ahead While British Keep **Enemy Busy** — Russians Forced Back **But Take Situation Calmly**

London, May 14—The beliligerents on both the east and west battlefronts are engaged in most momentous battles. The French, who already have gained possession of what was thought to be impregnable German positions to the north of Arras, are reported to be continuing their victorious advance, while the British are asserted to be holding a large force of Germans in their front and repulsing all German attempts to reach Ypres, which has proved the graveyard of so many thousands of men since the opposing lines were established there last autumn.

The Germans claim to have made a slight advance, but with the battle ebbing and flowing, this is not considered serious in military quarters here. Along toward the coast, the Belgian army has repulsed an attempt of the Germans to regain the bridge-head which the forces of King Alverte established on the right bank of the Yser Canal, while down in the Woevre another French army is pushing its offensive and claims to have gained possession of the whole of the forest of Le Pretre; which would be a step nearer in the Allies' aim to force

the Germans to evacuate St. Mihiel.

The Austro-Germans, after their lightning-like rush through Western Galicia, have now reached a line running due north and south to the west of Przemysl, while the other armies, emerging from the Carpathians, are pressing the Russian flank. Even up in Poland it is asserted that the victory of the Teutonic allies in the south has had the effect of forcing the Russians to fall

RUSSIANS CONCENTRATED ON SHORTER FRONT.

Petrograd, however, continues to take the situation calmly, and, although admitting that the Russian army has been forced back by overwhelming numbers and has lost heavily in the retirement, says the Russians are now concentrating on a new line and preparing for another big battle.

Until this battle is decided the British military critics are withholding their

comment. It is pointed out by some of them, however, that more than once the Russians have been driven back but that they always recovered and made

the victors regret their penetration into Russian territory.

DEALING WITH GERMANS IN ENGLAND

London, May 14, 11.15 p.m.—The riots which occurred earlier in the week have given place to condemnation by public men of the German emperor and his advisers, who are charged with the responsibility for the actions which have aroused public anger. The demand is made that the British government publicly proclaim the personal responsibility of members of the German government for "the outrages perpetrated by German officers or their agents dur-

ing the present war."

A resolution in this sense was moved at a public meeting in Chelsea tonight by Lord Charles Beresford, and was seconded by Lord Robert Cecil. It

Lord Beresford urged that all German property in the British empire be confiscated, and that all rich Germans, whether naturalized or not, be interned until British prisoners in Germany are treated as honorable prisoners of war.

Lord Cecil said he had been told that Emperor William did not approve of what had been done, but the speaker declared that if the German emperor disapproved, and allowed these things to go on, he was ten times more guilty and must be punished; this must be one condition of any peace.

Lewis Harcourt, British secretary of state for the colonies, speaking at a meeting on the waterfront tonight, said that Germany "stood at the bar of the world a naked and unashamed monster, simulating humanity, but in fact a reversion to pre-historic barbarism."
