### HERO'S SWIM FAILS TO SAVE HIS FRIEND

Angler Tows Dying Companion on Upset Boat a Mile in Sea.

New York, Oct. 31.—Refusing to abandon a half-drowned companion who could not swim, Emanel Lebane of White Plains very nearly gave his own life in a vain effort to get the man to shore alive after their rowboat had been upset in Long Island Sound near Mamaroneck. A third man, heavily clad, toppling into the water unawares, sank like a stone. Lebane's strength as he shoved his unconscious friend through the water atop the capsized boat was just about spent when a chance motor boat rescued him.

The little craft sped to shore and the unconscious man was treated with a pulmotor, but he could not be revived. Lebane, on the verge of exhaustion and suffering with shock and grief at the loss of his two companions, was hurried to bed and cared for by a physician. He will recover.

The men who were drowned were Charles Rowe, a blacksmith, and Ernest Baison, a plumber. Like Lebane, they had been residents of White Plains for a number of years. Both victims of the accident were married; so is Lebane. who could not swim, Emanel Lebane

scanning the Sound for some sign of rescue.

He traveled a slow, agonizing mile that way, his strength ebbing, the numbing cold creeping over him. But even while there remained hope of striking out for himself and reaching shore, he refused to leave the boat and Balson. And then there came the chug-chug of a motor boat. Over his shoulder he saw the little craft, bearing down upon him at its best speed, and took a new grip on life.

It was only minutes then until Mr. and Mrs. E. Dixon of 224 South Lexington avenue, White Plains, who had been fishing when they spied Lebane pushing the rowboat, were upon him. The three lifted Baison into the motor boat. Lebane was hauled in beside him and the trip to shore was begun.

While Mrs. Dixon steered, Dixon and Lebane did their utmost, rubbing and chafing the arms and legs of the unconscious man and trying with artificial respiration to get his lungs going again, but when the motor boat made harbor he still lay motionless in the bottom.

After that it was only minutes until they got an ambulance and a pulmotor. Because Baison had not been fully immersed for long they believed that they could revive him and worked a long time, but in the end they saw that he was dead.

### PLAN TO SPEND TWELVE MILLIONS

U. S. Red Cross Announcement of Large Expenditures.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 31—Approximately \$12,000,000 will be spent by the American Red Cross in humanizarian service during the current fiscal year ending June 30, 1924, according to the Red Cross National Headquarters. The Red Cross also announces that the budget for carrying on the national and international programme specificially allots \$5,543,077 for the work of advancing the welfare of people and communities through Red Cross services. The remainder of the money will be spent locally by the 3,000 chapters of the organization.

The national budget for the year, excluding the Japanese operation, cuts \$4,195,370 from the total of last year's expenditures, which reached \$2,738,448. This reduction is due to the completion of large foreign operations. The extensive relief accorded nearly 900,000 refugees driven out of Asia Minor last year cost the Red Cross \$2,605,696. For the purchase of medical and hospital supplies for relief work in Russia \$1,840,754 was spent. In helping Russia the American Red Cross in the last two years administered in all \$3,002,940.

Disabled ex-service men and their families have first call on Red Cross funds, emphasizing services for 34,000 men shattered by their war experiences still in Government hospitals, while more than 40,000 others constantly apply at Government institutions for treatment. In addition 78,000 veterans are taking vocational training,

ply at Government institutions for treatment. In addition 78,000 veterans are taking vocational training, while thousands of former soldiers traveling from place to place are proving to be a serious problem and burden of care to local Red Cross chapters. The work for these men and their dependents covers a wide variety of services which the Government is not authorized to render and for which it has neither money nor facilities.

For Red Cross assistance to the veterans of the world war the budget carries \$2,065,834, an increase of about \$120,000 over the amount spent from
