

INCOMES IN N. Y. STATE \$3,500,000,000 in 191

Controller Shows Total on Which Tax Was Paid-750,000 Returns Filed.

Wendell shows that the taxable income on \$750,000 returns filed in payment of the 1919 New York state income tax reached the unprecedented total of nearly \$3.500,000,000.

According to occupational classification, 45,000 returns were filed by commercial travellers and sales and manufacturers' agents, largely traveling men. The medical profession, in which the bureau included physicians, dentists and veterinarians, showed 19,200 returns, while 11,200 lawyers (except judges) made returns.







Ottawa, March 17—Before an attentive house, Hon. Dr. J. D. Reid, minister of railways, today made his annual statement on the operation of Canadian Government Railways. He showed in detailed statistics that the operating deficit in 1919 of \$49,242.536. The increased loss of \$21,000,000 was attributed to increased expenditures on payrolls, fuel materials equipment and supplies. Hon. Mr. Reid declared that there would have to be a wage reduction over the entire system. And what of the future? It was estimated that the deficit for 1921 (exclusive of the Grand Trunk Railway) would be \$60,892,720. Dr. Reid instanced the case of British and United States railways to show that results obtained on Canadian national lines were no worse. Out, he admitted, it would be a serious matter to have increased taxation for railways in Canada to the extent of fifty, sixty or seventy millions of dollars. Nor could he see much hope of any management materially reducing the loss on Grand Trunk Pacific and Transcontinental railways for severaly ways.



Toronto To Have Second Session of Imperial Conference

Many Important Matters to Be Taken Up-Hope for Post

Toronto, March 18—(By Canadian Press)—Canada is to have the honor, in August of this year, of entertaining the list inguished educationists from Great 3ri tain and other parts of the empire in the second Imperial Conference of Peachers' Associations. The conference will assemble in Toronto on August 10, and the session will continue for four days. The previous conference was held in July, 1912, in Caxton Hall, Westminster, when the invitation of the Ontario government that the next quadrennial meeting should be held in Toronto was accepted. The war intervened, with the result that nine years have elapsed between the first and second conference.

While it is still too early to estimate the attendance of the forthcoming conference, replies already received indicate widespread interest, and it is hoped that the attendance will at least equal that of 1912. The proceedings were opened on that occasion by the Duke of Argyll and the Right. Hon. J. A. Pease,







It was announced at local military headquarters this morning that according to information from Ottawa it is expected that training will be held wis year by the militia in this district, at the various local camps. Cavalry, rural infantry, enginneers and medical units will train for nine days while field artillery will train at the local camps with horses six days and the usual firing detachments will go to Petewawa for five days. The heavy artillery will probably train at local headquarters as they have in the last year. The St. John Fusiliers, Canadian Machine Gun Brigade, 6th Signal Company and No. 7 Canadian Army Service Corps will train at their headquarters for nine days while the Canadian Officers' Training Corps in the various colleges will train as usual during the college year.

All units will train at a reduced establishment. The expense of concentrating the militia at Sussex is declared prohibitive this year, so the local camps will be held at places most convenient for the units, although it is probable that certain units, such as the New Brunswick Rangers and the 8th Princess Louise Hussars will train at Sussex camp as it is most central year by the militia in this district, at

In 1901 with eleven schedules and 561 questions to get filled out the average number recorded per enumerator was 604.
