To the trimming. This, of course, does not apply to the vest and collar, which are invariably of contrasting material, usually linen or silk. To make the design shown here re-quires 6% yards of 36-inch or 5% yards of 44-inch silk. The back and front gores are laid on a lengthwise fold of the goods when cutting, also the back. Much as we may smile at these views, the fact remains that they were common-ly shared by the vast majority of intel-ligent Germans and, there is reason to believe, by many high naval authorities in Berlin. The prevalence of such opinions helps to explain the supreme confidence with which the Germans look forward to an encounter with Great Britain. They knew their fleet to be much smaller, but they really believed that the superior skill and devotion of their personnel, together with the incom-parably finer ships they manned, would achieve victory in the teeth of heavy odds.

odds. As we have said, Heligoland came as the first rude shock to this characteris-tic self-complacence. Other events fol-lowed, minor in themselves, but all point-ing the same way. Meanwhile it must have been brought home to the mean-est intelligence in the Fatherland that Britain's grip on German sea commerce is remorselessly complete. With the ex-ception of some wood work by its sub-marine and some destruction by the Karlsruhe and Emden the "successes" of the German navy to date have been of the negative order.
