
(Hartland Observer) The new American tariff, which has not yet become law, does not by any means give Canadian farmers the same advantage in the American markets as the reciprocity agreement would have done. That agreement provided that Canadian produce would be admitted into the United States free of duty, while the high tariff wall against the produce of all other countries would be retained. Under the American tariff now being framed potatoes, for instance, are to be admitted into the States duty free from countries that impose no du-ties on American potatoes. Otherwise a duty of 10 per cent. will be charged. Thus Canada is barred from shipping potatoes duty free into the United States. **BLACK CURRANT RED CURRANT**
