Nova Scotia News.
From Thursday's Chronicle.
We learn from a correspondent at Canby that the steam saw mill lately built by Mr. J. E. Woodworth, at Kingsport (formerly Oak Point), in connection with his shipyard, was totally destroyed by fire on Monday night. When the fire was first discovered, between 11 and 12 o'clock, the mill was all in a blaze, and had also caught, and she was only saved by great exertion. The origin of the fire has not been ascertained. The mill was situated on a point of land, and was surrounded by water. The women of the neighborhood deserted their usual avocations, and were seen in getting water and taking it to the fire, and without their assistance it would scarcely have been possible to have saved the ship, probably worth, as she now is, from \$15,000 to \$20,000.

Fish Breeding at Miramichi.
We understand that the Minister of Marine and Fisheries has instructed Mr. Wilnot, the well known fish breeder, to proceed to Gaspe and Miramichi, for the purpose of erecting establishments for the artificial breeding of fish. The large catch of salmon in the Miramichi river this season is partly owing to the fostering care of the Government in protecting the fisheries, and this new move on the part of the Federal Executive, through the energetic minister in charge of the Fisheries Department, will further prove the interest taken in this very important branch of our public industry. Besides salmon culture, Mr. Wilnot is to turn his attention to the bait so successfully used in catching mackerel, but which at present has to be imported from the United States. The calculation is to have both establishments in working order this fall, at a very small cost to the country.—*Neveast's Advocate.*
