## James Robinson's Representations Bring Furniture Industry Here.

### ROBINSON PRAISED

### MIRAMICHI LAND

President Anderson Says His Enthusiastic Representations Brought Co. Here

### NOT A BIT DISAPPOINTED

Head of Furniture Industry Looks Forward to Large Future Development.

As the new furniture factory is now nearly completed and on the eve of commencing operations a reporter for the Advocate was pleased, yesterday, to get an interview with Mr. O. G. Anderson, President and General Manager of the Company concerning the new industry. Mr. Anderson said that although the plant was not actually complete just now, he had every hope that such would be the case within a few weeks. The arrival of the last car of machinery had been unexpectedly delayed but same is now on the way, and preparations are being made to have the machines placed in position without delay. The exterior of the main building and that of the dry kiln building have not yet been finally completed, but this work will not in any way impede the commencement of operations inside. The main building is 64 ft. x 120 ft., 4 stories high, with large well spaced windows and with elevator in the centre running to the top. The dry kiln building is a two story structure, 40 x 80 ft., in one department of which the engine is placed. The boiler house is a commodious structure, in keeping with the main buildings. The roof is metallic, thus making the building practically fireproof. The office of the Company will be situated in the north end of the main building on the ground floor, and a special siding of the I. C. R. is under construction to run right to the shipping room platform adjacent thereto. The whole plant, Mr. Anderson stated, is equipped with the very latest and most improved machinery to be had on the continent. Considering that Canada and the United States are pre eminent in this class of machinery and that the selection of same and the buildings in which they are quartered, have been the result of such an experience as Mr. Anderson's, the people of Newcastle and the Miramichi can well be proud of this acquisition. There must have been a deal of thought and close application exercised to bring such a detailed equipment into such a perfect system as prevails throughout the plant. In this connection Mr. Anderson was led to observe "Of course the layout and selection of the machinery is somewhat of a study as is also the construction of the buildings and the material used. In this latter respect we feel in duty bound to acknowledge the kind assistance of not a few of the business men of Newcastle and along the river, notably among whom is Mr. James Robinson; in fact, it was largely Mr. Robinson's enthusiastic representations of the Miramichi that brought us to this locality in the first place. We have not been disappointed, and look forward to large future development." The output of the factory, Mr. Anderson states, will almost exclusively consist at the start, of chairs, but other articles of furniture will be added later. The Advocate wishes the Company all success.

Mr. Robinson should feel proud of the splendid reception accorded him at the Chatham convention on Friday evening. He was welcomed as the liberal conservative standard bearer with open arms. Outside of the delegates a large crowd attended the convention from Newcastle and other points. Mr. W. A. Hickson, president of the Association called the meeting to order shortly after eight o'clock. He began the proceedings by saying that the convention had been called to select a candidate to represent the Liberal Conservative party in the coming contest. It was time for a change of rulers—time to put an end to the rule of the party of broken promises—and he felt sure that Northumberland would do her part. The prospects of Conservative success in the Dominion were bright, and he looked forward confidently to victory in the impending struggle.

The delegates were directed to retire to another room for the purpose of selecting a candidate.

Mr. J. L. Stewart was called to the chair.  
Mr. Edw. Hayes nominated James Robinson as the Liberal Conservative candidate, and Mr. D. Morrison seconded the nomination.  
Mr. William Lawlor suggested, that as some persons had expressed doubt in regard to Mr. Robinson's attitude towards the party, Mr. Robinson be sent for and asked to state his views.

A committee was sent after Mr. Robinson and that gentleman declared himself entirely in accord with the Liberal Conservative party. He had not changed, but was the same as ever. It should be chosen as the candidate he would do his share of the work that might be necessary to win, and wanted the delegates and their friends to do their share. If another man were nominated he would work as hard to secure his election as if he were the nominee. He was heart and soul with the great Liberal Conservative party, and believed it would win in the coming contest. If he should be elected, and the time should ever come that he could not act heartily with the Liberal Conservative party in Parliament he would hand back to the constituency the trust that had been reposed in him. (Cheers.)

The resolution nominating Mr. Robinson was put and carried unanimously.

The delegates returned to the hall and Mr. Stewart reported the selection of Mr. Robinson as the candidate.

The announcement was loudly applauded and Mr. Robinson, who was called to the platform said he felt proud of the nomination, proud to stand before the public as the nominee of the Liberal Conservative party of Northumberland. He would do

Premier Tweedie and Mrs. Tweedie returned to Chatham yesterday after an extended trip to the Northwest.

Mr. Tweedie states that the trip was a most enjoyable one in every way. As far as the weather was concerned, but one rainy day was encountered. Everywhere in the west, Mr. Tweedie stated, there are signs of great prosperity. The wheat crop this year is an excellent one. When asked concerning the outlook in the coming election, Mr. Tweedie said that there seemed to be no doubt that of the 27 constituencies in British Columbia, Manitoba and the Territories, at least seventeen will return supporters of the Laurier administration. While in Vancouver Mr. and Mrs. Tweedie were tendered a reception by the Maritime Province Association, and Mr. Tweedie was presented with an address. This association has a membership of one thousand former citizens of the Maritime Provinces who are now in the west. Among the provincials Mr. Tweedie met in the west were Mr. Joseph N. Ellis and Mr. W. deK. Farris. In addition to Vancouver Mr. Tweedie visited a number of western cities among them Winnipeg and Calgary. Seattle across the boundary line, was also visited. Mr. Tweedie was particularly loud in his praise of Winnipeg, which he pronounced to be a splendid city, rapidly growing. On being asked if there will be any local elections in the near future, Mr. Tweedie smilingly shook his head and said, "Not for a while yet."

## THE GREAT MIRAMICHI FIRE

Something About the Terrible Blaze Which Did Such Damage on the North Shore.

(Correspondence St. John Sun.)  
Friday, October 7th was seventy-ninth anniversary of the great Miramichi fire. The appended quaint account of the conflagration appears on a sheet of paper 7 x 9 inches, that was issued Oct. 11th, 1825. This little sheet is supposed to be the only one of its kind now in existence.

### FIRE AND HURRICANE.

On the night of the 7th inst. this place exhibited one the most terrible scenes that a general conflagration is capable of producing.

The climate for two days previous was so intensely close and warm, but all doubt was removed as to some great fire existing in the woods, and on the approach of the night of the seventh it commenced its sad devastation.

The wind blew a violent hurricane from the Northwest and brought with it from Douglstown, Newcastle and the surrounding country, such immense clouds of flames and ashes, that it became extremely difficult to retain any position or to breathe at Chatham. The appearance of the heavens was awful, representing as far as the eye was capable of extending but one unvarying body of flames; the effect was frightfully increased from the appalling roar of the fire through the country in all quarters, the air blowing with such violence as to occasion the air to resound with one incessant thunder.

Among the vessels in the river a number were cast on shore, three of which, namely, the Concord, and Canada, together with the brig Jane, were consumed, others were fortunately extinguished after the fire had attacked them.

At Douglstown scarcely any kind of property escaped the ravage of the fire, which swept to the surface everything coming in contact with it, including the extensive mercantile establishments of Messrs. Gilmour, Rankin & Co. William Abrams & Co. together with their vessel then on the stocks as also all the property of

innumerable others leaving but little for the unfortunate inhabitants to fly to the shore, and there, by means of logs, canoes, rafts of timber, timber logs or any article, however ill calculated for the purpose, endeavor to escape from the dreadful scenes to reach the town of Chatham, numbers of men, women and children perishing in the attempt.

The town of Newcastle with all the surrounding settlements, became a total waste, excepting about fourteen buildings among those which were laid in ashes were the court house, church, barracks, jail and the miles through all parts of the interior of the country where mercantile, farmer and timber business were carried on to a great extent, the greatest ravages and desolation took place.

From the magnitude of the fire, and the dreadful violence of the winds, it is almost impossible to form an accurate idea of the extent of the loss of lives or property.

The remote settlements from the entrance of the river to the extreme source of it present to the eye the dreadful havoc of this calamitous event, particularly those of the North-west Branch, the Bartibog and Nappan, some of which have scarcely a place of habitation left, and the lives that were lost are innumerable; the shores at almost every change of the wind exhibiting dreadful spectacles of the burnt and drowned.

In some parts of the country the cattle have all been destroyed or suffered greatly, and the very soil in many places has been parched and burnt up and no article of provisions to speak of has been rescued from the flames, either at Newcastle, where almost every important mercantile establishment perished, or at Douglstown.

The hurricane raged with such dreadful violence that large bodies of timber on fire, as also trees from the forest, and parts of the flaming houses and stores were carried to the rivers with amazing velocity, to such an extent, and affecting the water in such a manner as to occasion large quantities of salmon and other fish to resort to the land hundreds of which were scattered on the shore of the North and South-West branches.

Chatham at present contains about five hundred of the unfortunate sufferers who have resorted to it for relief, and are experiencing some partial assistance and almost every hour brings with it numbers from the back settlements burnt, wounded or in the most abject state of distress, and it is

reported nearly two hundred have been actually discovered.

At this scene the heart sickens to see the widows, widowers and orphans that are without clothing, homes or the means of sustenance, and it is impossible at this early period to say how many humans have been added to the dead, or have survived to know that a father, mother, sister or brother has been devoured by the flames or perished by the wave, not only from the circumstance of numerous families in the back settlements not yet being heard of, but also from the want of information regarding the fate of large lumbering parties in the interior of the wood, who it is feared have fallen victims to the flames.

In a situation therefore, of such unparalleled distress and calamity it is hoped the hand of humanity will be extended to relieve the peculiar sufferings of our fellow creatures, and administer a balm to the torn feelings and wants of those who have in this most distressing manner been deprived of their dearest and best, and cast on the humanity of the world perfect beggars.

## NEW BRUNSWICK'S VALUABLE FISHING.

Fortunes Paid in This Province By American Millionaires  
For Salmon Fishing Privileges.

Enormous sums of money are expended by the American salmon fishermen who yearly flock to the waters of northern New Brunswick. Apart from all other expenses the cost of the fishing rights is often great. The rate of increase in values is illustrated by the fact that the angling of the Restigouche and its tributaries was leased some years ago by fishermen who are still catching salmon for \$150 a year, while thousands of dollars are now paid annually for the right to fish the waters of these rivers controlled by the government, and \$500,000 would not suffice to purchase the remaining riparian rights. Nearly \$200,000 has already been paid to riparian proprietors on the Restigouche by the present holders of fishing rights.

The largest owner of fishing rights at present is the Restigouche Salmon Club, one of the most notable concerns of the kind in the world. Its members have paid many multi-millionaires and millionaires at present but thirty-two in all. Its shares are eagerly sought at \$10,000 each.

The headquarters and main club house of the Restigouche is situated at Metapedia, at the junction of the Metapedia and Restigouche rivers. Here the members of the club who have fished by day, wearing the usual attire of anglers in the woods, must observe the club rule of donning evening dress for dinner.

A New York chef supervises the preparation of the meals, and the dinner room has been the scene of many a good fishing story from such past masters of the art as Harry Hollins, the late Dean Sage, the late Robert Goebel, the Rev. W. S. Rainsford and the late Dean Hoffman. Among others who are now or have been members of this famous club, are Wm. K. Vanderbilt, Henry W. DeForest Cornelius Vanderbilt, Philip Schuyler, Henry T. Sloane, Stanford White, Arthur D. Weeks, William E. Dodge, Robert G. Dan, S. Weir Mitchell, John S. Kennedy, John L. Cadwalader and Wm. L. Brezee.

It would require a pretty large chest to hold all the title deeds in virtue of which the Restigouche Salmon club exercises its fishing rights. It is interesting to note that for the New Brunswick side of Tom's Brook and Indian House posts, the sum of \$7,500 was paid in 1885, while the Quebec side of the Indian House property, all the way down to about one mile below Tom's Brook, cost \$35,000 in 1895. Yet in 1880 S. and J. Wilnot bought the same property for \$1,500. The increase in its value

was thus 2,300 per cent. in fifteen years. The Metapedia pools were acquired by the club in 1894 for \$25,000, the sellers having paid \$2,000 for them in 1882 to the resident proprietors.

High prices have also been paid for salmon fishing on the Restigouche by individual sportsmen.

In 1890 the late Mr. Robert Goebel purchased the Moore property, about six miles from Metapedia on the Quebec side of the Restigouche, for \$20,000. Yet he fished this water, which is about three-quarters of a mile in extent, only on two occasions, and then with poor success, as the owner of the opposite side of the river asserted that the boundary line between the two provinces was the middle of the stream, and all the best of the fishing was on the New Brunswick side of the river. This made Mr. Goebel's purchase of very small value so far as fishing was concerned.

In 1896 Mr. Goebel purchased the McAndrew property, seventeen miles from Metapedia, for \$35,000. In 1883 it cost Mr. McAndrew about \$5,000.

The Sweeney and Dean Sage estate properties at the mouth of the Upsalquitch, seven miles from Metapedia, were originally purchased from resident proprietors between 1880 and 1885, for about five thousand dollars. The Sweeney lots are now held by Mr. Payne, of Cleveland who paid \$35,000 for them in 1895. The late Dean Sage sold part of his rights on the New Brunswick side to his friend, Mr. Clyde, of New York, for \$7,000. Harry Hollins became the proprietor some ten years ago, of the Brandy Brook pool and of neighboring waters, paying \$15,000 for them.

For the Kedgwick pools at the mouth of the river where it enters the Restigouche, and for some of the still lower pools, Archibald Rogers of New York paid \$7,000 a few years ago, and they could not now be bought for \$70,000.

In addition to the main club houses of the Restigouche Salmon Club, its members have at their disposal a number of comfortable subsidiary camps in different parts of their territory. So far this

season the sport has been far from good, though better sport is looked for later, the season being late, and the fish scarce and small.

While Billy Florence almost always did his salmon fishing in the Restigouche, Joe Jefferson's favorite river was the Miramichi. Scarcely second in importance to the Restigouche is the Cascapedia. It is probable that the provincial government could easily obtain a quarter of a million dollars for its fishing rights in this famous stream. For a part of the year it receives \$5,500 a year from the Cascapedia Salmon Club.

No time pools, no large fishing and no larger stream are to be found in North America than those of the Cascapedia. It has been fished by nearly all the recent governor-generals of Canada and the Marquis of Lorne, now Duke of Argyll, who frequently fished with his wife the Duchess. Lorne, declared it to be the finest salmon river in the world. It carries fewer than twenty fine spotted salmon pools.

In one season Lord Lansdowne and his party killed in the river 320 salmon, weighing 7,277 pounds, and in the following year Lord Stanley of Preston, now the Earl of Derby, and his party, killed 300 fish weighing 7,692 pounds. It was on this river that Mr. R. G. Dan entertained President Arthur and the record of American fresh water, a salmon of fifty-four pounds, is said to have been among one of Mr. Dan's catches on the Cascapedia.

Very valuable salmon rivers, including the Washaboo, portion of the Nepisiguit and the Moisie, for the lease of which thousands of dollars have been paid during a single year, are owned outright by Mr. Ivers W. Adams, of Boston.

Enormous salmon are captured in the Moisie, hundreds of them every year. Washaboo is leased by Mr. Adams to a New York friend for \$1,000 a year.

Mr. Jas. J. Hall pays \$3,000 a year rental to the government for the lease of the St. John river in Labrador, and its distance from Quebec renders it almost necessary to employ a steam yacht to reach it.

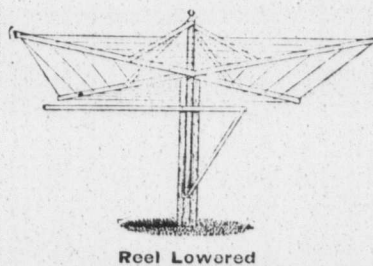

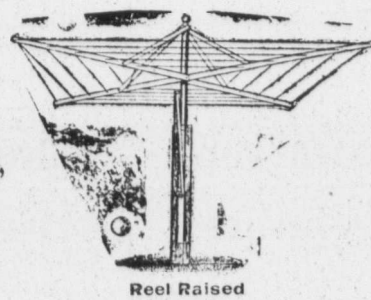
