CHRIST CHURCH WILL BE OPENED SUNDAY

Services will be Conducted in New Structure and Bishop of Fredericton will Preach

ORDER OF SERVICE

The formal opening of Christ Church will take place on Sunday when the services will be conducted by the Right Rev. Dr. Richardson, Bishop of Fredericton.

The church which was built by D. A. Stewart is from the plans of F. N. Brodie of St. John. The structure is of brick with concrete trimmings 40x80 feet and has a seating capacity of about 300. The roof is of the open timbered type and stained a dark hue. The building is heated by two Kelsey warm air generators which are said to be the most efficient type of hot air furnaces. The inner walls of the church are left in the natural brick.

The pews and choir stalls are made with ash backs and old English oak ends giving a massive and solid appearance, and were donated by the Shives family. The solid oak Communion table which was given by Rev. and Mrs. J. E. Purdie was made by Mr. Ernest Dunham, while the two Chancel chairs of oak with open high Gothic backs were presented by Mr. and Mrs. F. E. Morrison of Brantford, Ont. Mr. Morrison is a brother of Mrs. J. E. Purdie. The oak lectern was made and donated by Mr. E. Dunham, oak Hymn Boards and Brass Altar Screen by R. L. S. Sly, oak Book Rests, Mr. Thos. Woodgate.

ENTHUSIASTIC MEETING OF THE CAMPBELLTON BOARD OF TRADE

Campaign of Members has Most Gratifying Results. Large Increase of Membership.

RESOLUTIONS PASSED

An enthusiastic meeting of the Board of Trade was held in the Council Chambers, Monday evening. The attendance was so large that the matter of new quarters was taken up and it was decided to meet in Murray's hall in future if suitable arrangements could be made.

President Harquail was in the chair. After the reading of the minutes, the report of the council of the Board was read as follows and approved.

To the Board of Trade:

The committee re Agricultural Society have been at work and the council request that a committee be appointed by the Board to take up the steps of organization of said society.

Sec'y was instructed to write the Minister of Marine and Fisheries with regard to the steamship service to Gaspe and his reply is submitted herewith.

A committee was appointed to get the Hon. John Morrissey to come to Campbellton for an interview re the bridge matter. They report that this was impossible up to the present but that he may come before the house adjourns.

The following motion submitted by W. D. Duncan, was passed and recommended for consideration of the Board: That this Board of Trade do its utmost to have the Great Road between "a point on the St. John river, opposite the Tobique village in Victoria County, and the Town of Campbellton" opened up for traffic, especially with a view of making it one of the trunk roads of New Brunswick.

Recommended that a delegation be appointed to go to Fredericton to present memorial with regard to bridge matter.

Recommended that on account of holding meeting to-night a regular meeting next Monday be dispensed with.

The Bridge
That the Board does not intend to drop the bridge matter was clearly evidenced by the time devoted to this subject. The President announced that he and D. A. Stewart, M.P.P. had invited Mr. Morrissey, Chief Commissioner of Public Works to visit Campbellton and this gentlemen had promised to do so in the near future. Then the whole matter will be laid before him. If the bridge is to be a combined railway and highway bridge, the Dominion, Quebec and New Brunswick governments will be asked to contribute towards its erection. A resolution was also passed asking for a commission to enquire into the condition of the Quebec Oriental railway with a view of it being taken over by the government.

Trunk Road Policy
One of the most important questions so far as it affects Campbellton was introduced by W. D. Duncan, who brought up the matter of the opening up of the Great Road from the Tobique village on the St. John river to Campbellton and that it be made a part of the proposed Trunk Roads of the province. He explained that the New Brunswick Good Roads Association were asking the government to construct roads from the International boundary at St. Stephen to the Provincial boundary between Sackville and Amherst; from Moncton to Campbellton via Richibucto, Chatham, Caraquet and Bathurst from St. John up the St. John Valley via Woodstock, Grand Falls Edmonstone, to the Quebec line. This would leave Campbellton on a blind end, whereas his suggestion would form a connection. The road asked for was surveyed years ago and some miles built. This would make Campbellton the junction point of the tourist routes and would mean much for the town.

CASES IN QUEBEC SUPREME COURT

Important Judgments Rendered in Several Big Suits at New Carlisle

LARGE SUMS INVOLVED

Several important judgments were recently rendered by Judge Tessier, of the Superior Court, for the District of Gaspe, at New Carlisle, among others, in a case of Germain—vs—Shives Lumber Company, and of Le Gallais—vs—Atlantic, Quebec & Western Railway.

In the case of Germain—vs—Shives Lumber Company, the Company was sued by Germain through his Attorney the Honorable L. P. Pelletier, of Pelletier, Belleau, Baillargeon & Allet, for the sum of \$10,000 resulting from a contract which the Company had entered into with Germain, for a certain quantity of logs which Germain had to cut on the Company's limits. Germain proceeded to cut in the County of Bonaventure, on the Company's limits, at Meadow's Brook, and after he was at work for some time, the company took the contract out of his hands, and handed it over to a party by the name of Lahgis; hence, the action for damages for \$10,000.00.

The Shives Lumber Company, through its Attorney, Mr. John Hall Kelly, of New Carlisle, pleaded that there was a clause in the contract which gave the Company the right to hand the contract over to some one else, in the event of the contractor not using proper diligence in the execution of his contract.

2. That the contract called for lumber of a certain length, and that the contractor had not kept up the proper average;

3. That the contract called for spruce, cedar and pine only and not fir, which the contractor has made a considerable proportion.

This matter was left in the hands of W. D. Duncan and John T. Reid as a committee with power to draft a suitable memorial and ask the co-operation of the various Boards of Trade, Town Councils and the Good Roads Association.

The following resolution touching the death of Mayor F. M. Murray was unanimously adopted.

Whereas it has pleased Almighty God to remove from our midst Frank M. Murray, Mayor of this town, whose death occurred on the tenth day of February, 1913; and

Whereas the deceased was one of the charter members of this Board of Trade and ever since its organization had been one of its most active and progressive members, and also for a number of years, occupied the position of Secretary-Treasurer in an efficient and capable manner;

And Whereas by the death of the deceased this Board has lost one of its most energetic members and the Town one of its most public-spirited citizens, who was ever ready to bear his share of the burden of public service and duty;

Therefore Resolved that this Board do place on record its keen sense of the loss sustained in the death of so valuable a member and citizen;

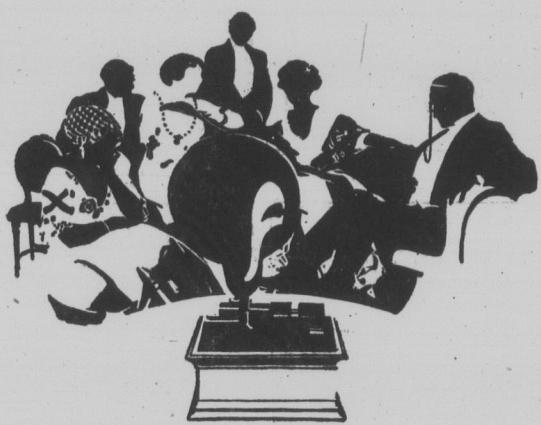
And Further Resolved that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the widow of the deceased and published in the local papers.

The matter of the change of telephone rates as proposed by the N. B. Telephone Co., was taken up and left with the Council of the Board to deal with.

The annual dues were set at \$2.00.

Visits Angus Shops and Evinces Keen Interest in All

Montreal, Feb. 19.—The Duke of Connaught, accompanied by Captain Rivers Bulkely, yesterday, visited the C. P. R. Angus shops, and made a systematic inspection. He was received by Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, Colonel Lacy R. Johnson, general superintendent of the Angus shops; H. H. Vaughan, assistant to the vice president, and George Hodge, general superintendent of the Eastern Division.

In the locomotive works the royal visitor evinced great interest in the process by which a powerful locomotive is evolved, and took pains to examine all the machines employed. When taking leave of Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, the Governor General expressed surprise at the completeness of detail with which such a vast undertaking as the Angus shops has been built up within the space of a few years.

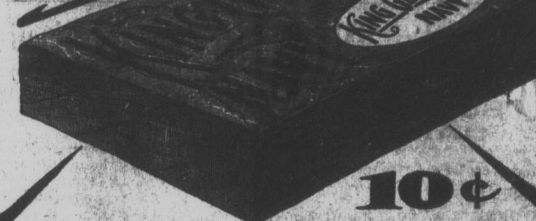

WASHING QUILTS

FIRE ALARM

Since the latest fire, much talk discussion and searching of heart has been occasioned and many people are asking "How do we stand with regard to fire protection?"

It certainly does appear as if a goodly number of our citizens are not aware that the system installed in this town is the latest thing in fire alarms, but so far unfortunately is unfinished.

When the installation of the present system was recommended to the council by the Fire Protection committee, the recommendation included a striker and bell for the giving of a general alarm. The site for the bell tower was secured from the I. C. R. and the total cost of both bell and tower was estimated to run not more than \$500. The striker was included in the purchase of plant costing itself \$550 but on the casting vote of the chairman the purchase of the bell was vetoed, so that the town bought an article which has been of no use to them so far.

It was understood at this time that a bell was to be placed in the clock tower of the post office, but, and yet again, BUT.

In any case it is not the proper procedure to use an ordinary bell for general alarm purposes, leading as it did in the town of Amherst to much confusion, as the people could never be sure whether the bell was ringing for prayer meeting or for a big fire.

In this town (Amherst) they have taken out the bell as used for a general alarm and have substituted a compressed air whistle.

Special bells are listed for fire alarm purposes and the people are now demanding that one of these be installed at once, the lack of a general alarm has been long enough felt, and the matter is pressing indeed.

Regarding the removal of the phone from the fire station, much can be said either way. There would not be much good in sending a phone message to the fire station and having the hose wagon turn out and no firemen to do the work. Yet again it is not impossible to have a switch board placed in the fire station with all the box numbers whereby an alarm could be transmitted to all the tappers and general alarm just as if it had come in from one of the boxes. The telephone here could be useful, for a phone alarm could be sent in to the station, and the attendant give the proper alarm to the firemen.

This however is a matter for future consideration, the thing most pressing now is a general alarm. If a bell is the best thing (not a church bell) but a real fire bell and get it at once and thus put our alarm system on a satisfactory basis.

BOARD OF TRADE

President Harquail and those officers and members of the Board of Trade who have always made it a practice to attend the meetings of the Board, and who in the past have, through many discouragements, labored in the interests of this town and country, must have been delighted with the success of the members who took an active part in increasing the membership and interest of the Board. Forty new members were added to the roll Monday evening and more are coming. The work of the Board went along with a swing and the discussions were instructive and interesting. It seemed to be the aim of all to work in the interests of Campbellton. The

Board has been a useful body, but it can be made more useful if all our merchants and business men take an interest in the meetings. A good start has been made. Keep up the good work.

LADY CANDIDATE

Miss Virginia Brooks, of West Hammond, Ill., is out as a candidate for police magistrate in opposition to two men, whom she claims are undesirable. She further says the town is going to see the liveliest campaign in its history. Probably it will, for this is a day when women can make a noise in public life as well as the men. The women suffragists of the neighboring republic are making great strides forward, and their advance is not marked by violence. Their arguments must be convincing.

MEMORY WILL KEEP

Commander Evans' suggestion that the bodies of Captain Scott and his associates should be left where they died will fit in with most people's ideas. The dead men will sleep well where, while discharging a perilous duty, they, each in his way, answered the last call. Like Drake in Nombre Dios Bay, and many another brave sailor or soldier, their memory will be better kept because their graves will be where they finished their work and their lives together.

EXPERIMENTAL FARM

Vincent Astor, the heir to the family millions, who owns among other things a big farm on the banks of the Hudson River, announces that he intends making it an experimental farm along scientific lines, and that everything he does there will be told to the people of the country. The idea is an excellent one, and the farm can only be good. Anything that teaches how the earth can be made to produce food in abundance benefits consumer as well as the farmer.

RESTAURANTS RESPONSIBLE

The appellate division of the Supreme Court of New York has delivered a judgment to the effect that restaurants which provide "wall hooks for patrons to hang coats and hats on are responsible for such property, even if warnings to the contrary are printed on placards or menus. Evidently the judges in question are of opinion that responsibility is not to be dismissed with a sign.

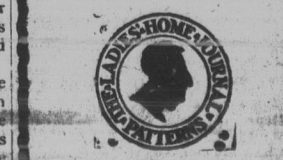

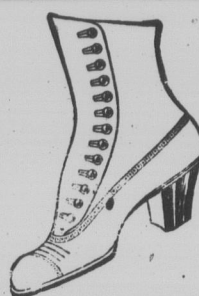

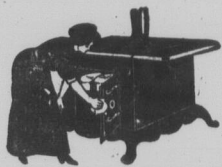

W.C.T.U. COLUMN

This department is conducted by the local Union, and is under the charge of an Editor appointed by them. This Editor assumes the responsibility for the statements and articles which appear in this column.

As a result of representations made at the request of the Nova Scotia Alliance to the Minister of Railways through Rev. Dr. Shearer, of the Moral and Social Reform Council of Canada, regarding the transportation of liquor on the I. C. R. the following order has been issued by the Minister. It is dated January 25th, and addressed to E. Tiffin, Esq., Government Railways Managing Board:

"Notify all agents and employees of the Railway, giving directions that all officers of the law must be given access to any and all of the premises where freight is kept so that they may enter, inspect, search and seize liquor improperly shipped in contravention to any of the following laws: The Canada Temperance Act, the New Brunswick and Nova Scotia Liquor License Acts, the Prince Edward Island Prohibition Act and the Nova Scotia Temperance Act.

It must be gratifying to Temperance workers in the Provinces that our request has been granted. Heretofore liquor dealers have been enabled by shipping liquor marked "groceries," "provision," "glassware" and so forth, to evade the provisions of the law.

The issuance of this order should lead to very vigorous and successful law enforcement.

The liquor traffic in the provinces is doomed.

To the Editor of the "Presbyterian Witness":

"Sir: We have been having exciting times in Sydney in connection with the Temperance cause. For years the Town Council has refused to enforce the Nova Scotia Temperance Act, asserting as an excuse that public sentiment was not in favor of law enforcement. Recently the Council decided to have a plebiscite taken on the 28th inst., to ascertain whether or not the citizens would prefer a high license law, and if so the Council would apply to the Legislature to enact such a law for Sydney. The Attorney General of the province was consulted and he advised that the plebiscite proposed by the Town Council was illegal and without authority of law. The Temperance people decided immediately to have nothing to do with an illegal plebiscite, and the pastors of the Presbyterian, Methodist and Baptist Churches at the services on Sabbath, advised their people to abstain from voting on Tuesday, as the plebiscite would be illegal and a farce. However, the plebiscite was held. The rum party put forth every possible effort. Many teams and automobiles were hired. Liquor flowed freely and drunkenness was greatly in evidence. The Town Council conducted the voting to suit the circumstances. When the votes were counted the figures stood:

For license 995
Against license 203

Regarding this vote the Rev. J. W. McConnell, pastor of Jubilee Methodist Church, said in an interview published in "The Morning Post": "The Mayor and City Council must now be aware that the sentiment in this city is overwhelmingly against license. When one thinks of the thoroughly organized and systematic work of the liquor party at the polls yesterday, and finds that only about nine hundred votes were rounded up by the agents, etc., of the whisky business, I am disposed to think there must be some serious questions asked in the "Pigs" today. On the lists in Sydney we have 4,445 names. Allowing for all duplicates, etc. There must be over 3,600 qualified voters who could have gone to the polls yesterday. The liquor men have therefore about one fourth of the whole. After all their advertising and denunciation and cornering of the lively stable market, etc., this record must be disappointing. They had the whole field to themselves and they could do as they pleased, and of course they got out every last man.

What about the remaining three-fourths of our population? This is the question to be seriously considered by our law makers and those who are at the head of affairs.

In one of two of the churches whose pastors instructed their people not to vote yesterday, there is enough ballots to swamp the votes of the rum party as indicated by the returns. The following churches may be regarded as well high solid to a man in favor of prohibition, St. Andrews, Falmouth, Jubilee, Pitt St., Bethany, St. Mark's Victoria Road and St. James. In both the Roman Catholic and Anglican there is a percentage of men who refused to vote. We know the full fighting force of the rum party is Sydney. They had in the field yesterday everything they owned, "Horse, Foot and Artillery." Would this city be asked to express itself on this question and carefully prepared British machinery be provided for taking the vote,

SOLDIERS TURN ON THEIR GENERAL

Turkish Commander is Wounded by His Men HIS GREAT FAILURE

LONDON, Feb. 17.—Turkish soldiers last night attempted to assassinate and succeeded in badly wounding Enver Bey, the young Turkish leader, who last week made a disastrous effort to pierce the flanks of the Bulgarian army on the shores of the Sea of Marmora with a "forelorn hope" of Ottoman troops, who were beaten back with terrible losses. A news agency despatch by wireless telegraphy from Constantinople today says Enver Bey was stabbed several times.

New York, Feb. 17.—A cable to the Tribune from London says:

Matters are going from bad to worse with the Turks. Enver Bey's expedition to land a large force on the north coast of the Sea of Marmora has ended ludicrously. Enver himself narrowly escaping with his life in an open boat. His disheartened men are now crowded, wet and hungry, in the open streets of Galipoli, in the worst kind of weather, all the houses being filled with wounded. It is reported that he will ship his men again to take them across the Dardanelles, owing to the report that the Greeks have landed near Bezika Bay, intending to take the forts on the Asiatic side of the Dardanelles, in their rear. A correspondent in the Daily News says there are almost certain to be accidents, however, if this move is attempted, for the boats are bad and would be overcrowded, and a great tempest is blowing.

Enver's was an idealist armada, not that of a practical sailor. His men started filled with hope, but, without food, they soon got dispirited. The leaders retained then in that day the Temperance and Prohibition sentiment of Sydney will assert itself and beat the whiskey business all to pieces.

The whole proceedings of yesterday from the legal view point were meaningless before the ballot boxes opened, it is meaningless today. The campaign in the interests of prohibition has aroused the Temperance people of our city, and not for years has there been so strong a sentiment against the Gin Mill as there is today."

LORD METHUEN FOR GOVERNOR GENERAL

Famous Soldier Mentioned to Succeed Duke of Connaught

London, February 17. — Lord Methuen is now mentioned as the next Governor-General of Canada in succession to the Duke of Connaught, who may be compelled to resign owing to the poor health of the Duchess of Connaught. His Royal Highness has been granted leave of absence to come home with Her Royal Highness, whose health it is hoped will be restored, but if she does not recover sufficiently His Royal Highness, it is believed, will not return to Canada.

As a soldier and administrator, Lord Methuen is known as one of England's most able and efficient men. His military career is one of the most varied as well as one of the most distinguished to be found in the Army List, and it is strange to note that while he had served a great part of his life abroad, he has seen no Indian service. Paul Sanford Methuen, third baron, was educated at Eton and entered the Scots Guards, of which he is colonel, in 1864. His first experience of foreign service was on special service on the Gold Coast; he next fought in the Ashanti War, 1874, receiving the medal with clasps, and in 1877 was appointed Assistant Military Secretary to the Commander-in-Chief in Ireland. He was later attaché at Berlin. He served in the Egyptian Campaign of 1882, and in the same year was Commandant at Headquarters in Egypt, receiving several decorations.

In 1884-5 he commanded Methuen's Horse in the Bechuanaland Field Force, receiving the C. M. G. and in 1888 was Deputy Adjutant-General in South Africa. Made Major-General in 1890, he was in 1892-3 in command of the Home District. In the South African war, 1899-1902, he commanded the first division First Army Corps, his dogged pursuit of De West being famous in the annals of the war. In 1903 Lord Methuen returned home to take the Eastern Command but in 1907 returned to South Africa as General Officer Commanding-in-Chief. In 1909 he was appointed Governor of Natal. His orders include K. C. B., K. C. V. O., C.B. and C.M.G. He has been twice married, his first wife dying in 1879; his second wife, Mary Ethel, daughter of William Sanford, of Nynehead, Wilts., he married in 1884.

BILL TO ABOLISH THE LONG HATPIN

American Women Must Now Wear Guards Over Points

Boston, Feb. 12.—Sternly repressing all show of mirth the Massachusetts Senate yesterday pushed along the hatpin bill, refusing by a vote of 5 to 18 to refer the matter to the next General Court.

Senator Fisher of Westford championed the cause of the women. Men are killed or injured on the football field, he said, and the morning papers had told of a man losing an eye by playing hockey, but there is no attempt to put through legislation to prevent such occurrences. Public opinion, he urged, should settle the matter without any act of the Legislature.

The bill was supported by Senator Montague of Boston, on the ground that it was in the interest of the public welfare. Senator Allen of Melrose, contributed his personal experience in dodging hatpins as he rides in the elevator to the 10th floor of the building in which he had his office. He declared that the matter is not one for levity.

Senator Bellamy Taunton objected to the bill as not a proper subject for legislation. It was favored by Senator Hilton of Framingham.

The bill as it now stands is; Section 1 — It shall be unlawful for any person to wear in public a hat pin unless the point of the hat pin is protected in such manner as to prevent the injury of persons coming in contact therewith.

Section 2. — Violation of the provisions of this act shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$100 for each offence.

MOUNT ALLISON TO HAVE CAMPAIGN

Arrangements are Being Made to Materially Advance College

Graduates of Mount Allison University in this city and elsewhere will be interested in the announcement that the Sackville institution is shortly to inaugurate a campaign with a view to very largely increasing the endowment. This college, established in 1858, has come to be regarded as one of the most valuable assets of the Maritime Provinces, and an institution of very considerable importance in the national life of Canada. Statistics show that in proportion to the total number obtaining its degree Mount Allison men stand at the head of the list of those securing honors in the larger universities and meeting success in Canadian public life.

It has been the practice in the Sackville institutions to fix the tuitions fees so long that one dollar's worth of instruction has been given for every forty cents of revenue from students, but unfortunately the endowment fund has not been sufficient to make up the remaining sixty cents. The result has been shown in the way of an annual deficit and in rendering impossible such improvements, and extensions of the work, as have from time to time been considered necessary and advisable.

For the purpose of enabling the university to meet the requirements of the present day, it has been decided to seek an additional endowment of one quarter of a million dollars. A campaign is now being arranged, during which it is hoped all former students and other friends throughout Canada will come to the assistance of the college and aid in helping it only to maintain its present high standard but to establish new branches, provide new buildings, grant suitable remuneration to the professorate, and generally to advance along such lines and in such manner as is demanded by modern methods of education.

Mount Allison students are to be found everywhere in Canada and it is hoped they will generously respond when the time comes.

MAKES BIG HAUL OF STRONG LIQUOR

Liquor License Inspector Seizes Large Quantity of Liquor at Freight Sheds

Following the recent order received from the I.C.R. officials that the Liquor License Inspectors of prohibition or local option towns had the right to search suspicious packages carried over the Intercolonial, Chief Hughes made a call at the freight sheds on Saturday and was rewarded with the largest haul of liquor ever made in Campbellton.

In all some 26 barrels and numerous cases were seized and removed to the police station, none of the packages bearing any name, having only some private marks.

On Tuesday a second call was made at the freight sheds and this time the haul was four barrels.

The new regulations which permits officers of the law to enter any premises on the I.C.R. where freight is kept and inspect, search and seize liquor improperly shipped is certainly stringent enough, and will do much to do away with this traffic on the Intercolonial which heretofore could not be touched.

car on which the accident happened belonged to them, and because it was defective, and that the said defects caused the accident, and more over, that the said car was on the Railway track of the Atlantic, Quebec & Western, when the accident happened.

The Railway Company through its Attorney, Mr. John Hall Kelly, argued that the action should have been directed against the New Canadian Company, and not against the Atlantic, Quebec & Western. The Superior Court maintained this plea, and dismissed the plaintiff's action, with all costs against him.

In two other cases of the Superior Court of Mr. Fletcher Blois—vs—George Henry and John Ward, where in Mr. Blois was represented by Mr. Kelly, and the defendants by Mr. W. A. Flynn, of Perce, Mr. Blois was awarded judgment for the amount of his actions with all costs against the defendants.

The Superior Court maintained the pretensions of the Shives Lumber Company, and dismissed the contractor's action, with all costs against him.

In the case of LeGallais—vs—Atlantic, Quebec & Western Railway Company, the facts were as follows:—

Young LeGallais was working for the New Canadian Company which was contracting the Atlantic, Quebec & Western Railway from New Carlisle to Gaspe Basin. While in the employ of the New Canadian Company, the Company sent LeGallais to work on a train made up of the cars of the Atlantic, Quebec & Western Railway Company. While working on these cars, which belonged to the Railway Company, LeGallais met with an accident which necessitated the amputating of his leg above the knee.

Through his Attorney, Mr. J. A. Moussault, of New Carlisle, he sued the Company, claiming \$10,000.00 damages, and set up that the Atlantic, Quebec & Western Railway Company was responsible for the accident, and had to pay his damages, because the
