CANADIAN IMMIGRATION IS COERCED BY COMBINE

Mr. Preston's Statement Respecting Ship Syndicate. Predicts Result Will Be Canadian Subsidized Line. Shipbuilders Have Nothing to Say Regarding Situation—Germany's Position—Cable News.

EXCITEMENT SUBSIDING.

London, April 28.—The excitement caused here by the shipping deal is subsiding, owing to the maze of contradictions and the lack of authentic information. A sense of irritated uneasiness remains unmistakably, for the independence of the British commercial marine is a national tradition well high sacrosanct, and even if the Cunard and White Star Lines, in joining an American-Canadian-German coalition, keep the same flag aloft, the grip of a foreign money power is dreaded as a source of danger in time of war. THE GOVERNMENT VIGILANT. A fresh series of questions asked in parliament threw little light upon the subject, but disclosed the fact that the government was fully alive to the importance of establishing safeguards against the transfer of subsidized British ships to foreign flags. The heads of the admiralty and the board of trade have been consulting, and there is likely to be something more than a reappointment of the committee on steamship subsidies. Mr. Arnold Forster is both a naval expert and a man of energy, and important action is foreshadowed. POSITION IN THE GERMAN LINES. What may be the real force of the equivocal denials of steamship owners to the National Review. The writer has more direct control over her merchant marine than the British government exercises. It is also plain that the Morgan lines, while not changing ownership, have made a definite agreement with the Anglo-American coalition respecting future operations. It is a plain inference that the English lines have either accepted foreign regulation and direction or are likely to do so. CANADIAN IMMIGRATION. London, April 29.—The Canadian officials here are highly excited over the profits received at the emigration office that the shipping combination, with two Canadian lines in it, are already interfering with the systematized operations of the highly successful bureau. Commissioner W. T. R. Preston confirmed yesterday the report that the two representatives of the shipping ring had threatened to divert emigration from Canada unless the work of the sub-agents appointed throughout the United Kingdom for promoting it without prejudice to any line were restricted. Mr. Preston told me that important correspondence on the subject would arrive at Ottawa on Thursday, showing that the ring is seeking to control the rates for passage to Canada, and to interfere with the wise policy which has led to the enormous increase of inquiries and departures of British settlers. He predicted that the interference of the shipping ring with the immigration business would be followed inevitably by the creation of a Canadian subsidized line for carrying emigrants.

HAS NO POWER TO DISCLOSE TERMS

British Government's Position Respecting Marine Deal.

Transfer of White Star Line to American Syndicate Talked Of in the House. London, April 28.—The Shipping Gazette this afternoon says: While it is perfectly true that the White Star Line has not been sold to the American syndicate and that the present owners of shares retain their holdings, the statements made Saturday do not fully represent the real position. We are authoritatively informed that while there will be no sale of White Star shares there will be an exchange of these shares for those of the financial interest of the White Star in the combine will be established. The two great German companies will, on the other hand, make no similar exchange of their shares for those of the new company, but they will enter into an agreement binding them for ten years, and renewable for another ten years, by which their co-operation is secured. The simplest way of indicating the real position is to describe the companies concerned as entering into a pooling arrangement. It follows that there will be no competition between them at the ports with which the individual steamship corporations have hitherto been more particularly identified. In the House of Commons today the president of the board of trade, Gerald Balfour, replying to a question said the board had no power to require the disclosure of any agreement for the transfer of a British ship to foreign owners, but to require the White Star Line or other lines which had entered into the American combination to disclose terms of their agreements with the American syndicate or to produce any documents showing the status of the persons who, under the agreement, acquire a share in the control of a beneficial interest in the ships concerned.

UNREST EXISTS IN ALL RUSSIA

Attitude of Workmen is Openly Threatening.

Serious Situation in Labor Circles—Factory Hands Demand Greater Liberties.

London, April 28.—"It is difficult," says the Moscow correspondent of the Times, "to exaggerate the condition of unrest among the working population of Central Russia. The attitude of the men to their employers is openly threatening. They have become aroused to a sense of their miserable condition by well-educated men who have given up careers to live among the people, to assimilate the doctrines of revolutionary socialism. The Russian factory hands are also made dissatisfied through coming into contact with foreign workmen and hearing of liberties enjoyed abroad. A deputation of Moscow workmen waited on the minister of the interior armed with a translation of the rules of an English trades union. They declared if they were not allowed to form a similar organization, a general strike would be declared in all the factories of Moscow." PRINCESS ON TRIAL. Cape Town, April 28.—The trial of Princess Radziwill, on the charge of forgery, in connection with notes purporting to have been indorsed by the late Cecil Rhodes, but which the latter repudiated, began in the supreme court here today before the chief justice, Sir J. H. De Villiers. The princess pleaded not guilty, and a counsel for the defense applied for a postponement of the trial in order to obtain evidence from England. The application was refused. There are 24 counts in the indictment. Though Rhodes and Schultz, the two principal witnesses, have died since the case was first filed, their evidence, in the form of affidavits deposed by Rhodes and Schultz, and the signatures on the notes as forgeries, hold good. HOLLAND'S QUEEN BETTER. The Hague, April 28.—A bulletin referring to Queen Wilhelmina's condition, posted this morning at Castle Leeuwarden, has majestically passed a quiet night and that all her symptoms indicate improvement. UNITED STATES CONSUL-GENERAL DEAD. London, April 29.—United States Consul-General Osborne died at his residence in Westminster at 10:30 o'clock this morning. William McKinley Osborne was appointed consul-general at London by President McKinley on March 18, 1897. He was born in Girard, Ohio, in 1842. He was a cousin of the late President McKinley.

PROSPECTS FOR PEACE AND CIVIL GOVERNMENT IN COLONY

Boer Leaders Are In Favor of Terminating War.

Strong Expressions of Feeling at Recent Conferences.

Establishment of High Court of the Transvaal Feared.

London, April 28.—A Pretoria dispatch reports that a proclamation has just been issued establishing the high court of the Transvaal, which will be opened on the 8th of July. This marks a great stride towards the re-establishment of civil government in the colony. The court, as at present constituted, consists of four judges, whose appointments will be permanent—Sir J. Rose Innes, Mr. Justice Solomon, of Cape Colony; Sir William Smith, a man of wide experience in crown colonies, lately judge in Natal and also in British Guiana, and Mr. J. W. Wessels. A single judge court will be established at Johannesburg, with high court jurisdiction over the Witwatersrand district, and will be presided over by one of the judges of the high court sitting in rotation. The great difficulty to be overcome was naturally the question of qualifications for admission to the bar. In this respect the provisions made are most generous to advocates throughout the empire, and at the same time they secure the efficiency of the bar. English barristers, Scottish advocates and advocates of the high court of the late republic are entitled to admission; also advocates from any British colony who have either passed an examination, which in the opinion of the judges of the high court, is equivalent to the law examination required for admission to the bar of Cape Colony, or who have practiced exclusively as advocates, not in partnership with attorneys, for a period of seven years, in the supreme court of such British colony. Coinciding with the establishment of the high court, the opening of the new deeds office, patent and trades marks office, will take place early next month, thus giving the new colony an excellent equipment towards civil government. In addition to the proclamation establishing a high court of justice pending the establishment of a supreme court for the Transvaal, proclamations have been issued amending the law of evidence in this colony, creating the office of sheriff, and establishing a council of the Incorporated Law Society. London, Tuesday, April 29.—Wiring from Pretoria under date of Sunday, April 27, the correspondent of the Daily Telegraph says that Gen. Botha, with other Boer leaders, attended meetings of the Utrecht and Vryheid commandos last week. At these meetings strong opinions in favor of peace were expressed. The tacit truce in the Utrecht and Vryheid districts, the correspondent concludes, will expire tomorrow. DESULTORY FIGHTING. London, April 28.—The war office has made public the following dis-

The arms had been a "red flag" to the Nationalists of late, and the mayor, Mr. Daly, wanted to remove them. The police have arrested the councillor Joseph Ryan, a member of the corporation, in connection with the occurrence, which has caused quite a sensation.

BERESFORD'S FIRST ACT

Starts Crusade in Parliament for Army and Navy Reform.

London, April 28.—The first official act of Rear Admiral Lord Charles Beresford (Conservative), after taking the oath in the House of Commons today, was to give notice that tomorrow he will present a motion for reducing the salaries of the members of the admiralty, in order to call attention to the lack of direct responsibility in the administration of both the army and the navy.

BRITISH SHIP LOST

Hope for Safety of "Antrim" Definitely Abandoned.

London, April 28.—The British steamer Antrim, which sailed from Newport, England, April 21, for Belfast, laden with coal, has not since been heard from, and hope of her safety has been definitely abandoned. She carried a crew of 12 persons.

Washington, April 28.—Sol Smith Russell, the actor, who was in impaired health for several years, died today. Sol Smith Russell was born June 15, 1845, in Brunswick, Mo., traveled in 1867-72 with the celebrated Peck and Burger family; was at one time as a monologist for several seasons; then started starring successfully in such plays as "Englishwood Folks," "A Poor Relation," and "Peaceful Valley."

He was usually wheeled to and from the theaters in an invalid chair. He was considered one of the wealthiest actors on the American stage, his real estate holdings including many properties in Minneapolis. The total value of his estate is said to be more than \$200,000. The deceased was a native of Maine.

It is provided, however, that the issued capital stock shall not exceed \$5,000,000.

That is the total of the execution permitted by Mr. Siever in the face of a team of veterans, many of whom have faced the best twirling in the country and solved it."
