COASTING CASUALTIES.

Three Guelph Men Badly Injured—One of Them in a Critical Condition.

GUELPH, Ont., Jan. 31.—While sledding last night a young man named Whelstone ran into a telegraph pole, breaking his nose, knocking out his teeth and otherwise injuring himself. His life is despaired of.

15,000 Insurgents Massed.

LONDON, Jan. 31.—Advices received here from Buenos Ayres state that 15,000 insurgents are massed at Quillota, Province of Valparaiso, 50 miles from Santiago, and it is reported they are contemplating an advance on the capital. The insurgents threaten to bombard every port en the coast unless their demands are granted by the Government. President Balmaceda's forces have recaptured Iquique.

The insurgents have been forced to withdraw from Lapona, where, after a desperate engagement, 5,000 (hovernment troops compelled the insurgents to retreat to Lanorita.

From Two to Three Hundred Chine San Francisco, Feb. 2.—The steamer City of Rio de Janeiro, from China, brings further particulars of the burning of the steamer Shanghai Dec. 25. She had on board 400 Chinese passengers and one European, and carried a cargo of cotton. The cotton caught fire, and the Chinese plunged overboard and were drowned or were burned to death to the number of 200 or 300.

For Local Option. Toronto. Jan. 31.—The Toronto Local Option Bylaw will be submitted to the township of Westmeath, in North Renfrew, on Wednesday, Feb. 25. Westmeath was under the Dunkin Act and the Scott Act, and its people seem determined to keep up with the march of temperance legislation.



THE IMPENDING DISSOLUTION. The Tory chieftain and his friends of the subsidized press affect to believe that the Liberals are fearing defeat in the country because they say that a dissolution of Parliament at the present time would be a breach of faith both with Parliament and the country. We do not know where the Liberals are who fear the issue of an appeal, come it early or come it late; but there is a reasonableness in political action as well as in other things, and if a dissolution before its time cannot be justified upon public grounds it ought not to be forced. There are two substantial reasons against a general election at the present time; on being that it should await the distribution which may be necessary when the census is taken, and the other that the latest voters list of the Dominion is now two years old.

The Secretary of State, Mr. Chapleau, speaking in the House of Commons last session, said: "If in July, 1891, the census shows that the representation must be changed, it will become necessary to have new elections after the census, it will be come almost an absolute necessity that the elections should take place in the beginning of 1892, by the natural death of this Parliament, according to the constitution." If therefore, a general election is, under the Confederation Act, a necessity after the taking of the census, there must be very grave reasons of State for dissolving the present Parliament a year before its natural course has run. The Governor-General, as well as his Ministers, must be prepared to justify an appeal to the people should the step be taken, and they should bear in mind that it cannot be justified on the ground of

political expediency.

The prerogative of the Governor has been narrowed down very much in recent years, but he still retains the right to grant or re fuse dissolution as a measure of equity under our system of party government. Can he with any proper consideration for the rights of the people grant an appeal when the vote must take place under lists two years old? Will he pause to consider before doing so how rank an injustice may be done to a large body of the people?

PROGRESS IN ENGLAND. other part of the world for evidence of the assertion than the kingdom of England, if we may accept as facts the statements and figures contained in a recent speech of Hon.

Joseph Chamberlain in Birmingham. The occasion was the jubilee of a provident ociety in that town, and Mr. Chamberlain was asked to move a resolution on the satisfactory character of the operations and "the vast improvement in the social condition of the working classes in the last 50 years." This particular society was founded by a few Sunday school teachers and scholars 50 years ago, and now it has 8,000 members, an income of £17,000 a year, and invested funds of £76,000. Mr. Chamberlain's speech dealt with progress and improvement as manifested in Birmingham and England during the period of the society's existence, and it is needless to say that he did not take a pessimistic view of

Fifty years ago Birmingham had a population of 180,000, or about 40 per cent. of what it has now, and the rateable value was less than one-third of what it is now. It had then no public edifices of any importance, no parks, no baths, no free library or art museum, no board schools, or Mason college or Corporation street. The era of street improvement had not begun in Bir-mingham 50 years ago. The streets were badly paved, imperfectly lighted, only partially drained, and the footwalks were worse than the streets. Gas and water were supplied by private companies, and the latter only three days in the week; for the rest of the week the citizens had either to go without or to take water from polluted wells carried round by carts. There were thousands of courts which were not paved or drained which were covered with pools of stagnant filth, and in which the ash-pits and middens were in a state of indescribable nastiness. Even as late as 1848 the sanitary condition of the town was such whole streets typhus and scarlet fever, diphtheria and diarrhœa were never absent, and the death rate was 30 per 1,000 now it is reduced to 20 per 1,000.

In other parts of the kingdom the state of affairs was no better. Between 1830 and 1846 riots were almost of daily occurrence, accompanied by long periods of distress. In the manufacturing districts machinery was destroyed and bakers' shops were plundered-the one in the hope of giving employment to artisans and the other to get their bread. In the agricultural districts outrages took the form of incendiarism, and the nights were lighted up by the burning of ricks and barns, and small shopkeepers were almost ruined by excessive taxation and bad debts. The farm laborers, who toiled for excessive hours, were not able to earn a bare subsistence, and had to look to the help which was derived from the Poor Laws. In 1833 the poor rate amounted to 12 shillings per head of the whole population, whereas it is now only whole population, whereas last year, with pauperism. In 1842 there were 31,000 committals for trial, whereas last year, with a population which has nearly doubled, there were only 13,000; but of course some allowance must be made for the greater leniency with which the law is now enforced. In 1834 the number of human beings sentenced to death was 480, and last year there were only 35, of whom only 21 suffered the penalty of the law. In those days there was no Factory Act, no Mines Act, no Truck Act. Women and children were enforced to work as mon sewer.


