[Special to the ADVERTISER.] OTTAWA, April 27.—The long-deferred iscussion of the London election case was asst reached in the House this afternoon.

Mr. Moncrieff urged the House to be most careful in its consideration of the charges against the judiciary, whom he praised most highly. THE CARON CHARGES.

After recess the resolution of Mr. Edgar for an investigation into the charges against Sir A. Caron next came up for consideration, Sir Richard Cartwright resuming the debate. He said it was perhaps as well that a considerable time had elapsed since the charges were preferred in order that all of the members might have had time to consider well the gravity. have had time to consider well the gravity of the offenses charged and the miserable subterfuges by which it was attempted to shield the offender. The course of the shield the oflender. The course of the Minister of Justice had still further tended to degrade the fair name of Canada, which suffered so seriously last year. Sir Richard reviewed the charges preferred by Mr. Edgar, Could anything be more explicit than that Sir A. Caron, profiting from the receipt of large subsidies which he recommended to be granted, had corruptly used vast sums in debauching the electors of a good portion of the country? If the charges were proven the Minister would stand convicted of conspiracy and charges were proven the Minister would stand convicted of conspiracy and embezzlement—embezzlement for a political embezzlement—embezzlement for a political purpose, and involving one of the greatest possible offenses against Parliamentary government. He was in fact accused of treason against the commonwealth. He would stand proven of the worst possible breach of trust. The duty of a Minister imposed on him the task of seeing that the public money was properly expended, yet if the accusations were true Sir Adolphe had violated his oath of office, had aded and assisted in the embezzlement of public funds and had doubled his crime by the use to which the money was put. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Sydney Drew (nee Rankin). His name is Sydney Rankin Drew. He is just 6 months old, and has traveled fully 10,000 miles in all kinds of weather all through the great extremes of climate met between Chicago or New York, Yuma and San Francisco. The Prospects for Canadian Farm Products at Home and Abroad.

A Big Combination of Cattle Shippers Successfully Formed.

The Bottom Out of the Egg Busines -Botter Outlook for Good Cattle in England—The Flour Market Still Unsettled.

MONTREAL, April 25.—The initial step of

to carry on business in live stock, fodder,

Company, with a capital of \$100,000.
These two gentlemen controlled nearly onehalf the cattle shipped last season, and the
competition between them has been keen.
Efforts will be made to bring other large
operators into line, making a concern strong
enough to control the trade in all its
branches. Their main object appears to be
to get concessions from the carriers which
cannot now be obtained owing to the competition among themselves and the small
shippers outside the ring. If the scheme is
unccessful the cattle feeders and small
shippers will suffer materially owing to
there being no competition as heretofore to
boost up prices in the country. Advices
from the British markets are more encouraging. A cable to-day says the prospects
are better for good cattle. Americans sold
in Liverpool to-day at 52d or 2d higher
than last week.

The local markets are glutted with cattle,
and the drovers lost heavily to-day. Choice

in Liverpool to-day at 5½d or ¼d higher than last week.

The local markets are glutted with cattle, and the drovers lost heavily to-day. Choice steers sold at ½c to 4½c; medium steers, 4c to 4½c; large oxen and bulls at 3c to 4c, and sommon stock at 2½c to 3c. There was an own supply of hogs, and prices eased off bout 10c per cwt in consequence, \$5.50 o \$5.65 being the range. Sheep and dambs are in demand at 4c to 5c per lb, and common calves are a drug on the market.

There are rumors afloat about shippers buying extensively in the country, but the Montreal men say positively they are doing nothing. The first boat to load will be the Fremona, which will take 700 head for John Crowe to Newcastle. By the time my mext letter reaches you the season will be in full swing. The outlook is none too bright, but the shippers say one of the most successful seasons in the history of the trade opened up three years ago with the condition of affairs almost identical with those of the present.

The Allan, Domninon and Beaver lines have made their rate for May 60s, which is 10s higher than that of last season. The Allans are charging 5s extra for insurance.

BUTTER, CHEESE, ETC.

New cheese is coming in more freely in lots of 40 and 50 boxes, which is costing 10c to 11c per 1b, according to quality. The new goods compare favorably with that of last season, and if the warm weather continues the season will be earlier. The report about the Ingersoil shipments is denied. Advices from London and Liverpool report the market dull. The Liverpool cable is down to 54s. Bids are being made from 10c to 10½c, but if the cable keeps going down it is likely to have a deterrent effect. Last year new cheese was a factor in the English market, and at this time the cable was 59s.

The movement in butter is still confined to a small jobbing trade. Receipts of new butter are small, and all offering sells at good prices. Old creamery remains as it was. The stocks are still heavy and have a depressing effect, but they have worked down to a better

FLOUR AND GRAIN.

The flour market is still in an unsettled ondition, no arrangement having yet been tome to concerning the Newfoundland difficulty. Some dealers say that the trouble will have the effect of building up our export trade with Great Britain; but prices must advance on the other side before business can be done at a profit. Sales are being made at low prices here. Consignments of straight rollers have been closed out at \$4 35 to \$4 50, according to size of lot and quality. Manitobas are offering freely at reduced prices, but are moving slowly. The range for strong bakers' is very wide, choice city brands selling from \$4 75 to \$4 90, and other qualities at \$4 35 to \$4 70. Western millers are competing for business in oatmeal, and are cutting prices right and left; but the movement is small. Mill feed is quiet and steady, quotations being as follows: Bran \$15 to \$15 50; shorts \$16 to \$16 50, and middlings \$17 to \$18.

The grain market is quiet. Sales of No. I regular Manitoba wheat are reported at 77 to 78c for May; red and white winter is selling in the West at prices ranging from \$5 to \$7c. Corn is quiet at 51c to 53c in bond. There is a good inquiry for peas for export. Advices from the Stratford district are easier, at 58c to 59c per 60 lbs; prices here are 76c to 78c per 66 lbs afloat May, and 74c to 75c in store. Feed barley as been sold during the week at 42½c, and malting at 58c. Several transactions ire reported in oats on private terms for May shipment; but 334c to 34c per 32 lbs is about the idea. No. 2 sare quoted at 33c, and others at 30c to 32c per 34c lbs. Malt is seiling at 70c to 75c. Buckwheat is quiet at 54c to 55c on spot, and 56c to 68c for May. There is no change in seed, quotations being as follows: Red clover, \$7.50 to \$8; Alisike, \$7 to \$9; Canadian timothy, \$2 to \$2.15, and American, \$1.85 to \$1.90. A sale of ten bales of hops is reported at \$21c.

How to Develop Good Traits in Horses

How to Develop Good Traits in Horses

It is very desirable and important to be able to catch a horse in the pasture field, which can most always be done when he is treated with uniform kindness. It is often necessary to get up a horse quickly, and if he is hard to catch, the delay thus occasioned may result quite seriously to his master's interest. I never go into a field to catch a horse without a nibble of corn, bit of apple, handful of oats or something else he likes, and as a consequence, never have the slightest trouble in catching him.

In turning a horse out to pasture, never frighten him and make him run away from you by striking him with the haiter or bridle and yelling at him. This is a mean, heartless habit, and is apt to make a horse horses cannot be caught in the field, and the only way they can be stabled is to get the dogs after them and drive them in. Should the dogs be away from home some day (or night) when he wants to go for a doctor or to see a sick neighbor, he would doubtless realize what it was to be "in a pickle."

Of the many bad traits the horse may possess that of being breachy may be classed as one of the worst. 



STARTLING DISCLOSURE.

Another Serious Deficit Alleged To Be Discovered in Windsor's Finances.

Discovered in Windsor's Finances.

Auditor G. K. Prowse, who since last October has been busily engaged in getting the finances of Windsor in a proper shape, on Wednesday unearthed the startling disclosure that there is a deficit in the consolidated fund of \$11,828, besides the sinking fund deficit of \$37,219 56, which he found out three months ago. In order to understand the deficit that was unearthed by Mr. Prowse on Wednesday it must be explained that in 1881 the town consolidated its debt for \$270,000, for which debentures were issued. A portion of these consolidated its debt for \$270,000, for which debentures were issued. A portion of these debentures were exchanged for debentures becoming due after consolidation and the remainder were held for the purposes of sale to pay other old debentures that were not exchanged. Now there is yet to be paid \$66,500, and instead of the town clerk having debentures equal to that amount he only has \$54,672, showing a clear deficit of \$11,828. There were no books in the possession of the town where by it could be learned how many debentures were out, and in order to obtain this informacion Mr. Prowse dissected the amount paid by the town for coupons for

this information Mr. Prowse dissected the amount paid by the town for coupons for debentures before 1881, and this gave him the actual amount that is outstanding at the end of last year, which is \$66,500. What has become of this money cannot be traced until a further investigation has been made, but it has most likely been used, as the major part of the sinking fund was used to pay off the current expenses. In regard to the sinking fund deficit not a cent was placed to its credit until 1889, when Mayor Twomey made the first deposit, and one has been made each year since. The whole thing means that the present taxpayers are paying a certain since. Auditor Prowse has as far as he has gone made a thorough audit, and he is to be commended for bringing before the taxpayers a true statement of how the finances of the town are.
