THE TELEGRAPHERS' TROUBLE.

Statement from the Committee of Conciliation.

The following statement is issued by the committee of conciliation, consisting of A. K. Kennedy, G. P. Pike, Ed. Sawyer and S. C. Young, which effected a settlement of the recent C. P.R. strike: "Owing to the many statements that

have been given out through the medium of the press to the public in connection with the recent unfortunate trouble between the C. P. R. and many of its train dispatchers and operators, and the settlement of the same through the medium of a committee on conciliation, we, the committee, think it is due the public and all parties concerned that the committee of conciliation should set aright the existing misunderstanding. "The strike was called because the executive of the company at Montreal refused to take up alleged grievances until they had first been presented to the divisional officers on the divisions where the grievances were supposed to exist, and they had failed to adjust them. In this the company was right. The rules of the company and the rules of all organizations of employes provide for this method of presenting such matters to the company. The committee of conciliation did not discuss the alleged grievances of the operators. The only question discussed was the best means of settling the matter of having the strike dewas presented to the company by the conciliation committee, representing the operators, and was accepted by the company:

"'All employes now engaged in a strike on the C. P. R. may report at once to their respective superintendents, who will reinstate them without prejudice to the positions they occupied before the strike took place, except such as have been guilty of such grave misconduct as to cause the gencept them. Under the verandah was a busy place. It was a laughable sight to see some women buying butter. They clustered round and pitched into the butter with anything that came first, which, as a rule, were lead question, agreed upon by pencils, pocket-knives, and silver money. It was also amusing to see them tasting. They sucked it off the coins, utterly oblivious as to who might have had the money in their dirty last. The produce was galore, sufficient to fill not only the market, but the streets surrounding the square. The meat market was well filled, beef and lamb being most plentiful. The former was quoted at 49c for fore and 5 1-2c for hind quarters; lamb, 6c to 8c for front, and 8c to 9c for hind quarters; pork, 6c to 7c for fore, and 7c to 8c for hind quarters. There were a few tomatoes at 15c per basket.

The poultry supply was the largest of the season. Chickens sold all the way from 35c to 50c per pair; ducks, 45c to \$1 per pair; turkeys, 70c. Eggs and butter were about the same price as a week ago. Butter ranged from 15c to 18c for roll and 13c to 15c for crocks. Eggs, 15c to 16c Apples—Snows were offered for 65c per barrel, and Northern Spy at 75c

per barrel; by the bag, 25c. Large cabbages were offered at 20c per dozen, potatoes at 40c and turnips for 30c per bag. Chestnuts brought \$1 50 per bushel, pigs, at \$3 to \$4 50, according to size.



To the Editor of The Advertiser: From all the information that has been given through the press or otherwise to the ratepayers, it is evident that the merits of the proposed sewerage systems are mysteries. The intelligent criticism of Dr. Gardiner demonstrates that the proposed system will be defective, and it is a fair inference to be drawn from the information given that it will not only be defective but most probably useless, because it is conceded by the experts that the waste water from ordinary consumption will not keep the sewers flushed, and that the sewers are not intended to and will not carry off storm water. As it is a fact that the supply of waterworks water is not more than sufficient for ordinary consumption, it follows that water for flushing is not obtainable from any known source. The matter now rests with the City Council, as to whether the experimental expenditure of nearly \$200,000 shall be made upon a system which cannot be effective unless supplemented at an unknown cost. DISAPPOINTING.

More Comments on Rosebery's Speech Does Not Justify His Action in Resigning.

London, Oct. 10.-Rosebery's speech at Edinburgh last night, giving reasons why he resigned the Liberal leadership, was eagerly awaited, but proved a disappointment Some of the morning papers say that in effect it is but a feeble exposition of common-place views of the Eastern Question, and revealed practically no more than the letter of resignation itself as to what led him to lay down the leadership of the party. The only actual news was that his resignation had been in the hands of his colleagues since the general election. The ohief interest in the ex-Premier's utterance centered beforehand in the attitude he would assume on the eastern question. It turns out that he after all differs in no essential way with Harcourt and his associates. Gladstone deprecates isolated action; so do they. He holds Armenia not worth a European war; so do they. He suggests making practical advances to Russia; so, at least, does Harcourt. Altogether, the speech neither justified his action in resigning, nor is likely to affect the Turkish situation in the slightest degree.
From reliable sources it is learned

that Russia, England and France practically have agreed to take concerted action in regard to the entire eastern question, but the precise details are not yet arranged.

The market has a firm and upward tendency owing to the large quantity that has been shipped to England. The above lot, it is said, could not be replaced today at less than 1c advance.—Montreal Trade Bulletin.

CHEESE SHIPMENTS. The shipments of cheese from Mon-treal last week were 61,952 boxes, making the total for the season up to the close of last week 1,168,220 boxes, as compared with 1,176,756 boxes for the corresponding period last year, being a decrease of about 7,500 boxes, with stocks here not more than one-half of those held a year ago.

A LARGE CARGO OF APPLES. The Allan Line steamer Numidian took out from Montreal a large cargo of 14,500 barrels of apples along with a heavy miscellaneous cargo last week. The freight on the apples alone amounted to \$10,440. It seems that the shipment of apples this year is more profitable to the steamship companies than to exporters.

CURING CHEESE.

Factorymen Urged to Give Particular (By J. W. Wheaton.)

As the cold weather approches, e-makers should put forth a special effort towards keeping the curing rooms at an even temperature that will cure the cheese properly. Many lots of cheese that have been well made have been spoiled by neglect when put in the curing-room. Irregularity in the temperature during the made. The great importance of having a cheese properly cured is not fully realized by our factorymen. Cheese-makers and factorymen are urged to give particular attention to

1. Have every crack and crevice in the curing-room closed up securely, so that there may be no unnecessary

waste of heat. 2. It is necessary to have a sweet and pure atmosphere for curing cheese, and consequently rubbish of any kind should be removed and the floor and shelving kept as clean as

3. A temperature of from 60 to 65 degrees should be maintained both day and night. This can be accomplished better by using a coal instead of a wood stove. Every factory should be provided with a coal stove. It will not cost any more to burn coal than wood, and a more even heat can be obtained. In cases where a wood stove is in use, it is the custom with many makers to put on a very hot fire in the morning and leave the cheese to themselves perhaps till evening, when a similar fire is put on. An even temperature can never be obtained in this way. A moderate fire that will keep the room at the desired temperature should be maintained, and it should be somebody's business to visit the

curing-room frequently and see that this is carried out. 4. Each curing-room stove should and will be satisfied only with positive, absolute merit. An Extra Teacher for the Lower Forms.

Mr. Merchant Gives an Interesting Comparison of Hamilton, Toronto and London Schools

Vertical Writing to be Introduced in Public Schools-Archie Hazelwood Winner of the Westervelt Scholarship.

Principal Merchant stated at last night's meeting of No. 1 committee of the Board of Education that the lower forms of the High School were overcrowded, and asked that another teacher be supplied. In support of his request he compared the attendance and number of teachers in the Toronto, Hamilton and London High Schools. In Toronto there are three high schools, with 915 pupils and 33 teachers, while in the High School here there are 723 pupils now attending, and the number of teachers is one less than half the staff at Toronto. Hamilton High School had the same number of teachers as here, but there were 200 fewer pupils.

Speaking of the relative cost of maintaining the schools in the different cities, Mr. Merchant stated that in Torento \$47,000 was paid out in salaries, and in London the salaries amounted to only \$17,000. Of course, in Toronto fees-\$20 in the first and second forms, \$23 in the third and fourth forms, and \$32 in the fifth and sixth forms-were here is growing very rapidly, owing cal system of writing. to its excellent standing. in this city was decreasing, owing from the Minister of Education. mainly to the increased attendance. 

Rev. Dr. C. H. Strickland, of Sioux City, recently delivered a sermon of direct interest to newspaper men. Cutting only to save necessary space and being forced to do less blue pencil work with it than we had expected, owing to its excellence, we present Dr. Strickland's sermon, as fol-

"We frequently speak of the won-ders of the world, such as the pyramids, the mighty Colossus at Rhodes, the hanging gardens of Babylon. We speak of the modern wonders of the world, such as a railroad locomotive or a steamship. But to my mind the newspaper is the greatest wonder of

"It is the potential agency for good or evil in the world today, a factor in constantly advancing civilization, and a mighty power to upbuild or destroy all that is good and true and

beautiful among men.
"The mass of men are readers of newspapers. It requires leisure to read a book, but comparatively a short time suffices to scan the daily paper that comes to us, and we look at it, and in looking upon it we behold the photograph of the city, state, country, and we obtain a glimpse in the distance of the entire world.

"We go through its editorials, if we have time; we dip into its foreign news; we read all the headlines of every page; we study its market reports; we look to see the prognostications for the weather for today and tomorrow. The news is boiled down and thoroughly pepper-sauced for us, and as we hold that paper we are no longer simply a citizen, but we are a citizen of the world, and we touch elbows with mankind everywhere.

THE MIGHTIEST WIZARD. "The mewspaper is the mightiest wizard we have ever met. No magician ever wielded such a spell as it does. and Aladdin's lamp was not nearly

so wonderful. "To estimate the influence and power of the newspaper is beyond my ability. I simply call attention to it as one of the potent agencies for good and evil in this world. It has access to all the homes in the land, and every intelligent eye must look along its columns. It gives shape to public opinion, as well as utterance thereto; it enlightens the people; it stimulates trade; it promotes civilization; it makes peace, and it foments war.
"I had almost said that a great newspaper is omniscient, omnipresent and omnipotent. Not in the sense in which we use these great words as aplied to Deity but in a lower sense they may be applied to a great daily. "We learn to love our daily paper. t becomes a familiar friend to us because it is helpful and finally neces-

sary to our daily life. We pay for it, but the idea of purchase does not enter into our minds. There is a kind of friendship between us and the newly printed paper, damp from the press, that we hold between our fingers. We criticise it, and talk about it, and quarrel about it, and yet could not do without it.

INFLUENCE OF THE PRESS. "Say all we may and all we will, we cannot fully realize or estimate the influence of the newspaper. If the Lord Jesus Christ owned the newspaper and ruled in the hearts of edi-tors and reporters, the Golden Age would begin at once, and there would be 'peace on earth, good will to men.'
The war drums would throb no longer and the battle flags would be "Our great dailies too often chron-icle evil without assailing it. They

speak to vast audiences, and I say respectfully that they ought to denounce immorality, wrong and sin. They do teach industry, enterprise patriotism and virtue. "I have not patience with that Phariseeism that condemns the press sweepingly and unsparingly because it chronicles the evil that occurs among men from day to day. The paper is the current historian of the times. It must record the acts of men. But I do hold that it should condemn the wrong and point to the remedy. It should be a teacher of right doing and right living.

"The pulpit needs to learn a les. son from the press. For instance, the preacher needs to look at life as it is, to come down and stand on a level with men, touch elbows with them in their joys and sorrows, be in contact with them in their victories, and in their defeats feel the great pulse of humanity throbbing against his own heart, that he may be able to cheer, to comfort, or to rebuke as occasion demands. This is what the newspaper does; this is what the editor does. As is the power of the parper, so is its responsibility to God.

Persistence of animal forms could always be ascribed to "heredity," and change in animal forms to "environment"; so that the universe seemed to be in a fair way to get along without God. But now we find certain lemurs, in which the force of heredity has been sufficient to preserve the form unchanged for vast geologic periods, suddenly give way to inferior and "unfit" forms which become persistent. The force of heredity, buttressed as it was by the in-breeding of the thousand generations, could not prevent the loss of a toe; but the force of heredity in that single defective generation could prevent its restoration, badly as the le-mur needed his lost member. We do not wonder that the British Association is "all tore up" about it.
