Day That Germany Reaches This Goal, Race for Naval Supremacy Will End.



LABOR MEN AND LABOR INTERESTS

Address Delivered by Mr. W. R. Trotter Last Night in St. George's Hall.

TO ABOLISH THE SENATE

Bar Out Asiatics-The Stand of Labor and the Immigration Question-Other Matters Discussed.

Mr. W. R. Trotter, who for the past two years has represented the Canadian Trades and Labor Congress in Great Britain, with reference to the immigration question, to do away with ndiscriminate immigration through alse reports of conditions existing in Canada, spoke at some length last night before an appreciative audience in St. George's Hall, on the subject, The Trades and Labor Congress, Its Work and Its Aims."

The Immigration Question.

"The immigration question is only ne of the many interests of the Trades and Labor Congress," said the speaker in introducing his remarks, "and we must not let it overshadow the other interests. The Trades and Labor Congress, at its next convention in Quebec, will celebrate its 25th anniversary, and every year the congress becomes more comprehensive. We have delegates in our convention from Cape Breton to Vancouver. This means a heavy drain on the different local councils.

"The Trades Congress is not a craft organization; the craft is only an in-The congress is the legislative head of the labor interests of Canada. New affiliations have been coming in in a most encouraging manner. Last year over 7,000 new applications

"We have today 25 international units in the Trades Congress, where four years ago we had only eleven. So you see that the labor interests are in favor of this movement.

'There are still some local unions that have not been included, and so we have to go to the local affiliations instead of meeting them through their international unions. And today there are 50,000 members in unions paying their affiliation dues, while those indirectly affiliated mean 100,000 more. "Parliament takes the records of
