BOLD DASH BY AMERICANS ON LORRAINE LINE

Sammles Raid to Second Works of Foe, Six Hundred Yards.

HUNS BOMBED NAPLES

Paris, March 11 .- American troops have made a bold raid into the German Mines in Lorraine, the war office an

With the American Army in France Sunday, March 10 .- American troops, co-operating with the French, have carried out three raids opposite the American sector in Lorraine. Two of the raids were executed simultaneously last night. The Americans swept past the German first line and penetrated to the enemy's second line, 600 yards back. the enemy's second line, 600 yards back. The Americans remained for 45 minutes in the enemy lines. They found excellent concrete dugorits, which they blew up, and also brought back large quantities of material and valuable papers. While they were in the enemy lines, German artillery began a vigorous counter-barrage. It was quickly slienced by American heavy and light artillery, which hurled large quantities of gas shells on the batteries.

Saon after these two raids had been carried out the Americans staged another at a point further along the line to the right. They went over the top after artillery preparation of 45 minutes, in which the enemy's positions attacked were destroyed. The two simultaneous raids were The two simultaneous raids were made after intense artillery preparation lasting for four hours, in which the German positions were levelled. At midnight two forces, with small French forces on their flanks, moved upon the German objectives behind a creeping barrage, each on a front of 600 yards. When the Americans reached the enemy first lines the barrage was !!fred so as to box in the German positions at both.

Winter Trench Warfare.

Canadian Army Headquarters, March II.—Scouting and patrol parties were turned back by Canadians at Lens several prisoners being taken. Finding himself beaten at trench warfare the enamy has been responsed. enemy has been resorting more persist-ently to gas shell attacks, on one occa-sion firing two thousand rounds. Activity is slowly increasing, especially in aerial fighting, in which the British have established a pronounced superiority. Canadians have had the better of winter trench warfare and their guns now dominate the enemy.



EXTRA MILLION ACRES ONTARIO'S **OBJECTIVE IN GREAT FOOD PUSH**

Ottawa, March 11.—The general basis of plans for co-operation between the Dominion Department of Agriculture and the Canada Food Board on the one hand, and the departments of agriculture of Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, and Prince Edward Island, in an extensive campaign for greater production in 1918, were agreed upon at the recent conference of provincial ministers of agriculture at Ottawa. Dr. James W. Robertson was appointed by the Dominion Minister of Agriculture and the Canada Food Board, to co-operate on their behalf with these provincial governments. Definite plans of organization are now in process of completion and application. Ontario has set for itself an objective of 1,000,000 additional acres of cereals and other cultivated crops, and also the greatest possible production per acre on all cultivated land. Quebec will do her best to pass her objective of 600,000 additional acres. The three Maritime Provinces are depended upon for increased crops to the extent of 400,000 acres, or an increase of 5 acres per farm

FIREMEN'S DEMANDS **GRANTED AS RESULT** THREATS TO STRIKE

Ultimatum Delivered to Mayor Has the Desired Effect.

HOLIDAYS START IS MAY

39 Members of the Local Fire Department Supported Demands.

Holidays for the city firemen will be franted in future at different times rom May to October, instead of being distributed over all the months of the year, as the practice has been in the past.
This announcement was made to the men by Fire Chief Aitken late Saturday afternoon after he had consulted with Mayor Somerville, members of the ard of control and the finance com

mayor somervine, members of the board of control and the finance committee.

The decision to allow the firemen to have their holidays during periods from May to October followed an ultimatum delivered by the men to Mayor Somerville on Saturday morning, in which the 39 men of the firemen's union informed him that their request had to be granted by 6 o'clock Saturday evening or every man on the department would go out on strike Monday morning.

The demand made by the firemen had the individual support of the men. With 39 men, the arrangements are such that three men may go on 14 days' holidays at the same time. The holidays for the 13 lots of men take up 26 weeks out of every year.

Objected Strongly.

Several of the men have strenuously objected to having their holidays set down for the winter months. All have wanted them at a time when they could get outside.

But few citizens realize that, except when called out to fires, the men on the department are tied to their respective halls 21 out of 24 hours of the day six days every week. The three hours off is the time spent by the men at their homes for their meals. They are, as part of their duty, called to sleep at the fire halls, except one night a week.

Want Real Holiday.

In view of these conditions, the firemen, as a matter of principle, considered it only right that their holidays should be granted at a time when they could spend them in the open, a direct change from the monotony of their daily lives.

So convinced were the firemen of the reasonableness of their request that the ultimatum was given unanimous support. port.

Rail-way and Townsite Company. The road way and Townsite Company. The road is only partially complete, and its present value is \$1,500,000. Some of the shareholders' liabilities listed as assets, \$273,121.97, were doubtful, as Mr. Buchner said many of the stockholders were unable to pay the balance due. He said the debenture holders had prior claim on the assets. He mentioned probable action against directors to recover dividends paid since the company became insolvent. These dividends, he



Germany's power to deal with the smaller peoples of the Balkans and with the disorganized and distracted Russians is the thing the

distracted Russians is the thing the world has to face.

But with the disappearance of Rumania from the battle line, with the imposition by Germany of what amounts to a death sentence upon all Rumania's aspirations, and in fact upon all of her liberties, the nations of the west must perceive with even greater clarity the task which is before them. Rumania has fallen fighting bravely; she has surrendered only when, twice betrayed, she had no further power to resist. The duty of her former allies to her remains unchanged by her forced surrender. If she is deserted, if the west accepts the German treaty with Rumania, then not alone Rumania, but all the little peoples will be placed under the shadow of German domination without hope of future resistance.

THE "WHY" OF THE U. S. TIE-UP.

WRITER in Collier's Weekly blames governmental regulation for all the chaos and confusion which brought on heatless days and tied-up industry in the United States this winter. He charges that the railroad situation and the coal famine were not due to any tremendous expansion of industry, but to the "butting in" of the Government at a time when the railroads and coal mines were in a position to give service that would have kept freight moving and kept every

coalbin full. The Government of the United States had agreed to a price of \$3 per ton for coal at the mines. This was repudiated, and reduced to \$2 a ton. The result, according to Collier's, was to cause one-third of the mines to suspend and to curtail production from the time the order was changed. Had the \$3 guarantee been adhered to, it is claimed that the later production would have been ample. The quality of coal immediately deteriorated. Ships had to carry from 50 to 100 per cent more in their bunkers, power plants ost much of their capacity. The 550,000,000 tons, of coal mined last year produced at least onefifth less heat and power than the smaller quantity mined the year before. Production was speeded up only before the price was cut.

After the hair is carefully unrolled from the curiers, comb it out rather well, so that the wave will fall naturally.

A tight wave isn't graceful and is too stiff for arranging artistically. A soft, irregular wave is more youthful than one in which the waved lines are too pronounced and symmetrical. Never allow your hair to wave so tightly that it "kinks." If at any time it becomes too curly, brush it well to remove some of the curi, and if necessary, slightly the curl, and if necessary, shightly dampen the bristles of the brush.

Five Unusual and Delicious Ways to Use Cornmeal. 4 cupfuls of boiling water

Have you tried cornmeal in some of the other-than-breakfast dishes. Many people find the rather insipid flavor of cornmeal unpalatable, but relish it if prepared in some other way. Cornmeal needs a dash of spicy flavoring, and there are numerous ways of changand there are numerous the other-than-breakfast dishes. Many

Hot Tamales.

1 cupful of chopped boiled chicken
1 cupful or cornmeal
1 teaspoonful of sait
1 teaspoonful of finely chopped onion
% teaspoonful of cayenne
Bolling water
Pour boiling water over the cornmeal in sufficient, quantity to make a stiff paste, and stir until smooth, shape by spoonfuls into flat cakes and then mix with one tablespoonful of the chicken, which has been mixed with seasoning. The genuine hot tamales are made by wrapping each cake of cornmeal and chicken mixture in a corn husk which has been first immersed in boiling water. The ends of the husk, which is filled with the amixture, are then removed; the husk is tied with string from end to end and dropped into boiling water for 20 minutes.


