Rilles and Other Arms Captured

Tokio. Jan. 19.—Sixty thousand stands of arms and some 6,000,000 of cartridges is a purchase recently made by Abyssinia. Both arms and ammunition were part of Japan's spoils of war, and were taken at Port Arthur during the last war. It is well known that these arms have been offered by the war department for sale, and it is now admitted that they have actually been sold, and that in a few days they will leave a port in Japan for the French port of Jibutil.

An old resident of Tokio—a foreigner was the purchases from the war department, and his sale of the arms and ammunition was made in Paris directly with the agents of the Abyssinian government. The price paid is not stated, but the seller says that he has already been paid. It is not improbable that a good deal more will be heard of this matter, as the British government is much concerned and has been making anxious inquiry.

The Japanese war department, however, professes to be entirely an innocent party, and asserts its full right jo dispose of the stock after securing an assurance that the arms were not to be sold to a belligerent country at war with a friendly power.

It is from the French port of Jibbuil that arms have been conveyed to Muscat, close to the entrance of the Persian golf, and passed on to war like natives on the northwest frontier of India. This may partly account for the British inquiries. Such a huge consignment of arms could hardly be intended for Abyssinia alone.

The Anglo-Egyptian Sudan, moreover, and British Somaliland border on Abyssinia, and the importation of these munitions of war might easily cause sbme anxiety to the British government. The French in the Wadal country, on the other side of the Egyptian Sudan, recently met with a freverse, owing to the fact that the natives were well armed.


