Early Morning Blaze Caused by Defective Wiring in Connection With Electric Stove in Kitchen-Nurse Brings a Woman Patient Down Fire Escape-Work of Volunteers in Saving Valuable Equipment Is Praised.

Gravenhurst, Nov. 30.—Two hundred patients in the Muskoka Free Hospital for Consumptives were carried to safety try this morning when fire destroyed the main buildings of the institution. One of the outstanding incidents was the heroism of Miss Lillian Powell, a nurse, of Toronto, who carried another woman to safety.

Miss Powell, the patient nurse in the main building, is given much praise for her action in carrying a woman down the fire escape from a second-story window. The fact-that the main building was devoted to bed cases made the work of clearing the wards more than ordinarily difficult.

The fire started very early this morning from wires connected with the electric stove in the diet kitchen. As the work of rescuing the patients proceeded the flames enveloped the main building, the kitchen and the dining-room, and in spite of the fire fighters these structures were a total loss. The whole town of Gravenhurst turned out to help in the work of rescuing patients, many of them unable to help themselves. Mr. Archie Sloan, former mayor, got out of a sick bed in order to run the fire engine.

With the aid of horses the fire brigade pushed the heavy engine two miles over bad roads to the hospital. Volunteers Dld Good Work.

Good work was done by the volunteers from the town. Not only were the sick and helpless saved from the burning buildings without the loss of a single life, but valuable equipment was carried out before the fire could reach it. ARMED CAMP; EVERY PRECAUTION IS TAKEN AGAINST SINN FEINERS

Public Buildings in Large Cities Throughout England Are Under Guard—Several M en Suspected of Incendiarism in Liverpool Are Placed Under Arrest.

London, Nov. 30.—Public buildings in London and in many of the other large cities of England were closely guarded against apprehended Sinn Fein attacks by heavy detachments of police and detectives last night. In this city the patrol was not limited to the streets, but armed motorboats moved up and down the Thames in front of the Parliament Buildings. With Downing street and its immediate neighborhood shut off from the rest of the city by a high fence, which was constantly under the eyes of uniformed men, and with the Parliament Buildings sentineled Government sections of London today assumed the atmosphere of an armed camp.

There is nothing to connect the Sinn Fein with the explosion of a bomb in a warehouse in Old Swan Lane, this city, early this morning, but the people of the city ascribed it to that organization.

Extra police guards have been posted in municipal and other buildings in Glasgow, while the docks and quays of the Clyde are being strongly guarded. License Inspector J. W. McCallum who has just returned from a shooting trip in Northern Ontario, has brought back with him an interesting curio in the form of a beaver's jaw. The teeth are well preserved in the specimen and are well preserved in the specimen and the inspector pointed out a number of peculiarities in connection with them. They are formed of two kinds of materials a hard shiny exterior and a softer centre. The soft substance wears away with comparative ease thus forming sharp edges of the harder covering. The same principle applies to the two tusks or cutting teeth. These, according to Mr. McCallum.grow as they are worn away. The specimen These, according to Mr. McCallum, grow as they are worn away. The specimen which he has extends more than an inch into the jawbone. On the outer side it is so hard that a file can scarcely make a mark on it, but on the inner side it wears away rapidly and maintains a sharp cutting edge with which the beaver cuts his way through huge trees. Mr. McCallum also has part of a small tree which has been grawed by beavers.

ESTIMATES WRONG

Contends That Revenues Ex- In Most Instances Wages Are pected Could Not Be Paid by Lines.

TORONTO, Nov. 29 .- Engineer Wm. E. Tyee, former chief engineer of the Canadian Pacific Railway, now a conhere today before the commission investigating the Ontario Hydro-Electric Power Commission's hydro radial projects, expressed the opinion that the province of Ontario could not support the proposed 325 miles of radial railways planned by the Hydro-Electric Power Commission.

Mr. Tyee asserted that there was absolutely no necessity for the proposed systems of radials, the estimated cost of construction of which, he said, was abnormally high and the estimated operating costs abnormally low. The tountry is already well supplied with railways, Engineer Tyee said, but there might be necessity for "occasional new branches here and there."

The hydro commission's estimated revenues from the radials were altogether too high, according to Mr. Tyee, and could not be paid out of the earnings.

Steve Cupiluk Must Stand Trial For Brantford



NEW YORK. Nov. 29 .- (Canadian Press.)-Advices from various parts of the United States, widely scattered, of sulting engineer in Montreal, testifying the reopening of factories closed during the recent industrial readjustment, are taken in New York business circles as indicating the beginning of a gradual improvement in business conditions. 

Please advise how to get rid of lice in the heads of my children, picked up presumably in school. We have tried everything we have heard of without success. Will it be necessary to cut their hair?

Answer—No. Saturate the hair for three hours with equal parts of kerosene and vinegar, and cover with a towel or bathing cap. See that the children are kept away from flames. Then shampoo, and dry the hair. If any nits are found on the hair shafts close to the scalp, these are best removed by drawing strands of hair through a soft cloth wet each time with hot vinegar. Patience and perseverance will overcome the invasion. You must repeat the treatment every day or every alternate day as long as lice or nits remain. GRAND TRUNK LINE SEEKS PAYMENT II **U. S. SUPREME COURT**

Takes Action Against Secretary of Treasury For Half

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—Mandamus proceedings against the secretary of the treasury were instituted today in the District of Columbia supreme court by the Grand Trunk Western Railway Company to require payment of an inter-state commerce commission certificate calling for \$500,000 as due the road under the guaranty provisions of the transportation act. The court issued an order returnable December 7, requiring Secretary Houston to show requiring Secretary Houston to show cause why the writ should not be granted.

While the Grand Trunk Company is the only petitioner in the case, approximately \$400,000,000 claimed by the railroads is involved in the litigation, according to a statement issued tonight.

according to a statement issued tonight by the Association of Railway

according to a statement issued tonight by the Association of Railway Executives.

The proceedings grew out of an opinion rendered October 7 by the comptroller of the treasury, based upon certain certificates presented by the inter-state commerce commission, to the treasury department in favor of the Grand Trunk Western Railway Company and the Detroit, Grand Haven and Milwaukee Railroad, in which opinion the comptroller of the treasury held that partial payments could not be made by the secretary of the treasury to a carrier in advance of final settlement with the roads in winding up the government guarantees in connection with public administration of the systems.

The comptroller took the position that the inter-state commerce commission was empowered to issue only one certificate to each carrier, this being for the full amount of final settlement.


