ary falls on this date. Eighty years ago a nurse was a drudge. In fact, she was a so-called "ward maid," whose social standing was that of a scrubwoman. Into this environment, with no thought of personal comfort, Florence Nightingale, member of a distingusihed English amily, voluntarily placed herself.

To be of service to others was her notive, but this laudable thought was not entertained by her friends and relatives, who were greatly shocked when she began nursing the It was Florence Nightingale who

### BLOW UP COAL MINE IN PENNSYLVANIA TOWNSHIP

Believed Strike Sympathizers Are Responsible For Destruction of Peterman Property.

Pittsburg, Pa., May 12.—The Peterman Mine in Pennsylvania Township, near here, was blown up early today by a heavy charge of dynamite which threw stones so far that the farmhouse of George Wessel, almost a quarter of a mile away was damaged. Sheriff Woodside, with big force of deputies, left Pittsburg shortly after 9 a.m. for the mine, where, it was reported, a body of coal strike sympathizers had collect-

Ten minutes after the deputies left Pittsburg, Peterman said over the telephone from his home in Oakmont, Pa., that the men who had attacked his place were hastening in automobiles to the mine of Joseph Schenck, half a mile away. One of the automobiles contained dynamite Peterman said, and members of the crowd said they were going to "get the Schenck mine.'

Peterman said that the men had zone to his mine shortly before day break and planting a heavy charge of dynamite in the mouth of the drift completely destroyed it. They then disappeared, only to gather again, he said. No one was hurt by the explosion.





LLOYD GEORGE. By Mr. Punch, with an introduction by W. Algernon Locker. McClelland & Stew art. Publishers, Toronto. \$1.50.

TODAY, when David Lloyd George, premier of Great Britain, is attempting to secure the economic peace of Europe at Genoa, while battling Germany and Russia on one front, while France and Belgium harass him on the other, nothing in the literary world could be more welcome to Ontario ad-mirers of the tenacious little Welshman than this delightful biography in caricature, compiled from the pages of Punch.

The first eartoon of Lloyd George which ever appeared in Punch was printed in 1900. It was called "Ll-yd G-rge and the Dragon," and por-trayed the then humble member of parliament standing, with his hands on his hips, gazing in indomitable fashion at a snorting dragon, which in facial characteristics faint resemblance to the Rt. Hon. Joseph Chamberlain.

The picture was occasioned by Lloyd George's vigorous attacks upon Chamberlain in connection with

the South African war. It was not until two years later that another caricature of the present prime minister manifested itself, and this second one is reproduced in the volume. On July 29, 1903, however, he reappears. Here we find parliament represented as "The Old Woman Who Lived In a Shoe," lamenting over the number of "groups" into which the old historic parties had been split. The head and shoulders of Lloyd George protrude out of the shoe, together with several other recognizable figures, and he is waving a banner upon which is printed "Liberal Anti-Imperialists.'

As one turns over the pages many an entertaining and keen thrust at contemporary events is to be noted. If, for any reason, the head set is believed to be damaged in any way, there is an easy way to test

Place a one-cent piece on the table and on that place a slightly larger piece of tissue paper that had pre-viously been soaked in vinegar. On the wet paper place a five-cent coin. Then another vinegar-soaked paper another cent piece and so on for four or six layers.

Place the head set over your ears and take a tip of the telephone cord in each hand. Touch one tip to the bottom coin, which should be a cent piece, and the other tip to the top oin-a nickel without any paper of

By holding the phone cord tip to the bottom coin and tapping the top nickel coin lightly with the other tip, a clicking noise will be heard if he receivers are in good condition This noise is caused by the closing of an electrical circuit between the coins and the phones. The stack of coins and wet paper form a delicate electric generator.

The efficiency of the phones can be estimated from the amount of coins used in the stack. The lower the stack the better the phones.







Although several complaints have already been received from servants of the government in Western Ontario, no protests had been received up to Wednesday night from Lon-don, Brantford and Stratford, Among the first complaints to be received was one from St. Thomas and one

from the riding of North Huron. In practically all cases complaint was made that the cuts announced by the government were much too

To assist the flax producers of Western Ontario to seek new markets, a representative of the agricultural department of the Dominion government is at the present time touring Great Britain and Ireland. He has with him three carloads of flax grown at various points in the counties of Middlesex, Huron, and Perth, which he is endeavoring

to place upon the British markets.

Although he has been gone nearly six weeks, little success has attend-Ireland without results, and the last report received from him stated that he was en route to Scotland. Be-cause of the more settled condition of Scotland and England it is ex-pected that they will offer a more promising field than Ireland.

Flax producers in Western Ontario are in straightened circumstances, owing to the condition of the linen market since the year 1920. Practically the whole of that season's crop is still in the warehouses unsold. The crop in 1921 was materially reduced as a result, and this year the acreage of flax is very small

Because it was feared that the industry was threatened with extinction, the government is endeavoring to do everything in its power to as-sist the producers. In addition to seeking out markets and the establishment of a mill at Clinton, experiments in flax raising and in the use of labor-saving devices are being carried out at the central farm at

HON. CHARLES STEWART, minister of the interior and of Indian affairs, will visit the Six Na-tions Indian Reserve on the Grand River Monday next to make a personal investigation into the troubles which apparently have stirred his wards into a rebellious mood.

The minister originally intended to visit the reserve in July next or at the end of the present session, but on Wednesday he decided that the situation had become grave enough to warrant an immediate investigation. He is hopeful that a peace ful settlement will be reached.

On two occasions since the present government came into power Hon. Mr. Stewart has endeavored to fathom the difficulties by hearing deputations from the reserve council at his office in Ottawa. While at the time the chiefs seemed satisfled with the results of the parleys, they evidently failed to establish eace, for no sooner the Indians returned to the reserve than trouble broke out again. The minister therefore believes that little can be accomplished by receiving further deputations.

ONE of the longest speeches of the session was made yesterday when W. C. Wood, Progressive member for Brant, spoke for 1 hour and 45 minutes on his proposed resolution on proportional representation and the alternative voting system for electing members to the House of Commons. When typed in preparation for Hansard the speech

covered 55 sheets of paper.
Needless to say the subject was covered fully, but in addition to this the matter was well thought out and clearly expressed. Indeed, Mr. Good's presentation of the case drew flattering comments from A. R. Mc-Master, Liberal member from Brome, who supported the resolution.


Mr. Good also won the support of Hon. T. A. Crerar and favorable comments from Premier W. L. Mackenzie King. The only opposition given during the whole debate, which lasted all afternoon, came from Leon J. Ladner, Conservative member for Vancouver.

Mr. Good presented facts gleaned from the political experiences of many European nations and of Great Britain. He gave statistics and figures for practically every election, provincial or federal, in Canada during the past 30 years. The debate was adjourned at 6 o'clock, there being no evening session.

## SURE KIWANIS IDEAL IS BEST

Taylor Statten, National Secretary of Boys' Work Board, Speaks.

### Declares London Ranks High As Place To Develop Boys.

"I do not believe that any organi zation has a better ideal than Kiwanis, the ideal of unselfishness, the golden rule, combined with the motto 'We build,' for aiding boys' work,' Taylor Statten, national executive secretary of the Boys' Work Board in Canada, told the members of the Kiwanis Club at their weekly luncheon in the Tecumseh House on Fri-

Mr. Statten explained to the Kiwanians by giving a short sketch of boy life before the war, and by telling of the ideal that was impressed on the minds of the German youth for 40 years before the great struggle how church organizations, clubs and the Y. M. C. A. throughout Canada is trying to educate the Canadian boys to the four-fold ideal, the four H's, head, health, heart and hand.

"Perhaps the greatest influence in the life of the boy," said Mr. Statten, and at a time when he needs help the most, is the influence of the gang, the club, or the body of men with whom he comes in contact. If it's a good thing for a full grown man to be a Kiwanian, think of how much it will mean to the growing boy, who is so susceptible to idealism, to belong to a club with such high ideals as those of the Kiwanis Club.




