





Canada's Military Policy.

Sir Frederick Borden has been de scribing to the House of Commons his plans for increasing the defensive strength of the country. He throws ou programme, but for the purpose of discussion, that all the young men of Canada under the age of 21 should be asked to undergo three annual trainings in the militia. In this he is coneiderably in advance of public opinion, and there is not much likelihood that the proposal will have anything more than an academic interest, in the near future at least. Sir Frederick expresses the view that the voluntary system is good enough for Canada, and he intends conferring with the Provincial Governments to ascertain whether they will co-operate in some uniforn method of imparting military education in the secondary schools.

Sir Frederick's policy, based upor the recommendations of the new militia council, contemplates the increase of the military establishment of Canada to 60,000 men. The fact that the Canadian west is a country of good horsemen will be turned to account. Five regiments of mounted infantry will be established there. Two new squadrons of Royal Canadian Dragoons, one in Quebec, the other in New Brunswick, will be formed. The artiflery service will be vastly improved by the creation of new batteries and the purchase of heavier ordnance. It is announced that English firms intend building branch factories in this country to build big guns. Schools of artillery instruction will be located in the larger provinces, and a department at Quebec to deal with higher instruction in coast defense and mobile branches of artillery. The permanent force will be increased from 1,900 to 3,000 at once, and ultimately to 4,000 by reason of taking over the defenses of Halifax and Esquimalt. The minister's programme is an am-

bitious one and should silence Tory critics, who claim that a Liberal Administration is indifferent to the military side of national life.

Protestant pastors and Jewish rabbis were included in the provisions. The Combes bill proposed to withdraw these grants, amounting to \$8,000,000 or \$10,000,000 per year, throwing the clergy upon the voluntary support of the laity. Volter's object is to show that the writers of the earlier books of the Old Testament only reproduced the Egyptian sagas and myths, slightly The fire altering and adjusting them to suit the theoretical tendencies of the Hebrews.

The histories of Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Esau, Joseph and Moses are, he declares, purely Egyptian, with
