Toronto, Feb. 14.—In the House yesterday the public accounts were laid on the table of the House. The total receipts for 1990 were \$4,192,940.—18, as against \$4,096,464 for 1899. The total expenditure was \$4,003,729.39, as against \$3,710,420 in 1899, the balance being \$209,147.51, as against \$386,074 the year before.

The chief items in the receipts are: Crown lands, \$68,861.43, a decrease; rent, \$69,714.41, a decrease; woods and forests. \$1,276,376.48, an increase: past year has been the most prosper-ous since the college was established in 1874. The enrolled attendance during the year was 259 students in the college, in addition to which there were 84 students in the special dairy course.

The coming Ontario budget will, is expected, show a slight deficit.

One thing is certain, we must have an engineer. The citizens three years ago unanimously voted that we should have a permanent engineer, and the council as servants of the people have no right to say that the city shall dispense with the services of such an dispense with the services of such an officer. It is absolutely necessary to have one. Public works have been too much jumbled and muddled by not having a proper officer to superintend the works, for that which is everybody's business is nobody's business. If the council, after a thorough enquiry, conclude that J. W. Shackleton is incompetent, then we shall at once advertise for a competent man. No specific charges of incompetency have, however, been laid against Mir. Shackleton. One thing sure, however, an engineer we must against Mr. Shackleton. One thing sure, however, an engineer we must have, and I, as chairman of the board of works, do not propose that we shall drift back into the shades of long ago by dispensing with the office of city engineer. I would absolutely refuse to act on the board as chairman or have any connection with the committee ein any shape or form whatsoever if that were done.

Canadian Railroads in Danger of Absorption by the American Combine.

Government Urged to Buy Canadia Pacific and Grand Trunk Before Corpo ations do.

Ottawa, Feb. 14.-In a somewhat nsational speech delivered in the House, Mr. McLean, of York, called. the attention of the government to what he claimed to be a matter full of menace to Canada, namely, the raidway situation in the United States,

where, he pointed out, most of the principal roads were now in the hands of half a dozen men.

He asserted that there was immediate danger of this giant octopus absorbing the Grand Trunk and Canadian Pacific roads as well. Already tracers were out locating the stock of these two Camadian lines, and they

these two Camdian lines, and they were likely at any moment to come under American control. Fifty millions, he said, would suffice to secure control of the Canadian Pacific.

To offset the peril which now menaced Canada's national highway from ocean to ocean, McLean advocated its purchase by the government, otherwise these Americans would have no difficulty in wiping, figuratively speaking, the name of Canada off the map.

TO BE REVIEWED BY KING EDWARD.

Strathcona's Horse Will be Presented With Medals-All but One in Good Health

London, Feb. 14.-King Edward will review Strathcona's Horse to-morrow (Friday) moning for the purpose of conferring the medals earned in South Africa. The Canadians will arrive in Africa. The Canadians will arrive in London to-day and will be allowed to-view the King's procession to Partiament. They will then return to barracks and wait for the review. The officers will attend this afternoon at the War Office to get the medals, which will then be sent to Buckingham Palace. To-morrow morning the regiment will be driven to Apsley Gate, Hyde Park, from which point they will march to Buckingham Palace, accompanied by a band from the Foot Guards. On their arrival at the gardens of the palace the King will Foot Guards. On their arrival at the gardens of the palace the King will review them and present the medals. With the exception of six, who are suffering from typhoid and were landed at Gravesend, the troopers are alt in good health. Elaborate arrangements have been made to entertain them in London. They will sail for Canada on the Numidian Feb. 25.

THE DUTY ON OIL.

A petition to Parliam extensively circulated amongst business men and manufacturers in Ontario, asking that the import duty be removed from petroleum and its products, says the Toronto Sun. The duty now levied is five cents per gallon on illuminating oil, which averages about 60 per cent on importations. This is certainly a heavy duty, The old story of the infant industry will hardly be brought out to serve as an apology, for there is a limit even to partizan credulity. The Standard Oil Company cannot be classed as an infantile. Its adolescence can no longer make public sympathy. It controls, through stock ownership, the oil refining business of Canada, and handles the entire Canadian output. Canada is an oil importing country. The local supply is not equal to the requirements. large quantity must be obtained from the United States, and it is the price of this, with the duty added, that determines the price of the local product. According to reports of the Ontario Bureau of Mines the output in this Province is valued at over a million dollars. This means that the Canadian oil comsumers are forced to pay the Standard Oil operators about \$600,000 more than the value of their oil every year. This is a nice little present for the owners of the great monopoly, perhaps not much to them, but a great deal to the people of Canada, who pay it. It is possible, as Mr. E. B. Osler said of the railway subsidies, that a part of it finds its way to the pockets of the politicians who Some of it goes to the well owners, and heretofore the Standard operators have been able to enlist their support in sustaining the protec-

The well owners are numerous, and for that reason are influential politically. They are the owners of the oilbearing lands, and many have one or two wells augmenting the revenues of their farms. The refinery controlled by the great monopoly is the only purchaser, and fixes the price so as to encourage the desirable activity among well owners. The threat of a reduction of price is held over their heads so as to make them active in defending the special privileges conferred by the protective tariff. The only fair way for parliament to mediate between oil producers and oil pusers is to give no special favors. If the price be increased to the comsumers some wells now idle will be pumped. If the price be lowered soma wells now level to strike is the natural price established by competition without the influence of a needless tariff. Justice would demand an extension of the system so as to give the oil producers their machinery and supplies equally 1 . 1 (11 61 1211

MICHIGAN'S LOSS IS ONTARIO'S GAIN

It took the Conservative party in the Ontario Legislature some eight or ten years to induce the Ontario Government to prohibit the export of On tario pine logs to Michigan. The Government depends largely on the re ceipts from the sale of timber for its revenue and it feared that if it forbid Michigan mill men taking the logs into that state for manufacture they would not buy our timber limits. But finally, with a provincial election looming up, the embargo was put or There was a cry to the effect that Michigan lumbermen were handsomely subscribing to Premier Hardy's election fund. The report was having considerable effect and the only way the Government could meet it was to accept the oft-repeated suggestion of Mr. Whitney and his friends and prohibit the export of pine longs. This was done with many misgivings. It was predicted it would depopulate our lumber woods and kill our timber industry. Well, it has done just the reverse. Aubrey White, of the Crown Lands Department, Toronto, furnishes the Detroit Tribune with the following information in an interview concerning the result of the new pol-

Twelve firms have removed their saw-mills from Michigan to Ontario, nine large new mills have been erected in Ontario since April, 1898, when the policy went in force and three firms which had mills on both sides of the line have enlarged those in Ontario. The correspondent says: "It is estimated that between 150,000,000 and 200, 900,000 feet of pine formerly sawn in Michigan has been prepared for the market in Ontario each year since the embargo went into force. The price paid per thousand for dressing is from \$2.25 to \$2.50. Palumbo has a family in Italy to whom he sends his earnings, On retir-ing on the night of Nov. 3 he accidentally turned on the gas. He was found unconscious next day and was taken to the Harlem hospital and while in a state of semi-consciousness, was transferred to the alcoholic ward in

Bellevue.
"I regained consciousness on the third day," said Palumbo, "and found myself tied to a cot. My feet were fastened, and there were leather handless around my wrists, connectbracelets around my wrists, connected by a rope beneath the cot. I went to sleep in that condition, and awakened by blows on my body. "A man was beating me with a stick, for no reason that I could learn beat me on the arms and legs un

tal I was covered with bruises. pain was so great that several times I jumped two feet from the bed. "On the next day the nurses punche me in the side with their fists. When-ever they entered the cell they struck me on the head or body with a stick

or with their fists.

"In addition to that, I was nearly starved. One of the doctors ordered me some chicken broth and sent a nurse to get it. The nurse closed the door and never brought me the broth. Palumbo insisted on leaving the hospital, and was discharged on Nov. 11, He left, walking with a crutch , and was confined to his bed for two weeks On his recovery he went to Bellevue

to make a complaint, but could not find the proper persons with whom to lodge such a charge. He says he will sue the city for damages.

Paris, Feb. 14.-At a conference of the Museum of Natural History, Prof. D'Arsonval showed some experiments with liquified air at a temperature of minus 180 degrees centigrade. The liquid can be kept in double-sided silver-covered bottles, from which it will

not evaporate. It was shown that the liquified air destroys the elasticity of India rubber, which becomes hard and as brittle as glass. It can then be pulverized When the air has evaporated the India rubber again becomes elastic. Meat can be treated in the same manner. Prof. D'Arsonval showed a beefsteak that had been dipped in liquid air. He let it fall, and when it struck the let it fall, and when it struck the platform it sounded like a stone. It broke
into pieces. Meats can be reduced to
a powder that is easy to masticate
and assimilate. In this form it will
be found important for use in hospitals. Ice depped into the liquified air
will cut glass like a diamond, and
mercury will become as hard as anti-

Liquified air cannot be used to pre serve meat, because it is in now antiseptic and does not kill microb It is five times dearer than ice. cannot be used for motors or submar-ine boats, because when it is heated ine boats, because when it is heated it becomes such an explosive that no metal could resist it. Prof. D'Arson-val warned the public to beware of companies collecting money for preserving meat or propelling motors by means of liquid air. Personal experiments, he said, showed that this could not the decay.



"Ancient official documents show that when George Washington signed his name during the early part of his first administration he frequently wrote it 'George Washington,' although his favorite signature and the one he commonly signed was 'Go. Washington.' It has also been found on documents written 'G. Washington.' Doubts may be entertained as to the accuracy of this statement, as the almost universal signature known to the public is with his first name abbreviated 'Go.,' but the facts are as I state them.

"When Mr. Lincoln first entered the White House, he always signed his name in full, 'Abraham Lincoln.' Subsequently he abbreviated his official signature to the 'A. Lincoln' of familiar sight.

"Mr. Cleveland elided one of his Christian names before he came to Washington, and he always wrote 'Grover Cieveland' in full.

"It cannot be said with exactness "It cannot be said with exactness which of the cabinet officers signs his name the most frequently. I believe, however, that it is the postmaster general. Not only does he affix his signature to the countless official papers of the department in common with his confreres, but he signs the commissions of all the postmasters of the fourth class. all the postmasters of the fourth class, and they approximate 70,000. Some-times one postoffice will be commission-ed several times during the term of the incumbent postmaster general, and it would not be far out of the way to say that he signs from 80,000 to 100,000 fourth class postmasters' commissions during his term.

"Cabinet officers acquire great rapidity in making these formal signatures, and they hurry through with it, as it is a task and blocks other more important work. Messengers stand by the side of the chief presenting the commissions or papers with one hand while they quickly blot each signature as made with the other."

OILS FROM THE WHALE.

They Possess Certain Qualities Which Keep Them In Demand. "Whale oil," said a dealer in oils, "is to ome extent used as a lubricating oil, but not to a very large extent. When used for lubricating purposes, it is more often compounded with mineral oils, which are cheaper. Whale oil is used for tempering steel. It is still used in a limited way

by some people as an illuminating oil.
Whale oil is used for making whale oil soap, used for killing worms on trees.
"Sperm oil is a fine lubricating oil, used on fine machinery, large and small. The fine sewing machine oil is likely to be sperm oil. It is used for illuminating purposes in safety lamps in warehouses, be-cause of its small liability to explode, sperm standing a higher degree of heat than mineral oils. It is used as a signal oil on shipboard, for lamps and lanterns and for side lights, and so on, and on steamers for a lubricating oil. For all these purposes mineral oils and lubricat-ing compounds have more or less sup-planted it because of their greater cheapness, but sperm oil is nevertheless in de-mand for them. There are some other uses for whale oil and for sperm oil, which are still sold to larger and smaller

users by the barrel or the can or gallon. "The desirable qualities for some uses of these oils, once so commonly used, make a market for the comparatively small and diminishing quantities of them now brought to sale, even though their prices are higher than those of the oils that

are nigher than those of the oils that have so commonly supplanted them.

"There is an oil produced from some part of the head of the whale that is much more costly than either whale oil or sperm oil. It sells in fact for as much as \$10 a gallon. This is watch oil, and it may be bought of dealers in watch sup-plies. It is used for oiling watches and also for oiling the arbors or journals of the wheels of tower clocks. It is not only a fine lubricant, but it withstands cold remarkably well, not freezing except at an extremely low temperature, for which reason it is very desirable for such use in cold and exposed situations."

Some minor verbal changes were made, and the eleventh section of the bill was stricken out entirely, but the changes do not alter the spirit of the measure. The amendment

THE FATE OF CHARLIE ROSS.

Ex-Mayor Briest, of Trenton. Throws Some Light on the

Once Famous Kidnapping Case-Hov the Philadelphia Detectives Made Their Great Mistake.

Ex-Mayor John Briest, of Trenton knows about the kidnaping of Charley Ross. He was brought into the case because it was believed at first that the boy was hidden in or about Tren ton, and the police wanted Mr. Briest's help in searching for him. Yost of his knowledge of the case came from the Philadelphia detec-

"The secret as to who the kidnapers were was confined to the heads of the Philadelphia and New York polive departments, and both supposed that they were on a boat plying either on the Delaware and Raritan or the Pennsylvania Canal, the letters being posted from Trenton, Bristol, New Brunswick and Newark tending to confirm the theory. tives. Mr. Briest says :-

"The detectives felt so certain that "The detectives felt so certain that they would have the kidnapers within a few days, and receive the credit and reward, that their identity was kept a close secret among themselves. Had the matter been made as public as was the Cudahy affair, at Omaha, the criminal abductors would have been arrested within a few days by the police officers of Newark, Jersey City or Bayonne. Their theory that the kidnapers were on a boat was correct, but it was not the kind of a boat they were looking for, as it afterward turned out.

"William Mosher and Joseph Douglas were the abductors. They had

"William Mosher and Joseph Douglas were the abductors. They had been peddlers and engaged in an oil and lamp store in Philadelphia, with a branch store in this city in charge of other parties. The wagon was one that had been used in the business. They brought Charley from Germantown to this city over the lower Delaware bridge, and through Bridge street to Hamilton avenue, and across the State to a yacht they had prepared for the purpose on Riritan Bay. The detectives had the right parties but they were on the wrong scent for but they were on the wrong scent for the bout, and the kidnapers kept them so by depositing their letters, in the Trenton Post Office and other

the Trenton Post Office and other cities near it.

"Mosher and Douglas no doubt kept Charley Ross on that boat while they sailed around Newark, Raritan and New York bays and adjacent waters and up the Hudson River on marauding expeditions to maintain themselves. There he was secure from prying eyes and gossipy neighbors.

"Charley Ross died not more than three months after his capture, from neglect, home-sickness and disease, and his little body was buried in the waters of Newark Bay. The body of a boy about his size and age, dressed in clothes too large for him, as if they had been purchased at random, was found floating on the bay, and turned over to the authorities of Jersey City. Mr. Ross was called over to see it, but he failed to identify it as that of his lost child.

"Whather it was the body of the boy whose fate had touched the hearts of millions of mothers and fathers throughout the and I am not prepared to say. loved, and for whom he had striven hard to earn honest dollars, but powerty had been the lot of him and his, and his wife said that they had his, and his wife said that they had always been poor, and he took that means to secure money to secure some of the luxuries of life that others were enjoying, and which he coveted. He had no idea of doing harm to the boy, but thought that he would be ransomed within a very short time. ransomed within a very short time.
"Douglas was only a weak man in
Mosher's hands, and was under his Mosher's heads, and was under his subjection. The mistake of the de-tectives was in the kind of boat the kidnapers were on, and in keeping within themselves the rames and de-scriptions of the abductors. Full and general publicity at the start would have resulted in their capture, and the restoration of the boy to his doving and almost broken-hearted parents.

"On the night of Dec. 14, 1875, Mosher and Douglas broke into the house of Judge Van Brunt, at Bay Ridge, L. I., and were discovered. Mosher was and were discovered. Mosher was shot and killed. As Douglas lay on shot and killed. As Douglas lay on the grass plat where he had been car-ried, wounded unto death, he said:— 'We stole Charley Ross.' He was urged to say more, being assured that Mosher was dead, but he would not believe it, and died before he could again open his lips.

HE SIGNED TWO DEATH WARRANTS.

King Fdward Resumes Control Over the Life and Death of the Con-

veek King Elward has signed two death warrants ordering the execution of murderers condemned to capital punishment. This shows that he has resumed one of the most important prerogatives of the Crown, which was surrendered by Queen Victoria shortly surrendered by Queen Victoria shortly after her accession, but only for the duration of her reign, to the Secretary of State to the Home Department.

In all continental monarchial countries it is the sovereign alone who has the right of life and death over his subjects. None can be sent to the scaffold, no matter how he may have been condemned by the courts, until the warrant for his execution has received the rayal sign manual, which ceived the royal sign manual, which

may be withheld on granted as the monarch sees fit.

With this prerogative goes that of clemency, and in resuming the right of signing death warrants, King Edward has likewise resumed the right of granting pardon to eriminals.

The reason this prerogative was surrendered by Queen Vactoria was because, being a young girl, it was regraded as too great a tax upon her feelings to ask her to sign warrants taking the life of her fellow-creatures,

LOST SHIP WAS

Every Soul Aboard Perished -St. Johns Nfld , in Great Grief.

St. John's, Nfid., Feb. 14.—A lot of wreckage has been found in the vicinity of Bicalieu, a small island to the east of the Avalom peninsula, and at various other points on the south-east of Newfoundland. It is almost certain that the Lucerne was the victim of the disaster near Bacalieu. A message from the agent to the

victim of the disaster near Bacalieu.

A message from the agent to the owners says:—"Unidantified wreckage, the same as Lucerne's fittings, found at Lead Cove." The Lucerne's loss involves thirty lives, 23 of her own crew and seven others, shipwrecked seamen and passengers.

The supposition is that she either burst her boilers and went to pieces or struck the cliffs and foundered. The only fact beyond dispute is that a steamer and crew have perished.

As all the Lucerne's crew resided As all the Lucerne's crew resided here the disaster has appailed the whole community, being the worst whole community, being since the Greenland disaster three

years ago.
It is now feared that another wreck It is now fenred that another wreck has occurred, in this case a sailing vessel, as a spar belonging to a three-masted schooner drifted ashore at Blackhead this evening with other wreckage, which it is known to have belonged to the Licerne. This adds to the depression because the vessel may be a local fish-carrying craft, whose loss has involved the lives of another eight or ten residents of St. John's.

KILLING DEER IN THE WATER

While the game laws of Ontario are undergoing their annual amendment the Legislature shou'd put an end to the prac-tice of killing deer in the water. It is not tice of killing deer in the water. It is not sport to be paddled up to a deer that has been hounded into water and to kill the poor brute with a rifle, club or butcher-knife. It may gratify our Anglo-Saxon love of killing, but the most abunuant chariy cannot regard it as sport. Last year the express companies carried 2,032 carcasses of deer. There were 3,559 deer-hunting licenses issued, and 2,065 settlers took out permits to hunt deer. Incomplete returns published in that Game Commiseturns published in that Game Con sion's report show that there were 5,600 leer-hunters in the woods during the fiftee days' open season. A rough estimate, made on the assumption that the laws were generally regarded, places the number of deer killed at 6,500, but there are many who hold that a round ten thousand would

who hold that a round ten thousand would be nearer the actual number.

The figures are sufficiently alarming to warrant some radical change in the law to prevent depletion. The prohibition of hounding has been suggested. That would be retaliation for the settlers, who feel that be retaliation for the settlers, who feel that the laws have been changed from time to time for the benefit of city sports. The average hunter from the city, whose feet entangle in fallen limbs, and who cannot see a deer till it jumps, would stand a poor chance of killing one in fifteen days, or even fifteen weeks, still-hunting. There is a special clause in the game law applicable to the Indian peninsula of Bruce County, mak-ing it illegal to kill deer in the water or immediately after they have landed. This law should be made, applicable to the entire law should be made applicable to the entire Province. Much can be said in favor of genuine sport, but butchery should not be encouraged as a passime. The tendency to substitute the camera for the rifle is growing, and is worthy of all commendation.



o Longer Used to Record the Joys The solemn and impressive custom of

announcing death by the tolling of the church bell will soon be but a vague and distant memory. "The passing bell" has itself passed away, and its slow measured accents no longer tell the story of the departure of one more soul. The brief notice in the daily paper, while it conveys explicit informa-tion, fails to give something that the bell's tolling carried with it. The solemn rhythmic tones awakened a mo mentary vibration in the breast of each listener and bade each pause for sympathy and meditation. The bell admonished the sinner to repent and warned the thoughtless that time was flying while it spoke clearly and comprehensively and bade all scattered and preoccupied inhabitants attend its

The bell's voice is identified with all the deepest and most sacred human emotions. It has bespoken the joys and sorrows of all mankind for centuries. Is its voice to die away and have no part in the life of the future? The wedding bells ring out no more save in some song or story. The Christmas chimes are seldom wafted to our ears. The church bells ring but faintly now and under constant protest. "The curfew tolls the knell of parting day" only in verse. A sunset gun today gives greater satisfaction. The angelus sounds merel, in pictorial form, the fire bells give place to still alarms, the dinner bell is silenced in polite society. and sleigh bells are discarded.

What is the future of the bell-that happy silver tongue that has sung out the joys of all the world, that solemn tone that has mourned for the nation's dead and voiced the nation's woes and summoned to their knees the nation's worshipers?

QUARRIES OF OLD EGYPT.

Where Stone For Pyramids of the

Desert Was Procured. On the way to Philæ and the head of the cataract, a short distance south of Assouan, we come upon the ancient quarries which supplied the granite for the columns, statues and obelisks throughout Egypt for many centuries. An obelisk which we saw lies in its native bed. It is 95 feet in length, and three sides have been carefully cut, but for some unknown reason it was never separated entirely from the parent rock. The surface bears the tool marks of the workmen. The grooves in it show that it was to have been reduced at the sides. It was supposed that the stone was split from its bed by drilling holes in the rock and filling them with wooden wedges, which were afterward saturated with water, the

swelling wood furnishing the power. From illustrations in the temples it is clear that these great monuments were floated down the river on flatboats and rafts and then carried inland by artificial canals or dragged overland by thousands of slaves. In one of the tombs at Beni-Hassan is a picture illustrating the process. The great stone is loaded upon a huge sled drawn by a multitude of workmen. One man is engaged in pouring water upon the runners to prevent friction; another stands at the left of the statue and beats time, that the men may work in unison, while overseers, provided with whips, urge the laborers to their task. What king desired to extricate this block from the quarry, why it was left here, what it was to commemorate, we can never know. The riddle of the sphinx is solved, but the riddle of the obelisk in the quarry will no doubt remain

with us forever

The saloon is operated by John Juertick. As Mcs. Nation entered the place a young man embraced her and cried out: "How are you, grandma?"
The young man is manager for Juertick, and was recognized by Mrs.
Nation as her husband's (David Nation's) grandeon.

Mrs. Nation then sat down and she and her grandson had a talk, a big crowd which had followed her and expected trouble, being greatly surprised. Mrs. Nation said she was going to get the saloonkeepers to attend her

Mrs. Nation's arrival in the city was very tame. But dew people were at the depot, and they made no demon-stration. At Willard hall, where she lectured, the crowd was rather small The price of admission was 50 cents.

The mahogany bar was hacked to splinters and all the bottles and barrels were smashed. This was the work of but a few minutes.

The Schmidts ran to the front door and attempted to defend their property. Rav. Charles Lowther prevented Charles Schmidt from entering the place by striking him with an axe. The blow was a glancing one, and made only a scalp wound. As he fell to the ground Henry Schmidt made a gun play in defense of his brother that nearly cost him his life.
