

Dishes dad says doo dem

On the heels of a resounding failure at the University of Calgary to raise tuitions for foreign students, the Board of Governors here has decided to complete that action.

As of next year, foreign students will be paying the entire fees for instruction at the U of A, including tuition, field trips, and chemical supplies.

Acting on a recommendation from the provincial department of advanced education and manpower, the board decided it was unfair to Alberta's citizens to allow foreign citizens the privilege of education here at local expense.

"At a time when facilities for education are becoming more and more at a premium," said a press release prepared by the board, "we must consider more and more our responsibility to our citizens who, in the end, must pay for these facilities."

Doo Dem Dishes, a representative of the Arab Students' Association, said the move places an unfair burden on both individuals and other nations.

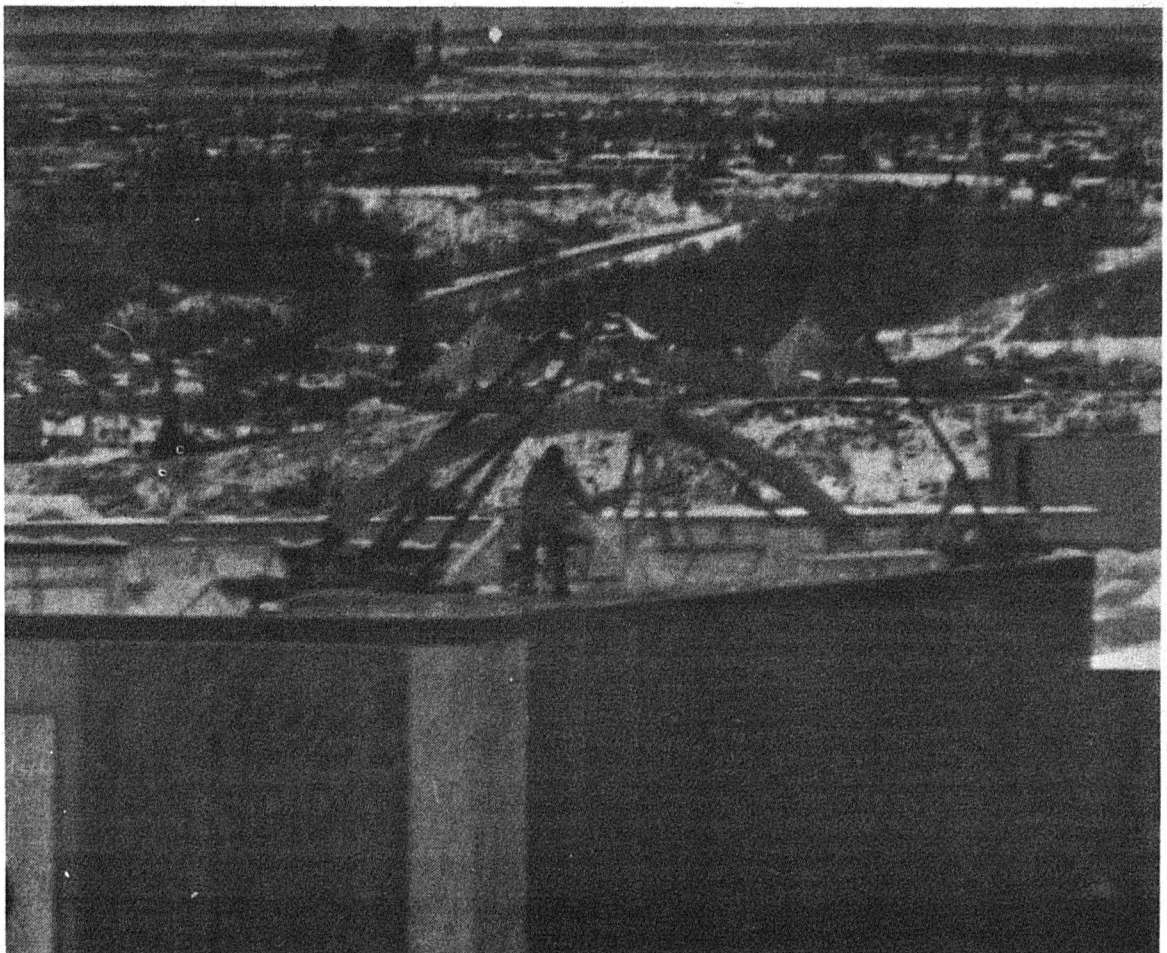
Individuals cannot be expected to pay the total cost of their extraterritorial educations especially if they come from poor countries.

As a retaliatory move, Dishes said he was planning to request that his father purchase Alberta and have it turned into a slum.

A cavalcade of foreign students' automobiles was quickly organised to protest the decision, and campus was choked within minutes by hundreds of Chargers, Corvettes, Lincolns, and the odd Mercedes-Benz.

Efforts of a towing company to clear the jam were thwarted because the owners of the cars refused to speak English.

After repeated attempts over two days to receive comment from the provincial government on a reported five and a half billion dollar bid for the province of Alberta, *The Getaway* can report only that the government will utter a glossy-eyed, "no comment".

Headsets for Tory

The delicate balance between Canadian-born and foreign students, which has hovered about the 50-50 mark for several years, has been upset this academic year by a record influx of immigrant students, forcing the University to adjust its thinking on several fronts.

Foreign-born students now comprise approximately 56% of the total student population, and the percentage of immigrant faculty members is well over the 65% mark.

In an effort to cope with the difficulties arising from this shift, the Board of Governors has voted to allot in excess of \$100,000 for the installation of headsets in all Tory Lecture theatres, and a further \$125,-

000 annually, for a five-year trial period in order to hire a team of interpreters for all classes to be held in that building.

Student kept away from destiny by law soldiers

A potential suicide victim narrowly escaped death today when he hurled himself from the roof of the Tory building. Two passersby were able to save his life by acting as a cushion for the impact.

The two heroes names will be announced pending notification of next of kin.

It is thought the suicide attempt was prompted by a particularly dulling seminar session. Classmates report that

he left the room muttering "That's fucking it". Before the other students had a chance to ask whom was fucking what or to even ponder his question in depth, he was "long gone".

His rush to the roof was witnessed by two professors returning from coffee. Professor Herring, who first noticed the lad, asked him where he was off to in such a hurry. "Destiny" screamed our suicide Charlie as he streaked

past.

The other professor, Dr. Gibbled, thought to ask if that was anywhere near Vegreville, he had a cousin there. It is not known for sure whether Charlie actually heard this comment. Gibbled, however, swears he heard something like an anguished cry.

According to informed sources, the heroes were law students who "always prided themselves on being in the right

place at the right time." They were "brave soldiers in the battle of life, both of them," said one.

For all potential suicide victims and/or suicide watchers there will be a special seminar presentation in SUB-Theatre entitled "Suicide - where do we go from here?"

One of the two law students had been married with 2.5 children, although neither professor had ever given birth.

Sask. B of G decides hockey relic must live on

Despite continuing pressure from the university's athletic department, the Board of Governors at the University of Saskatchewan will likely vote down a proposal for a new ice hockey facility at their monthly meeting tomorrow.

The proposal, first initiated by U of S hockey coach Donald Canard in 1969, was for a 3500-seat arena to replace the 140 year old Rutherford Rink, which is the present home of the U of Saskatchewan Huskies.

"We're hoping to get the rink built for several reasons," said Canard at the time he first proposed the idea. "We would like to be able to accommodate more fans, for one thing. Another is that some of the other teams in the league have complained about having to change in the players' box - some have even gone so far as to demand showers."

When the proposal finally reached the B of G last week, it was thought that the eight-man body would support it, but a

statement released yesterday would seem to dash the hopes of the supporters.

In its statement, the Board said, in part:

"We cannot support the proposal as it now stands. Reasons for non-approval are as follows:

1. The fact that the Huskies have drawn only 117 fans in the past five years demonstrates no need for increased seating capacity.

2. The recommendation of one year ago stipulating that visiting teams may dress at the hotel and leave only their skates to be donned at the players' bench should eliminate their complaint.

3. There is plenty of opportunity for players to "wash up"

after games using the sinks in the public washrooms.

4. Zero degrees Fahrenheit is NOT deemed 'too cold to play hockey' by this Board."

Although the likelihood of the proposal being defeated is great, one member of the Board has confided to this news service that the B of G would be willing to set aside a substantial sum of money to make renovations to the ancient structure.

Some of the changes would include:

- patching the holes in the walls, so that the teams would not need to flip for wind advantage before every period. (this would also significantly eliminate the wind-chill factor).
- replacing the four 50-watt

bulbs with 100-watt bulbs (this, however, would necessitate the availability of a supply of lampblack at the penalty box, at additional cost to the University, in the event that glare from the new lighting was too great).

- a roped-off area in the north stands for the press.

- fixing the hole in the roof, so that the snowplow only needs to be brought out between periods. (this will cut purple gas costs substantially).

Showers and dressing rooms, according to the Board spokesman, are still out of the question.

Coach of the Huskies, Dave Smith (who replaced Canard in 1973), said he thought the opposing teams would be much happier on a outdoor rink.

have headsets, each of which will be adjustable to channels connected to a panel of three interpreters. Languages translated will be Hindu, Chinese, and Arabic, the three largest majority groups on campus.

All classes in which the percentage of foreign students is higher than 50% will be directed into Tory theatres. If demand for classroom space is too great, the Bof G is prepared

to cough up an additional \$100,000 for the extension of the system to the Humanities Building.

Preliminary response to the plan has been favorable, one ethnic leader on campus calling it a "most wonderful and gratefully fortuitous occasion for which we are inevitably happy to hear."

The plan is slated to go into effect in time for the 1976-77 winter session.

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UA student PC candidate

Merrill Lynch, a 43 year old Commerce student here at the University, today announced that he is planning to run for the leadership of the Progressive Conservative party. He is the 473rd Albertan to join the race, which now contains 7,995 Canadians, 25 Americans (including Nelson Rockefeller), 14 Germans, and Idi Amin.

Merrill is now in his 24th year of a four year program, and, like most Commerce students, has just a few more years to go. He says he will not drop out of University if he wins the P.C. leadership, since he "never really has to come to classes anyway."

Merrill's platform is based on the idea that Canadians aren't getting enough for their tax dollar - he cites the example of the price of his Trans-Am, which he replaces each fall.

"Times were that my car

would cost \$7,300, tops. Nowadays I have to pay up to \$9,500, and I don't even get a B.T.O. tape thrown in free anymore!"

He feels the government should 'crack the whip and get down to business', as well as 'putting their nose to the grindstone and really working on it'.

He feels the Faculty of Commerce should help the fight against inflation in its own way - "They should arrange jobs for us when we graduate, so we aren't cluttering up the job market. My dad tells me there's a real need for B.Comms all over the place."

Above all, Merrill hopes that people will accept the idea of a University student heading the P.C.'s. He says everyone will welcome the wisdom and education his Commerce degree has given him, and if he

wins, his knowledge will be put to good use in "straightening the mess out, and really get working on it."

U cops set style

Campus Security may not be clothed in drab green much longer if the proposal presently before the Board of Governors is adopted.

A motion was brought forward at the last Executive Meeting of the B of G which called for \$80,000 to be set aside for the purchase of new uniforms for Campus Security Personnel and that such clothing be of "a more aesthetically-pleasing nature than at present."

While debate has been going on, Campus Security are apparently looking at some of the changes they might be able to make. Staff Sergeant Ernest Snodgrass says, "Well, you must understand that \$80,000 is not a heck of a lot of money. Right now we're looking at either purchasing a second-hand consignment of American marine uniforms, with a mottled green-and-brown design, or else being forced to go to some type of inexpensive 'pin-stripe' design. There's sort of mixed feelings about the whole thing in the force right now, and it's causing real dissension in our 'esprit de corps'."

A final decision will be reached over the holidays and new uniforms, if the purchase decision is made, will be in use before the end of next semester.

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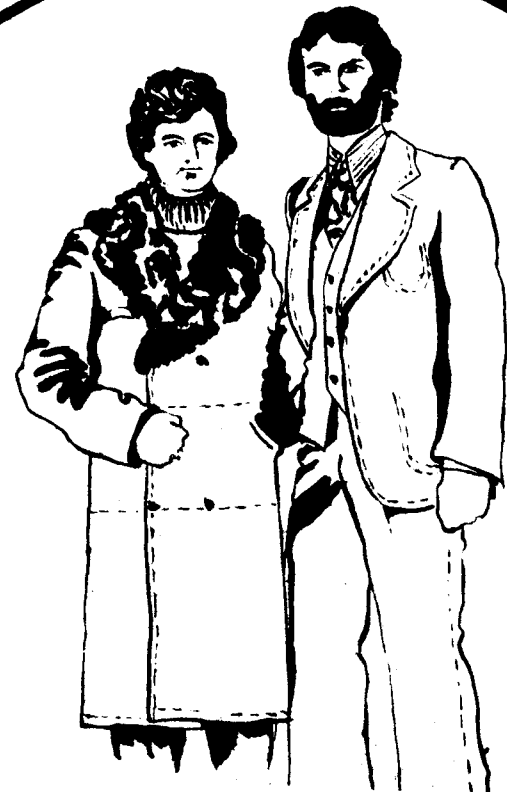
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Fans installed in wake of Tory wind gust tragedy

Police announced today that two University of Alberta professors were seriously injured in a freak accident last week.

Mr. and Mrs. J. Clavey, professors of Geography and Economics respectively, were walking through the courtyard below the Tory Tower last Friday when a freak gust of wind

picked them up and blew them across the river. Mr. Clavey landed on the roof of the Valhalla Apartments, 11307 - 99 Ave., Mrs. Clavey ended up wedged between a 1976 Cutlass Supreme and a 1968 Ford Galaxie on the lot of Edmonton Motors at 11445-Jasper Avenue.

Both are reported in good

condition at Misericordia Hospital, although their Scottish accents seem to be thickening at an alarming rate.

The problem of wind gusts around Tory are of great concern to many people, and students too. When asked about it, one student replied, "The problem of wind gusts around Tory is of great concern to many people, and even myself."

Just last week, an associate professor of Entomology was picked up by a wind gust beside Tory, and carried through the roof of the Agriculture greenhouse. He credits his survival with the split-leaf rhododendron he landed on.

A study carried out by the University's Office of Planning and Management has shown that over the past five years almost 300 people have been injured by winds around tall buildings here at the University.

They feel the figure would have been much higher if HUB had not fallen over on its side in the early stages of construction.

"If HUB had been completed in its original vertical position, high winds at the base would most certainly have killed many," said the O.P.M. head, Joe Pencilpusher.

What then is the solution to this growing problem? Physical Plant announced yesterday that a \$3,500,000 capital works program will be launched in the new year, designed to cut down winds around Tory. Money for other buildings may also be raised.

The plan for Tory calls for the construction of giant fans on top of the Arts, Agriculture, and Housing Union Buildings. These fans will suck in all that excess air blowing around Tory and funnel it into Student Council chambers, where it will be

heated and put to good use.

Until such time as this plan can be put into effect, students are advised to exercise caution when approaching the Tory building.

As a final note, the 'Kathleen Clavey Relief Fund', which will attempt to raise funds to send the Claveys to Inverness for recuperation, will be showing "Gone With the Wind" tomorrow in TL-11.

Library student victim of engineering rampage

Joe Mundane, prominent student and a member of the Boring Arts faculty, was pronounced DOA at Misericordia Hospital, after having been found in a hallway at Residence on Saturday morning.

His clothes were soaked with beer, three ounces of hashish had been shoved down his throat, and the words 'Bang on Lulu' had been carved into his chest.

As far as police can determine, Joe left home last Friday night and told his parents he was off to Rutherford Library for a seminar on the Dewey Decimal System. His father's Hillman Helix, Joe's favourite car, was in a service station, so he borrowed his brother's Valiant and set off.

The instructor at the seminar was John Walton, who told police - "I really don't know if he was here or not - in Library Science they all tend to look the same."

As far as they can determine, Joe then met some Engineer friends while heading back to his car. Joe never really liked engineers, feeling that "all that beer must do something to their heads, you know?", and so we can assume he was feeling very nervous.

He had good reason to feel that way - in recent weeks he had been writing numerous letters to the student newspaper, complaining about various rowdys on campus. Prominent in his criticism was his belief that engineers were a bad influence on other students. He felt that "all that beer must do something to their heads, eh?"

Police believe Joe was dragged off to Residence and tortured with excitement. They have determined that 183 separate parties were going on in Res that night, and Joe was forced to attend them all. Numerous Penthouse magazines were spread open near the body, and a blood alcohol count showed his blood to be 85% alcohol.

Cause of death was "one hell of a good time" according to the attending physician, who added "what a way to go".

Further investigation into the case is being hampered by boredom of police officials, who agree that Joe was, without a doubt, the most mundane murder victim ever.

Joe is survived by his father Joe, his mother Bernice, his sister Bernice and his brother Axle.

Joe's parents are married and have three children.


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

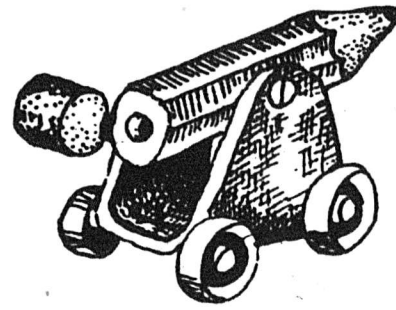

Better yet, let's just forget it. *Greg Neiman*

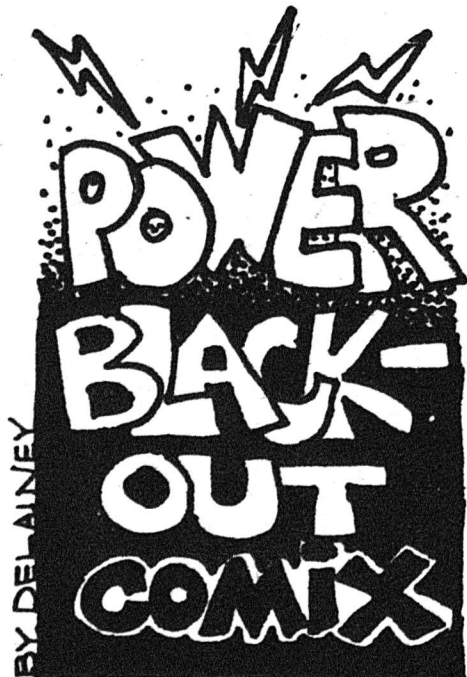

Will Edmonton collapse?

"Edmonton faces physical collapse," said Geoffrey Wilde, last Friday evening to a meeting of concerned scientists and members of the public, where he stressed the possible consequences of continued removal of coal and oil from under Alberta's surface.

"For years people have been complaining of slumping along the river valleys. Last May the Cambridge building basement warped. I am afraid that this is the beginning of a terrible period in Edmonton's history," said Wilde. "Look at the Frank slide. If people wouldn't have started mining in that area, those people would never have been killed."

"For nearly 29 years we have been pumping oil and gas out of the ground around Edmonton. Literally thousands of wells have been drilled in the Edmonton area. This represents a considerable volume that has been displaced."

Amid shouts from attending clergy that "God would not permit this to happen," Wilde continued: "If you take the air out of a balloon, it deflates. Take out the water from the beneath the ice on a lake, and it will hold out, but eventually it must crash down. I feel that Edmonton is in

danger of precisely the same fate."

Granted, the thickness of the "table" that we sit on is at least 4,000 to 6,000 feet thick, but Wilde maintains it is only a matter of time until "the world falls down."

Some of the religious in attendance pointed out that San Francisco's 1971 earthquake may have been due to a combination of oil exploration off of California's coast and the continued presence of immoral and licentious businesses there.

Don Kluck, speaker for his congregation, announced that the religious communities had not closed their eyes to the visit of Miss December from Playboy to Edmonton recently. Kluck believes there is some basis for taking the Wilde idea seriously.

"Unless we repent, doom will overcome us all," chanted a number of people at the back of the room.

Wilde maintains an immediate halt to oil and gas production followed by decisive action to remedy the situation is the only solution.

"We must drill three holes per square mile for a radius of 57 miles around Edmonton, and start pumping material back down to restore the natural

balance of the Alberta sector of the North American crust. I think that this would be an ideal way to dispose of sewage. But what is really needed is at least 100,000 pounds of Portland Normal cement with 874 pounds of Krazy Glue per hole."

Wilde's reason for advocating this last solution is to provide a sound industrial basis for the reinforcement operation. "Last year we had all kinds of drilling rigs leaving for the United States. This may provide an incentive for them to come back. And business would be great for the cement industry. It could mean a new boom for Edmonton."

I won't tell you how it happens but it has something to do with Alexander, the hero, and Raphael, the heroine, and Big Popa Jack, the fishing boat captain come villain. His wind-down or 'denouement' as more pretentious critics are fond of

calling it) is a bit weak, but then, we can't all be Shakespeare (or Barry Westgate).

But don't let that keep you from one of the best I've had a

chance to read. Buy it ... you won't be disappointed (and neither will I, if I get my kickback as I'm supposed to).

SU may be looking blue in the face

In the wake of a financially successful experiment conducted at Dalhousie University, SUB Theatre announced yesterday that it will be offering a pornographic film fare beginning early next year.

VP Services Terry Sharon, key figure in bringing the blue movies to campus, says that the Dalhousie experiment realized a weekly net profit of over 700 dollars resulting from low film rental costs in combination with high student interest. All monies went directly to the students' union coffers, and, said Sharon, "When you consider that the Dalhousie theatre seats 130 less than our own, assuming a one dollar admission charge, the probable returns look very promising indeed."

With regular showings Sharon feels profits could run as high as 1200 dollars per week, adding that "The market for this sort of thing is inexhaustible. We'd be fools not to take advantage of it."

There was even some preliminary discussion of possible allocations of the financial windfalls. Suggestions included the expansion of RATT to the sixth floor of SUB, the hiring of 'big name' bands for socials, as well as construction of the long needed bowling lanes in HUB.

The films, to be shown between 1 and 3 p.m. on Tuesdays and Wednesdays, are tentatively scheduled for a March 1st start, and with the absence of interference from the Alberta Censorship Board, Sharon expects the program to get the balls rolling again for student services on campus.

If I want any lip from you I'll rattle my fly

If you read the reviews which promise "hot, panting sex" in *Bawdy Body*, now playing at the newly-opened Dream-country Cinema, you might be receiving mis-leading information. Actually, the show is tame and hasn't got a helluva lot of sex - hot, panting, or any other kind, to offer.

Sultry starlet Stella Stephans plays a long oral role but doesn't say much (if you know what I mean). She appears, however, to genuinely enjoy the part she is required to perform. She's backed up by some fairly incompetent acting

from the minor characters, most of whom are either employees or visitors to Ms. Stephans' house of pleasure.

The plot line is simple... Stephans' is a madame in Cincinnati in the years immediately following the last war. She is apparently an emigree from a European country where prostitution is legal and she is determined to obtain a similar legal situation in Ohio. The movie follows her adventures in trying to do so. And it all makes a pretty flimsy fabric to base a full-length movie on.

As a result of this shaky

foundation, the movie tends to restrict itself to casual shots of naked human bodies floating around, but it never really gets down to some solid flesh photography, although as I've said, all the publicity blurbs try and give it the impression of being really 'hot' material. Certainly the oral shots of Ms. Stephans, and the various poses of her always top-heavy employees are stimulating to a degree, but I would say that most people going to see the show will be, on the whole, unsatisfied by the material which is presented. I was and I know it wasn't solely a result of my impressions of the acting abilities... I mean, you should get what you pay to see, shouldn't you? My recommendation is to stick to Studio 82 for a fare which gives you exactly what it promises to.

Anything more? "Just this: if you can't stand the heat get the hell out of the kitchen; but if you can't stand the food there's no hope."

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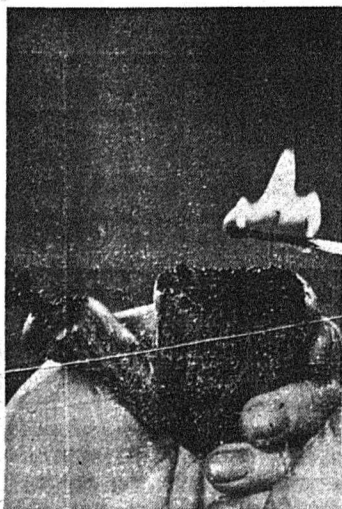
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Bear-Oiler duel first ever

"These two outstanding young men will, I am confident, make outstanding contributions to our team," said Hunter, "but we cannot, in good conscience, keep university-educated players on our roster - it has been proven time and time again that players with university backgrounds are a disruptive element on professional clubs. For one thing, they don't get along well with the other players, and for another we can't bring them up because that would mean cutting two of our outstanding performers with no-cut contracts."

Hunter also added that "it is not in our best interests to start making changes now, especially when the law of averages indicates that a win is imminent."

It was also Bears' first win of the season. Cabana is married with three children, one of them mongoloid.



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

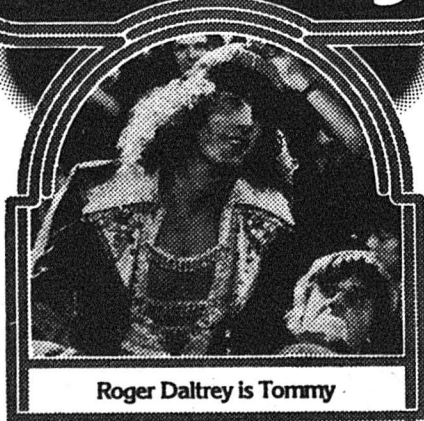
