BO STONES GROW ? Well No, Not Fxactly, but Some Get Bigge

The question in the headline is often asked, and not infrequently by scholarly people too. By way of a general answer to all such questions I would say that the best people too. By way of a general answer to all such questions I would say that the best suthorities have come to this conclusion: That rocks do not grow in the sense that plants do. They may increase in size by means of accretions, and they may also undergo other changes. Old sees beds lifted up and exposed for ages tecome stratified beds of sandstone or limestone; volcanic ashes and lava strewn over hills and plains become tufa hard enough for building stone, and the pebbly shores of rivers and smaller stream may sometimes thange into conglemerates. The simple mineral, however, do s grow, especially when it takes upon itself the form of a crystal. A sparkling prism of quartz in-creases from an atom to a monster crystal of varying length and size by what geolo-giats know as a "process of addition and assimilation."
